FRENCH GAINS. PARIS, Nov. 7.

In the color of the light produced it is far superior to any other illu-minant in general and universal use. The investigations of acknowledged authorities indicate that for the ap-proximation of artificial daylight the gas mantle has at least one and one-half times the value of the carbon-filament electric lamp. This quality is highly desirable, in-deed absolutely essential where the approximation of daylight color values is important. For lighting shops, dis-playing haberdashery, suitings, gowns, millinery, etc. the incandes-cent gas lamp is not even remotely ap-proached by any other incandescent lamp. 



Long Branch .- When the New York papers began conceding the election of HUGHES HEARS OF HIS ELECTION Hughes, there was a perceptible les sening of optimism by the White House Executive officers, but the view was expressed that the chances of Wilson were still good. Anxiety to hear from the Western and Middle Western States was shown. All the important news was telephoned immediately to the President.

New York .--- The State of New York has been carried for Hughes by a plurality of more than 100,000. The indications are that he has also carried Illinois and Indiana by like pluralities. Returns from Ohio are insufficient to determine the result in that State. All of the New England States, as well as Wisconsin and Michigan, have been removed from the list of doubtful States. Unless there is a substantial landslide for Wilson on the Pacific slopes, the election of Hughes is certain.

NEW YORK, To-day. The result of the election still was ficially in doubt early, with a decided drift toward the re-election of Wilon. Upon a dozen doubtful States, from which returns are slowly coming, depends whether Wilson has been relected or whether the next President will be Hughes. The Chairmen of both the National Committees claimed handsome majorities in the Electoral College for their candidate. The reurns, however, show a steady trend owards Wilson. All through the west, aside from the

ncerainty of result, the most remarkable thing about the election was the sudden wiping out of the Hughes ma orities piled up in the east by the reurns coming in from the west. When he Republican landslide in New York ecame known and was quickly folowed by heavy Republican victorie in New England there was a veritable stampede to announce the election of Hughes and the defeat of Wilson Hundreds of thousands waiting in the streets saw the signal lights flash the defeat of the President. The New York newspapers which have bee prominent in their support of him 1. onceded the President's defeat even some of the Western States had been heard from. Thousands of persons in the east went to bed be leving Hughes elected and woke up this morning to find the result apparntly changed while they slept.
