





ter judgment when the other driver



### Position of Nova Scotia in Union

PREMIER ARMSTRONG GIVES NO-TICE OF IMPORTANT RESOLU-

(Morning Chronicle, April 24.) A full discussion of Nova Scotia's position in the Union and the conditions which have arisen since Confederation which have prejudically affected the interests of the Province shall meet as strangers. Your duty's will take place in the House of Assembly next week, according to a hand in marriage, you'll fill your pelt notice given by Premier Armstrong with that old felt, with high and reads as follows:

"I hereby give notice that on future day, probably Tuesday or Wednesday next. I will move a resolution with respect to certain matters referred to in paragraph 19 of the Speech from the Throne at the opening of this session of the Legislature, of which more formal notice will probably be given later.

Paragraph 19 of the Speech from the Throne, to which Mr. Armstrong's notice refers, was in effect that the Government and Legislature of Nova Scotia had at various times protested by petition to the Crown against the terms of Confederation, as they affected the interests of this Provnce. The British Government and Parliament, while declining to annul the Union compact, nevertheless recognized that the arrangements respecting taxation and the regulation of trade and fisheries should be so relaxed and modified that the interests of Nova Scotia and of the mari time portion of Canada would not be prejudiced. No action has yet been indertaken by the Federal Government or Parliament to carry out, in their full letter and spirit, the in-structions of the British Government in this respect.
