The Government and Denomination-al Grants.

The Toronto correspondent of the Hamilton Times says:—"The Government has not openly taken any position on the Upper Canada College Question, so far as I can learn; but I understand the Premier declares that he will stand firm as a rock against any further appropriations towards the Sectarian or Denominational Colleges. If this be the case, and I have no doubt of it, the Government will receive a most cordial and hearty support from the great body of Reformers in the House, and what is more, they will honestly deserve it.—Though there are many things in which I am afraid the Government will fall short, yet there are others in which they are fully up to the mark of expectation. I assume the position towards them of being

"Willing to praise, but not afraid to blame."

On the Sectarian College question they are sound, and no motion can be entertained for giving pecuniary aid to these colleges, unless approved by the Govern ment, which it will not do, hence no aid will be granted, and the friends of sectarian grants may just as well abandon the petition procedure, as it will prove utterly useless. I may warn those who are in favor of the disendowment of Upper Canada College, and opposed to Government grants to the denominational colleges, that there will be desperate efforts made to continue both. Both the friends of the endowment, and the annual grants to the sectarian colleges, being anxions only to get a portion of the public funds, will leave no stone unturned to carry their designs into successful operation; and therefore those who are opposed to the endowment and these annual grants, should make equally vigorous efforts to defeat those men who are solely bent upon despoiling the Provincial Treasury for personal gain and advantage. Queen's College, of Kingston, has flooded the House with pamphlets arguing in favor of the annual grants generally, but with more special reference to its own aggrandizement."

The Ontario Address to Lord Monck.

The Address to Lord Monck, passed by the Legislative Council of Ontario, was presented at Quebec by the deputation appointed. To the Address Lord Monck replied as follows:—

GENTLEMEN,—I have just read with feelings of the most lively satisfaction, the address you have been deputed, by the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, to present to me, on the occasion of my retirement from the government of the Dominion of Canada. I am painfully conscious that your kindness has led you to overrate my personal ability and the services which I have been enabled to perform during my term of office amongst you. But it is not on that account the less a source of gratification to me to find that my motives of action have not been misconstrued and that my efforts to do my duty have been appreciated by you. I am rejoiced to believe that the picture which you have drawn of the state of happiness and prosperity, which exist in your Province, is not overcharged, and I have the fullest confidence, that under the blessing of the Divine Providence, the future destiny of the Dominion and the Province will be wrought out to a successful issue, because the policy of the former must be largely influenced, and the course of the latter will be exclusively controlled by the sound sense, the practical energy and the loyal hearts of the men of Ontario. I wish you farewell and God Speed with all my heart, and it will give me sincere pleasure if at any time my influence and ability can be made available to promote the true and permanent interests of your Province.

After routine business, it being Government day, the House went into Committee of the Whole on the Ministerial Bill to secure the independence of the Legislative Assembly, the first section being under consideration.

Mr. Blake moved in amendment such change of language as would render ineligible to the Legislative Assembly persons holding any office, commission, or employment, permanent or temporary, not only in the nomination of the Crown in Ontario, but in the service of the Dominion of Conada and the Provinces of Quehec, Nova Scotis, or New Brunswick.

Mr. Blake assigned his reasons for offering his amendment. The Attorney General replied, asserting that the amendment was unnecessary, because the language of the bill was quite comprehensive enough to embrace all that could be desired. The amendment was lost on a divison of 17 to 43.

The second section was then put. It provided that the section should not render ineligible to the Legislative Assembly "any person being a member of the Executive Council" or of the Cabinet offices.


