Value of a Nose.—The Paris Courts have been occupied debating the exact price of a merchant's nose —not one in pasteboard, plaster or silver, but one in flesh and bone. DISALLOWANCE.

John Sandfield Macdonald has been nubbed. Perhaps he does not mind that sort of thing. At all events he was snubbed once before, and does not appear to have acquired any additional prudence in consequence.— Some of the Acts which he carried recklessly through the Legislature during the first session were disal-lowed by Sir J. A. Macdonald, never during the first session were disallowed by Sir J. A. Macdonald, nevertheless the Ontario Premier during the last session, committed his previous mistake of going beyond the bounds of his authority, and suffers the same punishment of again seeing some of his pet Acts vetoed. We might have thought that the lengthened experience of which Sandfield Macdonald is wont to boast would have been a sufficient safe-guard against his treading on forbidden ground, but if we do not lay ignorance to his charge, we cannot help accusing him of possessing an overweening arrogance which makes him sometimes very disagreeable and sometimes very ridiculous. It is in the latter light he appears at present, when the Minister of Justice has vetoed three Bills, on the passage of which the Premier plumed himself. These are, the Privileges of Parliament Act, the County Courts Act, and an Act respecting increased Salary to the Judges. While the first mentioned Bill was under discussion a prominent member of the House pointed out in a clear and incontestable argument the unconstitutional nature of the measure, and showed that the House in passing such a law was exceeding its authority.—

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLIES. — The general assembly of the Free Church of Scotland met on the 20th May in the New Assembly Hall, Edinburgh. The retiring Moderator, Mr. Nixon Montrose, preached the opening sermon. The Rev. Sir Henry Moncrieff was appointed Moderator. The contributions and collections to the schemes of the Church for the year amount to \$18,868, being a decrease of \$3,667 over those of last year. The total income of the Sustentation Fund for the year is \$132,125, being an increase of over \$800 as compared with last year, and allowing a dividend of \$150 to each minister in the church. 
