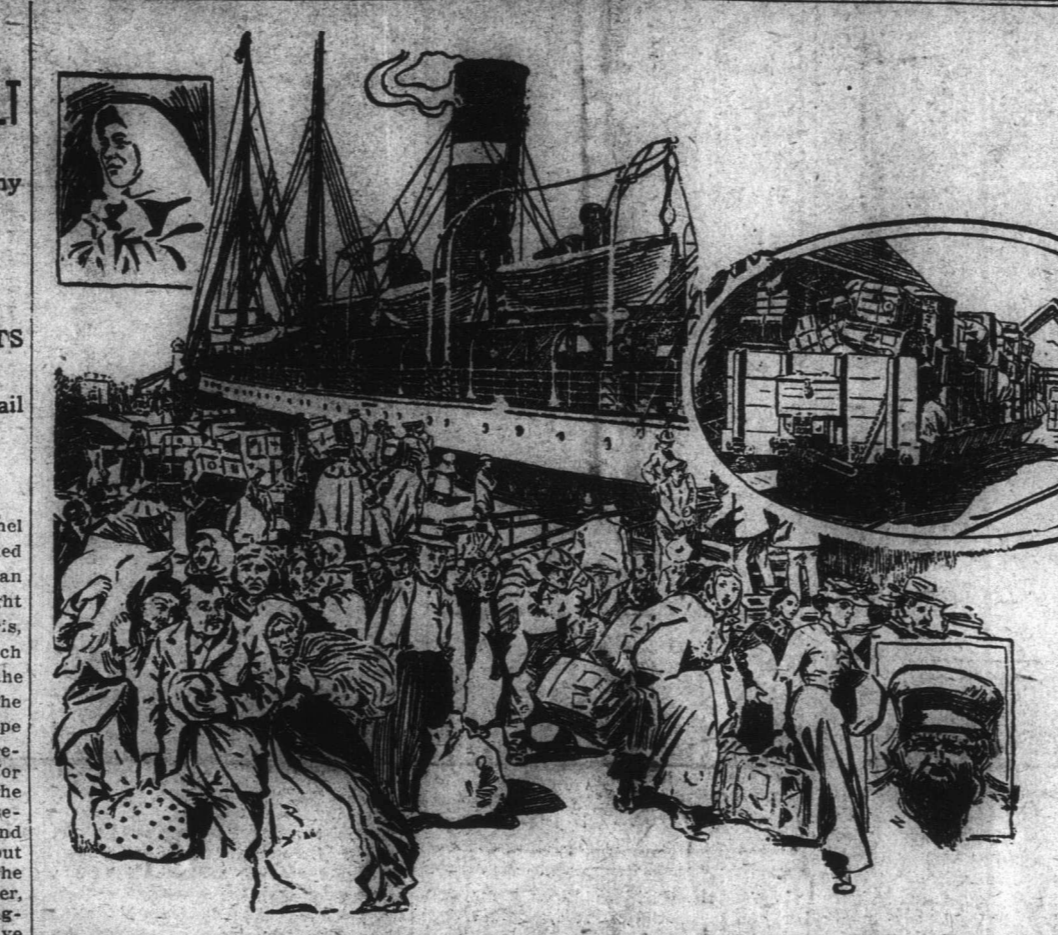

Winnipeg, Man., April 24.—When
Alberta's Royal Commission, investi-
gating the Great Waterways scandal,
meets in Winnipeg Tuesday, a curious
situation will be revealed. The su-
preme court, at the conclusion of the
arguments Saturday to have the order
by which the session of the commis-
sion is legalized in Manitoba annulled,
reserved its decision. Mr. Justice Mac-
donald offered to render a professional
decision since both sides were deter-
mined to appeal, but H. A. Robson
urged the court to take the reserve
option. This means that all these argu-
ments have not changed the status
of the case and no decision will be
made by Tuesday.

NO STRIKE ON DELAWARE

The Conductors, Trainmen, Telegraphers
and Others Make Peace.

Albany, N. Y., April 23.—There will
be no strike on the Delaware and Hud-
son railway. After conferences ex-
tending over several days between offi-
cials of the company and representa-
tives of the brotherhoods of conduc-
tors, trainmen, engineers, firemen and
telegraphers, it was announced today
that an amicable adjustment of grie-
vances of employees had been reached.
The conductors and trainmen have
agreed to abide by the award of the
board of arbitration that has under
consideration the differences between
the New York Central railroad and
its conductors and trainmen.
The telegraphers have accepted an
offer of an eight per cent advance in
pay and the engineers and firemen
have been granted a considerable in-
crease, the advance percentage of
which has not been announced, but
which is said to be satisfactory to the
men.
A satisfactory agreement as to
working conditions has also been
reached. Negotiations have been
pending between the company and the
various brotherhoods since last Janu-
ary.

CARNEY'S MEN LOOK PENNANT WINNERS

They Show Up Well in the First Game Played—Beat the Semi-Pro By Nine Runs to One.

On Saturday afternoon at Victoria Park the baseball fans had an opportunity of seeing just what sort of a ball team Bill Carney had gathered together to represent Calgary this season in the Western Canada league.

The general and united opinion was that the team was every bit as good as the advance notices had said. What Carney's men can really do on the baseball diamond remains yet to be seen. Although on Saturday they were pitted against the strongest Semi-Pro team this city has ever turned out, and perhaps as good as the team that started out the season last year in the league, the professionals had such an easy time of it in the first couple of innings, that they let up, or the score might have been nearer thirty. As it was the final tally stood nine to one, which is an unusually big score, at that.

Then again the men did not feel in anything like good baseball shape after their long trip from Seattle. They only arrived in the city at twelve o'clock, and Manager Carney gave orders for the team to be at the grounds at two.

The team that arrived here included Carney, manager; Killackey, Duggan, Smith, Clynes, Tallant, Flannigan, Stanley Gehan, Standridge and Manning, the last three pitchers. At present Carney only has three pitchers, but he has the hook out for another and if he lands the one he is after he will get a crackerjack. The manager left behind Main, first base, and Main, pitcher. The latter lost the second game with Seattle, and right away Bill and the boys sized him up as N. G. Carney came near landing Jacks, a coach pitcher, but he slipped through at the last minute. Lee Wolfe, an outfielder, who was signed, will not be asked to report, as there is no room for him in the garden. This is the man that Deacon White tried hard to land, so Deacon may yet be successful.

Walker, the short stop, whom Calgary signed up, did not come with the team. He is very fast and a good hitter, but he threw his arm out at Seattle in practice and is out of the game for some time. However, Carney does not need him, as Duggan is good at short, and with Conners, who will be here tomorrow, to hold down second, Walker will not be missed. If the worst should happen, Bill knows where to get him. Miller, who finished the season with Calgary at short last year, was also left behind in Seattle. Miller is a nice fellow at right, but not fast enough to play ball with the present bunch. Is the way Carney puts it.

With those already here, and Gouchee, Conners and another pitcher yet to report, this will complete the team which will go through the season. One of these, however, will be let out, and it is generally expected Pop Gouchee will go, as the club has already received an offer for his services.

Behind the bat Carney is well fixed. With Stanley and Flannigan he has two of the best of them, while Killackey can also hold his own with the catcher's mit. Last year in the Northwest, Killackey caught sixty odd

games, with a fielding average of over 900. It is most likely both Flannigan and Stanley will work in turns. Flannigan is a handy man alright, and he has a good reputation as an outfielder. On Saturday he got two hits out of three times up, one of which was a pretty three bagger.

Taking the team as a whole, they look a likely lot of ball players. Physically, they are hard to beat. With their new uniforms, which are dark blue with cream facings, the team looked like a newly made article just from the factory.

Owing to Conners not yet having reported, Manager Bill played second, and Flannigan in the right garden, with the other positions as reported. When the teams lined up it was easily seen that the Semi-Pro had a good bunch out, including Chan, Hoan, LeCraw, Turner, Stokes and Steidinger, all of whom have played in fast company. The latter player, with the long name was an importation from Chicago. He only arrived in Calgary a short time ago. He is a good catcher, and caught a good game. He brought in the only run scored by the Semi-Pro off his own bat, and it was a home run at that. This being the first home run of the season, this player received the full offered prize of \$100.00.

When the Pros were warming up previous to the game the fans got wise to the fact that Carney had got together. They were fast, and threw the ball around the bases almost like a bullet out of a shotgun. Figuring Chuck Conners on second, with Carney in the outfield, there is not a weak spot from catcher to outfield. Looking over the team and comparing it with the bunch Charlie Crist had to start the season with last year, would make a saint sit up and take notice. Some of the boys are not yet in shape, but another week will work wonders, and the game next Saturday will see the team working like clockwork.

Killackey at first base, Dutch Zwicker faded seventeen different ways. Killackey gathered in one or two bad ones on Saturday which were both high and wide, but he never let the ball get past him. He covered lots of ground, and can whip the ball over to third as straight and hard as anybody. What's more, he is a hitter too, and he has a good position in the batting line. This position will be a great improvement over last year. Manager Carney is a ball player every inch of him. He can catch, play second or in the outfield, and more, he can go in the box and pitch them over fast enough to make a batter sit up and take notice. This was demonstrated in the second game against Seattle, when the hard hitting Turks swatted Main out of the box in four innings. Carney went in and held them down for the rest of the game for only two scattered hits. As a manager, Bill has everything in his hands. He knows the game from start to finish, knows how to handle the players, and more, the players think a bunch of Carney and respect his judgment. When Bill says anything it goes, and the boys know it's said and done. As a ball player, Carney will not have to take a back seat with anyone in this league. Bill can chase the long ones out in the garden, but at the bat he is a demon. He has averaged two or three hits per game since the team started their games, commencing with Seattle. On Saturday he hit four out of five times at bat. In the fourth inning Bill laid down a bunt right along the third base line, and before anyone knew what had happened he was down to first.

Duggan at short covers a lot of ground. He will make a hit this year as a short stop pitcher. No doubt there are a number of fans here who remember Duggan. He played here in 1905 on the Semi-Pro team, and was at that time a good one. He was only a kid then. Duggan is so fast, that at times he is quicker than the ball, and that's how he got one of his errors on Saturday. Duggan is also a first class batter, and on receiving thrown balls and getting it to the bases he is a wizard.

Wally Smith is the same Wally, only perhaps he has a little more weight than ever. He still covers lots of ground, and is even faster than last year already. In his batting eye, he is right from the start, and he says the 300 mark will be a cinch this year.

In the outfield Carney, Clynes, Tallant and Flannigan will make a hot bunch. At fielding they are perfect, while their arms are good enough to throw to the plate from almost any distance. A feature of these men is their batting ability. Either of these men can be counted on for a hit, any time they come to bat. Tallant is considered the find of the year in university circles. Last season he played for Stanford University, and hit over 300, with a fielding average of .934.

Pete Standridge and Ed. Gehan shared the pitching. Both took it easy on Saturday, but at that they held the Semi-Pro guessing all the time. 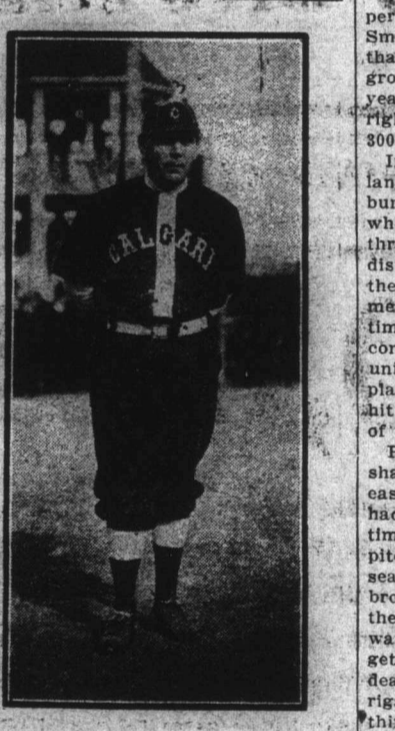

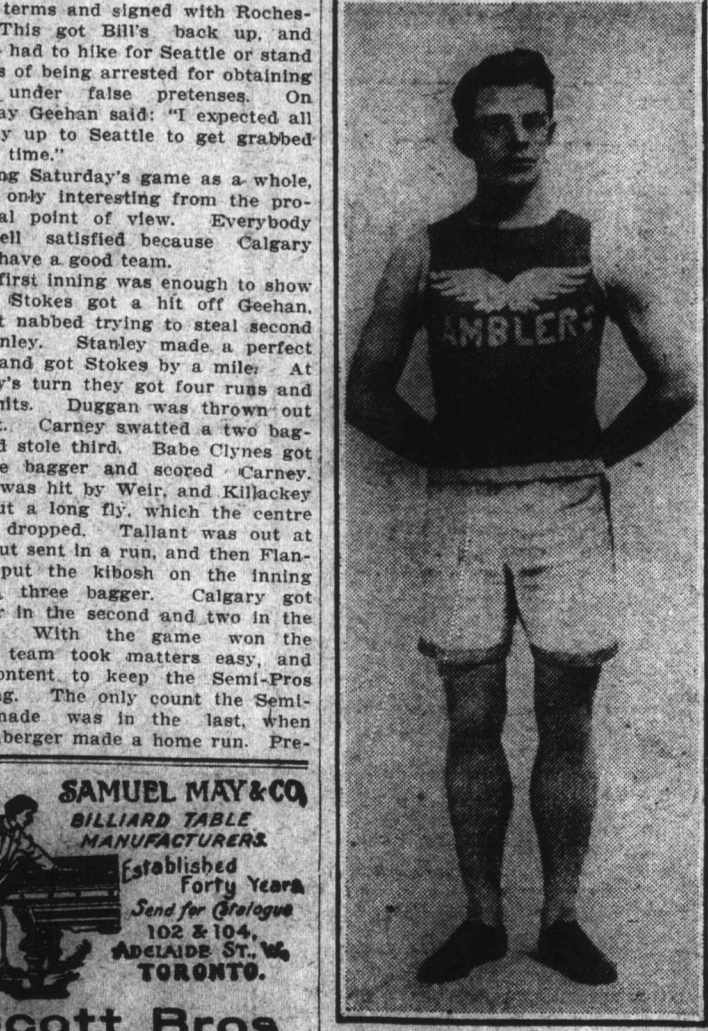

WIVES IN THOUSANDS

Farmers in Northwestern Canada Waiting for Cargo of Women

(From the Kansas City Journal)
The problem of domestic isolation is about to be solved in a large part of the provinces of northwestern Canada. The Women's Guild of Montreal has made arrangements with two lines of steamers plying between that port and England for the passage of 4,000 domestic servants to be brought over this summer. The officers of the guild announce that applications have already been made for the services of every one of these domestic servants, and that the demand is so great that they could place twice the number already engaged. Most of these 4,000 servants will be sent to the provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta. And as most of them are women, it is probable that they will be quickly snapped up as wives by the desperately lonely farmers of the Northwest. Thus history will repeat itself and the scenes enacted in Virginia and the other colonies in the earlier days of the settlement of this country will be re-enacted in Western Canada. To any one who has experienced the depressing isolation of the tremendous distances of the silent places of this region, there will appear as a novelty in the question of the Canadian farmers marrying their domestic servants. Under such depressing conditions the only question that presents itself is the biblical one—that a virtuous wife is more precious than jewels. No social problems of caste will vex the minds of these lonely pioneers of the Northwest. They understand perfectly that if they do not promptly avail themselves of the opportunity to secure a wife some other farmer will quickly deprive them of their services by making an offer of marriage. And they also understand the curious trait in womanhood which leads virtually every member of the feminine sex to prefer to work for a man all her life without pay in the hope of the realm provided the magic ring of matrimony encircles her third finger.

MOSQUITO WRECKS TWO EMPIRES?

Harvard Professor Says Malaria Laden Insect Caused Downfall of Greece and Rome

Boston, Mass., April 22.—That the fall of ancient Greece and Rome was directly due to the mosquito was asserted by Prof. W. M. Wheeler of Harvard university in a lecture yesterday. "Undoubtedly the introduction of malaria from Egypt and Asia through the medium of the mosquito was the cause of their downfall," he said. "Nearly one-half the population of Greece today is malarial infected, and the other portion, by reason of previous long attacks, has become immune."

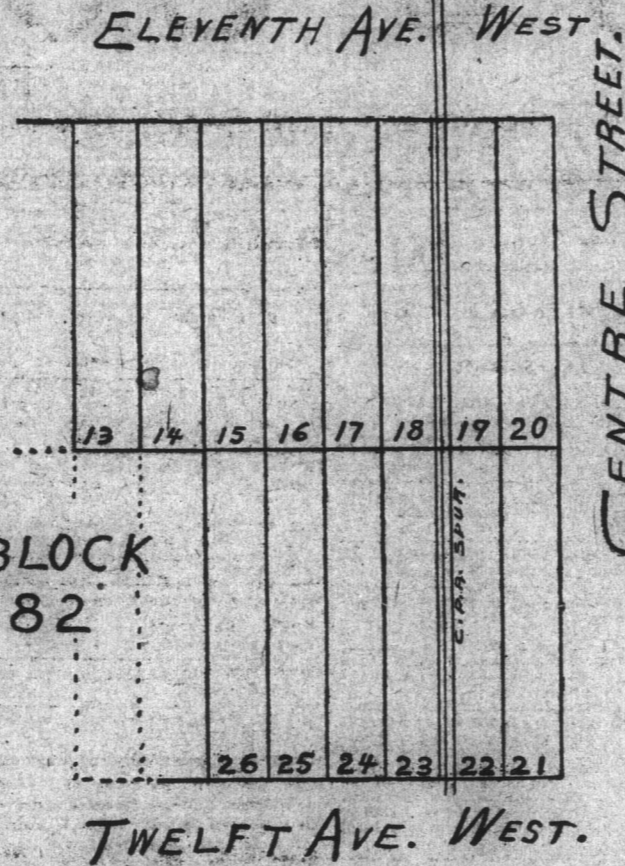

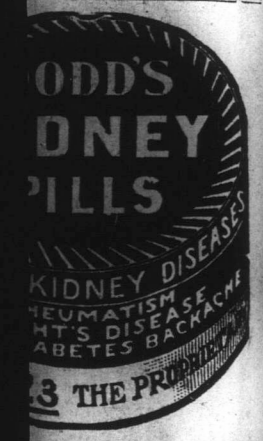
