DEVELOPMENT AT ALBERNI

The New Town Building Up and Mining Is Progressing Well.

Special to the Colonist. New Alberni, Sept. 12.—During my present visit to this locality it has often seemed to me that a plain statement of what is going on here now would be of interest to our readers. Many matters of importance are taking place, and much of interest must transpire here in the near future.

Since my last visit a different spirit seems to pervade the locality; a quiet earnestness heretofore unknown; not a boom spirit, but a thinking, working one that does not expend itself in talk but in well-considered action and unimpeachable evidence. Things are being done, not promised and predicted, as heretofore. There is no rush of tin-horn mining men, capitalists without money, taking worthless claims upon wind-bonds.

Most of the claims now held here are of some value; many of considerable merit; while the well-located locations have only been allowed to lapse. The day of outrageously high prices for mining claims has passed here, and prospects can now be bought for prospective prices. A man with cash can buy a claim here for what it is worth or less. I call to mind, for example, one instance of a claim, and it is a good one, one situated within five hundred feet of water deep enough for ocean-going steamers to come to within fifty feet of the shore, for which two years ago the owners asked for one hundred dollars, which can now be bought for twenty-five hundred dollars. There are other similar cases.

Old Alberni is situated on the river one mile from the head of Alberni canal. New Alberni, beautifully situated on the canal proper, at the head of steam navigation, is growing in New Alberni. A new building is going on at Alberni canal deep and wide here, and could easily accommodate all the craft belonging to Vancouver Island. Large ocean-going steamers can come directly to the wharf.

Much work is being done at Hayes' Landing, situated twelve miles below New Alberni, on the bank of the Hayes canal. A first-class gravity tramway, over five thousand feet long and of a daily capacity of one hundred tons, is being constructed there for the purpose of transporting ore from the Nabint Gold & Copper Mining Company's mines to the canal; an air compressor to run power drills in the mine is being erected; new buildings are being erected; the wharf has been enlarged until it has a frontage of about two hundred feet upon deep water, and great ore bunkers are being built upon the wharf, so that ore may be loaded upon vessels directly from them.

There are over four thousand feet of tunnels and drifts upon this mining property, and there are hundreds of thousands of tons of ore developed. The ore is of good value, a chalcopyrite, carrying gold. The workings are now over four hundred feet deep in ore, and a seven hundred foot tunnel, 6x8 feet, is now being run, and will strike the veins at a depth of eight hundred feet. When the tramway is completed the shipment of ore will begin.

It is from the first being the policy of the company to develop a mine, rather than shipping ore, and this policy has been carried out under the direction of Col. G. H. Hayes, who has been managing director and superintendent of the company from the start. As a result this company has now one of the great mines of British Columbia. In and about the mine are now employed over one hundred men. The Thistle was sold to California parties about three months ago for a small sum; it was only a prospect then, but the work done upon it since the purchase has developed large bodies of high grade chalcopyrite ore, carrying good gold values.

Work upon it is being pushed and a wagon road is being built from the canal to the mine; new buildings are being erected and a large wharf will soon be constructed. Over one hundred men are now employed by the company. Clarence S. King, of San Francisco, is superintendent.

The Monitor mine, five miles below Hayes' Landing, has inaugurated an extensive system of development and is pushing the work with vigor. Space will not permit me to go further into particulars or mention other work that is going on near here.

In addition to claims near and upon Alberni canal, there are prospects upon Anderson lake well worth examination. The channel between the lake and the head of Uchuckit harbor is now being deepened by the government.
