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WONDERFUL WINNIPEG

Arrangements for the \$15,000 Rowing Match - The Tennis and Canoe Clubs - Crowded - Hosts of Fortune-seekers.

The following sketchy notes were received this morning from our special correspondent at Winnipeg, Manitoba, under date of 21st inst., and give a realistic description, in terse language, of the future Chicago of the north west:

Mr. J. P. Murray, formerly of Dakota, and now of Winnipeg, has been invited to give an exhibition of sculling on the Red river. Murray is also the promoter of the \$15,000 rowing match for prizes for consolation.

The current is about five miles an hour in the summer, and as its name signifies, the river is very muddy. Boating upon it is dangerous, owing to the existence of an underwater bar. The bar is a mud, which will hold a man if he happens to strike it. Some years ago the chief of the police, in consequence of a falling in the river, when the criminal managed to escape the boat.

There is more so-called champagne drunk in Winnipeg than in any city of its size on the continent. American supplies the clarified cider, which does duty for the "widow." A well known young man cannot leave for the east for a week or two unless he is sped on his way by a champagne supper.
