New York, Aug. 31.—About 2 o'clock this afternoon Tom Davis, otherwise known as William Warren, was shot and killed in a room which he called his office at 113 Reade street, by a man who gives his name as James T. 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

A Jockey Killed at Brighton. NEW YORK, Sept. 2.—The weather at Brighton Beach to day was bracing and invigorating, though somewhat chilly. There was more than an average attendance. The track was in good condition A sad accident occurred in the second race A sad accident occurred by which Moran, one of the most promis-instantly killed, by which Moran, one of the most promising young jockeys, was instantly killed, and two other jockeys, Garrison and Lane, narrowly escaped the same fate. Thirtyone horses started, although twenty-two owners had applied to have their entries withdrawn, considering the number too great on this track to give their animals a reasonable chance to win. Some of the pwhers also feared just such an accident as unfortunately occurred from the overnmfortunately occurred from the over-rowding of the track.
