Some practical facts are furnished by the experience of the workmen engaged in the construction of the new Central railway over the main range of mountains in Peru. The line starts from Lima, in latitude 12°. The summit tunnel of the line at Galeria is at the height of 15,645 feet, or a little under the height of Mont Blanc, but it must be remembered that the climatic conditions are very different and more unfavorable in Peru than in Europe. Mr. E. Lane, the Peru than in Europe. Mr. E. Lane, the engineer in chief, finds that the workmen, up to an altitude of 8000 to 10,000 feet, do about the same relative quantity of work as at the sea level, provided they have been inured to the height of brought up in the country. PUBLIC NOTICE.

Whereas it is desirable to change the names of certain streets and avenues in various wards in the City of Toronto.

And whereas the Municipal Act requires every Bylaw changing the name of a street in a City or Town to state the reasons for the change, and that the same should be expressed to be subject to the approval of the County Judge.

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Toronto enacts as follows: Ward Number Two.

MOULTON-STREET.

a, that the name of the street is known as Gordon-avenue, extend Dale-avenue to Elm-avenue in Ward No. 2, is kereby changed to hereafter be known and designated ton-crescent, the said street being a tion of Nanton-crescent.

1. That the name of the street heretofore known as Anderson-lane, being the first street north of Queen-street and extending from Simcoe-street to William-street in Ward No. 4, is hereby changed to and shall hereafter be known and designated as Pullanplace, there being another street in the said municipality named Anderson-street.

2. That the name of the street heretofore known as Bear-street, extending northerly fromSt. Patrick-street, between Hickory-street and Carlisle-street in Ward No. 4, is hereby changed to and shall herealter be known and designated as Casimir-street, the property-owners on the said street having requested this change.

That the name of the street heretofore known as Saurin-street, extending from Lisgar-street to Northcote-avenue and situated between Argyle-street and McKenzie-crescent in Ward No. 5, is hereby changed to and shall hereafter be known and designated as Afton-avenue, there being another street in the said municipality named Sorauren-avenue, and a largely signed petition from the property owners on the said street having been received asking for this change. IV.

This bylaw and all the changes therein provided are subject to the approval of the Judge of the County Court of the County of York, and the same shall not take effect until approved of by such judge after due notice as provided in the Municipal Act.

COUNTY OF YORK, In the matter of the proposed Bylawto change the names of certain streets in the City of Toronto, submitted to the Council or the said City on the 13th day of February, A.D. 1833.

I hereby appoint Saturday, the 15th day of April, A.D. 1893, at the heur of 10 o'clock in the forenoon, at my chambers, corner of Church and Adelaide-streets, as the time and place for considering the above-named Bylaw, and for hearing the advecates for the changes and persons who may deem themselves aggrieved thereby and may desire to be heard, and any other persons interested in the said matters.

I direct that the said Bylaw shall be published, in compliance with the provisions of the statute, in The World newspaper, published in the City of Toronto.
