Whether a Level Crossing, a Subway or Overhead Bridge is Ordered in Parkdale City Must Bear All Expenses—City and Railways to Confer Re Don Bridge.

OTTAWA, July 31.—The Railway Committee of the Privy Council has a regular full day today, sitting from 11.30 until nearly 6, with only an hour interval for lunch. Twenty-six cases were on the order paper, the majority of which stood and the balance were either decided or postponed and decided. All the Toronto cases were up again, but not finally disposed of.

CHINA'S SECOND DISASTER

THE BEST SHIP IN HER NAVY REEF TO THE BOTTOM.

Two Chinese Cruisers Captured With Great Loss of Life—Japan Makes an Explanation Why She Seized the Vessels, which the British Press Rides—China Will Fight It Out.

SHANGHAI, July 31.—News has just been received here of a desperate battle of the fleets of China and Japan, in which the Chinese were defeated. The two largest battleships but one in the Chinese service, was sunk, and two other large Chinese vessels were captured. The Japanese reported that the Chinese fleet consisted of the two battleships and two torpedo boats, and that the Chinese fleet was engaged in a desperate battle with the Japanese fleet. The two Chinese cruisers supposed to have been captured or destroyed during the engagement which ended so fatally for the Chen-Yuen are the Chen-Yuen and the Foo-Chin.

The Chen-Yuen was British Built. The Chen-Yuen was a protected cruiser, built at Devonport, England, in 1890, and with an average speed of 18 knots in her trial runs. She was armed with two 12-inch main batteries and two 6-inch secondary batteries. She also carried eight 4-inch rapid fire guns, six 3-inch anti-aircraft guns, and six 2-inch anti-aircraft guns.

The Foo-Chin was also an English-built protected cruiser, very much similar to the Chen-Yuen. She had a displacement of 2500 tons, was built in 1890, and carried a main battery of two 12-inch guns. She was also armed with six 4-inch rapid fire guns, six 3-inch anti-aircraft guns, and six 2-inch anti-aircraft guns.
