own use. Devastation by Prairie Fires. The Mounted Police Department has received reports from different police divisions, which tell of great devasta-tion by prairie fires in the Territories during the past few weeks. In addi-tion to the tracts already mentioned, over which the fire has run, reports to hand show that a stretch of coun-try from Bressylor settlement, north of Battleford, to Fort Pitt, 45 miles of country, was over-run by fire. This particular fire in its course licked up over seven hundred tons of hay. The Quadra Safe, by James Playfair of Midland, has been wrecked on the Magnetic Reef, north of Manitoulin. A private telegram was received to that effect by Capt. Wm. Hall of this city, on Monday night, and as it was dated from Thessalon, the accident must have occurred on Sunday. The barge was bound to Mid-land with 25,000 bushels of wheat, con-signed from Port Arthur to McBean & Sons, this city. The cargo was in-sured in the British America Assur-ance Company for \$10,000 and the boat itself for \$18,000 in the Reliance Mar-ine Insurance Company of England.
