Mr. Cushing spoke at length of the advances Congregationalism was making and how it had made more advancement than any of the smaller denominations except the Jews, and they were largely swelled by immigrants from Russia. Mr. R W. McLachlan spoke of the three great obstacles standing in the way of union of the Congregationalists and Presbyterians-Church courts, the confession, and an unconverted membership. 
