Dear Vice-Chancellor,

As requested by the Conference of Canadian Universities I have prepared a summary of the regulations for degrees of the universities of the United Kingdom.

Before the Bureau was established consultation and co-operation amongst the universities was almost unknown. Each university drafted its ordinances without reference to those in force in other universities, with the result, as you will gather from my summary, of which I am sending you **50** copies, that there is great variation in detail in the conditions laid down for qualification to sit for the final examinations for degrees. I have endeavoured to reduce the regulations, as far as possible, to common terms.


I thank you for the promise contained in your letter of Nov. 23 of bringing before your Board of Governors the matter of renewing their contribution to the Bureau funds.

Publication of Abstracts of Theses
presented for Research Degrees.

The "Cambridge Reporter" of Feb. 23 contains a report on this subject by the Board of Research Studies:-


"The Board have had under consideration the question of the publication in the "University Reporter" of short summaries of dissertations approved for Research Degrees. Such summaries would lead to a more general reference to, and use of, the dissertations themselves, which are deposited in the University Library. They would also provide a complete and readily available record of the research work accomplished in this University under the direction of the Degree Committees and the Board, would assist future Research Students, both at Cambridge and elsewhere, to formulate their schemes of research, and would help to prevent overlapping and the repetition of work in directions that have already been explored by previous workers.

In order to ensure the completeness of the record, the Board consider it desirable that the submission of suitable summaries should be made compulsory."

It is proposed that the summaries should be from 100 to 300 words in length.

Although not specifically mentioned in the agenda for Congress the Publication of the results of research in universities is implicit in the subject "Co-operation in Research throughout the Empire" and has a bearing on "The actual working of the Ph.D. scheme."

Table 1(a) can be utilized, substituting 'Canada' for 'British Isles'.

Table 2(b) unnecessary and confusing, as many full time students must
be admitted twice, i.e. in Arts and later in Law, Medicine,
etc., which require completion of a preliminary Arts course.

Table 2(a) and 2(c) useful.

Tables 2(b) and 2(c) unnecessary in this University.

Tables 3(a), 3(b), 3(c), 4(a), 4(c) and 5 can be used.

Table 4(b) unnecessary.

Summary. We are not in favour of grouping subjects which in this
University are taught by different faculties under one faculty;
thus we would not show Music as a part of Arts nor Dentistry as a
part of Medicine.

The following Schools which are part of this University do
not properly come under any of the classifications given:-

School for Teachers,
School of Household Science
School for Graduate Nurses
School for Social Workers
Department of Child Study

It follows from our point of view some extension of the Summary is desirable.

We should therefore suggest with regard to the Summary that lines be given to Law, Dentistry and Music, also that a line be given the other Schools. On the last page we suggest that "Faculty" should read "Faculty or School."

We should like to remark that before additional statistical work is placed on staffs already generally overloaded, the necessity for such work should be clearly demonstrated.



University Statistics.

The Bureau Committee has had under consideration the question whether it can usefully take any steps towards the formulation of a common policy for universities in all parts of the Empire in the matter of statistical returns and the adoption of a uniform nomenclature and uniform definitions and categories for the purposes of such returns. By the courtesy of the University Grants Committee I am able to send herewith a specimen set of forms and instructions used in Great Britain in compiling Student Tables. These represent the outcome of many years experience and careful study. My Committee would be glad to learn which of them, if any, you consider unsuitable for adoption in your university, and for what reasons. A summary of the replies to this circular letter will be supplied to delegates to Congress.

Your special attention is invited to the summary following Table 5. In the event of these forms and definitions being generally acceptable they will be used for the purpose of securing returns for incorporation in future editions of the Universities Yearbook.

INSTRUCTIONS AND DEFINITIONS TO BE OBSERVED IN COMPILING THE STUDENT TABLES.

(1) The object of Tables 2-5 is to indicate the body of work being done of a University standard. The following definitions and instructions should be studied in compiling the Tables.

Yes (2) Students should be allocated to the several years of the Courses according to the nature of the work done by them and not to the length of time they have attended the Institution; thus, a student repeating a first year Course during the second year of his attendance should be entered as a first year student.

Yes Attention is drawn to the classification adopted for Tables 2(a), to (d). The object is to secure that the statistics of "advanced" students entered in these tables shall be confined to those who are engaged in research work, or who, if not so engaged, are working for a higher degree or are taking courses of a standard appreciably higher than that for a first degree in the subjects which they are studying.

Yes Students in a Training Department for Teachers who, after obtaining a degree in Arts or Science, are spending their fourth year in receiving their professional training, and students who are taking such vocational medical diplomas as the Diploma in Public Health, should not be classified as "advanced". Such students should be entered in Table 4(a) or 4(b).

A "first Diploma" course is normally one the entrance qualification for which is approximately of the standard of matriculation. This definition will not, however, apply to the courses mentioned in the preceding paragraph.

(3) Students following full-time Courses which involve instruction given elsewhere than in the Institution, e.g. in workshops under the "sandwich" system, should be included as full-time students in Table 3 (a) or 4 (a), but as a separate entry, provided the instruction so given is undertaken under conditions approved by the Institution.

Students reading for Law Degrees given by the University and following Courses occupying their full-time, when reading in chambers and court practice are taken into account, should be returned as full-time students. Students taking Courses in Law for the purpose of examinations held by other bodies should be returned as part-time students.

Students enrolled for full-time Courses extending over one or more academic years but absent for a part of a session should be included as full-time students.

Students following Courses which involve full-time attendance while they last, but which extend over only part of the academic year, should be included in the appropriate part-time Tables.

In order to avoid duplication of statistics in the various returns, full-time medical students attending at two different Institutions on the grant list during the academic year should be included as full-time students by the Institution at which they attend for the greater part of the year. They should be excluded from the tables and the summary by the other Institution, but may be shown in a footnote.

(4) In Tables 2 - 5, students should be entered in detail under their respective Departments, but in the Summary Table under Faculties, e.g. students shown under Mining, Engineering, Metallurgy, Applied Chemistry, Architecture, etc. in the Tables should be grouped together under Technology in the Summary.

(5) Evening students should be included in Tables 2-5 only when they are doing work at least comparable to that being done by day students proceeding to a Degree or Diploma.

(6) No student should be entered more than once in Tables 2-5. If a student is eligible for entry under more than one category, he or she should be placed in the higher, e.g., a student in the Faculty of Medicine reading for a Degree and for the Diploma of the Conjoint Board should be entered as a Degree student only.

(7) By a matriculated student is meant one who is qualified to enter upon a Course for a first Degree; in the Scottish Universities those students only should be entered as matriculated students who have satisfied the requirements of the University Entrance Board.

(8) Students attending University Tutorial Classes should not be included in Table 5, but in the separate space provided.
