APPLICATION having been made to me for a Catalogue of the works which I possess relating to the Exhibition of 1851 ; and it appearing from inquiries that many of the works—temporary, of course, in interest and character—are not, even now, to be obtained, I have been induced to print a Catalogue, believing that it might be acceptable to those who took an active part in the arrangements for the Exhibition, and who received in recognition of their services "Presentation Sets" of the publications from Her Majesty's Commissioners. Few persons, perhaps, are aware of the number of works issued on that occasion, both in this country and abroad.

In nearly all cases the title-page has been copied literally. The only exception is in regard to quotations, which often appear with double inverted commas, whereas in this Catalogue single inverted commas only have been employed—the double commas having been reserved to indicate extracts from the book itself or translations of such extracts.

The publisher's or printer's name, date, and price, when they do not appear on the title-page and could be ascertained, are inserted between brackets ; also the size of the work and the number of pages.

The number of pages has been copied from the paging of the book ; it being thought better to adopt this system, as a rule. It is requisite, however, to mention that in some instances the introductory pages have been by the Printer of the work included in the continuous paging, whereas in others the Arabic numbers commence from the first page.

A brief explanation—when possible, in the words of the Author, or in literal translations of such words—has been added, when the title appeared not clearly, or sufficiently, to explain the contents of the work or the views of the writer.

In addition to Books and Pamphlets, the titles of such engravings and music as are in the collection have been added ; but it is not presumed that either of these departments is complete. Mere trade Pamphlets have not been included.

The Books will be found alphabetically arranged, according to the first word

on their title-page, except in the case of general headings—"Exhibition of 1851"—"Exhibition of Industry of All Nations"—"Great Exhibition of Industry of All Nations"—"Exposition de 1851"—"Exposition Universelle de 1851"—"Exposition de Londres"—"Exposition Universelle de Londres"—and "Grande Exposition de Londres"—when not substantive titles.

Cross-references will be found to Authors' names and pseudonyms when they appear on the title-page. When the Author's name appears in the body of the work it has been added in the note.

With regard to cross-references generally, the search is to be made for the first word of the title, the others having been added only to explain precisely the work referred to. Thus, under "Birmingham," reference is made to "Slight sketch of Manipulatory Processes." To find this work the search is to be made under "Slight."

The works marked ^o have been seen, but copies have not yet been obtained.

The works marked * are only known by advertisements, and it is doubtful from the inquiries made whether some of them were ever published.

The abbreviations used are those adopted at the British Museum.

w. y. signifies that the title-page is without year.

v. directs to the title under which the description of the work will be found.

Had the Commissioners been occupied all their lives in the management of colossal fêtes, they could not have provided more sagaciously for all possible emergencies."]

He consequently admonishes his countrymen to strenuous exertions in favour of national unity.]
