## ERRATA.

Under the head "Duties on Imports" at page 64, the Imperial Duty on "*Iron, all, except Pig,*" is stated at 7 per cent. instead of 4 per cent.

NOTE.—At page 76, under the head Corporation of Montreal, the name of the Mayor is left blank, the question of Mayorship not having been decided by the Court of Queen's Bench at the time the sheet was printed.—The Judges gave their decision on the 2d of December, declaring the election of Mr. Mills, as Mayor, illegal; and, on the 11th December, declared the election of Mr. Ferrier illegal also.—On Monday, the 14th, the City Council proceeded to the election of a Mayor, when JOHN E. MILLS, Esq. was chosen.

## ECLIPSES.

In the year 1847, there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon,—all invisible in Canada.

I.—A partial Eclipse of the Moon, March 31— invisible in Canada: opposition in Right Ascension at 9 minutes after 5 in the evening.

II.—A Total Eclipse of the Sun, 15th April,— invisible in Canada: Conjunction in Right Ascension at 9 minutes after 1 in the morning. This Eclipse will be visible at the Cape of Good Hope, in the Islands of Madagascar, Borneo, and the Indian Ocean.

III.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, September 24th, invisible in Canada. Opposition in Right Ascension at 8 minutes after 10 in the morning.

IV.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, October 9th, invisible in Canada. Conjunction in Right Ascension at 50 minutes after 3 in the morning. ,

**VICTORIA**, Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, [daughter of the late Duke of Kent, by Victoria Maria Louisa, sister of Leopold, K. of the Belgians] born May 24th, 1819—succeeded her uncle, Wm. 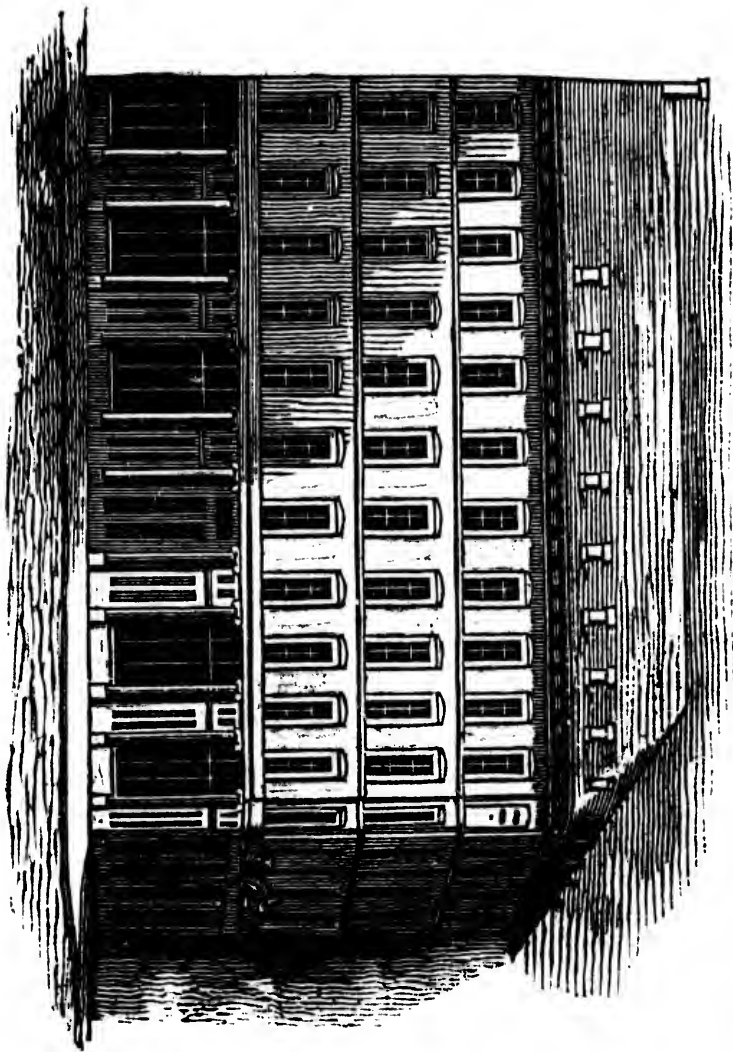

## REGULATIONS &amp; RATES.

1.—All letters sent by post in Canada and other Provinces of British North America, are charged by weight.

2.—The scale of weight for charging postage is the same as that by which letters to and from the United Kingdom are charged, viz :

For a Letter not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz	.....	1	Rate
Ditto	ditto	1 oz	.....2 Rates
Ditto	ditto	2 oz	.....4 Rates
Ditto	ditto	3 oz	.....6 Rates

And so on, adding two rates for every additional ounce. After the first ounce, fractional parts are not noticed ; thus, if a letter exceed 1 ounce, it becomes liable to four rates, and if it exceed 2 oz six rates.

3.—The Rates of Postage on letters are—For a Letter not exceeding half an ounce, (without regard to the number of pieces of which it is composed)

4.—Letters to and from the United Kingdom are subject to an uniform charge of 1s. 4d. currency, per half ounce ; and on letters, *via the United States*, the provincial charge is an uniform rate of  $2\frac{1}{2}d.$  from any part of Canada to the frontier line, and  $2\frac{1}{4}d.$  for every additional half ounce. This charge must be pre-paid, as also the American postage to the Atlantic port,—Boston or New York.



NEWSPAPERS.

Colonial Newspapers, not exceeding 2 oz., to or from any part of the British N. American Provinces, pay one half-penny, pre-paid or not, at the option of the sender.

If sent to any British Colony beyond sea, (not intended to pass through the United Kingdom,) or to any foreign country, except the United States, one halfpenny, *to be pre-paid.*

If sent to any part of the United States—one penny—to be PRE-PAID.

Newspapers from the United States pay, on delivery, 1*d.* Provincial, in addition to the United States postage.

Colonial Newspapers sent to the United Kingdom, or to any British colony by way of England, and British newspapers from the United Kingdom to any part of Canada, are subject to a duty of a half-penny, each, to be paid on delivery.

With exception of these last, (which are not limited as to weight,) a newspaper to pass under the foregoing regulations, must not exceed 2 oz., otherwise it will be liable to pamphlet postage, *i. e.* one penny per oz.

British Newspapers can be re-posted in Canada, subject to one half penny postage.

Supplements charged as distinct Newspapers.

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS IN PARLIAMENT.

If sent to the U. Kingdom by packet, or to any part of British North America or British West Indies, one penny for every four ounces.

If intended to be sent to the U. Kingdom by private ship,—double the above rates.



No packet or cover containing votes or Legislative proceedings, permitted to be sent through the Post, if exceeding six pounds weight.

PAMPHLETS AND OTHER PUBLICATIONS.

If printed in the United Kingdom, British North America, or British West Indies, may be sent to any place in British North America, the United States, or British West Indies, at the reduced inland rate of one penny per ounce, in addition to sea postage, provided they do not exceed 16 ounces.

If printed and mailed in the United States, they are liable on delivery in this province to the same rate, of one penny per ounce; but if re-posted in Canada, they are charged with full letter postage.

Newspapers, Pamphlets, Publications, and Parliamentary Proceedings, must be sent without covers, or with covers open at the ends. If this is not done, or if there be any marks or writing on them besides the address, full letter postage will be charged.

#### EXEMPTIONS.

The following exemptions refer to the Prov. duty only:—

I.—Copies of the Holy Scriptures, printed in the United Kingdom.

II.—Donations of Books or Clothing, specially imported for the use of, or to be distributed gratuitously by any Charitable Society in the Province.

III.—Philosophical Apparatus, Instruments, Books, Maps, Statuary, Busts and Casts of Marble, Bronze, Alabaster or Plaster of Paris, Paintings, Drawings, Engravings Etchings, Specimens, of Sculptures, Cabinets of Coins, Medals, Gems, and all other collections of antiquities,—provided the same be specially imported in good faith for the use of any Society incorporated or established for philosophical or literary purposes or for the encouragement of the fine arts, or for the use or by the order of any University, College, Academy, School or Seminary of learning within this Province.

IV.—Arms or Clothing which any Contractor or Contractors, Commissary or Commissaries, shall import or bring into the Province, for the use of Her Majesty's Army or Navy, or for the use of the Indian Nations in this Province:

provided the duty otherwise payable would be defrayed or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of this Province.

V.—Specimens in Natural History, Mineralogy, and Botany.

VI.—Seeds of all kinds, farming utensils and implements of husbandry, animals for the improvement of stock,—when specially imported in good faith by any Society incorporated or established for the encouragement of agriculture.

## REMARKS.

I.—The specific Duties are levied according to the Imperial Weights and Measures, and in Sterling money,...20s. stg.—24 4d cy. or \$4 87. The Imperial Quarter of Grain is equal to  $8\frac{1}{2}$  of our Winchester Bushel.

II.—In calculating the advalorem Duties under the Imperial Act, *one-tenth* is first added to the amount of the invoice.

III.—When the Tares cannot be ascertained from the Invoice, the following are allowed:—On Coffee, in bags, 3 pr. cent.; Coffee in casks, 12 pr. cent.; Raw Sugar and Molasses, 12 pr. cent.; Loaf Sugar in casks or boxes, 15 pr. cent.; Leaf Tobacco in casks, 12 per cent.

IV.—Bonds, satisfactory to the Collector, will be taken for the Provincial Duties (except the Provincial Duties on Live Stock, Grain, Meal, Provisions, and other agricultural Produce,) when the same shall exceed £50 currency, at 6 months; but, all dated from 1st September till 1st April, are due on the 1st April. All other duties are payable in cash.

V.—Goods imported, whether by sea or inland, may be entered for warehousing, and exported from the warehouse without payment

of duty. American products may descend the St. Lawrence in Bond, and be exported into the United States by way of Laprairie and St. Johns.

**UNITED STATES DRAWBACK BILL.**—The following two clauses of this Bill bear upon the trade with this Province :

**Sec. 7.** And be it further enacted, That any imported merchandise which has been entered and the duties paid or secured according to law, for drawback, may be exported to the British North American Provinces adjoining the United States; and the ports of Plattsburgh, in the district of Champlain; Burlington, in the district of Vermont; Sackett's Harbor, Oswego and Ogdensburgh, in the district of Oswegatchie; Rochester, in the district of Genesee; Buffalo and Erie, in the district of Presqu'isle; Cleveland, in the district of Cuyahoga; Sandusky and Detroit, together with such ports on the sea board, from which Merchandise may now be exported for the benefit of drawback, are hereby declared ports from whence foreign goods, wares and merchandise on which the import duty has been paid, or secured to be paid may be exported to ports in the adjoining British Provinces, and to which ports foreign goods, wares and merchandise may be transported inland, or by water, from the port of original importation, under existing provisions of law, to be thence exported for benefit of drawback: Provided, That such other ports situated on the frontiers of the United States, adjoining the British North American Provinces, as may hereafter be found expedient, may have extended to them the like privileges, on the recommendation



of the Secretary of the Treasury, and proclamation duly made by the President of the United States, specially designating the ports to which the aforesaid privileges are to be extended.

Sec. 8.—And be it further enacted, That all laws now in force in relation to the allowance of drawback of duties on goods imported into the United States, and exported therefrom, and in relation to the conditions and evidence on which such drawback is to be paid, shall be applicable to the drawback allowed by this act. And, in addition to existing provisions on the subject, to entitle exporters of goods to the drawback allowed by this act, they shall produce to the collector of the port from which such goods, wares and merchandise were exported, the certificate, under seal of the collector or other chief revenue officer of the port to which said goods, wares, and merchandise were exported in the said adjoining Provinces; which certificate shall be endorsed upon a duplicate or certified copy of the manifest granted at the time of such exportation, and shall state that the same identical goods contained in the same manifest had been landed at such foreign port, and duly entered at the custom house there, and that the duties imposed by the laws in force at such port upon the said goods had been paid, or secured to be paid, in full, and the said exporters shall also produce the affidavit of the master of the vessel in which the said goods were exported, that the same identical goods specified in the manifest granted at the time of such exportation had been carried to the port named in the



clearance of manifest and had been landed and entered at the custom house, and that the duties imposed thereon at the said foreign port had been paid, or secured to be paid; and that the goods referred to in the certificate of the collector or chief revenue officer of such foreign port herein mentioned, were the same identical goods described in the manifest aforesaid, and in the said affidavit.

Sec. 10.—Provides, that in paying the drawback,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. of the duties be retained.

TO BE COLLECTED BY THE CLERK OF THE NEW MARKET.

Each Cart or Sleigh, drawn by one horse, conveying any kind of building materials into the city from the banlieu, shall pay an annual duty of 10s. to the Clerk of the New Market for enregistration and number ; for each vehicle under similar circumstances, drawn by two horses, 20s. ; for each waggon or other four-wheeled vehicle or corresponding winter vehicle, drawn by two horses, 35s.



All Coachmen, Cabmen, Calechemen, Carters and drivers of summer or other vehicles for hire within the city, shall pay an annual duty for registration as follows:—Registration and number for a Cart, 20s.—Do. do. Caleche, 20s. Do. do. Cab, 25s.—Do. do. Coach drawn by 2 horses, 50s.—Do. do. Omnibus, 80s.

The Clerk of the New Market also collects all assessments leviable on all horses and vehicles of which certificates of registration are applied for, viz:—On each working horse, for the assessment for the year ending in May, 12s. 6d.—On each two-wheeled vehicle for hire, 15s.—Do. four-wheeled do. do, 20s.—Each Omnibus or Waggon, drawn by one or two horses, 50s Do. do. four or more horses, 75s.

All Bakers, Brewers and Distillers, and their Agents, shall pay an annual duty for registration, as follows:—For each Baker's two-wheeled vehicle and corresponding sleigh, 50s.—For each Baker's Waggon or do. do. 75s.—For each Brewer's or Distiller's two-wheeled vehicle or corresponding sleigh, £5.—For do. do. waggon do. £7 10s.

**Chimney Sweeping.**

The Tariff of Rates which Licenced Sweeps within the City of Montreal are allowed to charge is as follows:—

Each chimney in use is required to be swept by licenced sweeps at least three times in the year, —once between 1st May and 1st November, and twice at intervals of at least two months apart, between 1st November and 1st May,—under a penalty of 25s. to 50s. In every case of a chimney taking fire, the occupant of the house is subject to the above penalty.

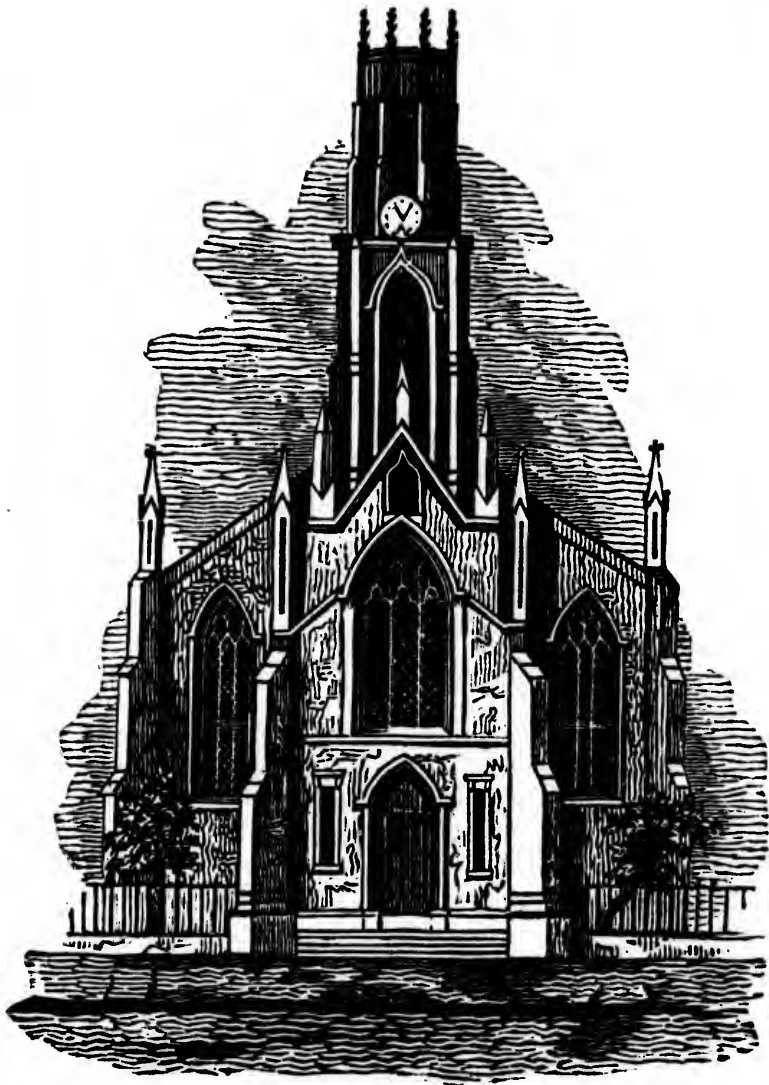

**VALUE OF COINS.**

The values assigned to the several coins by the Currency Act are not arbitrary, but are proportioned, (except in the case of British Silver) to the quantity of pure gold or silver in each. The £ currency was and is equal to 4 dollars of *account*; and a note for 100 dollars, either in Upper or Lower Canada, is now, as it has always been, payable by £25 cy., in any coins equivalent by law to that sum. By the Currency Act the Provincial dollar of account is made equal in value to that of the United States.

The coins current by the Act are :—

British gold coins at the rate of £1 4s. 4d. cy. to £1 stg. American Eagles coined before 1st July, 1834, at £2 13s. 4d. cy.—Do coined between 1st July, 1834, and 1st January, 1841, at £2 10s.—and at the same rates for half Eagles, etc.

The above are a legal tender *by tale* if within 2 grains of full weight, deducting  $\frac{1}{2}$  d. cy. for each half of a grain wanting.

British silver coins, *while lawfully current in Gr. Britain*, pass for sums proportionate to their nominal value there, at the rate of £1 4s. 4d. cy. for £1 stg., in sums not exceeding £2 10s. cy. in any one payment.

The dollars of Spain, United States, Peru, Chili, Central America, States of South America, and of Mexico, coined before 1841, at 5s. 1d. cy., and half dollars at 2s. 6½d. cy. Quarters at 1s. 3d. Eighths at 7½d., and sixteenths at 3½d., if legal weight. The parts less than halves being a tender at the said rates *by tale* to the amount of £2 10s. in one payment, until they have lost one twenty-fifth of their weight, and not afterwards.

French 5 franc silver pieces, coined before 26th April, 1842, at 4s. 8d. each.

Copper coins of the United Kingdom, (or any to be coined by Her Majesty, of not less than five sixths the weight of such coin) at their nominal rates.

The least legal weight of a Sovereign is, 5 dwts 2½ grains.—of an Eagle, coined before 1834, 11 dwts. 6 grs.—after 1834, 10 dwts. 18 grs.—of a Dollar, 17 dwts. 4 grains.—of a 5 franc piece, 16 dwts.

## Sir R. Peel's Corn Bill of 1846.

The Act commences by stating, that after the passing of this Act till the 1st February, 1849, the duties set forth in the schedule shall be payable upon all corn, &c. imported. It then recites, that on and after the 1st Feb., 1849, the following duties only shall be levied:—

Upon all Wheat, Barley, Bear or Bigg,  
Oats, Rye, Pease and Beans, for every s. d.  
quarter, ..... 1 0

And so in proportion for a less quantity.

Upon all Wheat Meal and Flour, Barley  
Meal, Oatmeal, Rye Meal and Flour,  
Pea Meal, and Bean Meal, per cwt ... 0 4½

And so in proportion for a less quantity.

The average prices are to be still made up according to the regulations made by 5 and 6 Vict. cap. 14.

**RYE MEAL AND FLOUR** :—For every barrel, being 196 lbs., a duty equal in amount to the duty upon forty gallons of Rye.

**PEA MEAL AND BEAN MEAL** :—For every quantity of 272 lbs., a duty equal in amount to the duty payable on a quarter of Pease or Beans.
