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

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

G. T. Berthon

Born in Vienne, France, in 1806, the son of René Théodore Berthon. The father, who was an artist, studied under the French painter, David, who regarded him as one of his most promising pupils. The younger Berthon showed, at a very early age, great aptitude for portrait painting; and, as soon as his school-days were over, he travelled through Europe to perfect himself in his art. In 1811 Berthon settled in Toronto where he devoted himself solely to portrait painting. His works include presentations of many of the most eminent men of Canada. He died January 18th, 1892, aged 86 years.

W. B. BRUCE

Born at Hamilton, Ont., in 1859. His father, William Bruce was a native of Scotland. His first lessons in painting were obtained at the Hamilton Art School; but considerations of prudence made him for a time devote himself to the study of Architecture, which, in spite of some success in this field, he abandoned for the more congenial work of a painter. He went to Paris in 1881, and entered the Julian Academy, where he placed himself under Tony Robert Fleury and Bouguereau. He was an artist of great versatility and matured power, whose work showed nothing traceable to the teaching of either of his masters. His range of subject included landscape, marines, portraits and mythological subjects. He died at Stockholm in 1906. In 1907 a retrospective exhibition of his works was held in the Rue de Sèze.

He was elected a member of the Ontario Society of Artists in 1885 and was a regular exhibitor in its exhibitions as well as those of the Royal Canadian Academy. On the foundation in Toronto of the Art Students' League he was made its President, which office he held from 1886 to 1890. He died in Toronto in 1903.

W. N. CRESSWELL, R.C.A., was born in Devonshire, England, 1822, and died near Seaforth, County Huron, Ontario, 1888. He studied with W. E. Cook, R.A., and Clarkson Stanfield. He was one of the first members of the Ontario Society of Artists, and upon the founding of the Royal Canadian Academy in September, 1879, he was one of the first eight appointed academicians. He is represented in the National Gallery, Ottawa.

WYATT EATON

By permission of the Century Co., N.Y.

Born in 1849 in Phillipsburg, Quebec. Pupil of the National Academy of Design, New York, and the Beaux Arts, Paris. He exhibited in the Salon, then returned to New York, and made for the *Century Magazine* his portraits of the great American poets. With others he was active in forming the American Art Association, the outcome of which was the Society of American Artists. In 1880 he visited France and Italy and in 1892 was called to Montreal to paint a number of important portraits. He painted in Florence a portrait of Mr. Timothy Cole, which was much exhibited as "Man with Violin." Wyatt Eaton was a fine pen and ink draughtsman. He wrote his recollections of his friend, J. F. Millet. He died at Newport, Rhode Island, in 1896.

A. A. Edson, R.C.A.

Born in 1816 at Stanbridge, Quebec, of American descent. In 1831 his family removed to Montreal and at the age of eighteen he crossed the Atlantic and studied art for two years. Again he visited Europe and after two years returned with many sketches which were quickly bought up. A third visit was spent in England and Scotland, then five years in France as a pupil of Pelouse when he became a friend of that master. He exhibited at the Salon, the Royal Academy, and the Society of Canadian Artists, of which he was a charter member, and of the Ontario Society of Artists. Princess Louise presented two of his pictures to the late Queen Victoria. He died in 1888.

J. A. FRASER, R.C.A.

Born in London, England, 1838. As a young man he studied as a portrait painter. Owing to the failure of his father, John Fraser, the family emigrated to Canada; and in 1860 Fraser entered the employ of William Notman, photographer, in Montreal. The Montreal Art Association came into being at the time of his arrival in the city, and later he assisted in the formation of the Society of Canadian Artists. In 1868 he removed to Toronto, and in 1873, he, with a few coadjutors, organized the Ontario Society of Artists, of which he was the first Vice-President. In 1880, on the establishment of the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts, he was appointed a charter member. In 1883, severing his connection with photography, he went to Chicago, then to Boston, and finally to New York. In 1891, he exhibited several pictures at the Salon of the Champs Elysées. He was a member of the American Water Colour Society. He died in 1898.

D. FOWLER, R.C.A.

Born at Down Hall, in the village of Down, Kent, England, in 1810. He was intended for law and was articled in Doctors Commons by his father. This uncongenial pursuit he gave up on his father's death, and bound himself for three years to J. D. Harding, the eminent water colour artist and draughtsman.

In 1843 he came to Canada for the benefit of his health, and chose a farm on Amherst Island, near Kingston, where he lived for fourteen years, and occupied himself with agriculture. After a visit to England in 1857, the impulse to paint pictures revived. His work follows the admirable traditions of the early British school of water colour; and in it can be traced the influence of Turner (*in Liber Studiorum*), David Cox, Cottman and J. D. Harding. He painted a great variety of subjects, and a vast number of pictures. In 1886 he received the diploma medal at the Colonial and Indian Exhibition. He died in 1894.

Hamel, Theophile

THEOPHILE HAMEL was born in or near Quebec in 1814, and died in Quebec in 1870. He studied under Plamondon, and went to Europe for further education in 1844. On his return to Canada he acquired a very extensive practice as a portrait painter, and also executed many church pictures and historical works of Canadian subjects.

BENONI IRWIN

Benoni Irwin was a Canadian portrait painter of English descent. Studied art in Toronto, and in 1864 or 1865 entered the National Academy of Design, New York. He afterwards went to Paris and Italy to study and remained five years abroad. Returning he took a studio in New York. At Salt Lake City he painted portraits of Brigham Young and his five wives. For a time he had a studio in Baltimore and later in San Francisco. He exhibited at the Salon and a "Study" in brown was shown in the World's Fair, Chicago. He came to a tragic end, being drowned accidentally while boating on the Hudson.

OTTO R. JACOBI, P.R.C.A.

Born in Königsberg, Prussia, February 27th, 1812. Educated at his native place, he early devoted himself to art. In 1832 he won a prize of \$1,000, with the privilege of studying at Düsseldorf for three years. The Grand Duke of Nassau appointed him court painter at Wiesbaden. He held this position for twenty years. All his paintings found ready purchase, being taken principally to England and America. In this way he became known in Canada where he settled in 1860. On the organization of the Royal Canadian Academy of Arts, 1880, he was chosen one of the first members of that body, and in 1890 was elected President. He died in 1901.


HENRI JULIEN

HENRI JULIEN, of Montreal (1846-1908). A French Canadian born in Quebec, known chiefly as an illustrator, though he painted in oil and water colours. His pictures represent the life of the Habitant, and are full of reality and action. His drawings of the French-Canadian horse were among his most noteworthy achievements. Previous to 1870 his work appeared in *The Canadian Illustrated News*, *L'Opinion Publique*, and *The Favorite*. He accompanied the Red River expedition of 1871 as illustrator, and this work received wide recognition at the time. For over twenty years he was chief illustrator of *The Montreal Star*, and his sketches of the Ottawa politicians were particularly noteworthy. Hebert, the sculptor, said of him, "He was a good artist and a fine comrade."


PAUL KANE

Paul Kane was the son of an Irishman who had come to York, now Toronto. In 1836 he went to the United States and in 1841 to Europe, where he spent four years travelling in France and Italy. Returning to Toronto in 1845 he determined to visit the haunts of the Indians in the far west. He travelled thousands of miles in canoe, on horseback and on snow-shoes to obtain his end, and on his return painted his famous collections of portraits and scenes representing the life of the Indian. These became the property of the Hon. George Allen and were treasured for half a century until, at his death, Mr. E. B. Osler bought the collection. Paul Kane wrote his experiences, *Wanderings of an Artist among the Indians of North America.*

CORNELIUS KRIEGHOFF

Was born at Dusseldorf about 1812. He took a course of study at Rotterdam, then travelled in Europe and came to the United States. He wandered south, then the Seminole war breaking out in Florida he joined the United States Army and made a series of sketches representing incidents of the war. He was afterwards commissioned by the United States Government to make paintings from some of these for the War Department. He took a studio in Rochester and afterwards joined a brother in Toronto, where he opened a studio, but removed to Montreal in 1853 his friend, Mr. John S. Budden, induced him to go to Quebec, where he had success painting scenes from the life of the Habitant, and Canadian landscapes. He visited France to study figure painting. His pictures are to be found in Toronto, Montreal, and Quebec. He died in Chicago in 1872.

HOPPNER MEYER was the son of a London engraver, and was one of the first portrait artists of real excellence to migrate to Canada. No dates of his birth and death are procurable, but he exhibited eight works in an exhibition of the Toronto Society of Arts, held in the old City Hall in 1847, and was a member of the Society. He painted small portraits in water colours and made drawings in pencil and chalk. Some of his works were engraved by himself.

CHAS. E. Moss was born about 1860 and died, at Ottawa, in 1901. He was made an Associate of the Royal Canadian Academy in 1897, and was elected Academician in the following year. Although a painter of portraits and figures, often of a decorative and classical character, he devoted himself largely to the painting of the landscape of Quebec, particularly of the neighbourhood of Murray Bay where he had a summer house. He is represented in the National Gallery, Ottawa.

Louis Richard O'Brien, P.R.C.A.

Born at "The Woods," Shanty Bay, Ont., August 15th, 1832, the second son of Lieut.-Colonel G. S. O'Brien. He was educated at Upper Canada College and entered an architect's office, 1847. He subsequently studied and practised as a Civil Engineer; and, in both of those callings, established his proficiency as a draughtsman. In 1872, when the Ontario Society of Artists was formed he was asked to join it; and, in the following year, was elected Vice-President, an office which he held until 1880, when he was appointed President of the Royal Canadian Academy of Art, founded in that year. He remained President for ten years, being succeeded by Mr. Jacobi, 1890. His diploma picture, "Sunrise on the Saguenay," is in the National Gallery, Ottawa. He died in 1900.



PAUL PEEL, R.C.A.

Born in London, Ont. At seventeen he entered the Philadelphia Academy of Fine Arts, and studied for three years under Eakins. He then went to England and worked at the Royal Academy, shortly afterwards removing to Paris, where he remained for ten years, studying under Gerôme, Boulangier, Lefevre, Doucet, and Benjamin Constant. With the latter he spent nearly four years. His "Venetian Bather" and "Life is Bitter" were shown in the Salon of 1889; and "Apres le Bain" gained a medal at the Salon. He died in Paris, France, in 1890.

HENRI PERRE, R.C.A.

Born at Strasbourg, Alsace, in 1828. He took part in the rising in Saxony and afterwards fled to America. He joined the ranks of the Confederate army. He lived in Cincinnati and Chicago before he came to Canada. Here he painted industriously the landscape of a considerable area of the Dominion. He is represented at the National Gallery, Ottawa. He was on the staff of the Ontario School of Art—the first Art School in Toronto. He died at Toronto in 1890.

In England he was a member of various art societies and was secretary of the Institute of Fine Arts in London. He came to Canada in 1866 and was, while in Montreal, one of the founders of the Society of Canadian Artists, and was its first President. He devoted himself entirely to the painting of portraits and miniatures.

Born in Montreal, 1842, and educated there. He entered the employment of W. Notman, whose partner he became. He had the advantage of instruction from J. A. He died in 1910 in London, England.
