



The heat produced in a man's kody in the course of a day is considerable in quantity, though not very intense in quality. Taking the average, it is enough to raise five and a half gallons of water from freezing point to boiling point, and this is about the heat that would be given off during the burning of a pound of coal. All this heat comes from slow wasting or burning of the substance of the body, so that it is evident that if we did not make up for this constant loss by eating food our corresponded. stant loss by eating food, our organs would soon be wasted away and consumed.

\$10 issue, bearing date November 1st, 1870. Is rather smaller than the genuine—paper not so strong—numbering letters smaller, and "British American Bank-Note Co." is omitted from the back. The Biggest Things. Facts Useful when you get into

an Argument.

The largest theatre in the world is the new Opera House in Paris. It covers nearly three acres of ground; it cost about 100,000,000 francs. The largest suspension bridge is the one between New York City and Brooklyn; the entire length of the bridge is 5,980 feet. The loftiest active volcano is Popocatapetl—"smoking mountain"—Mexico; it is 17,748 feet above the sea-level, and has a crater three miles in circumference, and 1,000 feet deep. The longest span of wire in the world is used for a telegraph in India over the River Kistnah. It is more than 6,000 feet in length, and is 1,200 feet high. The largest ship in the world was the Great Eastern. She was 680 feet long, 83 feet broad, and 60 The largest theatre in the world is the new She was 680 feet long, 83 feet broad, and 60 feet deep.

The greatest fortress, from a strategical point of view, is Gibraltar. It occupies a rocky peninsula jutting out into the sea, about three miles long and three-quarters of a mile wide. One central rock rises to a height of 1,435 feet above the sea-level. Its northern face is almost perpendicular, while its east side is full of tremendous precipices. The fortress is considered impregnable to military assault. The regular garrison in time of peace numbers about 7,000.

The Chinese wall is the largest in the world. It was completed about 220 B.C., as a protection against Tartars. It traverses the northern boundary of China, and is carried over the highest hills, through the deepest valleys, across rivers, and every other natural obstacle. Its length is 1,250 miles. Including a parapet 5 feet, the total height of the wall is 20 feet; thickness at the base, 25 feet, and at the top 15 feet.

The deepest mine in the world is the Lam-

bert coal mine in Belgium, 3,490 feet.

The biggest cavern is the Mammoth Cave, in Edmonson County, Kentucky. The cave consists of a succession of irregular chambers, some of which are large, situated on different levels. Some of these are traversed by the navigable branches of the subterranean Echo

River. Blind fish are found in its waters.

The biggest trees in the world are the mammoth trees of California. One of a grove in Tulare County, according to measurements made by members of the State Geological Survey, was shown to be 276 feet in height, 108 feet in circumference at base, and 76 feet at a point 12 feet above ground. Some of the trees

point 12 feet above ground. Some other trees are 376 feet high, and 34 feet in diameter.

The largest library is the Bibliothèque Nationale, in Paris, founded by Louis XIV. It contains 1,400,000 volumes, 300,000 pamphlets, 175,000 manuscripts, 300,000 maps and charts, and 150,000 coins and medals. The collection of engravings exceeds 1,300,000, contained in some 10,000 volumes. The portraits number 100.000.

The largest desert is that of Sahara, a vast region of North Africa, extending from the Atlantic Ocean on the west to the valley of the Nile on the east. The length from east to west is about 3,000 miles, its average breadth about 900 miles, its area about 2,000,000 square


Gipsies.

Household Facts. Recipes for Housekeepers.

ANTS, RED. — Sprigs of winter-green or groundivy will drive away red ants. Branches of wormwood will sorve the same purpose for black auts. The insects may be kept out of sugar-barrels by drawing a wide chalk-mark around the top, near the edge.

BILIOUSNESS.—For biliousness use B.B.B. according to directions.

BITES AND STINGS OF INSECTS.-Wash with a solution of ammonia water.

BITES OF MAD DOGS.—Apply caustic potash at once to the wound, and give enough whiskey to cause sleep.

Boots.—To make leather boots waterproof, saturate them with stor-oil; to stop squeaksaturate them with stor-oil; to stop squeaking, drive a peg int. the middle of the sole.

BOTTLE - CLEANING. - Bottles are easily cleaned with hot water and fine coals.

BURNS.—Apply Victoria Carbolie Salve.

IRON RUST.-To remove from muslin or white goods, thoroughly saturate the spots with lemon juice and salt, and expose to the sun. Usually more than one application is required. A good way to prevent its appearance on clothes is, when washing, to always have them enclosed in a muslin bag while being boiled.

Motus.—Thoroughly beat furs and woollens before putting away. Put them in a paper bag and fasten up tight. If there are no moths or eggs inside the bag the furs will be

safe.

PAINT. — Chloroform will remove paint.

When the color of a fabric has been destroyed by an acid, ammonia is applied to neutralise the same; after which an application of chloroform will, in almost all cases, restore the original color.

PILE OF PLUSH OR VELVET .- To raise the pile of plush or velvet, dampen on the wrong side with clean cold water, then hold tight across the face of a hot iron, and rub up the

compressed part with a clean stiff brush.
Polished Flat-Irons. — Black flat-irons. when rusty, with stove-polish, and rub well with a dry brush.

Polishing Stoves.—For polishing heating stoves, hardware dealers use turpentine and black varnisl Properly put on, it will last throughout a season.

RATS.-Chloride of lime is an infallible preventive against rats, as they flee from its odor as from a pestilence.

Screw.—To remove an obdurate screw, apply a red-hot iron to the head for a short time, the screw-driver being applied immediately while the screw is hot

Silverware.-Silverware can be kept bright for months if placed with a largish piece of camphor in an air-tight case.

To prevent articles of silverware from tarnishing, first warm them, and then paint them over with a thin solution of collodion in alcohol, using a wide soft brush for the purpose.

SMELL OF ONIONS.—Rub the liands on a stick of celery after peeling onions, and the smell will be entirely removed.

Of these there are about 6,000. A 9-foot telescope reveals stars of the twelfth magnitude, about 10,000,000 in number. An 18-foot telescope reveals about 43,000,000 stars, including those of the thirteenth magnitude, whose light takes 2,700 years to reach us. Each of these stars is thought to be the centre of a solar system like our own. Our own solar system consists of the Sun, and the following planets revolving around it; Mercury, nearest the sun, is 35,000,000 miles distant; Venus, 66,000,000 miles; the Earth, 91,000,000 miles; Mars, 139,000,000 miles; the Asteroids, about 266,000,000 miles; Jupiter, nearly 476,000,000 miles; Saturn, 872,000,000 miles; Uranus, 1,754,000,000 miles; and Neptune, 2,746,000,000 miles from the Sun.

Eight aqueducts supplied ancient Rome with water, delivering 40 millions of cubic feet daily. These vast erections would never have been built had the Romans known that water always rises to its own level.

The Temple of Diana, at Ephesus, was 425 feet long and 225 feet broad, with 127 columns, 63 feet high, to support the roof. It was 220 years in building.

The largest one of the Egyptian pyramids is 543 feet high, 693 feet on the sides, and its base covers 11 acres. The layers of stones are 208 in number. Many stones are over 30 feet long, 4 broad and 3 thick.

Facts about London.

London (with all the suburbs) covers within the 15 miles radius of Charing Cross, nearly 700 square miles.

It numbers within these boundaries over 4,000,000 inhabitants.

It contains more country-born persons than the counties of Devon and Gloucester combined, or 37 per cent. of its entire population.

Every four minutes a birth takes place in the metropolis, and every six minutes a death.
Within the circle named there are added to the population 205 persons every day, and 75,000 annually.

London has 7,000 miles of streets, and on an

average; 28 miles of new streets are opened, and 9,000 new houses built every year. 1,000 vessels and 9,000 sailors are in port

every day.

Its crime is also in proportion to its extent. 73,000 persons are annually taken into custody by the police, and more than one-third of all the crime in the country is committed within its borders. 38,000 persons are annually committed for drunkenness by its magistrates.

The Metropolis comprises considerably upwards of 100,000 foreigners from every quarter of the globe.

It contains more Roman Catholics than Rome itself, more Jews than the whole of Palestine, more Irish than Belfast, more Scotch than Aberdeen, and more Welsh than Cardiff.

Its beer shops and gin palaces are so numerous, that their frontages, if placed side by side, would stretch from Charing Cross to Chichester, a distance of 62 miles.

With regard to churches and chapels, the Bishop of London, examined before a Committee of the House of Lords in the year 1840, said:—"If you proceed a mile or two eastward of St. Paul's you will find yourself in the midst of a population the most wretched and destitute of mankind, consisting of artificers, laborers, beggars, and thieves, to the amount of 300,000 to 400,000 souls. Throughout this entire quarter there is not more than one church for every 10,000 inhabitants, and in two districts there is but one church for 45,900 souls."

The skin contains more than 2,000,000 openings, which are the outlets of an equal number of sweat glands. The human skeleton consists of more than 200 distinct bones. An amount of b ood equal to the whole quantity in the body passes through the heart once every minute. The full capacity of the lungs is about 200 cubic inches is about 320 cubic inches.
