HELP DESERVING SOLDIERS OWNERSHIP IS NOW URGED

Object of a Society, the Initial Meeting of Which Was Held at Government House.

KEEP TRACK OF THE VETERANS MEMBERS OF IT ARE UNANIMOUS

And Provide Them With Names of Members Wherever They Go and May Require Aid.

There was yesterday held at Government House the initial meeting of the Ontario branch of the Incorporated Soldiers and Sailors' Help Society, an institution founded in England in 1900, for these objects:

- (1) To help deserving soldiers and sailors by providing them with the name and address of a "friend" in each parish (or ward), through the kindness of whom they can be commended on discharge from the army or navy, for aid in obtaining employment, or other form of suitable help.
(2) To establish and maintain convalescent homes and homes of rest for discharged soldiers and sailors, who are disabled and necessitous; and to contribute to the support of such cases in their own homes if considered necessary.
(3) In time of war, to arrange for the accommodation of sick or wounded convalescent soldiers and sailors in temporary convalescent homes and private houses.

During its yet brief existence, it has been the means of doing much good in the direction above indicated. When a soldier or sailor is honorably discharged from either of the services, he is given a "commendation ticket" testifying to his character and claims, and a handbook containing the names of all persons who have identified themselves with the work, and to whom he can apply for such assistance as he may desire. The society is just extending its work in Canada.

The list of those connected with the organization and management of the society includes members of the royal family and many of the distinguished persons. The King is the patron of the parent society.

The local officers are: President for Ontario, His Honor the Lieutenant Governor.

Vice-presidents, Hon. Octavius Lambert, Hon. Mr. Justice Street, Lieut.-Col. Mason, Col. W. D. Otter, Col. G. A. Sweeny, Commander Albert W. Whelan, Lieut.-Col. Hon. J. M. Gibson, Col. Lawrence Buchan.

Hon. secretary, Mr. Lawrence Baldwin. Hon. assistant secretary, Lieut.-Col. Clarence Denison.

Hon. treasurer, Lieut.-Col. J. Vance Gravelly. These gentlemen will take steps to interest friends throughout the province, who will undertake to contribute a small annual fee (in England, it is two shillings and six pence), and assist any who call on them. For instance, a discharged man coming to Toronto, thru the medium of his handbook, would know to whom he might apply if necessary, for work or assistance. The work is carried on by funds secured thru annual fees, donations from wealthy individuals and contributions from school children. Last year \$1800 was secured thru this latter source, the total funds secured amounting to \$27,000.

WHAT IT COSTS THE DEALERS. Antisepic stands them No More Than 60.

A prominent out-of-town wholesaler and retail coal merchant said yesterday that the public would have all the coal they would require, but that the market would not be over crowded.

Regarding the price, he thought that Toronto people should get anthracite for \$7 or \$7.50 a ton, and bituminous for \$6.50. The price has been fixed by the operators, and there will be no change until after April 1st. The price of the Ontario bituminous is \$5.50 per gross ton of 2240 pounds, making the cost of the net ton \$4.50. Adding to this a dollar for freight, unloading and delivery, it would stand the dealers \$6 a ton, and in selling it at \$7.50 they would make a fair profit on their deal.

The smaller places will have to pay more for theirs, as the freight charges are much higher, and the dealers expect to get at least \$8 a ton.

May Be Cars for Dogs. Paris, Nov. 3.—The crusade of dog lovers for transportation of their pets by metropolitan lines has bobbed up again, and the managers of the underground line, at last touched by the appeals of dog owners, seriously contemplate running cars in which the inseparable master and dog will be allowed passage.

Man Injured by Astor. London, Nov. 3.—Sir Archibald Beckley Milne, the Scottish baronet, whom William Waldorf Astor ordered from his house when the former went there with the Countess of Oxford, has been appointed naval aide-de-camp to the King. This is a mark of personal favor.

Turtle Goes 300 Miles in 30 Years. New York, Nov. 3.—Mrs. A. P. White, a widow of Syracuse, while christening her son Arthur, found a turtle that had been marked with initials of her husband 30 years ago. During that time the reptile had traveled from Nantasket Beach, Mass., to the spot where it was found.

Small Settlers Need Relief. Melbourne, Nov. 3.—Australia's exports for 1902 will be \$25,000,000 less in foodstuffs than last year. A relief fund has been opened to aid small settlers.

School Teacher Murdered. Manila, Nov. 3.—D. C. Montgomery, Superintendent of Schools in Oriental Negros, was murdered Friday by Ladrones. This is the first instance of a teacher in the Philippine Islands being harmed while in discharge of his duties.

C.P.R. Earnings. Montreal, Nov. 3.—The C.P.R. traffic for week ending Oct. 31 was \$1,210,000, for the same week last year \$1,210,000; the mileage had been increased to 7088.

For Future Benefit. Johannesburg, Nov. 3.—Lord Milner declares that for the future benefit of the Transvaal many temporary inconveniences must be endured.

RIGHT TO CROSS GRANTED.

J. J. Hill Will Lay His Tracks Over Those of J. R. Stratton's Road.

The World had a call yesterday from Mr. Neil McCallum, Mayor of Columbia, B.C. Mr. McCallum, together with Charles Cummings of the Grand Forks Board of Trade, has just been down to Ottawa in connection with the railway question which the boundary between the two provinces is now to be settled. Mr. McCallum announces that as a result of representations to the government at Ottawa a partnership existed between them in this matter, and that Mr. McCallum has secured a right to cross the tracks of the C.P.R. and the Kettle Valley Railway at Grand Forks and to build a spur to the Grand Forks. The Victoria, Vancouver and Eastern Railway is a line in which the privilege of the Northern Railway, thirteen miles of the road having already been built in the boundary question. It is proposed to build a line right thru to Vancouver, a distance of 300 or 400 miles. The line would be distinct, for it would cut at almost three times the time of the line from Columbia to the Pacific coast.

Mr. McCallum says that the need of his country is more railways, and that there is business enough for them in and about the mining country to keep as many as can be built going. He describes the situation in the boundary question as a matter of public interest at Grand Forks and Greenwood.

DEWET PRAISES KING.

Boer Leader Says English Rules is Pleasant Man.

London, Nov. 3.—Gen. Dewet, before starting for South Africa to-day, said that he had been highly pleased with his reception in England and on the part of the British government. He said one of the pleasantest men he ever met. He gratefully appreciated the attention and cordiality shown to him by the British government. He said he would always remember the kindness of the British government, and would be faithful to British allegiance, and to do what he could for the good of the country, those whom the war had left helpless and destitute.

DOWNTOWN CHURCH PROBLEMS.

Lack of Money and Men Subject of Discussion by Ministers.

At the Ministerial Association on Monday "Downtown Church Problems" was the subject of discussion. Rev. J. B. Kennedy pointed out that the downtown church had every advantage, because it could secure luxuries of religious wealth by means of the wealth of its members. He said he had had a dream that Jesus Christ came to Toronto, and in company with Peter and Paul made a tour of the churches.

Rev. C. A. Atkins said the greatest problem of the downtown churches was finances, and the lack of reserve of men to fall back upon.

Lash for Indecency.

Windsor, Nov. 3.—At noon to-day David Valandry was convicted before Judge G. H. H. of having committed an offence under the Charter Act, a victim being a little 8-year-old daughter of a Sandwich South farmer. Valandry was sentenced to ten years in Kingston penitentiary and to receive twenty lashes, twelve in two months from date and twelve in one year from that time. Valandry took his sentence stoically.
