St. Petersburg, Feb. 27.-An action of no mean proportions is in progress on the Russian left flank. The advantage thus far is on the side of the Japanese, the at heavy cost. From advices from the front it is difficult to say how severe the losses have been or ho bad the reverse, and whether the Japanese are likely to attempt to drive in the Russian left much further-

Gen. Kuropatkin evidently had beer trying to establish his left flank far in advance, to command the crossings of the Taitze River, the operation being a counterpart of Gen. Gripenberg's movement on the right flank to secure the fords of the Hun River prepara-tory to the breaking up of the ice in the spring.

The scene of the operations is 50 miles southeast of Mukden beyond Da Pass, an important defile commanding the road to Fusan. Both armies open ing apparently impregnable positions on the centres, Gen. Kuropatkin evidently planned to inaugurate widely sweeping operations on both flanks, but the Japanese countered hard.

The weather is fine and favorable for operations, and all is quiet on the Russian right wing.

STRIKERS AWAITING SIGNAL FOR CONCERTED ACTION

Widespread Disaffection Part of a Plan to Aid Peasant Outbreak in the Spring and Force Czar to

St. Petersburg, Feb. 27.-Evidence is increasing that the strikes thruout the empire, and especially those in St. Petersburg, are not economic in their origin, but inspired by a definite political plan. The government and the employers are embarrassed by the tactics of the workmen, whose discontent is being fed and who are increasing demands with

This condition is believed to have been fomented by crafty political agitators, who are stirring up the men, and at the same time holding them in leash, apparently awaiting some signal for concerted action. Fear is entertained that this widespread disaffection is connected with a plan to await a possible peasant outbreak in the spring, with which a general strike will be synchrocrized, the workmen joining hands with the peas-

The election of labor representatives to the imperial commission which is to investigate the causes of discontent in St. Petersburg passed off quietly yesterday. The situation in Riga is again reported to be very serious. The authorities there are apparently unable to cope

with the lawless elements. In the Caucasus the situation is extremely bad, practically amounting to civil war. In Baku the inhabitants barricaded in their houses are petitioning the central authorities at St. Petersburg for relief from the existing condition of affairs. The government is sending reinforcements of troops, but while these may be able to stop the reign of terror they will be impotent to start the wheels of industry. Proprietors fear that the oil wells will be utterly ruined if pumping is suspended much longer. Conditions in other towns in the Caucasus are equally desperate.







It was not the extreme length of the tunnel which constituted the difficulty of the enterprise, but the soft, treacherous rock, combined with hot and cold springs of

great volume.

The tunnels, which is really two parallel tunnels, each with a single track, was begun in the autumn of 1898 at Brigue, Switzerland, and a month or two later at Iselle, Italy, All the machinery installations had to be specially prepared, hence the progress at the outset was slow, but from January, 1898, until December, 1993, it progressed at an average of 3497 metres a year. Berlin, Feb. 25.—General Von Budde. Seventy-four miles an hour is possible, but the government's recommended speed does not exceed 68 miles an hour.



I hope that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will not make all true citizens wish that he was in some other position because of his own denominational principles, and that there will be strength enough on the part of those who legislate for us to insist that all the parties shall come into one common system and that we shall be united loyal British subjects. I regret that any part of the citizenship of this country should find it necessary to take their command and the indications of their duty from Italy, instead of from British principles."

Rev. Dr. Carman, who occupied the pulpit at McCaul-street Methodist Church last evening, reiterated his views on the question. Rev. A. T. Campbell of the Church of Christ (Scientist) also commented on the situation and a petition was circulated after the service.
