The system of management used in conducting the School during the past year has been the same as that of the previous one-no improvement having suggested itself, and everything having been found to work satisfactorily.

The usual number of changes in the staff of Teachers, which must always be looked for in the course of a year have occurred, but the school is still to be congratulated in possessing a most desirable staff in every sense.

In the removal of the late Secretary, Mr. Geo. S. Hodgins, to British Columbia, the School lost a most efficient and painstaking officer.

The usual Pic-nic and Christmas Festival were held on 7th July and 30th December, respectively-and passed off pleasantly.

During the much regretted but forced absence of the superintendent in England, both in the spring and fall of the year, his place has been as usual ably filled by Mr. W. Bridgeman-Simpson.

During the Summer the School Building was repaired and tinted, and the expense thered very kindly paid by the Executors of the late Mr. Geo. Grasett. The large School room and Class rooms now present a very attractive appearance. A most important improvement made was the introduction of a ventilator in the ceiling. For these most useful improvements cordial thanks are due to the Superintendent as Executor of his late brother. The organ has been ordered from Messrs. Lye, and will soon be in position. The necessary fund to pay for it has been subscribed and banked.

Mr. Bishop who was rarely, if ever, absent was called suddenly from our midst to his eternal home. In the morning he was with us in the class, and in the evening his earthly course was closed. The class sent a floral offering, and followed his remains to the grave.

The amount we realize by collection is hardly sufficient to meet expenses, and as the season is now approaching in which it will be necessary to give a picnic, we would say that our treasurer is prepared to receive subscriptions towards this cause.

On April 17th a children's service was held in the Cathedral. It is intended to repeat these services, and a cordial invitation is extended to all parents and those who take any interest in this work.

The infant class, under the efficient teaching of Miss Clark, is making rapid progress, having now on the roll over sixty children.
