The usual number of changes in the staff of Teachers, which must always be looked for in the course of a year have occurred, but the school is still to be congratulated in possessing a most desirable staff in every sense.

In the removal of the late Secretary, Mr. Geo. S. Hodgins, to British Columbia, the School lost a most efficient and painstaking officer.

The usual Pic-nic and Christmas Festival were held on 7th July and 30th December, respectively—and passed off pleasantly.

During the much regretted but forced absence of the Superintendent in England, both in the spring and fall of the year, his place has been as usual ably filled by Mr. W. Bridgeman-Simpson.

During the Summer the School Building was repaired and tinted, and the expense there of very kindly paid by the Executors of the late Mr. Geo. Grasett. The large School room and Class rooms now present a very attractive appearance. A most important improvement made was the introduction of a ventilator in the ceiling. For these most useful improvements cordial thanks are due to the Superintendent as Executor of his late brother. The organ has been ordered from Messrs. Lye, and will soon be in position. The necessary fund to pay for it has been subscribed and banked.

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DISTRICT VISITING SOCIETY.

At these meetings Missionary news is read, and also letters from the Missionaries assisted by the Society, while the ladies work at clothing to be sent wherever it is most needed.

Several boxes of clothing have been sent to the Rev. Mr. Browne and the Rev. Mr. Tinitt during the past year, and one is now preparing for a Missionary at Lesser Slave Lake.

In all ways it has been a successful year of work. The Young People's Working Party have regularly attended the monthly meetings, and greatly added to their interest.

At one meeting, Mrs. Greaves gave an address on the behalf of the Zenana Mission. Mrs. Sullivan, at another, read an account of a tour, on which she accompanied the Bishop of Algoma; Mr. Brick, also, gave an address on his work at Peace River.

The subscriptions collected by the Society are about \$500 more than last year, which is the most practical test of the year's work.

The Choir, under the direction of Mr. W. Elliott Haslam, has greatly improved in members and efficiency. The rehearsal is held in the Church every Friday evening at 8 o'clock, at which Mr. Haslam desires to see all the members of the choir present regularly and punctually.

CHURCH OF ST. JAMES THE LESS.

The services have been maintained as usual. There has been an increased attendance during the past year. The petition of this congregation and of residents in the neighbourhood for the formation of a new Parish has been granted, and the new Parish has been set apart. Hence our work in connection with St. James the Less comes to an end.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ST. JAMES THE LESS.

In presenting the annual report I have much pleasure in stating that our work continues in a very prosperous condition. The average attendance of 135 has been fully maintained during the past year, notwithstanding the want of a more suitable building and the presence of two other Sunday Schools in the neighbourhood.

The Library has been worked up to a most satisfactory state.

The finances of the School are very nearly balanced.

I feel deeply indebted to the teachers and many friends who have always given ready help in carrying on the work.

I regret the loss of valuable fellow-workers, whose places it is difficult to fill.

In closing this report I would with all thankfulness acknowledge the blessing of Almighty God our Heavenly Father in the past, and pray that His Holy Spirit may be poured out upon us and our Sunday School in the future, for Jesus Christ's sake. Amen.
