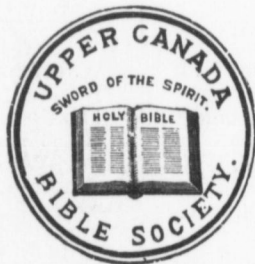

# LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

## UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

*As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the third day of August, 1855; and amended at General Meetings held on the 13th day of April, 1880, and 18th day of November, 1887.*

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavour to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, and a representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The five clerical and five lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election except in cases where the non-attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the country, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be *ex officio* such representative, or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such Branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside,

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Book-keeper, and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal of the Corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs

and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour of 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President or of any three Directors.

XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society; when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depositary's accounts duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director or Officer during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration of these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alteration has been given to the Board.

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RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE  
TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS, SEPTEMBER, 1878.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday schools the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the school; the number of scholars and teachers; the amount of funds at the disposal of the managers; who are its officers; and why it is necessary to make such application; all of which should in every case be certified by a minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements; reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

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REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RELATIVE TO "GRANTS TO  
SUNDAY-SCHOOLS," ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS,  
18TH JUNE, 1888.

That the forms of application for grants, already in use, as authorized by the Board in October, 1867, and September 1878, regarding Sunday-schools, be continued, although it is right to state that the superintendents of schools have not availed themselves of the privileges offered in the form of September, 1878, to any extent.

In the opinion of your Committee, mission churches and schools, under denominational auspices, are not in general to be considered fit objects for the gratuities of the Society; but missions among Indians, Jews, French-Canadians, Chinese, Italians, etc., though under denominational auspices, are not to be taken as coming under this general rule.

# RULES

## RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

(Revised May 17th, 1887.)

- I. That a society be formed in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society, and through it with the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment.
- II. That the Society be denominated "The \_\_\_\_\_ BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."
- III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually shall be members of the Branch Society; and those subscribing twenty dollars at one time shall be life members of the same.
- IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than \_\_\_\_\_ other members; five to constitute a quorum.
- V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who are subscribers to the Society shall be members of the Committee.
- VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.
- VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into districts, and appoint visitors for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.
- VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Branch Society shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted yearly to the Upper Canada Bible Society, or through it to the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the various languages, and for supplying the whole world, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God.
- IX. That a depository for the sale of the Holy Scriptures be opened in a suitable central locality, and that the books be placed in a conspicuous position, the necessary supply being obtained from the Upper Canada Bible Society *on sale*. Remittances on purchase account to be made from *proceeds of sales only*.
- X. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, in each year, at \_\_\_\_\_, when the accounts shall be presented; the proceedings of the past year stated; moneys voted, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee if required, and a copy forwarded to the Secretary at Toronto.
- XI. That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

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### FORM OF BEQUEST TO THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

I bequeath the sum of \_\_\_\_\_ to the Upper Canada Bible Society, to be paid for the purposes of said Society, to the Treasurer for the time being thereof, whose receipt shall be a good discharge for the same.

FIFTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT  
OF THE  
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY  
FOR YEAR ENDING 31ST MARCH, 1893.

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Saint Paul, in writing to Timothy, his beloved son in the Gospel, distinctly affirms that "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God." More than a thousand years earlier in the history of the world, David (in the 68th Psalm) gives utterance to the same truth, when he says, "The Lord gave the Word." At the same time he couples with this statement, another, as to the natural result of the revelation of the will of God, a result which is generally apparent in this missionary century, namely: "Great was the company of those who published it." God is the author of the *Word*. In those sixty-six (66) volumes, composing a book which can be conveniently carried about by any one—written by different individuals, at different periods of time—we have a revelation of the will of God to man, and the declaration of *His plan* for their salvation. "In the light which the *Word* exhibits, and the commands which it presents," those who have received it and all the blessings which accompany its acceptance, are under the most solemn obligation to give it to those who have never heard of—much less enjoyed this rich legacy. "Neither science nor philosophy can meet all the demands and aspirations of the immortal spirit." For peace through forgiveness of sins, for guidance, for consolation, man can look with confident expectation and satisfaction, *only* on the divine revelation found in the Scriptures. Many are yet in darkness, they know nothing of the compassionate love of God in Christ Jesus: Our knowledge is superior, our circumstances and surroundings have been more favourable to the reception of the truth, and in obedience to the commands of the Bible it is clearly our duty to send the "Book Divine" to the uttermost parts of the earth.

The British and Foreign Bible Society, and the Upper Canada Bible Society, with all other kindred societies, have accepted this solemn obligation to disseminate the *Word* of God. This they do, irrespective of name or denomination, colour or country; and the great object of the *Bible Society* is to place in the hands of every man, woman and child in the world, a copy of this "Sacred treasure," so that all may read it in their own language.

The Bible Society is always the ally of the Missionary of the Cross—frequently its colporteurs go before as heralds, casting up the highway, gathering out the stones, removing difficulties; but whether as harbingers, companions, or followers of the Missionary, no doubt is ever entertained as to the character of its mission.

## OUR WORK.

In reviewing the operations of the Upper Canada Bible Society for the past year, there is ample cause for thankfulness to the Supreme Ruler of all events for His continued guidance and blessing in the conduct of its affairs. The work has been extended, and the revenue is in advance of any previous year in the history of the *Society*.

Although the year has been one of depression and discouragement to the community generally, your Directors are gratified to find that the interest in the work has been well sustained, and that the claims of the Bible Society have had a cheerful and liberal response. While in a few cases, there have been slight reductions in the usual annual revenue of local branch Societies, there have been considerable advances in others, and we are pleased to be able to report continued success in all departments.

The number of copies of Scriptures issued from the Depository in the course of the year, has not been so large as the previous year. This may be accounted for in several ways, viz: the novelty of the *penny* Testament has somewhat subsided—the scarcity of money no doubt had something to do with the decreased sales—while the requests for gratuities were less, by 800 copies, than in the previous year. Our colporteurs, however, have sold and circulated nearly 500 copies more than last year.\*

## SPECIAL DISTRIBUTION OF SCRIPTURES.

The Committee on "Distribution of Scriptures on Railways, Steamboats and at Hotels," reports that during the past year two of its members called on the proprietors of the principal hotels in Toronto and offered to supply Scriptures at half price, to be placed in the bed-rooms, for the use of guests. Several of the proprietors cheerfully and promptly accepted the suggestion, and ordered Testaments to place in their rooms, not already supplied. About 400 copies were thus placed.

With the permission of the officers in charge of many of the large passenger steamboats plying to and from our harbour during the summer, large Bibles were placed on the tables in the cabins, for the use of travellers.

In conjunction with the Railway Committee of the Young Men's Christian Association, at York, 40 large-print Testaments have been placed in freight train caboose cars—and are much appreciated by many of the train men.

The Victoria Industrial School has had a grant of 200 Bibles for the use of the boys there. Young Men's and Young Women's Christian Associations, Mission Sunday Schools, Hospitals, Jails, Sailor's Rest, Vancouver, B. C., and other institutions have also been supplied with Scriptures.

## BRANCHES AND DEPOSITORIES.

There are now 567 Branches and Depositories in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society, and they are to be found in Ontario, Manitoba, the North-West Territories, and British Columbia. The greater number of the Branches were visited by *Agents*, appointed by the Board of Directors, who addressed the annual

meetings, giving information regarding the work of Bible Society throughout the world; thus endeavouring to increase and intensify the sympathy and co-operation of God's people in disseminating the Scriptures,—the noblest work in which human beings can be engaged. The Permanent Agent, and thirty-one Provisional Agents performed the visitation,—twenty-seven in Ontario and five in Manitoba and the North-West. Generally speaking their reports were encouraging, and in most instances their best anticipations have been realized.

As in former years, a considerable number of the Branch Societies in cities and the larger towns, etc., held their anniversary meetings without the presence of an Agent. In the majority of such cases the interest has been preserved—but in several cases, Agents have been called for to assist in resuscitating branches languishing for want of necessary information regarding the work of the Society. In places where the work of the Society can be maintained *effectively*, it is very desirable that the Officers, in co-operation with the local ministers, should assume this responsibility and thus save the Society the expense of Agency. A timely intimation of such desire by the Officers of Branches—sent to the Permanent Secretary at Toronto—will be duly attended to.

#### CITY BRANCHES.

The District Branches in Toronto, which were partially organized last year, have developed considerably and are now in fair working order. The success so far attending the scheme is largely attributable to the perseverance of Dr. Geikie, Chairman of the Committee, and the faithful officers of the different *Districts*. As a result of this effort, the paid collector has been dispensed with, and the contributions taken up this year, by volunteers from some of the city Churches, are considerably larger than those received for several years past—and the collector's usual commission has been saved. No doubt this scheme will further develop in future years.

#### JUVENILE BRANCHES.

A very interesting feature, which may be considered an important department of our work, is the initiation of Juvenile Bible Societies. The first one recorded as being duly organized is the "*Kirkwall* Juvenile Branch Bible Society." This youthful band of workers has been matured under the fostering care of Mr. Robert McQueen, and having attained maturity, is now placed in charge of pains-taking and competent officers. The donations of this young branch amount to \$12, and this is not their first contribution.

We have also pleasure in recording a *second* donation of \$7 from a Union Sunday School near *St. Helens*, Ont., for Mr. Peter Clark, Superintendent of the School. And yet another gift of \$7.10 collected by "A little girl" belonging to the congregation of the Rev. M. E. Wilson, of Norwood, Ont., who kindly forwarded this very welcome contribution to assist in circulating the Word of God.

We earnestly trust that many ladies and gentlemen, Sunday School superintendents and teachers, will realize the importance of inculcating a deep reverence for the Bible in the minds and hearts of the rising generation, that they may thus early in life be inspired with a desire to assist in sending the "Bread of Life" to

those who have it not, whether on our own continent, or in heathen lands—and that ere long, many *Juvenile Bands* will be actively engaged in this work of sending the Gospel to every creature.

## NEW BRANCHES.

In the course of the year, seventeen (17) new branch Societies have been organized, viz :—(In Ontario)—Roseneath, Dunedin, Duntroon, Thamesford, Pelee Island, Gesto, Quinn, Lobo, Schreiber, Sudbury, Gravenhurst and Kirkwall, Juvenile branch. (In Manitoba)—Roland, Baldur, Estevan, Melita and Hartney.

## BIBLE SOCIETY YEAR.

We desire again to call the attention of the Officers of Branch Societies to the fact that the *fiscal year* of the Upper Canada Bible Society, and the British and Foreign Bible Society *closes* on the 31st March in each year, and would entreat all Officers to endeavour to have their collections taken up and remittances sent to Toronto by that date, so that the amounts may be included in the revenue of the year to which they properly belong.

As a general rule the Branch Societies are in a healthy, active condition, the officers, including the collectors, etc., performing arduous voluntary duty with commendable zeal and fidelity for the Master, and in the cause of perishing fellow-men. To all such faithful servants in this department of Christ's vineyard, we now tender our most sincere thanks,

## CIRCULATION OF THE SCRIPTURES BY COLPORTAGE.

The important and much needed work of Colportage has been prosecuted by our staff of Colporteurs, eight of whom have been engaged for portions of the past year in the following districts :—

*Mr. Peter Cromar* in the counties of Grey and Bruce—where he had opportunities of meeting with farmers, labourers, fishermen, sailors, the employees of mills foundries, machine shops, shipyards, etc.—selling Bibles and Testaments and giving with discretion to those who could not purchase.

*Mr. John Lockhart* in the counties of Addington and Frontenac, where he has circulated a large number of copies of the Scriptures. His visits to the people at their homes, at Sunday Schools and other religious meetings, have been very acceptable in many localities.

*Mr. Geo. Armstrong* has been operating vigorously in the counties of Simcoe Ontario and Victoria, where he has made large sales. Mr. Armstrong takes a special interest in the men employed in connection with saw mills, etc., and is a general favourite with them. On a recent visit to Longford, Mr. Wm. Thomson the proprietor of the extensive lumbering operations there, ordered the saw-mill to be stopped so that the employees could have an opportunity of selecting the Bibles

and Testaments they desired. Such a graceful action on the part of Mr. Thomson is its own best comment. Hotels, boarding-houses, work-shops, etc., are visited. Occasionally Roman Catholics purchase copies of the Scriptures, but generally they prefer to hear portions read by the colporteurs rather than be found in possession of the *Book* itself.

*Mr. James Sinclair* labours in Muskoka and Parry Sound districts, where he has had many a lonesome drive to reach the distant huts of scattered settlers, the shanties of the lumbermen, etc., etc., in this rocky, barren country. In his report for April he mentions having had occasion to drive ten miles over the ice on Lake Muskoka, when he was exposed to the most intense cold he had ever experienced. Mr. Sinclair reports having visited twenty-one shanties during the winter months. He is always made welcome, and generally stays over *a night or two* so as to meet with the men on their return from the woods after the day's work is over. In eighteen of those shanties copies of the Scriptures were sold—the other three being occupied principally by Roman Catholic men—no sales were made; however your Colporteur was treated to the best they had, while his wearied horse was fed and cared for, and although no Bibles were sold, religious conversation was engaged in, which with God's blessing will bear fruit. Mr. Sinclair states that on a Sunday recently he was delighted at hearing a good gospel sermon delivered by one of the lumbermen before his fellow workmen in a shanty at *Lake of Bays*. Numerous instances, showing the desirability of such visitation and the blessed results of the teaching of the Scriptures by our Godly Colporteurs, are reported from time to time.

#### IN MANITOBA AND THE NORTH-WEST.

Our Colportage work in Manitoba and the North-West, which was formerly carried on in co-operation and joint expense with the Upper Canada Tract and Religious Book Society, has been conducted by four Colporteurs engaged specially by this society during portions of the past year, viz:—*Mr. Robert Halsall*, who canvassed and sold Bibles and Testaments in the vicinity along the line of the Souris extension and Coalfield district during the summer months, and being a student, returned to college in the fall.

*Mr. Daniel McKay*, also a student, in sections of the country in Manitoba and Assiniboia, sold a large number of Bibles notwithstanding the many difficulties met with.

*Mr. W. G. White*, who extended his Colportage tour from Algoma through the Rainy River district into Manitoba, where he spent four months visiting in the Red River district, etc., doing excellent work.

In addition to this, another aggressive step was taken at the earnest request of the officers of the Winnipeg Bible Society and other friends interested in the spiritual welfare of the Mennonite population in Manitoba. Mr. P. P. Siemens was engaged for Colportage work in the Mennonite Settlements, in the neighbourhood of Gretna, etc. This Colporteur has been labouring faithfully among his fellow countrymen, and although he has met with some opposition, and has not made as many sales as anticipated, still he has already accomplished much good, inducing and encouraging the people to read the Scriptures, and he reports that Prayer Meetings have

been established, where previously unknown. Thus the good seed is being scattered broadcast; let us pray that it may fall into good ground and bring forth much fruit to *His Glory*.

The total circulation by our Colporteurs during the year is, 6,725 copies; this is nearly 500 copies more than the previous year, and the cost is \$474.89 less.

#### REMOVALS BY DEATH.

With regret we record the demise of three (3) Vice-Presidents of this Society since our last annual meeting, viz:—Rev'd. T. S. Ellerby, Sir Daniel Wilson, LL.D., and Mr. Herbert Mortimer. Each of the deceased gentlemen had been long connected with the Bible Society and were deeply interested in its aim and object.

In the unexpected and unavoidable absence of the President, Sir Daniel Wilson presided at our last Anniversary, and no doubt many of you will recall the warm eulogium he then expressed regarding the work of this Society.

The removal of so many of our colleagues year after year reminds us that ere long the work will be in other hands, and the place that now knows us shall soon know us no more. May we be stirred to greater earnestness and work while it is called to-day, as we know not how soon we may be required to give an account of our stewardship.

#### QUEBEC AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Quebec Society is doing a noble work, although surrounded with much difficulty and obstruction,

In a letter dated 25th April, Rev. E. J. Stobo, District Secretary and General Agent, writes as follows:

"Your letter was read last evening at our regular meeting of Committee and was listened to with great interest and gratitude by the members of Committee present, and the following resolution was passed unanimously and a copy ordered to be forwarded to your directors at the earliest possible moment:"—

"This Committee has heard read, with interest and gratitude, the letter from the Secretary of the 'Upper Canada Bible Society,' announcing the cheering fact that a cheque had been forwarded for \$908, being the contributions from the Branches for French Colportage, and also a cheque for \$1,000 as a special donation from the Society for the same object. This Committee would therefore place on record its gratitude to God for placing it within reach of the Directors, and for giving them the disposition to perform such a gracious act in behalf of this Committee in its endeavor to do a great work for God and humanity in this District, and would specially note that it feels greatly encouraged in its work, by the expressed confidence, sympathy and generosity of the Directors and friends of the 'Upper Canada Bible Society,' and would still plead for an interest in their prayers that a great and effective work may be done in this dark province."

## BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

# BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT, 1892-93.

For the past four years the Committee have had to present an unsatisfactory financial statement, as painful to themselves as it was disappointing to their friends. It is with exceeding pleasure that they to-day submit a much more favourable report, which will show, that while the society has not yet recovered the position it held in 1888, the outlay of the year has been more than met, and the large deficit substantially reduced. For these signal mercies the Committee render devout thanks to Him who has bestowed on the Society's friends both the power and the will to give. Nor would they omit to thank the givers, who will this morning share in their gratitude and joy.

For several years preceding 1889 the receipts had been (chiefly through legacies) in excess of the expenditure. But in that and the three following years there were deficits, amounting in the aggregate to nearly £67,000.

The Committee felt that this state of things could not be allowed to continue. Their working capital had been seriously diminished, while the annual funds placed at their disposal were altogether inadequate to the Society's own work, and to the demands made upon them for Scriptures by religious societies and individual workers. One of two courses was inevitable. Either the Society's income must be largely and permanently augmented, or its work largely curtailed.

When the Society's financial position was frankly stated at the last Annual Meeting two gentlemen generously offered £500 each towards removing the deficit, provided £50,000 were raised by the June following. The Committee were grateful to these gentlemen for their spontaneous offers, but they feared the minimum sum required was too high for attainment, which the event has proved. They have however, the great pleasure of announcing that up to the 31st March £25,909 had been contributed to the Special Fund by the Society's friends at home and in the colonies. This includes, the two conditionally promised gifts of £500, the gentlemen having kindly waived their full claim. This sum has afforded the Committee great relief by replenishing their much reduced working capital. How necessary a large reserve is, will be understood from the fact, that the average *daily* expenditure throughout the year is £600.

The Committee will now present a statement of the ordinary receipts, which they are thankful to say is also of a cheering character. The free contributions, for the year, apart from the Special Fund, amount to £137,545 *os.* 11*d.*, being £23,032 *6s.* 7*d.* more than in the year preceding. The sale of Scriptures has yielded £99,833 *7s.* 10*d.*, being an increase of £2,961 *12s.* 2*d.* The entire increase in receipts from Free Contributions and Sales is therefore £25,993 *18s.* 9*d.* This part of their report the Committee regard as calling for an equally hearty recognition of the Divine goodness as that relating to the Special Fund. They would ask particular attention to one fact. The Free Contributions received from the auxiliaries in England and Wales (excluding legacies, subscriptions, donations, and collections paid direct to the Bible House) amount to £57,263 *19s.* 4*d.*, which is the largest sum obtained from this source for upwards of twenty years.

It is well understood that a man's position depends quite as much upon what he spends as upon what he receives. The Committee can reassure the Society's constituents upon this point also. The expenditure has been £220,956 *13s.* 8*d.*, which is below that of 1892 by £13,825 *10s.* 6*d.* They do not look upon this reduction with

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complacency, except in one aspect. The pecuniary condition of the Society last year, together with the uncertainty attending the future, counselled the greatest possible economy consistent with the efficient prosecution of its work. They have endeavoured faithfully to carry out this policy. The large reduction has been effected chiefly by a considerable lessening of the stock of Scriptures kept at the foreign depôts; also by curtailing colportage in some European countries, and by abstaining from new undertakings except where the call was clear and strong. It should, however, be borne in mind that the large decrease in the stocks held in continental depôts was only a temporary expedient to meet an emergency. The shelves will have to be gradually replenished, which will involve future outlay.

At the last anniversary the President expressed his conviction that an addition of £20,000 to the Society's income was indispensable to enable them fully to meet the world's need of the Bible. The Bishop of Exeter thereupon moved "That the Society's supporters be respectfully urged to add half as much again to their subscriptions." The Committee know that in several instances his lordship's proposal has been adopted, but they have not the means of judging to what extent it has been acted upon throughout the country. They would earnestly entreat all who are able to assist the Society in this the only way which will afford a sufficient permanent income.

To prevent a too favourable estimate of the Society's financial position a few words of explanation are necessary. The great increase in the ordinary income is chiefly owing to a legacy of £20,000 bequeathed by a warm friend of the Society, the late Rev. James Spurrell, of Brighton. Such large gifts are rare, and cannot be reckoned upon. With respect to the sum so kindly contributed towards the deficit, it should be remembered that it amounts to only a *portion* of the total deficit, still leaving the Society poorer by £40,920 11s. 11d., than it was five years ago. Even if the surplus arising from the excess of receipts over expenditure during the past year be applied to the reduction of the deficit, the capital of the Society is yet below what it was in 1888 by £24,498 16s. 10d. For this reason the Committee have decided to keep the Special Fund open for another year; and they earnestly request those of the Society's supporters who may not have already contributed to this object to favour them with donations.

The encouraging character of the Society's finances extends to the issues. The steady and uninterrupted increase reported in the circulation for the last four years has been continued in 1892. It has reached a total of 4,049,756 copies, being 60,541 more than in 1891. There is a gratifying advance of 6,531 in the sale of Bibles, Testaments have diminished to the extent of 46,222. The reduction is mainly in Penny Testaments, which are no longer in such heavy demand. There is an advance of 100,232 in Portions. Considering the smaller expenditure of the year this growth in circulation is eminently satisfactory, and calls for gratitude and praise. The total issues by the Society since its formation are now 135,894,552.

The obituary of the year affords a pleasant contrast to that presented in 1892, during which year no less than eleven of the Vice-Presidents died. On this occasion happily the list is unbroken.

The following gentlemen have accepted the office of Vice-President:—The Rev. Canon Edmonds, B.D.; The Hon. G. W. Allan, of Toronto, President of the Upper Canada Bible Society; Edward Rawlings, Esq.; Joseph Storrs Fry, Esq., of Bristol; The Most Rev. the Bishop of Calcutta, Metropolitan of India and Ceylon; The Rev. Dr. Newman Hall, LL.B.; The Rev. J. Guinness Rogers.

Among the Honorary Governors for Life two have been removed by death—Mr. John MacGregor and the Rev. F. J. Falding, D.D. The former gentleman was for many years a prominent and valuable member of the Committee, whose name is held in affectionate remembrance by his surviving colleagues. Dr. Falding was one of the Society's most devoted workers in Yorkshire. Notices of both these deceased friends were given in the *Monthly Reporter*.

The following additions have been made to the list of Honorary Governors for Life:—E. Neston Habershon, Esq.; W. Lashmar, Esq.; The Rev. F. Fitch, M.A.;

J. Fenn Clark, Esq. ; The Rev. H. H. Lawry of Auckland, N. Z. ; The Rev. E. E. Reinke, of Manchester, Jamaica ; The Rev. Dr. Cornish, of Montreal ; The Ven. Archdeacon Maunsell of Auckland, translator of the Bible into Maori.

In the last Report occurred for the first time the names of ladies who had been elected to the same honour "for essential services rendered to the Society." Already death has made an inroad in their ranks. Miss Cahill, of Richmond, an old and active friend of the Society, has been called to rest from her labours.

The under-mentioned ladies have been since appointed by the Committee Honorary Governors for Life:—The Lady Alicia Blackwood, of Boxmoor ; Mrs. F. Browne, of Douglas, Isle of Man ; Mrs. Cheesman, of Buckingham ; Mrs. Richard Davies, of Treborth, near Bangor ; Mrs. R. Garnett, of Penketh, near Warrington ; Miss Gorell, of Coltishall, Norfolk ; Mrs. Lloyd, of Torquay ; Mrs. Robinson, of Northampton ; Miss Sharman, of Streatham ; Miss Snewin, of Barnsbury ; Mrs. Thorpe, of Surbiton ; Mrs. Wightman of Shrewsbury.

It is with deep sorrow the Committee report the death of one of their own number—Mr. W. M. Seaman, of Tower House, Putney. He joined the Committee in 1888, and by his Christian character, genial disposition, and painstaking devotion to his duties, gained the warm regard of all his brethren.

In such details as these,—the details of finance, the statistical results of organised action—the Bible Society has much in common with all other Christian agencies. But when we turn to its work, as we see it in life and movement in the narrative of the year, we are struck with the way in which it differs from them all. It possesses, indeed, the same deep interest which the missionary enterprise has: it possesses all its spirituality: it possesses also and in a great degree, that romantic charm which is felt as one passes away from home into the heart of strange races and lands. But it is less confined, it is more comprehensive than any: the limitations of creed fall from it: it finds no church: it commissions no preacher: remembering how often popular theology is a paraphrase of the original—how often the paraphrase of a paraphrase, it withdraws to the untroubled wells of sacred truth—to the inspired text itself—and that without comment, without note. And in doing this, while it leaves to others the crowded ways of Christian instruction, it enters the sphere of pure learning and becomes a great philological Institute. Never indeed has there been such an Institute before—with its thousand scholars at work in a hundred languages, and that not in academic seclusion where the voices one hears are from books, but in the midst of crowds and with the sound of their vernacular ever growing more familiar, nor bent on the production of some treatise of mere learning, but eager to give to men the Words of Eternal Life and intent on the deliverance and redemption of the soul. In such a spirit and with such aims the Society cannot but accept a policy which may well be called imperial—it cannot pause, it cannot retreat, it cannot delimit its frontiers; the greatness of its plan and of its duty will not allow it to rest. It already possesses the great national tongues, but there are hundreds of others. It must annex new languages as the great Powers annex countries, for through the language of the people lies the way to its heart. Within the last three years about twenty new languages have thus been added.<sup>1</sup> Some of these were obscure dialects; they have been rescued from degradation and enriched with the beautiful treasures of sacred literature, as waste land is rescued from the sea and transformed into the meadows and the orchardland of home. But when the speech has thus been won and the Gospel made vernacular, the Society's work is but half complete, the colporteur and the Bible-woman must be found who—themselves "living letters"—may follow the people into the haunts of their common life, and put into their hands the Word of God. It is in the life and work of these devoted servants of the Society that we see best its

peculiar character ; and the reports of the year—which are largely compiled from their narratives—lead us as in a journey into every corner of the world.

Let us begin with FRANCE—as with France the Society's Report opens—and with the group of countries of Latin race and faith, among which France holds a premier place. In one sense the accounts of the year may appear disappointing. There is nothing new ; there is nothing striking ; and, fearing that he has been too sanguine in the past, M. Monod is reticent on the hopes or prospects of the future. But in one felicitous phrase he indicates the true point of view, "The noble and wealthy," he writes, "may seem beyond our reach ; but it is otherwise with the poor ; we do not indeed see multitudes converted but we see the faithful efforts of the men blessed to one soul here, another there—always one by one" It is this "one by one"—this recognition of the individual—which is the great fact and reality in the light of which everything is changed. Watching for some national movement—some characteristic revolution—one too easily forgets that a single soul is itself a world. But what a record of the year it is—here as everywhere else—when the greatness of the individual is remembered ! During 1892 fifty-two men have pursued their quiet work in France ; we meet them everywhere,—in the crowds that throng the great seaports and the inland cities, in the beautiful Loire country, with its white spaces of sand and grey slated cottages ; in the vast pastoral plains of *La Bassée*, where the great rolling fields of corn put one in mind of the sea ; among the mountains of the Cevennes, so far from the ordinary tracks that the shepherds are astonished to see a stranger ;—everywhere these patient men are found and always they are in frank and familiar converse with the people,—remonstrating in one case, explaining in another, consoling in a third it is "one by one always" and never surely in vain. How reassuring—when the individuality of their work is remembered—is it to observe the exhilarant tone which marks the journals of the year, and to notice that, in spite of endless discouragements there are no signs of despondency. "After all the light spreads" writes one of the men, and the simple generalisation is unquestionably true. There is indeed one cloud on the pages of the year—it is the sorrow felt by the men when they learned from M. Monod that owing to the financial difficulties of the Society, the limits of their work and expenses must be as far as possible narrowed ; and it is in such expressions that one learns the meaning of a diminished income. Happily it also gives opportunity to learn the loyal spirit of such men as are at work in France. "I am quite willing," writes one of the colporteurs, "to bear one half of my expenses, though," he sorrowfully adds, "this will be but a drop in the ocean." Yes, as regards the amount of the gift, but not as regards its spirit. This spirit it is which in every difficulty has been the treasure and strength of the Society and of all Christian service.<sup>1</sup>

Looking for a moment across the north-east frontier into BELGIUM, where the mining population, perplexed and excited by the promises of a mistaken socialism, exist in a state of chronic unrest, we mark the colporteur busied among the people as he is busy in France : here also it is "one by one always" and with the same results. "It is a constant struggle," writes Mr. Kirkpatrick, "as our men go from house to house, attending fairs and markets, accosting people in the street, on the roads, in railway carriages—taking every opportunity of calling attention to the Book of Truth." "It is among the manufacturing and mining populations," he continues, "that infidelity is growing more combative and virulent ; but it is among them also that the Scriptures have always been most readily received ; it is there also that the distribution of the Scriptures has led to the formation of churches composed almost exclusively of the working classes. In the neighbourhood of Liege, Charleroi, and Mons, the religion of Christ may be seen influencing the conduct of men who are actively influencing others. They have earned the respect of those among whom they dwell ; they are peaceable members of society ; they take no part in strikes and riots ; some are reformed drunkards ; others have learned to read in

order that they may read the Bible, and all bear witness that Godliness is profitable both for this life and for the life to come. Sixty years ago there were but few churches, and those composed mostly of foreign residents; now there are fifty, and there are urgent demands for more." Such are some of the results of individual influence in one of the strongholds of ignorance and unbelief.<sup>1</sup>

The same narrative continues itself, adding chapter to chapter similar to those already written for the north—though in circumstances and surroundings naturally different—when we cross the Pyrenees into Spain, or the Alps into Italy. But in both these countries there is something of a larger and more national interest, as indeed is sure ever to follow—soon or late—from that patient individual work which receives so fine illustration in France and Belgium.

In the summary of last year SPAIN contributed one of the most significant sections, and later accounts fully sustain the interest. In Spain, indeed, at least in Bible-work, we seem to be standing at the parting of the ways. For more than twenty years the labour of the colporteurs has been prosecuted—silent, inconspicuous, giving slight account of itself; now and perhaps in consequence of it, a new movement has become necessary. No one can so fairly describe the situation as Mr. Jameson himself. "The work of the colporteurs," he writes, "has been largely to prepare for yet higher work, and for a higher class of workers. But this class has now been furnished and we already begin to see the results,—meetings attended by hundreds of people, educated men being brought into contact with educated Evangelical thought and made to realise that people called Protestants or Evangelicals are people who cannot be despised for their ignorance or passed over for their insignificance. And to crown all, in the very centre of the religious and political and literary life of the country there has been opened a new Bible House which men of education and importance are not afraid to visit, to admire the linguistic achievements of the Society and to praise its generosity. In a word, in addition to the devoted patient labours of the colporteurs the Society is beginning to be recognised as a great institution, and there is a disposition continually evidenced to accept a simple Biblical Christianity when presented untrammelled with historical associations which makes one very hopeful of the future of Spain. "The circumstances of the time," Mr. Jameson continues, "favour greatly this new departure. There is a most manifest movement towards something better and higher; several popular writers have been emphasising the need of a purer morality and a more spiritual religion; they appear unconsciously to be stretching out their hands towards the Society and asking to be led further on. A rising politician has given strong expression to the view that a most unmistakable reaction is manifesting itself in a religious sense. Twenty-five years ago the leaders of thought declared that the people could do without religion, but experience has shown that is an impossibility. The most advanced thinkers and eager politicians are pointing to the countries where the Divine Book has proved itself the power of God unto salvation, and, while rejecting foreign creeds and confessional forms of belief, they are open to study the Book itself, and to respect the Society which circulates it alone." These are words of great significance. They have been inspired by the facts and experience of the past, and one waits—rather with hope than with assurance—for the commentary which is to be written upon them by the future."<sup>2</sup>

To pass into ITALY seems to continue the narrative which has been begun in Spain; here also it is a time of crisis and of change, and the voices which describe them best are those of the leading writers of the day. It is in the words of Sig. Bonghi, an eminent writer of Italy, himself a Roman Catholic, and of Prof. Teza, of Padua, that Sig. Meille finds the best expression of the spiritual position. In the leading Italian review, the *Nuovo Antologia*, Sig. Bonghi addresses himself directly to Leo XIII. Much of what he says belongs to politics, but he remembers that

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everywhere politics rest ultimately on religion—that there is a power behind alike Pope and Statesmen which both must recognise, and he speaks with unusual frankness on the nation's spiritual needs. "The conscience of the Italians seems to me," he writes, "to be awakening, though as yet slowly and imperfectly. I hope and believe that our people are thirsting after the fountain of living water. In the Catholic Church of to-day—such as it has become—that fountain appears to many to be dry. It had ceased giving living water for the generality of the people towards the end of the fifteenth century, when the Reformation began. Whatever may have been the faults and errors of that great movement it undoubtedly sprang and derived strength from a quickening of the thought of God and Christian conscience." "I do not," adds Sig. Bonghi, in very significant words, and in view of circumstances which he evidently believes extremely likely,—"I do not consider it an impossibility that such an event may reproduce itself in Italy." Prof. Teza, Rector of Padua University, is perhaps better acquainted than Sig. Bonghi with some important facts, and he speaks with correspondingly greater emphasis. A careful reader of the Society's recent Reports, he has contributed to the *Transactions of the Royal Institute of Sciences, Letters and Arts* an enthusiastic review of the latest volume. What especially engages his admiration is the unceasing and successful toil of the translators. But everything is interesting—the influence of the agents, the labour of the colporteur, the Bible-women in the Zenana. Even the perplexities of an inadequate exchequer give him occasion for praise. "How beautiful," he says, "in this age of corrupt financing, to see a great Society exceed its income in order that there should be no corner in the world unreached by the hand that helps, the voice that teaches, the Book that remains forever." And this is more than a testimony to the Bible Society—it is a plea for Italy—an aspiration for that more liberal, happier age which comes in with a popular Gospel. It is a pleasant commentary on Prof. Teza's words that Sig. Meille can report a circulation far above the average,<sup>1</sup> a sale by the colporteurs of complete editions greater than ever before, and a public interest in the Scriptures of which every section of his narrative contains evidence and illustration.

Between the Latin countries of western and southern Europe and those in the north and centre, where the Reformation made its home, there is a difference which—as regards Bible circulation—every year is rendering more emphatic. It is that while the one group receive their Bible supplies from abroad, the other, to a large and increasing extent, provides them at home. This is eminently the case with Germany, where there are eight Societies, and Switzerland, where there are ten; it is the case in a different degree with Holland and Denmark, with Norway and Sweden. From Sweden and from Holland the Society has been able to withdraw so far as a separate Agency is concerned, and its withdrawal from the others is coming steadily nearer. Nothing can be more satisfactory than the reasons of this readjustment; it means that the organisation for Scriptural supply has, in these countries, been completed, and its administration left in the safe and competent charge of home Christianity. In HOLLAND the present year is the first of so pleasant and healthy independence. SWITZERLAND is in the transitory stage which precedes it, and the accounts which have been received from its Cantonal Societies with their Bible Union for Colportage shows that while much is to be desired much is also being done. In DENMARK and in NORWAY the people are familiar with the Colporteur, and as he passes along the dykes and level meadows of the one, or climbs the steep mountain paths of the other, he meets with few to whom he is not a welcome visitor. From GERMANY the story of the past year is one which must be read with pleasure; there is indeed a decline from the high figures of 1892, but by extending the comparison to the figures of a decade ago the rapid advance is at once evident. In 1881 the total circulation in the Empire was 461,000; last year it was 621,000. At the earlier date the share of the German Societies in this number was 172,000; last year it was 326,000,—a return nearly double of the first and the highest ever attained.<sup>2</sup>

Nothing can better emphasise the growth and development of Bible work in the Fatherland than these figures, and there can be no better pledge for the future. The circulation of the British and Foreign Bible Society, limited largely to the Roman Catholic population, has also advanced and at a constantly diminishing cost; in 1881 it was 198,000, in 1892, 213,000, and at no distant date it must be hoped this share also in the work will pass entirely into other hands. Meantime the colporteurs have urged their work in the face of every difficulty, and though from the Poles and Lithuanians of the eastern frontier to the Alsations of the west, and from the Bavarians, whose homeland skirts Switzerland, to the Mecklenburgers on the Baltic there is much more to be done than has yet been accomplished, there is yet ample assurance that it will be undertaken in the spirit which preludes success. A special and very interesting part of the circulation is under the control of Col. Klefeker, the Emperor's Commissioner, who gives his undivided attention to the Army and Navy, and who reports for the past year a circulation of almost 37,000. The disastrous depression which follows epidemics like those of cholera and influenza—and 1892 will be known in Germany, says Mr. Watt, as "the cholera year"—accounts to a large extent for any reduction which may be noticed in the return, but with restored national confidence, and with the gradual diffusion of the Revised Edition of the Luther Bible, the accounts from the Fatherland for 1892 may be expected to show an advance worthy of the work they register.

Of all the annual letters of the year none is conceived in a more tender spirit or with more frequent reference to the Person and the kingdom of his great Master than that sent from the AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN Agency by Mr. Millard. It is very copious; the diversified character of the empire renders it correspondingly varied in contents; and it necessarily leads the reader into many scenes which are sufficiently depressing. But there is a light upon every page, and a touch of kindness in every narrative, and though from time to time he is compelled to speak of "growing opposition" and "increasing Atheism," nothing can sorrow or sadden, even for a moment, the temper of the genial writer. Mr. Millard is an Apostle of Hope, and wherever he looks—to Bohemia, to Silesia, to Hungary, to Roumania—he finds reasons for rejoicing. Not that he at all shirks the facts, but that he delights to emphasise those that point more distinctly to the day which he sees everywhere spread—however faintly—on the mountains which encircle his home. With great pleasure Mr. Millard notices the growth of Christian life and activity in Hungarian and Bohemian society; the courtesy of the authorities in giving facilities to the Society's work—the cordial support of such men as Bishop von Everth,<sup>1</sup> and Bishop von Tardy, and of such assemblies as that of the Lutheran Church—the increasing attention shown in the religious press to the work of the Bible Society; the enlarging circulation in some important districts, and especially the numberless instances, occupying as they do almost every page of the journals, of the hearts of men and women touched with the powers of the world to come. Seldom indeed is the individuality of the colporteur's work better seen than here; seldom is one more content—forgetting the excitement of national awakenings—to notice that here again it is "one by one always." The general impression on reading these narratives is that the Károli celebration of a few years past must have had excellent results; that the work of the Bible Society is becoming largely familiarised to the more educated and christian classes, and that it is impossible to over-estimate the influence for good, within the territory of the great Dual-Empire, of the ceaseless though unpretentious work which the colporteurs carry on.<sup>2</sup>

It is at this point we enter the domain of Muhammadanism. The shadow of that old faith lies like a cloud over the group of countries where three continents—Europe, Africa and Asia—meet. To the west its dusky crescent covers Asia Minor and the provinces around Constantinople; southwards it lies across the valley of the Nile and the sandy wastes of Arabia. Eastward it folds Persia in its eclipse; then

northwards again, it creeps up the Euphrates valley and touches the slopes of Ararat and the coast towns of the Black Sea. In the centre of this area lies the Holy Land; and the outskirts of the cloud are loosely conterminous with three of the Society's Agencies, the Turkish, the Egyptian, and the Persian.

On the European edge of this great area, and writing from CONSTANTINOPLE, Dr. Thomson gives an account of Bible-work which everywhere shows progress. The circulation, favoured by a quiet year, has increased from 40,000 to 48,000, and there are several interesting evidences of increasing liberality of thought and a deepening sense of religious truth<sup>1</sup>. These may be perhaps best indicated by some of the comments on the table of thirty-nine languages used in the Agency. "The issues of *Albanian*," writes Dr. Thomson, "now considerably exceed 1,000 copies, no small attainment among a people who had no written language till the Bible Society gave them one, and who are still the least civilised of the races of European Turkey. *Bulgarian*, reaching a total of 6,009, exhibits the large increase of 1,438 copies, largely in consequence of the pocket Bible published by the American Society, partly also in consequence of the promotion of education by the Government. The *Greek* group has this year attained the highest figure hitherto—that of 30,506, exhibiting an increase of 5,580 copies. A circulation so large and so steadily progressive for these thirty years may safely be held to indicate that the people love and study the Scriptures. It is cheering to report that in the regions of Asia Minor, consecrated by the labours of the Apostle Paul, the people are urgently calling for the same Gospel he preached to them though in a different language. Nor is the circulation in Ancient Greek to be overlooked, as it represents largely the place of the Scriptures in the higher department of national education. The very large increase of 1,591 copies in a total of 3,947 in *Turkish*, is to be regarded with deepest interest as indicating that in a land where the Gospel is only with difficulty heard in Turkish it is becoming increasingly read. These are but a few instances, and generally it may be said that, as in England, the systematic promotion of education has given a vast impulse to production by the press, so in Turkey also where, notwithstanding some vexatious impediments, education is advancing among all classes, it is impossible to over-estimate the importance of giving to the rising generation the Word of God in their own tongue." Thus far Dr. Thomson, and he adds a significant sentence which, summing up the more encouraging facts about GREECE, must be given here:—"I cannot," he says, "but direct attention to the progress made among the Greek nation. Thirty or forty years ago utter indifference or open hostility was the general attitude of the Greek clergy and people though with some noble exceptions, to the circulation of the Scriptures. Now open hostility is seldom met with, while not a few frankly defend and applaud the circulation of the Bible as a work of divine philanthropy."

From ALEXANDRIA a brief statement summarises the year. Seldom indeed has there been a year so crippling to all engaged in the work, so obstructive to all their means of doing it. Almost every one was prostrated by influenza or some other form of illness. Mr. Weakley himself was long an invalid—the ports of SYRIA and PALESTINE were guarded—the interior of the country was barred by sanitary cordons; the door left so invitingly open last year in Southern Arabia was closed again for the route to the interior was blocked and the cases of Scripture were untouched; the narrative is little but a chapter of accidents. Yet in spite of all this the circulation by sale has been larger than ever; never indeed has so high a figure been touched in Arabic Scriptures. No wonder that, as he recalls what he and his colleagues have suffered and then surveys the total of over 21,000 copies distributed, Mr. Weakley finds in so unexpected success "a token not to be doubted that their great Lord and Superintendent has been with His servants."<sup>2</sup>

The same story of progress, and in the face of hardly fewer—though they are different obstacles—comes from PERSIA. In 1891, 2,657 copies were circulated; the returns for 1892 are 4,303. In various ways Mr. Hodgson has been able to improve his organisation; and the possibilities of the position are more inspiring than any obstacles could be. "Arabia," he writes, "from this side at least, has hitherto been closed to the Gospel, but at Baghdad, Basra, Bahrein, and Muskat we stand on the threshold and it will be a great day to look forward to when we join hands across the Continent, with the Egyptian Agency." No doubt that day will come. Meantime the Persian colporteurs have been pursuing their work in other directions as they were able. One reads with a strange sense of its romance the narrative which recounts their journeyings. "We stayed," writes one of them, "fifteen days at Hillah [Hillah is the ancient Babylon], sold many copies of the Scriptures, and had much religious conversation with those who came to us." "Going to Shiraz," says another, "I passed through a beautiful country full of lemon and orange groves and sold seventeen copies on my way." Among these groves lie the tombs of Hafiz and of Sadi, and Shiraz was a classic city when England was emerging from barbarism. Others of the band are found by the banks of the Euphrates on the way that leads to Ur of the Chaldees—another started for Susiana where travellers are shown the traditional tomb of the Prophet Daniel.<sup>1</sup> What strange visitations of thought come at such names from that old buried world to these modern times which tread upon its tomb! But of all such reflections these Persian colporteurs are unconscious; they live in the present; their care is to make an impression on the narrow Muhammadan natures they meet; to put into their hands a Book they have themselves found to contain a treasure; to touch their lives with a new inspiration. The journals of the year show that they had not laboured in vain.

From this ancient world let us turn to the modern—from the Muhammadan to the Slav. At its northern extremity the Persian Agency is conterminous with part of the Russian; on the boundary line stands Mount Ararat; beyond—and almost in its shadow—one hears the shriek of the locomotive as it speeds from Tiflis to its terminus on the shore of the Caspian. The Bible Society's records of 1892 are found as regards North Russia and Siberia in Mr. Nicolson's report; the accounts of the Southern and Central Asiatic section are given by Mr. Morrison. Both are interesting, both must be called progressive, but each has a special section in which largely centred the interest and the advance of the year. In the north it is the journey of Mr. Davidson into Siberia; in the south of Mr. Morrison into Chinese Tartary.

Mr. Davidson, who is in charge of what is now the Sub-Agency of Western Siberia, left Ekaterineburg in the spring of 1892. His course, after visiting the great fair at Irbit and elsewhere, lay through Omsk and Tomsk to Irkutsk on Lake Baikal. At this point he turned westwards again by Tobolsk and Tyumen to the point whence he started. During this long and often perilous journey the organisation of the Agency was developed and strengthened, and not a few fresh proofs were given by the higher Russian officials of their courteous regard for the Society and goodwill to its work. At Irkutsk—the "Paris of Siberia"—Mr. Davidson parted from his fellow traveller, Mr. Keay, in whose charge as sub-agent Eastern Siberia is now placed. When the account was written Mr. Keay was at Vladivostock, the new Russian port on the shores of the Sea of Japan. From this eastern boundary of the Agency to St. Petersburg on the west it is almost 4,000 miles.

The journey of Mr. Morrison was equally long, it was more perilous; it was perhaps even more important. His object was partly to develop Bible circulation, partly to test the value of the new Uzbek-Turki translation of the Four Gospels. In both respects he was successful. At Kashgar, where Morrison was courteously received by the Russian Consul and by the agent of the Viceroy of India, he was

able to secure the services of a colporteur whom he hopes soon to see travelling across the uplands which stretch from the southern wall of the Thian Shan to the northern frontier of Thibet. The inquiry as to the version with which he will work was equally satisfactory. "I am satisfied," says Mr. Morrison, "we have now a book which is understood by 4,000,000 of people scattered over the illimitable plains between the Caspian and the Wall of China." In this journey Mr. Morrison entered what is entirely new ground for the Bible Society. "It is to the credit of the Swedish Mission Union that they were the first to enter this rather unpromising Mission Field; it is to the credit of the Bible Society that they were only a few days behind them."

These journals have a special interest of their own, but the reports from Russia are interesting everywhere. They show, as perhaps no others do, how kindly affected the great Slavonic people are to the men who bring them the Word of God, and how courteous and helpful the Government officials are. When the colporteur goes to one of the military garrisons, he has a soldier to introduce him to the men, and the good word of the commanding officer to help his sales. When he visits a prison the authorities seem almost as wishful that his books should be distributed as he is himself. The expenditure both in north and south has been considerably reduced owing to the readiness with which free passes have been given to the men, and freights have been remitted on the cases of books. This latter is not a slight item; Mr. Davidson has transmitted to the East thirty-seven tons of Scriptures. In some districts the circulation has greatly advanced. In Charkov, for example—and Charkov is a centre of work almost exclusively among Russians—last year's circulation of 63,442 is by far the largest on record, and almost amounts to the entire circulation of the Agency when this Depôt was established. Results like these have been won only by corresponding sacrifice and effort. "Some of the colporteurs," says Mr. Morrison, "have done astonishing things as travellers; one covered in the course of the year 28,000 miles; another in the Volga, 27,000; a third in the province of Veronej, 18,000. The average of these three is nearly equal to a journey round the world."<sup>1</sup>

From Russia it is natural to turn to CHINA—the one name is increasingly suggestive of the other—and with China in this review may be classed JAPAN. Unlike recent years, 1892 has been in China one of comparative quiet. It has been unvexed by special pestilence or calamities, and the "Prodigal Child"—the wayward Yellow River—has kept fairly within its bounds. The narrative of the Society's work is also unmarked by special incident. We turn over the pages of such journals as reach us to mark again that characteristic of colportage everywhere—its individuality—its patient, gradual influence, touching person by person, broadening occasionally into groups and little communities,—there are references to bands of thirty or more, who from the influence of the Gospels alone have associated themselves for study and worship; but from one side of the immense field to the other it is a fresh illustration of "one by one always." During the year about 176,000 copies have been circulated. This is less apparently than the figures of 1891, but some of the returns have been delayed. The colporteur force numbered 140. Of these, six only were Europeans. "It is a pity," says Mr. Dyer regretfully, "that their number is not double and treble what it is." When we recollect what has been done among the islands of Malaysia by the band of young Englishmen who found Christ's work calling them there, one feels how true the regretful words are. What a voice one may surely hear—if the conscience will but listen for a little—from these great cities, these villages, these populous plains of China, pleading, in its inarticulate way, for that guidance and ground for hope for which the weary people turn to the dumb oracles of Confucianism in vain.

In JAPAN the year has been one of political agitation so intense and continuous as to absorb, in the meantime, much of the thought which religious affairs might claim. With too many in eager young Japan, Christianity has become "something we may neglect," it is not home-born, it is not "patriotic." "Are you a Japanese?" says an indignant native to one of the colporteurs—"a Japanese, to deal in these foreign books and doctrines!" It is no result of such feeling that the number of inquirers has been reduced, and that attendances in many places have diminished. The case is all the sadder when it is seen—as it may be seen plainly enough—that the chill which has for the moment fallen on the first love of Japanese piety, has come like a frost-wind from the same countries whence the missionaries and the Scriptures themselves first came. The young men read the Agnostic and the sensuous literature of the West; they watch the ecclesiastical feuds; they become—with a sigh perhaps—disenchanted, for *we had trusted it had been He which should have redeemed us*, and they transmit their unbelief to others. "The mass of the people," writes the report, "has thus been rendered less sensitive to the preaching of the Gospel." On the other hand it is noticeable that there is increasingly shown among Buddhist writers a distinct despondency as to their own future, and that they admit it is idle to stem the inflowing tide of Christianity by questioning its critical or historical claims. In the meantime the work of the united Bible Agencies has been continuously pressed; the circulation though less in volume has perhaps been better in the quality of its influence; and the year has been signalised by what may be called its central event—the publication, in Roman character, of the entire Japanese Bible, assiduously revised from the earlier edition, and fitted to be what it is hoped it will soon become—the book of the people, understood and studied by them—in this strange new Empire of the East.

The annual narrative from MALAYSIA, as it reserving its best for the living voice of its writer at Exeter Hall, is brief and without special incident. The circulation is not higher than that of 1891, but it is hardly less, though illness and absence withdrew some of the busiest workers who contributed to the advance of earlier years. It is in facts like this—the correspondence between the number of hands that give and those that receive—the failing or the broadening of the kindly beam just as there are few or many messengers to bear it on—it is in this that one may read the claim that the populations walking in darkness urge upon those who are walking in light, that the voice may be heard that shapes itself, as we give or refuse it obedience, either into words of encouragement or of condemnation. It is one of the safe generalisations of experience in Malaysia that Europeans of the stamp worthy of such work are incalculably more efficient than natives. Why have we not more of the abler men? Why must returns remain stationary, because there are none to fill vacant places? Now that the Japanese Bible is fast approaching completion, and that the Malay will soon possess the New Testament in an idiom which, it is hoped, may speak more clearly than ever to his heart, why should these issues be limited because colporteurs are few?<sup>1</sup>

But whatever interest is awakened by these Islands and Empires of the East it is sensibly deepened as the eye turns to INDIA. For in India everything fascinates; the memorials of its undeparting past, the panoramic scenery of the present, the approach—dimly discerned, but ushering itself by many heart-shaking anticipations—of some near and mighty future. That past meets us indeed everywhere, not only in the great temples and palaces—more impressive because their uses and their inhabitants are gone—but also in the living descendants of once imperial races in whom one may still mark the unexhausted power which built up the dynasties of Mahrattas and Moguls. To many these are reminiscences only of what has vanished; it is the European cities, the military station the flag and the drum-beat of England which impresses the sense. And yet the deepest interest is not here, it is absorbed with the problems and the anticipations of what is to come. For India is moving—rapidly moving—through an era of transition: in a very impressive sense

the old is passing away—the old fantastic faith, the old order in morals and manners, and all is becoming new. And what is the new age, so near but so indefinite, to be? Have the powers of Brahminism and Buddhism gathered their shadowy robes about them and gone, to leave their thrones to Muhammadanism—virile and aggressive still; or to the Agnosticism of the West; or to Christianity? And if to Christianity, is the advent of that better Kingdom near, or must it come—as the earlier political dynasties came—only, after convulsions and shattering war? It is such questions as these which haunt the mind, and which give the main interest to the annual messages from the mission agencies, and to the accounts of the Bible Society, for from these, as from despatches from some distant battle field, one hopes to gather the reply.

For recent years the Society's reports have been singularly articulate in their intelligence and their forecasts, and if they do not furnish a complete answer, they seem as to the main question to be clear. They have given testimony to the advance of Christianity everywhere—an advance so rapid as to alarm native attention, and so sustained as to have suffered no serious retreat. These testimonies are continued in all the latest reports which have been received. One comes from Allahabad, itself a centre of pilgrimage, and not far from the temple-crowded city of Benares, and overlooking from its ramparts the spot sacred to native faith where the Jumna and the Ganges and the Saraswati meet. It is also the centre of the Hindi-speaking population and therefore of peculiar importance. In 1891 the circulation was exceptionally high; in 1892 it has, in the important items of Depôt and colportage sales advanced still further; a great impulse has been given to Scriptural distribution by the issue of a portable Hindi Bible, and a still more portable New Testament; and in summing up the partial results of the year the Agent can say, that "as a whole, the Kingdom of Christ is making rapid progress in the North-West Provinces and many are looking for a large in-gathering of those to whom the Gospel has been made known." From the military and at the same time Auxiliary centre of Bangalore in the South there are similar accounts; the Kanarese Bible is being revised with elaborate care so as to bring it nearer than before to the ordinary comprehension of the masses of people; "the number of volumes of Scriptures sold is nearly double of what it was six years ago, and of purely Kanarese editions it is nearly two and a half times as great as then." Similarly the Madras Auxiliary reports a purely colportage circulation higher than ever before, a proof, says the secretary, that "the Word is gradually gaining ground, breaking up prejudices and preparing the way for a great future." The same is the case in Bombay. There also the colportage circulation has increased, there is a continued demand for Scripture Portions, and the Gujarati Old Testament is being revised. These are suggestive testimonies, and all the more as they represent an ever increasing and sustained advance. If it be objected that all this is slight in comparison with the millions of India, and that the older faiths increase with the perpetual increase of the population, it should be remembered that the progress of Christianity has never been controlled by natural but by spiritual law; that the arithmetical rather than the geometrical ratio represents the growth by which it first occupied Europe and destroyed the superstitions which then overshadowed everything; and that the "one Divine Event" to which all history points is to a dominion not of an era or of a race but of the world.

In a review so rapid as this little can be said of another great continent—differing singularly from India both in its past and present—but, to the Christian estimate, destined equally to share in the great Christian future. In AFRICA every thing to ordinary interest is modern; on its wide uplands and rivers seem to meet, and in all their force, the currents of the interests and competitions, the changes and revolutions of to-day. From the Bible Society point of view the centres of special development are in Egypt, in the region of the Great Lakes, and in the fast developing colonies of the Cape. To Egypt some reference has already been made; if one passes in thought almost directly southward, he will enter Abyssinia. It is one of Mr. Weakley's regrets that the transmission of Scriptures into Abyssinia from the coast was so long delayed; but it has been accomplished, and a cordial autograph

letter of thanks from the Emperor to the Committee of the Society gives assurance that every facility will be given to its work. Further south we enter Uganda the scene of the labours of the Church Missionary Society, and still further the region of the Great Lakes, in which the Universities' Mission is at work. Both of these have specially engaged attention during the year, and both have furnished fresh evidence of the importance of the Society's aid. Since the date of last Report 25,000 copies of Scriptures have been sent to Uganda, a number which will soon be exceeded in the present year; and Mr. Travers, Secretary of the Universities' Mission, regards the completion of the Swahili Bible as the "crown of the year." Almost at this point we meet the outposts of the great Auxiliary centred at the Cape, and there is perhaps no report of the year more expressive of activity and advance than theirs. The circulation—close on 36,000—has never reached before so high a figure. "Who can estimate," says Mr. Nuttall, "the moral value and spiritual worth of these thousands of volumes scattered in various parts of South Africa?"

Of the WEST INDIES, where the Society's Agent, Mr. Heath, is patiently urging everywhere the extension of colportage, the formation of Depôts, and the organised supply of the populations with the Scriptures, no detailed account can be given here; nor of CENTRAL AMERICA, to which Mr. Castells, with the experience gained in his Malaysian work, has recently been commissioned to the Spanish-speaking islands and inhabitants of the mainland; nor of CHILI and PERU, where the Valparaiso Society, assisted from London, are continuing colportage work; nor of the pleasant islands of MELANESIA and POLYNESIA, where the Society has many friends; nor of the ARGENTINE REPUBLIC, where an excellent and most necessary work is being done by the men under Mr. Jetto's superintendence, and about whom he characteristically says—"If they have not done more it is because more cannot be done!" Nor can anything beyond a reference be made to the group of Auxiliaries and the innumerable friends who in CANADA and AUSTRALIA and NEW ZEALAND are doing so much to strengthen the Society's hands and to extend its influence. In these great Colonies one happily notes the absence to a large degree of the more purely missionary characteristics of other fields; he is among communities already Christian—members of the old home circle, and delighting to find out year by year, in their deepening sympathy and increasing contributions, how much more blessed it is to give than to receive.

It is one of the peculiar honours of the language of England that its *contents* are so inestimably rich,—that it possesses and gives access to a literature which no other language can boast. And just as the language becomes more widely spoken—as the river broadens its bosom and extends its course—so the influences of the literature it bears with it will be correspondingly diffused. In 1760 English was the vernacular of about twelve millions; it is now spoken by more than a hundred and thirty millions. This has been more than a mere linguistic expansion; it has been the development of the rich and the powers of a great treasure of thought; it has been the establishment of an intellectual empire; it has made Shakespeare, and Milton, and Bunyan, and above all the English Bible, familiar wherever their tongue was spoken, and since *it* has grown well-nigh cosmopolitan *they* have become classics of the world.

And it is the peculiar honour of English Christianity in founding the Bible Society that what has been done without human intent in the case of its own language, it has desired to avail itself of the connection between the language and its contents, and give to every tongue a literature—sweeter, deeper, more mighty than any other; to launch on the river of every form of speech a vessel which may bear its cargo and spread its riches wherever the river itself may flow. And in all this it has been wonderfully successful. It has made popular the Divine possession of the older tongues of civilisation, and consecrated many rude and barbaric ones by making them custodians of the same treasure. It has taught many dialects their noblest use, and brought into kindlier concord than ever before the long-dissonant accents of Babel. The time foretold in ancient prophecy,<sup>1</sup> when all PEOPLES shall become obedient to the Son of Man, seems still distant, but the Bible Society has been privileged to bring sensibly nearer the period when all LANGUAGES shall serve Him.

## EXTRACTS FROM AGENTS' REPORTS.

REV. DR. BEAUMONT—*Delhi*.—This branch, after some years of suspended animation, is again showing signs of vigorous life under the management of its staff of able officers. Dr. Honsberger, president, occupied the chair, when an excellent report was read by Mr. D. W. Parsons, secretary. Rev. Mr. Clarke and Rev. Mr. Haviland were present with us. Your agent spoke about forty minutes, laying stress on the dependence of all the Foreign Missionary Societies upon the Bible Society, and their inseparable co-operation together.

*Lynedoch*.—For its size this branch keeps up its reputation as one of the best branches in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society. The pre-eminence of Lynedoch is principally due to the deep interest taken in it by Mr. W. A. Charlton, the able secretary, and by Mr. John Charlton, M.P., one of the "Noble Thirteen" who protested against the Jesuits' Estate Bill of 1888. The sum of \$54 was subscribed at the meeting, and will be paid when the collectors call. The Rev. Alexander Barclay, M.A., and the Rev. Edward Whitworth were present and spoke after your agent.

*Langton*.—A moderately good attendance; but this branch, notwithstanding the active efforts of the secretary, Mr. G. E. Smith, is in a languid state. Miss Tweedale was the only young lady who exerted herself in the work of collecting, the rest declined.

*St. Williams*.—The attendance was fairly good. Wm. Nevett, Esq., president, "a fine old English gentleman" of the older school, being present. The Rev. R. W. Johnston gave an excellent address, having come specially from Port Rowan to assist in the proceedings. Mrs. Nevett kindly volunteered to undertake the collecting personally. The collection at the close was said to be the best they have ever had at the annual meeting.

*Vittoria*.—The attendance consisted chiefly of ladies, and those who were appointed collectors readily and cheerfully accepted the nomination. Rev. L. Newton occupied the chair. Mr. S. McCall, ex-M.P., presented a favourable and well-prepared report.

Sunday, Oct. 29.—Preached three times—at *Port Rowan*, *St. Williams* and at the church a few miles from *Port Rowan*, on "The Bible, its Divine Inspiration and Power," and on "The Objects of the Bible Society."

*Port Rowan*.—A good attendance. Spoke about forty-five or fifty minutes to a most attentive and appreciative audience. The Rev. R. W. Johnstone, president, occupied the chair. The pious and active zeal of the ladies of Port Rowan gives every hope as to the future of this branch. The collection at the close of the meeting was very good.

*Port Dover*.—No branch is more highly favoured with earnest and capable officers than this. It was refreshing to note the business-like method pursued at the preliminary meeting of the committee, and the orderly manner in which the proceedings were conducted at the general meeting immediately afterward. The most influential men in the town were present, together with a large representation of ladies. Port Dover is doing well. Mr. P. Lawson, president, occupied the chair, the Rev. John R. Newell having conducted the opening devotions. Rev. Mr. Cookman was also present.

*Waterford*.—Fine moonlight evening, but only a moderate attendance. The collectors did fairly well last year, but still there is a languid interest here. One or

two of the resident ministers were with us, and spoke in aid of the good work. Mr. A. E. McMichael occupied the chair.

*Norwich.*—The meeting was by no means numerous, and yet this branch is in an active and healthy state. Mr. Barr, president, occupied the chair. Mr. T. A. Walker presented a well-written and able report, which, it must be added, was very encouraging. Your agent again urged, as an inducement to liberal support, the indebtedness of the various Missionary Societies to the Bible Society for the Holy Scripture. The *Gazette* contained a notice of the Societies' scope and objects.

*Otterville.*—The good staff of officers, including Mr. Paxton as president, and Mr. F. G. Bullock as secretary, is a good guarantee for effective work, but the meeting was not a large one. Rev. Mr. Trembel and the superintendent of the Sunday school, both spoke after the agent.

*Bookton.*—This branch, about five miles from *Otterville*, was established by Mr. Paxton and Mr. F. G. Bullock a few years ago, and through the earnest efforts of these two gentlemen is doing good work. Although only a sub-branch of *Otterville*, it is outstripping the latter, especially in the matter of attendance. It is a prosperous branch, and well deserves the annual visit of the Agent. The meeting here fell very appropriately on Thanksgiving Day, and was very well attended.

*Simcoe* Feb. 18th, 1893.—The meeting was of a highly encouraging character, with a good attendance of representatives of all the congregations. The ladies, as is usual in every good work, were conspicuously in the majority. The secretary, Mr. Frank Reid, barrister, read an ably-prepared report. The president, Mr. Alden, occupied the chair. The resident ministers were all present, viz: Rev R. Hicks, B.D., Rev. W. S. Day, M.A., Rev. L. H. Robinson and Rev. Mr. Dack, all of whom took part in the proceedings. The affairs of the branch are under the most able and efficient management. The lady collectors have done exceedingly well.

REV. BERNARD BRYAN—*Cooksville.*—Visited this branch in November. Weather damp and roads bad. Twenty were present. Rev. Mr. Washington in the chair. Rev. Mr. Linton and Mr. Ferguson gave short addresses. The next annual meeting will be held in the Presbyterian Church, Port Credit.

*Streetsville.*—Visited and addressed the children in the Public and High Schools during the day, and gave a notice of the meeting in the evening. Very good meeting; held in Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. Hicks in the chair; Rev. Mr. Glassford addressed the meeting. About ninety present. A hearty interest is here taken in the Society's work.

*Milton.*—Meeting held in Town Hall. Attendance not large. Other attractions held the same night. Rev. Rural Dean MacKenzie occupied the chair, and recommended strongly the work of the Society. Rev. Mr. Haddow also spoke. May r Dice and other good friends of the cause were present. Mr. J. S. Deacon, secretary, performed his work in a thorough business-like way.

*Georgetown.*—Meeting held in Congregational Church—pastor and good choir present. Rev. Mr. Norton performed excellently the duties of the chairman. Addresses were delivered by Revs. Jos. Fennel, A. H. Gibbard and Mr. McCormack. About 125 were present. This branch is doing very good work.

*Norval.*—Very fair meeting. Night wet and dark, and yet about eighty present. Mr. Robert Watson occupied the chair. The financial report was very satisfactory. It would be difficult indeed to find a more efficient, a more thoroughly interested secretary of the Bible Society, than the Rev. J. Argo. He will make most of the field occupied by this branch.

*Glen Williams.*—This is in the field of the Norval Branch. The people of this section have contributed for some time to the funds of the Society, but never enjoyed an annual meeting in their midst. At the request of Rev. Mr. Argo, and after consulting with the permanent secretary, the agent visited them in the face of very wet weather and an intensely dark night. A very good meeting was held in the Methodist Church and those present expressed themselves greatly benefitted and pleased by what they heard.



*Erin.*—(Very cold). Meeting in Presbyterian Church. About forty present. Rev. Mr. Reid in the chair. Rev. Dr. Strongman, Rev. Mr. Fowlie, and Messrs. Williams and Kitchen gave interesting and profitable addresses. The reports were very satisfactory.

*Hillsburgh.*—Very good meeting, held in Baptist Church. Sixty present. Helpful addresses were given by Revs. E. J. Harris and J. J. Elliot. Mr. McMurchy performed in a business-like way the duties of the chair. The reports showed an advance in the work.

*Derry West.*—The meeting this year was held at Palestine. Unfortunately a very wild storm was raging the night of the meeting. The attendance was small. Mr. E. McBride presided. Arrangements were made for another meeting later.

*Mansewood.*—Heavy storm. Roads all blocked. Meeting held in Presbyterian Church. Small attendance but interesting meeting. Revs. Mr. Milne and Mr. Finney, resolved to lay the claims of the Society before their people on Sunday and give them the facts about the Society's work which has been brought out at the annual meeting.

*Cheltenham.*—Roads all blocked by storm. But very fair meeting. About thirty present. Rev. Jas. Hamilton presided, and Revs. Mr. Duff and Mr. Campbell made short addresses. The reports were satisfactory and the business of the meeting was attended to in an efficient manner.

REV. ROBERT BURNS, PH.B.—*Nanticoke*, Oct. 3rd.—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Methodist Church. The attendance was small on account of a very heavy thunderstorm. In the absence of the president, Mr. Low, the treasurer, Mr. Wood, occupied the chair. Your agent addressed the meeting for half an hour on the "Influence of the Bible and the Bible Society." The officers and collectors were appointed. The report of the Society showed that the branch is in a flourishing state.

*Cheapside.*—We found this branch in a live, healthy state. A large audience assembled in the Baptist Church and was presided over by the faithful president, Dr. Shirk. This was the largest meeting held here for many years, according to the opinion of many. The choir rendered excellent and appropriate music. Short spicy addresses were given by Revs. Mr. Best (Baptist) and Mr. Cavers (Methodist). The officers and collectors were appointed. This Society will give a good report of its work.

*South Cayuga.*—The 39th anniversary of this branch was held in the Evangelical Association Church. The Church was well filled, there being about 300 present. The chair was occupied by the faithful president, V. Honsberger, Esq. The earnest and well-tried friend of the Bible Society, A. Nash, Esq., who for thirty-nine years has served the Society, as secretary-treasurer, felt that he must resign owing to old age. His resignation was accepted and a hearty vote of thanks recorded, and by resolution he was made honorary secretary. Mr. Chester A. Drake was appointed to the office of secretary-treasurer. Mr. A. Bilger was placed in charge of the Depository, in the place of the late Isaac Fry. Addresses were given by your agent, and Revs. Hauch, Elder, Moyer and E. H. Taylor. The united choirs gave nine selections of music.

*Dunnville.*—We were greeted with a fair-sized congregation in the Baptist Church tabernacle, notwithstanding the rain. The choir rendered suitable music. Rev. Messrs. Iler (Baptist) and Hazelwood (Methodist) gave short addresses. The retiring president (Mr. Lockie) occupied the chair. W. N. Braund was elected president for the ensuing year. The secretary's report was adopted, and showed a large increase in subscriptions. Your agent gave an address on the subject, "The history, growth, and necessity of the Bible Society." The branch here has enjoyed a very successful year.

*Fort Erie and Victoria.*—The anniversary of this branch was held in the Methodist Church *Victoria* (International Bridge). The attendance was good. Rev. T. G. Livingstone led in the singing and gave a solo with fine effect. Mr. A.

A. Colthurst was elected president, and at once presided over the meeting. The officers and collectors were appointed, and will, I believe, render efficient service. The depository is in good shape and is a great help to the branch. F. Vahey is a faithful and earnest worker and makes a splendid secretary. On Sunday I preached in the interest of the Bible Society to a large congregation.

*Ridgeway.*—This branch is in good working order. The annual meeting, held in the Methodist Church, was pretty well attended. The choir, under the leadership of J. N. Beeshy, gave suitable selections. The Rev. C. Stringfellow occupied the chair and addressed the audience. The officers and collectors were appointed, and a hearty vote of thanks given to the collectors for their services during the year. Two additional collectors were appointed. This branch will no doubt give a good account of itself.

*Pt. Colborne.*—Here the meeting was very small owing to the concert given by the Jubilee singers, in the town hall. However, the business part was transacted, the officers and committee being appointed. Mr. D. W. McKay was elected president. It was resolved to ask all the Churches to take up offerings on behalf of the Bible Society. This method was adopted by the Presbyterian Church during the past year and was considered quite satisfactory.

*Cayuga.*—The meeting of this branch was held in the Methodist Church, and was well attended, in fact it was one of the largest held for some years. Dr. Baxter, M.P.P., presided with his usual ability. The Rev. D. Chalmers gave a very good address. The secretary, Mr. Cotter, read the report, which was very satisfactory. The choir rendered a number of anthems, which were well received. The officers were re-appointed. *Cayuga* has lost, by death and removal, many ardent and liberal supporters of the Society, yet I believe the branch will grow in numbers, and in time make up financially what she has lost.

*Canfield.*—Here the meeting was largely attended, especially by young people. The young are the hope of the Church. Robert Harvey, Esq., the popular agent of the G. T. R., was elected president, and presided. The Rev. T. A. P. Frost (Baptist) addressed the audience. The officers, committee and collectors were appointed. Two members were elected on the committee to represent Canboro village, with power to appoint collectors for their part of the field.

*Selkirk.*—The annual service of this branch was held in the Baptist Church. The attendance was very fair. The choir enlivened the meeting with choice music. The retiring president, David Duff, Esq., occupied the chair. The secretary, M. F. Derby, read the report, which showed that the year was one of the best for some time. The usual business was transacted. Your agent spoke on the "Claims of the Bible and Bible Society." The collectors and officers will give a good report.

*Mimosa, Monday, Dec. 12th.*—We had a large and enthusiastic meeting in the Disciples' Church. John Scott, Esq., was elected president. The Rev. Mr. Baker rendered valuable service in helping your agent. On the advice of your agent they agreed to consider the matter of re-opening the depository at Mimosa or at Orton, which is about three miles away. I found Messrs. Robinson and McDougal very kind and earnest friends of the Society. Officers and collectors were appointed and I believe the branch will give a good report for the year.

*Moorefield.*—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Presbyterian Church. The Methodist Church choir assisted in the singing. The meeting was fairly well attended. I think it would help the work in Moorefield if the clergy would preach on the subject of the Bible next year, the Sabbath before the annual meeting. Rev. Mr. Lounds (Methodist) gave a short address. Mr. Holtzman, the president, is an efficient officer and gave an excellent address. The officers and collectors were appointed and the field blocked out for immediate work.

*Hollen.*—Here the meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The president occupied the chair. The attendance was fair. The branch is in a very weak state, owing perhaps to the fact that the village has gone down on account of other villages which have sprung up along the line of railroads, and also to the closing down of the mill. The officers are warm hearted workers. Dr. Fell, the secretary,

read the report and gave a short address. We are looking for a good year from Hollen.

*Glenallan.*—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was good. In the absence of the president, Mr. James White presided. Mr. Robert Scott was appointed secretary *pro tem*. Rev. Mr. Norris (Presbyterian) gave an interesting address. He is a warm supporter of the Bible Society. Everything looks hopeful about this branch.

*Garafraxa.*—Here we were the guest of Mr. Blythe, the active secretary of the Society. The meeting was held in the Congregational Church. The newly appointed president of the Society, Rev. J. P. McLaren, presided. The meeting was pretty fair. The secretary read an encouraging report. The depository is in a very good place. The sales were in advance of the previous year. The officers, committee, auditors, etc., were appointed. The prospect is very hopeful.

*Rothsay.*—Here I was entertained by the Rev. Mr. Edminson, a faithful advocate of the Bible Society. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The congregation was not very large but was full of spirit and zeal for the work. Miss Edminson presided at the organ and led in singing. The officers were re-elected and the collectors appointed. The depository is in good condition and kept in a good place. Everything looks encouraging about this branch.

*Drayton.*—Here we were the guest of Rev. Mr. Chown, B.D., who is loyal to the Bible Society, and who has helped your agent in the work of this branch. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The audience was pretty fair. Rev. Mr. Chown occupied the chair and also read the report. By resolution, the meeting decided to continue the branch. The officers were appointed, also the collectors, and a general review made of the field. I believe the branch is now on a good basis.

*Palmerston.*—Here we were the guest of S. Gourlay, Esq. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The congregation was good. The secretary read an excellent report showing progress. Addresses were given by Rev. Messrs. Webb (Baptist), Aull (Presbyterian), and Nugent (Methodist). A very fine spirit characterized the meeting. The officers are very efficient. The collectors are faithful. We may expect a good year.

REV. J. CARSWELL—*Stayner.*—Held a union service here on Sabbath, Oct. 2nd, in the Methodist Church. Four congregations were represented, completely filling the church. The best of attention was given and a good collection was received. On Monday evening the annual meeting was held in the same place. All the resident ministers were present except Rev. R. Moodie, who was away from home. The attendance was fair and the attention good. The officers of this branch do their work well. The interest in the Society's work has greatly increased since the plan of having a union service on Sabbath was adopted.

*Angus, Oct. 4th.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, the pastor, the Rev. J. Leishman, being present and rendering valuable assistance. The attendance was very small and composed almost entirely of ladies. As they seemed to be the only parties that took any interest in the work of the Society it was thought well to continue to appoint them to the various offices, and so this was done, with the exception of the president and the depository.

*Painswick, Oct. 5th.*—The meeting here was good, and the feeling that pervaded it was excellent. Nothing was received from this branch last year, except the collection taken up at the public meeting, on account of the failure of some of the gentlemen to collect in their district. It was thought well to return to lady collectors, so that better things may be expected from this branch this year.

*Churchill, Oct. 6th.*—Here there was as usual a good meeting, the centre of the Presbyterian Church being filled. Since last year the Rev. J. A. Ross, of *Meaford*, has been settled in this charge, and he will doubtless prove, as he did this evening, a valuable promoter of the Society's work. The offices continue to be mainly filled by young gentlemen who do their work very efficiently.

*Lefroy and Bell Ewart*, Oct. 7th.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, the Rev. W. McConnell, was present and in the absence of the president filled the chair. The attendance was rather small on account of the threatening appearance of the weather, but those present listened to the address given with evident interest. One pleasing feature of the meetings of this branch is, that there is always excellent music provided.

*Craigvale and Stroud*, Oct. 11th.—The meeting was held this year in the Methodist Church, Stroud. Both the pastor, Rev. R. Toy, and the Rev. W. McConnell (Presbyterian) were present and gave addresses. This branch has taken a great step in advance during the past year in the amount of its contributions, mainly through the efforts of the enthusiastic president and secretary.

*Evening and Banda*, Oct. 23rd.—Here the meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Banda, on Sabbath evening. It was thought better to hold it there in order to secure a good attendance. The evening, however, turned out very wet, and there was nothing like so many present as would have been had it been fine; still it was a good meeting, and the influence of it will no doubt be seen in increased contributions.

*Creemore*, Oct. 24th.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was not as good as last year. The Revs. Messrs. Henry Owen and Stevenson were present and gave addresses as well as assisted in the transaction of the business. Though this branch had considerably increased its contributions last year, it had not received credit for it in the printed report. This was owing to the removal of the secretary early in the year and to there being no report sent in from this branch in time for publication.

*Dunedin*, Oct. 25th.—Here a new branch was organized, including the villages of *Dunedin*, *Lavender* and *Glen Huron*, with the districts between and around. The night was wet and dark, yet about fifty people were present, many of these being heads of families. An excellent spirit pervaded the meeting. There was no trouble in getting efficient officers and collectors. The favourable auspices under which this branch has been organized are largely due to the efforts of Rev. J. K. Henry, of Creemore, who prepared the way for, as well as aided in the organization effected.

*Singhampton*, Oct. 27th.—The night was clear but the roads were very bad, and so only a few persons were present—too few it was thought to transact the business of the Society. The Rev. Mr. Long and the secretary, Mr. Grant, undertook to have a meeting called at some favourable time for the transaction of all necessary business.

*Maple Valley*, Oct. 28th.—Considerable effort had been put forth to secure a good meeting and to furnish good music on the occasion, but the night was exceedingly wet and unfavourable. Notwithstanding this, a goodly number were present, and some very excellent music was furnished by the young people. The zeal which that wet night could not dampen, will doubtless produce good financial results during the year.

*Thornbury and Clarksburg*, Sabbath, Dec. 4th.—Preached in the Presbyterian Church in the morning and the Methodist Church in the evening, presenting the claims of the Society and received a special collection for it. On Monday evening the annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, the Rev. J. L. Simpson, presided. The attendance was good and the interest manifested encouraging. The best of attention was given to the addresses of the agent and the Rev. Mr. Vickery (Methodist). It was evident that the services conducted by the agent on the Sabbath had produced a good effect, which will no doubt result in increased contributions from this branch.

*Collingwood*, Dec. 6th.—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church. The attendance was very small, considering the size of the town. Three of the resident ministers were present, Mr. Kirkby (Episcopalian), Mr. Luckins (Baptist) and Mr. Barber (Methodist), all of whom seem to be warm friends of the Society. Mr. Barber had been appointed to address the meeting along with the

agent, and he did it very efficiently. There is an excellent staff of officers here, and they will, no doubt, devise some means of increasing the attendance at the annual meeting. Perhaps a union service on the Sabbath would be a good way of increasing the interest.

*Meaford*, Dec. 7th.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The pastor, the Rev. Dr. Stone, in the chair. The attendance was small, the weather and roads being very unfavourable. The audience, though not large was very appreciative, and gave the best of attention to the remarks of the agent and the Rev. Mr. McDougall (Baptist) who addressed them. This branch is well manned with officers and collectors, and will no doubt give a good account of itself during the year.

*Duntroon*, Dec. 8th.—Had an excellent meeting in the Presbyterian Church. The Rev. A. McDonald, the pastor, presided, and rendered valuable help in effecting an organization. A most hearty spirit was manifested, and no difficulty was experienced in obtaining the necessary officers and a large staff of collectors. A large union choir furnished good music for the occasion. The best results may be expected from a branch formed under such favourable circumstances.

REV. R. M. CROLL — *Ripley*.—Fair attendance in Methodist Church. Two Presbyterian ministers present. In the absence of the pastor, who was president, Rev. A. Sutherland presided. Rev. A. F. McQueen assisted in devotional exercises. Usual reports submitted and adopted. The contributions for last year were collected but not forwarded. This is a fine field—the people are interested in the work, and when well-worked will do nobly. They promised to show a decided improvement under their new president.

*Ashfield*.—As in *Ripley*, so here, your agent was the guest of the manse. Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church; president in the chair. Rev. John Ross, pastor, opened the meeting with devotional exercises. The usual monthly Gaelic prayer meeting was turned into a Bible Society meeting. The families of this wide community were largely represented. They have not forgotten what the Bible Society did for their fathers in their Highland homes. A deep interest was manifested, which well harmonized with a free contribution of \$75.50 last year. The officers are energetic—all resolved to do their best for the branch.

*Amberley and Pine River*.—Met in Presbyterian Church, Amberley. Night stormy—meeting small—though much interest was shown and commendable activity manifested by those present. A change was made in some of the officers. This branch is doing fairly well, but is capable of increased results.

*Bervie*.—Very fair attendance in the Methodist Church—president in the chair, and all officers present. Mr. W. Henderson, a model secretary, read very full and satisfactory reports. The people here take a deep interest in the work, and nobly second the efforts of the officers, who are capable and willing. Good results may be anticipated for another year. The depository is well and neatly kept.

*Arnow*.—In the Methodist Church a large meeting convened which was presided over by the veteran president, Mr. F. Robertson. Rev. Dr. McKay conducted religious exercises, and afterwards cheered those present with kind, encouraging and timely words. This branch is in a healthy state and doing well. Your agent found the depository pretty well sold out.

*Underwood*.—By the kindness of Mr. Wright, your agent was driven to Underwood, and again shared the hospitality of the manse. Meeting held in Presbyterian Church. Large attendance—officers all present and full of enthusiasm. Rev. Mr. Fitzpatrick, the pastor, rendered valuable assistance. The choir rendered several hymns. This branch did well last year, and is determined to keep up its record.

*North Bruce*.—Your agent was kindly driven again from *Underwood* to North Bruce, where in the manse he enjoyed the hospitality of an old friend, Rev. John Eadie, and was made at home by his interesting family. Though the day had been

fair the evening proved stormy, which seriously told on the attendance. This branch is capable of a vigorous showing, and with its new officers, improved results may be expected.

*Southampton.*—Was met by the Rev. Mr. Wass, the genial Methodist minister, who was in waiting, and was conducted by him to the parsonage. Meeting held in the Methodist Church, president in the chair. Meeting opened by Rev. J. Tolmie (Presbyterian). The secretary, Mr. C. M. Bowman, read full and luminous reports. The attendance was large, and a fine feeling manifested. At the close of the public meeting, a conference of officers was held, which resulted in a resolution to push the work vigorously. When the Southampton branch wakens up to a full realization of its privileges it will make for itself an honoured name and a renowned reputation.

*REV. ALEX. CURRIE—Brandon.*—The Bible Society meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. On the platform were the resident ministers. Revs. Messrs. Daniels and Mason addressed the audience, which would number between two and three hundred. Their theme was the Bible and the new theology, while your agent pressed the claims of the Society. It was admitted to be the best Bible Society meeting ever held in Brandon. The committee had taken great pains in advertising the meeting. The city is divided into twelve districts, and collectors appointed to canvass the entire town.

*Holland.*—A blizzard raged during the whole evening. Quite a number ventured out. Mr. Ross, the courteous and able president of the branch, was in the chair and addressed the meeting on the work done by the branch during the past year. Rev. Mr. Campbell (Presbyterian minister) gave a brief address, and the several officers were re-appointed.

*Cypress River.*—An error had occurred in making the announcements, which affected our meeting, yet a very fair audience gathered. Mr. Patterson, (Presbyterian student), was present, and took part in the meeting. The officers were re-elected. The people took a deep interest in the working of the Society. Your agent reviewed the history of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

*Glenboro.*—The public meeting was held in the Y. M. C. A. rooms. Rev. Mr. Cheney (English Church minister) was present and made an excellent address. This branch is in a vigorous condition. Though the meeting was not large, they gave an open collection of about \$13.

*Stockton.*—Our meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Howarth took part in the meeting. This branch is not in a flourishing condition. The officers were re-elected, except the treasurer, to which office Mr. Steyne was elected.

*Treherne.*—I should have been at this place Monday, 6th, but could not reach it because of the storm which blocked the railroad. Reached it late Tuesday evening. On Wednesday, I met with the officers, all of whom were appointed for another year. The officers were much interested in the work, and I expect this year will be a successful one in the interests of the Bible Society.

*Douglas.*—Public meeting this evening in Methodist Church. A fair audience came at rather late an hour, yet we had a good meeting. Much interest in the work was manifested.

*Carberry.*—There was a counter-attraction in the town hall, which made our meeting small, and it was arranged that your agent would at some future date deliver his lecture on the work of the Society.

*Elkhorn.*—The branch situated in this thriving town is in a healthy condition. The public meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church—a good attendance of the citizens. Dr. Rolston, the genial president of the Society, occupied the chair. Good speeches were made by the several clergymen of the town—Rev. Messrs. Stevenson (English Church), Penman (Presbyterian Church) and Talbot (Methodist). The agent spoke at length on the aims of the Society.

*Griswold.*—The meeting was held in the town hall. We had a good audience and a cold night. Mr. Urquhart (Presbyterian student) rendered valuable assistance.

Your agent urged the claims of the Society on the ground of the great needs. The few Bibles already published contrasted with the world's population.

*Alexander.*—A lecture in the Presbyterian Church in the evening compelled us to hold our meeting in the afternoon. On this account the attendance was small. But your agent found everything connected with this branch in a most satisfactory condition.

*Oak Lake.*—Your agent was announced here for the 8th, but because of cancelled train service, he could not reach until the following morning, when he met with the officers. The night previous they held the meeting. The several clergymen of the town were present, and addressed a large audience. The reports of the several officers were read, and everything indicated a live Society. Your agent promised to lecture at his earliest convenience.

*REV. J. DOWNIE—Corinth.*—I called on the secretary, Mr. James Amoss—a very warm friend of the Society, who showed me many acts of kindness. I also visited the depository and inspected the stock. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The congregation was fair notwithstanding the stormy weather. The president, Mr. Isaac Conner, was unwell; in his absence the chair was taken by Rev. Mr. Down. All the officers were re-appointed. The secretary undertook to see the collectors, give them their books and set them to work. The Society has warm friends here.

*Dereham.*—I called on the late president, Mr. J. D. Freeman, also on the secretary, Mr. Karr, and the president, Mr. Benj. Hopkins, and during the afternoon I inspected the stock at the depository, which is kept by Mr. T. R. Wood, a warm friend of the Society. The evening was rather stormy. The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, and was well attended. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Bosworth, came all the way from Tilsonburg to attend it. The choir was present and sang suitable hymns. The president, Mr. Hopkins, was in the chair, although he was not fully recovered from a recent illness. All the officers were re-appointed. They take a lively interest in the work.

*Tilsonburg.*—Visited the officers of the branch and others in the interest of the Society. Called at the depository and inspected the stock. The meeting was held in the new and commodious Presbyterian Church, and was well attended. The local clergy were present and rendered valuable assistance. The excellent choir of the church was a very useful adjunct to the meeting. Rev. Mr. McGregor, M. A., the pastor of the church, was elected president. He and the other officers took a warm interest in the work. The meeting was quite enthusiastic. The collection was larger than on former and similar occasions.

*Burgessville.*—The meeting was held in the Baptist Church. Rev. Mr. Haryet, the pastor, was present, as was also Rev. Mr. Hunt (Methodist), who drove some six miles to take part in the meeting. The attendance was good. The president, Mr. Topham, said it was the best they had for years. The efficient choir of the church rendered good service by singing suitable hymns. The old officers were re-elected, and good collectors to canvass the village and surrounding country appointed.

*Beachville.*—I called on a few friends of the Society and also Mr. Shann, president, but failed to find him home. Returning to the village, I delivered short addresses to the pupils of the public school in behalf of the Society, announced the public meeting, and asked them to make it known as widely as possible. The meeting was held in the new and handsome Methodist Church. Rev. Mr. Robinson (Baptist) was present, and gave valuable help. The choir sang appropriate hymns. Earnest and efficient lady collectors were appointed. The Society has a number of zealous friends here. Mr. Shann, president, and the other officers are the right men in the right place.

*Thamesford.*—This branch had just left the Western Ontario Bible Society and joined the Upper Canada. The resolution of withdrawal was confirmed at the public meeting held by your agent, who spent part of Saturday and the whole of Sunday

here. Your agent preached in the morning to a very large congregation in the Presbyterian Church, and in the afternoon in the Church of England to a good one, and in the evening in the Methodist Church to a crowded attendance on behalf of the Society. Rev. Mr. Cameron (Presbyterian) gave up his service in the evening, in order that his people might have another opportunity of hearing more about the Society's operations. The public meeting was held on Thursday in the Church of England. Rev. Mr. Stout, the pastor, was present. Rev. Mr. Cameron (Presbyterian), the president, occupied the chair. There was a good attendance. The choir of the church helped the meeting by singing suitable hymns. The officers of the branch take a deep and intelligent interest in the work; there are many warm friends of the Society here.

*Kintore.*—During the afternoon the stock at the depository was inspected by your agent. He also addressed the public schools on behalf of the Society, and called on the Methodist minister, Rev. Mr. Sabine and the Presbyterian minister, Rev. Mr. Munro. The latter is president of the branch. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The attendance was large and enthusiastic. Short addresses were delivered by the pastor of the church and several friends of the Society. Most of the collectors had handed in the subscriptions obtained, and it was believed that the collections this year would be considerably in excess of last year. All old officers were re-elected.

*Lakeside.*—Your agent, thanks to Mr. Whitstone, reached here in time to take part in a confirmation service held in the Church of England in the morning by Bishop Baldwin, one of the warmest friends of the Society. An opportunity was given the agent to announce the public meeting, which was held in the evening in the same church. A large and most attentive congregation attended. Several warm friends delivered short addresses on behalf of the Society's work, after your agent had spoken. The collection was larger than in former years. This branch is doing a successful work. The chair was ably filled by Mr. Mills, ex-president.

*Harrington.*—Mr. Mills drove me from Lakeside to this place. I called on Rev. Mr. McLachlan (Presbyterian), who cordially welcomed me to his house. Visited the public school in the afternoon, and addressed the pupils on behalf of the Society's work, and announced the meeting. Called at the depository and examined the stock. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church and was very largely attended. The pastor of the church was present and rendered valuable help. The meeting elected him president for the ensuing year. Mr. Manson, the ex-president, occupied the chair. He, in a few well-chosen words, presented the objects of the Society. Collection was much in excess of last year.

REV. CHARLES DUFF—*Chatsworth.*—I visited the ministers or clergymen of the various denominations. I found that the meeting had been duly announced by them, and that our worthy secretary, who is the principal of the public school of the place, had everything prepared for the proper transaction of the business of the meeting. The meeting was held in the Episcopal Church. The worthy incumbent, the Rev. D. J. Davies, was elected president for the ensuing year. I had the hearty support of the Rev. J. McAlpine, the pastor of the Presbyterian Church. The attendance was not large, but the meeting was attentive and earnest and the collection exceeded that of the previous year.

*Desboro.*—The meeting was held in the town hall. There is no minister resident in the place, but Rev. Mr. Hamilton (Presbyterian) was present. The branch has a set of good and efficient officers. The business was transacted first, and then followed the speeches of the evening. The meeting was small and was peculiar in that there was not a lady present. I found the depository in good shape and the business of the Society well in hand. The officers were all re-elected and enjoy the full confidence of the people.

*Kilsyth.*—I learned that there had been no announcement made of the meeting, the secretary having removed to Owen Sound. But having the afternoon before me,



I visited the public school and talked to the children, and enlisted the sympathies of the teacher. I posted a notice in the post-office, and got some of the ladies of the place interested, and with the aid of the worthy president, Mr. John Fleming, a goodly number came out to the meeting, which was held in the Presbyterian Church. Miss E. Fleming was chosen secretary in the place of Mr. Wm. Douglas, removed; and I doubt not there will be a good response to the call of the collectors chosen to do this department of the branch's work in this place and its vicinity.

*Kemble.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. There were in attendance about thirty-five persons; the president, Rev. D. H. McLean, in the chair. The business of the meeting transacted in an orderly and creditable manner. The agent delivered his message, which was listened to by a very attentive, if not a very large audience.

*Walter's Falls.*—The worthy secretary of the branch of that place at once conveyed me to the comfortable and most agreeable home of our worthy president, the Rev. H. Moyer, the Methodist minister in charge, whose pulpit I was to occupy the following evening. The evening congregation was excellent, and the Master seemed to afford me just the help necessary to the hour, to improve the opportunity in connection with the claims of the word of God. The next Monday evening was rainy and very disagreeable, but considering these things the congregation was good, and the claims of the Society were duly presented by the president and myself. The old officers and committee were re-elected, and the promise of a better year than the past was manifest in the spirit and life of the meeting.

*Holland Centre.*—Here I had valuable assistance from the Rev. John Pepper, B.A., whose hospitality I shared. The young Presbyterian student ministering in that church, whose name has escaped me at this moment, gave us his heartiest support. The attendance was good and the interest manifest. Holland Centre will assuredly report well of itself this year.

*Markdale.*—The meeting, which was held in the Presbyterian Church, was small. The attendance of the officers and committee was pretty prompt and the business of the branch was attended to in a regular and hearty manner. It is always an encouragement to have the co-operation of all the clergymen of the place. Here we had the Episcopal incumbent giving us quite as hearty support as the Presbyterian and Methodist brethren did, which was neither stinting nor grudging.

*Priceville.*—At Flesherton station I found the Rev. president of the Priceville branch with his buggy, there on purpose to convey me to that village, five miles from the station. My friend, the Rev. R. J. Husband, and I had not met for over thirty years. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, which was well filled with a very attentive and highly interested audience. Both the Methodist and Presbyterian brethren gave us their heartiest support, and the fruits thereof will doubtless be forthcoming in the collection for the Society.

*Maxwell.*—My friend, the Rev. F. Woodger, the newly-elected president of the Maxwell branch received me cordially, and I now learned that by an awkward mistake there was to be an educational concert in the place that evening as well as the annual meeting of the branch Bible Society. A few of the friends of the Bible Society met and transacted the business of the Society, and then we adjourned to the Orange Hall, the place of the concert named, where we met a full house of the village people and of those of the surrounding country. Our worthy president secured me thirty minutes on the programme for my speech, and I had then the opportunity of speaking to a larger audience than I should have had had we held a meeting under ordinary circumstances, though my time was somewhat limited.

*Flesherton* was reached the next morning by return of stage. The worthy treasurer of the branch at Flesherton, Mr. William Henderson, a close neighbour in a former field of labour, was mine host and his good wife mine hostess while I sojourned here. The next day being Sabbath I preached in the morning for the Rev. Mr. Wells, the Presbyterian pastor, and in the evening for the Rev. Mr. Long, the Methodist minister. The congregations were both large and interested, and the

preacher tried in the highest and best sense to prepare the way for the meeting of the Bible Society, to be held on the Monday evening in the Methodist Church. The three pastors of the place were present, and a good congregation assembled. The committee was desired to appoint the collectors.

*Dundalk.*—The meeting was larger than last year, and the Rev. G. H. Cobble-dick, B.D., of the Methodist Church presided. The Rev. A. Corbet was chosen his successor; not being present, the late president and myself called upon him the next morning, when he readily consented to act. The meeting here was warm and appreciative. In the removal of the Rev. Mr. Cobble-dick the Society loses a warm and an intelligent friend; but he will still be doubtless within the bounds of our Bible Society work.

*Corbetton.*—At this place our cause is truly weak. Still there is a growing interest in the work. The Rev. W. H. Sanderson was chosen president for the ensuing year and did us good service in the meeting. Here our stay was literally but for a night, under the hospitable roof of the president.

*Horning's Mills.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and although the night was dark and the roads uncommonly muddy, there was a large turnout. The former president, the Rev. Mr. Boyd, having removed, the chair was filled by his successor, the Rev. Mr. Miles, B.A., the present incumbent of the English Church in Horning's Mills. The Rev. Mr. Stinson, B.A., Presbyterian pastor, whose hospitality I shared while here, was chosen president for the ensuing year, and the Rev. Mr. Wilson, B.A., LL.B., secretary. These brethren, young and strong, kindly accompanied the agent to the next branch to be visited; which is in a neighbourhood where they all have ministerial duties to perform.

*Whitfield.*—Here, although the night was stormy and bad, the attendance was quite large. The question of the separation of the Tract Society's stock from that of the Bible Society seems to have caused some friction; but the sturdy common sense of the people will, no doubt, soon restore harmony. The worthy president of the branch, Mr. Geo. Lacking, conveyed me from his hospitable home to my next appointment.

*Shelburne.*—Here I stayed with warm friends of the Bible Society, Mr. McLachlan and his good wife. On Sabbath forenoon I preached for the Rev. G. G. McRobbie, Ph.D., who is now president of the Shelburne branch. In the evening to the congregation of the United Brethren. Both congregations were large, and I rejoiced in the opportunity of speaking to them of the value of the Word of God. Our meeting on Monday night was small, but highly interested and grateful for what has been done during the past year by and for His Word. The depository is in good hands and the work conscientiously attended to. The president, Dr. McRobbie, the late president, Rev. J. Mager, and the Rev. H. McTavish, Methodist minister, are all warm friends of the Society and did good service.

*Alton.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, recently rebuilt and neatly fitted up and decorated. The attendance was larger than last year. None of the ministers were present except the Rev. W. K. Hagar, B.A. (Methodist) who made some inquiry into the working of the Society, and was answered by the agent and assured how glad the Upper Canada Bible Society is when branches such as Alton manage their own affairs and thereby dispense with the need and expense of an agent.

*Camilla.*—Here there is no depository as in most places where there is a branch, and the whole of the collection is for the free contribution list. The Rev. Mr. Ballantyne is president of the branch and the pastor of the Presbyterian Church, in which the meeting was held. The attendance was very good and the interest unabated.

*Mono Centre.*—The meeting was by mistake held in the Relessay Methodist Church, the place in which it was held last year. But it was a good meeting and the business was transacted with interest.

REV. J. MCD. DUNCAN—*Winterbourne*.—This branch is in a flourishing condition under the care of the president, the Rev. A. M. Hamilton, M. A., who is assisted by very efficient colleagues. A change has been made in the management of the depository, which it is hoped will be advantageous. In spite of unfavorable weather, the annual meeting in the Methodist Church was fairly attended. The people of this neighborhood take an intelligent interest in the work of the Bible Society.

*Bloomington*.—A pouring rain prevented a large attendance at the meeting here. To those present your agent presented the needs and claims of the Bible Society.

*Elmira*.—It is a pleasure to visit this thriving branch. The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church. After the agent had addressed the meeting, a very interesting discussion of the Society's work ensued, which was taken part in by the Rev. Messrs Bell and Dierlam and others.

*Hawkesville*.—Again unfavorable weather was against the meeting. The attendance was not large but there was manifest in the meeting real interest in the work of the Bible Society.

*Linwood*.—This branch owes much to its indefatigable president, Rev. H. C. Boomer. As usual, he occupied the chair at the annual meeting. Valuable assistance was given by the Rev. Messrs. Armstrong and Grandie.

*East Puslinch*.—Your agent spent Saturday and Sabbath in this field, preaching thrice for the Rev. Wm. Robertson, M. A. On Monday evening the annual meeting was held in Duff's Church. In spite of unfavorable weather and bad roads there was a fair attendance and an interesting meeting.

*New Dundee*.—The annual meeting of this branch was well attended. The prospects are bright here for a successful year. The officers are all capable and energetic men.

*Preston*.—The officers of this branch decided to postpone the meeting. This decision was not communicated to your agent early enough, he therefore visited the branch, inspected the depository, called on the president, and saw the local ministers. These ministers have undertaken to hold a union meeting, shortly, in the interests of the Bible Society.

*Hespeler*.—This being the annual day of Thanksgiving, a union meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The annual meeting of the Bible Society was arranged to be held at the close of this service. Your agent thus had the opportunity of addressing an audience of about three hundred, representing all the Churches in the interests of the Society. As was the case last year, the affairs of this branch are in a very prosperous condition.

*New Hamburg*.—The meeting here was held in the Baptist Church; although the weather was unfavorable, there was a good attendance. Addresses were given by the Rev. Messrs. Bielby and Burns, by Wm. Linton, Esq., and by your agent. The prosperity of Bible Society work here is shown by increased sales and contributions.

REV. J. DYKE—*Virden*.—The annual meeting of this branch was held Feb. 23rd in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, Rev. W. Beattie, in the chair. The attendance was very good. The agent gave an address in which the object and claims of the Society were laid before the audience. Collection amounted to \$8.00. Usual officers were elected, and four collectors appointed to canvass the town in behalf of the Bible Society.

*Gladstone*.—Meeting was held in Methodist Church, March 1st. The pastor, Rev. J. Tozeland, the Rev. Messrs. Munro and Garton took on active part in the meeting. Collection was \$4.35. Dr. Walton presided in an able manner. At the close of the agent's address, officers and collectors were appointed.

*Shoal Lake*.—The agent was met at the station by the president and secretary of the local branch. The public meeting was not largely attended, owing to the very deep snow, and bad condition of the roads. The local pastors, Rev. Messrs. Girling, Huntsman, and Pattison, supplemented the agent's address, and urged the necessity of the work upon the people. Collection \$4.85.

*Newdale.*—A very interesting meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. Hamilton conducted the opening exercises. Rev. R. Spencer leading in prayer. The agent gave an address on the operations of the Society, and urged greater zeal and liberality in the good cause. During the day the retiring president, Mr. F. N. Dewitt, accompanied the agent around the village, calling upon the residents, inviting them to the meeting. New officers were elected at the close of the service, and several ladies appointed to collect.

*Saltcoats.*—The agent reached this place at three o'clock on Sabbath morning. A very excellent service was held in the Presbyterian church at 11 o'clock, when the work of the Society was laid before the people. The Rev. Mr. Brown (Presbyterian Church) was unable to be present through illness. Rev. Mr. Hamilton, (Methodist) was present and greatly assisted the meeting. This branch was organized a year ago, but nothing has been done since. A very energetic set of officers have been appointed, and it is hoped vigorous work will be done.

*Yorkton.*—The meeting at this point was held in the school house, the Presbyterians very kindly giving up their service for the meeting of the Society. Rev. Mr. Ross (Presbyterian) and Rev. Messrs. Hughes and Millikan (Methodists) gave good assistance in the meeting. Yorkton and Saltcoats are villages of 250 inhabitants with a large adjacent territory. Yorkton is the terminus of the railway, and fifty miles beyond there is a large settlement who will draw their supplies of the word of God from the Yorkton depository. Officers were elected and arrangements made for opening a depository as soon as possible.

*Russell.*—A most excellent meeting was held in the Presbyterian church. The Rev. Messrs. Sadlier and Peters were unavoidably absent. The Rev. Mr. Rogers, pastor of the church, took a prominent part in the meeting. Too much praise cannot be given to the excellent officers of the branch, who made such energetic preparations for the meeting, and had sent collectors round, so that upwards of fifty dollars had been collected. The public collection amounted to seven dollars.

*Birtle.*—Annual meeting was held in Presbyterian church. M. A. Morton, president of the branch, in the chair. Rev. M. Frew, pastor, was absent attending Presbytery. Rev. W. Somerville (Methodist) conducted the service of prayer, and the agent spoke on "The world's need of the Bible." An election of officers took place, and it was unanimously resolved to do more energetic work during the ensuing year.

*Minnedosa.*—The Methodist church contained a large and appreciative audience. The president, Rev. E. A. Gill, conducted the meeting and gave an excellent address. The other resident clergy took an active part in the service. At the close of the agent's address the collection was taken up and new officers elected. Some persons present were of the opinion that this annual meeting was the best ever held in the town.

*Rapid City.*—A cold, stormy night prevented many from attending the public meeting, which had been well announced. The service was held in the Episcopal Church. The rector, Rev. A. C. Garrioch, also Rev. Messrs. Beynon and Rowan, with the agent, took part in the exercises. At the close of the addresses reports were read and suitable officers elected.

*Portage la Prairie.*—Annual meeting was held in the lecture room of the Presbyterian Church. The genial president, Mr. W. W. Millar, presided. In the audience eleven clergymen were seen, three of whom, Rev. Messrs. McMorin, Finn and Gowdie took part in the service, with the agent. Finances are in advance of last year, and by general consent it was agreed to enter more heartily into the work of spreading the word of God throughout the world.

REV. J. B. FRASER, M.D.—*Warton.*—Owing to various local attractions and distractions, a rather small meeting in the Disciple Church. Rev. Mr. Reikie (Congregational) in the chair. Helpful and stimulating remarks from Rev. Mr. McGee (Baptist) and Rev. Mr. Yeomans (Presbyterian). Promise and prospect of increased interest and liberality.

*Arkwright.*—Meeting in Mount Hope Methodist Church. A dark, rainy evening reduced the attendance to little more than a quorum. The efficient secretary, however, drove four miles to the meeting and all present seemed interested. A new president was appointed, who promises to do all he can for the cause.

*Burgoyne.*—Meeting in Presbyterian Church. A fine evening and a fine enthusiastic meeting. Excellent music. Efficient officers and faithful collectors insure the success of the cause in this district.

*Tara and Invermay*—A fair evening and a fair meeting in the Methodist Church, the pastor of which was unavoidably absent. He was ably represented, however, by Rev. Mr. Webster, who presided. Appropriate addresses by Rev. Mr. Mackenzie (Presbyterian) and Rev. Dean Cooper (Episcopalian) were much appreciated. The choir of the church furnished fine music. The officers and committee, who are efficient and devoted, will see that the reputation of the branch for liberality is well sustained. The secretary is a model, and he arranged admirably, not only for the meeting, but for the comfort of the agent.

*Allenford.*—Meeting in the recently re-opened and much beautified Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. Mowat, pastor, in the absence of the president, in the chair. Meeting, from various local causes, not so good as last year, for which regret was expressed, and promise of amendment made for next year. Allenford should and will do better.

*Riversdale.*—Evening dark, wet and windy. Meeting in Presbyterian Church, the only one in the place. Both the pastor of the church, who lives some miles from it, and the president of the Society, absent. Chair well filled by Mr. Wm. MacDonald, the depository, a warm friend of the Society. The secretary, efficient. The need of collecting will be attended to.

*Paisley.*—Meeting in Baptist Church—not so large as last year. President, Rev. J. Johnston (Presbyterian) in the chair. Rev. Messrs. McAllister (Methodist) and Van Sickle (Baptist) both present. The branch is well officered, and district meetings were held last year in the neighbourhood of the town to widen the interest in the work, an example which is worthy of wider imitation.

*Pinkerton.*—Meeting in Presbyterian Church. Enough snow to make very bad walking but not enough for sleighing. Fair attendance, good interest, good music. Rev. Messrs. Campbell (Presbyterian) and Truax (Methodist) conducted the devotional exercises and expressed hearty sympathy with the work. This branch may be expected to maintain its good record.

*Walkerton.*—A good meeting in the Baptist Church, which would have been large but for a Thanksgiving social in the Methodist Church. This branch is in many respects a model. The attendance at meeting of committee previous to the public meeting was large and all seemed deeply interested. The ministers of the town, with one exception, were all present. The address of the agent was listened to closely throughout. A Sunday is to be set apart by the committee, on which all the ministers will call the attention of their congregations to the work of the Society, and envelopes will be distributed in which contributors will enclose their contributions and place them on the plate when the church collection is made the next Sunday. By this simple and practical plan a larger contribution has been made each year, for the last three or four years and all the trouble and toil of house to house collecting saved.

*Hanover.*—Snow, rain, wind and a rather small meeting in the Methodist Church. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Snowdon, in the chair, gave an earnest address. A few most appropriate remarks by Rev. Dr. Howie, who was present. Close attention by the congregation. Excellent music by the choir. A promise of large liberality for the future. Collectors will go out next week.

REV. W. J. GARTON—*Manitou.*—During the day your agent visited the depository and other officers. The former is to be congratulated on the nice way he takes care of the Bibles and for the painstaking manner in which he keeps the accounts.

The annual meeting was held in the evening; a fair attendance considering the severe weather. Rev. W. Cavan took the chair. After the agent's address Rev. Messrs. Hewitt and McClung spoke. Officers elected for the ensuing year.

*Crystal City.*—This place was reached on Sunday morning. Meeting and service in the Presbyterian Church. Agent conducted both. Instead of a sermon the address was given, all present listened with great attention. Officers were elected and collectors appointed.

*Pilot Mound.*—From Crystal City I drove over to this place through a severe storm and had a meeting in the Presbyterian Church after the usual service. The Methodists joined and we had cause for encouragement. Rev. Mr. Farquharson, president, introduced the agent, who spoke for about forty minutes. Rev. Messrs. Barker and Auvache followed, the latter testifying to the great work the Society is doing in India. After the usual routine business the meeting closed with the benediction.

*Morden.*—The depository has been moved from S. Messer's store to W. P. Duncalfe's, chemist, who is taking great interest in the work. Meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church—not large on account of weather; Rev. James Borthwick presiding. After giving an able address, he introduced the agent, who occupied the usual time setting forth the Society's work in this country and elsewhere, and also giving his own experience amongst the Indians and acknowledging the great help he had received from the Society while working among them. Addresses were given by Rev. A. Andrews and Rev. M. C. Rumball, the new president.

*Cartwright.*—Although the meeting for this place had been well advertised, yet they did not hold it on account of their want of faith in the train service. Your agent telegraphed he would be almost on time asked them to have the meeting, etc., yet the stormy weather seemed to have made our good friends of Cartwright downhearted or something of that kind. In company with Rev. C. H. Haughton, I visited the Presbyterian and Methodist ministers, who promised with Mr. Haughton, to hold a meeting, appoint collectors, etc. We also visited Mr. Moore, of Hunter & Moore, who promised to act as depository.

*Gretna.*—The population of Gretna and surrounding country consists principally of Mennonites, and as the meeting was made up chiefly of them, the Rev. H. H. Everts gave a synopsis of the agent's address in German. The sale of Bibles has been phenomenal, amounting to \$244.74. This sale has been consummated in connection with another place recently sprung up, called *Winkler*. At this place they want a depository. Great credit is due to Mr. Isaac Loewen for the very efficient way he works as depository, and the great interest he takes in Bible Society work.

*Emerson.*—We had a very good meeting. Rev. James Lawrence ably filling the chair. The other ministers unfortunately, were not able to be present. A nice number assembled in the Presbyterian Church to listen to the agent, and the response at the collection was most cheering. On the following day the agent visited the depository and recommended the executive obtaining a fresh supply of Bibles, as the stock is very poor.

*West Selkirk.*—A small but enthusiastic meeting. Weather stormy. Rev. C. R. Littler, B. D., president, opened the meeting and gave an address full of interest and appreciation of the Society's work. The agent followed. Mr. Dagg gave a verbal report. Rev. Messrs Sutherland, Dyer and Settee also spoke. The depository was visited.

*Stonewall.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, the pastor, Rev. O. Darwin presiding. As this branch has no depository, it was decided to start one forthwith, and a depository was appointed. After the agent's address the Rev. B. Davies forced home what had been said.

*Whitewood.*—Evidently the good people of this place had forgotten about the Society. No preparation had been made for a meeting, notwithstanding the agent had written more than once about it; in fact, great ignorance was manifested throughout. However, there is a probability of this being remedied next year.

*Boissevain.*—Your agent made a second attempt to reach this place and succeeded, but over five hours too late for the meeting, the train being six hours late. Fortunately, the meeting was held and all the business transacted. Rev. G. C. Hill very kindly carried this through. In the morning the secretary, treasurer and depository were visited. The prospects for the coming year are very good.

*Killarney.*—As some Methodist Evangelists were working in this town when your agent visited, he asked permission to address the meeting gathered by them in the Methodist Church. This permission was granted, but no business was done. Notice was given out that there would be a business meeting on the following Saturday.

*Deloraine.*—Meeting in Caver's Hall; Rev. D. Munro in the chair; a good meeting both in numbers and enthusiasm. The reports were fairly good. The success of the meeting was greatly enhanced by the assistance of the Union choir. During the day the agent met the executive in the Methodist Church. This branch is fortunate in having a good, painstaking secretary.

REV. DR. HARPER—*Minesing.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The evening was somewhat stormy, yet a fair congregation with all the officers of the branch were present. The Rev. James Baker (Methodist) and Mr. Loughhead (Presbyterian student), as well as the agent, addressed the audience, Good attention was given and an excellent spirit pervaded the gathering. The officers were all re-appointed and collectors selected to canvass for subscriptions.

*Elmvale.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The pastor, Rev. P. Jones, gave hearty support. The Presbyterians are without a minister at present, but their people nobly support the claims of the Bible, which the agent presented to the best of his ability. It was promised that the collectors would do their work promptly and efficiently.

*Edgar.*—The meeting was held in the Congregational Church. The condition of the roads, in consequence of the immense snow drifts, greatly lessened the attendance. The Rev. Mr. Franks (Methodist) assisted the agent which was the only local help to be had.

*Rugby.*—Meeting was held the following night. Mr. Miller, depository at Edgar, took me over eight miles and brought me back the same night. The officers and committee of this branch are men of business, and interested in the Bible cause. They had everything in readiness and a good meeting followed. Rev. Mr. Dobson ably filled the chair. The agent had full scope allowed him and felt much at home with a Bible-loving audience. Fitting reference was made to the loss which this branch sustained some short time since, in the decease of S. Tudhope, Esq., its honoured president. The customary appointments to office were made and the collectors engaged to complete their work.

*Bracebridge.*—By request was taken in the winter. I went there and was hospitably entertained by Sheriff Bettes, president of the Society. On Sunday morning I preached in the Presbyterian Church, and in the evening in the Methodist. Rev. Messrs. Clarke and Rowe, pastors of these churches, aided efficiently on the following evening in the Methodist Church. The congregation was said to be in advance of that of the previous year. With a single exception, the officers of the Society were again appointed to their former positions. For a staff so competent for managing well, this branch must be productive. The town is alive and growing.

*Huntsville* naturally follows Bracebridge and so was taken the following evening. The president, Mr. Wright, was hospitable and kind, and did all that one man could do to secure success; but the secretary was sick, and for some cause the meeting was small. The Rev. Mr. Richards (Methodist), in whose church the meeting was held, was present and assisted. The agent did his best by earnest words, and urgent appeals, to secure an advance in interest and support of the good cause. Some changes were made in the officers, and it was promised that collectors would enter on their work at once.

*Penetanguishene.*—The sickness of the president rendered necessary a postponement of the meeting from the time first fixed on. The winter, too, was preferred to

the autumn. The Rev. Peter Campbell, president, gave hearty support in every possible way. The Presbyterians are without a pastor here, but Mr. Nettleton, depository, who is an elder of that church, cannot be easily outdone for hospitality and energetic effort to secure a good showing from this branch; but the population is largely Roman Catholic—a barren field for Bible fruits. The collectors had not completed their canvass, but promised to do so without delay.

*Midland.*—The meeting was held in the beautiful Presbyterian Church, whose pastor, Rev. D. James, is president of the Society. This was in every point of view the most satisfactory meeting that I have attended this season. The ministers present and taking part were, Rev. D. James, president; Rev. A. C. Philp, jr., (Methodist), Rev. J. Kendall (Baptist) and all the officers of the branch. It was a real pleasure to the agent to comply with the urgency of the audience, and occupied fifty minutes of their time in presenting the claims of the Great Book of God. Appointment of officers, collectors, and reception of a good collection followed in the usual way.

*Coldwater and Waubaushe.*—The double name was decided on last year, and meeting was appointed for Waubaushe. Dr. Hanly kindly entertained the agent. Rev. Mr. Sheppard (Church of England) drove through the storm from Coldwater and with Rev. Mr. Wiley (Presbyterian), who resides here, assisted nobly. Mr. Wright, son of Dr. H. H. Wright, of Toronto, occupied the chair with ability and acceptance. The agent did his best to interest his audience, who responded in a fair collection. The appointment of officers and collectors followed. No depository is kept at this branch.

*Gravenhurst.*—After much correspondence and a preliminary visit, arrangements were made for organizing a branch in this young and enterprising town. The purpose was accomplished. The Rev's M. N. Bethune (Presbyterian) and N. P. Bowles (Methodist) gave willing and valuable assistance. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, and although the audience was not large it was appreciative. Addresses were delivered by the agent, and the ministers present. The offices were all filled, and collectors appointed. I entertain strong hopes that this branch will prove a fruitful and a real auxiliary to the U. C. Bible Society and the great parent institution.

REV. J. M. HARRISON.—Our work began at *Morris* (Manitoba). We had a fair attendance and a good meeting. The Methodist Church was placed at our disposal, and Rev. M. Davies, whose guest I was, presided. In the organization this year our friends placed lady officers in charge of the Society, and we hope for great success. I found the stock of Bibles very low, and recommended the selection of a better stock, as that carried would not at all meet the demands.

*Roland.*—I left home and met the friends of this rising village in the Methodist Church for organization. The night was one of the most stormy of the season, yet quite a respectable audience gathered. Addresses were delivered by Rev. Mr. Hoskins and W. K. Phillips, Esq., after which your agent explained the origin, growth, objects and work of the Bible Society. An organization was effected, and the depository placed in the hands of a gentleman, who, I think, will push sales. I was the guest of R. Foster, Esq.

*Miami* was the next point visited. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and we had a good audience and a good meeting. In the absence of the president, the Rev. Mr. Whiteside presided. The Presbyterian minister rendered us efficient help. Your agent was kindly entertained by Geo. Cummings, Esq. After explaining the work of the Society, I gave an address at each place on "The indebtedness of civilization to Christianity." I think the officers here are efficient and will do good work. This is the only point where the collection had been made before my visit.

*Baldur.*—I was met at the station by Mr. Chester. The evening was perfect, and a good audience met your agent in the Methodist Church, which is the only one in



the town. The Presbyterian minister was necessarily absent from our meeting, but the Rev. Mr. Wigle gave us excellent assistance. I explained the work of the Society, and the friends concluded to organize. The president is a good, faithful Presbyterian, whom I have known for many years. There is a large settlement of Icelanders just a little north of *Baldur*, numbering 120 families, and are trading at this point.

*Carman*.—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. We had a splendid meeting and a large audience. We had with us the English Church, Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist ministers. The president, T. B. Meikle, Esq., occupied the chair. The sales have not been large, and I think the depository would do better in a store, where the people are more likely to look for books.

Next day we started for *Estevan*, where we should have arrived at 4:30 p. m., but owing to the snow we did not reach this point till 11:30, compelling me to miss *Alameda* and *Oxbow*, where I had arranged to speak on Thursday and Friday evenings respectively. Being delayed in *Estevan*, I announced for a meeting and a goodly number assembled in Hopkin's Hall. We organized, and I think the officers appointed will make the branch a success. The Methodist minister was called away, but we had the assistance of the Presbyterian. At 10:15 p. m. Saturday, I started for *Melita*, ninety-eight miles distant. I reached the hall engaged for our union meeting at 7:45, waiting until the good brother ceased preaching. I spoke of the Society's work, and the local ministers proposed to hold a union week-night for the purpose of organization. After paying for the hall, the collection netted us \$6.10. I hope to see good work done here.

*Hartney*.—I was met here by Rev. T. Ferrier and Ed. Hammond, Esq. The night was one of the most stormy of the season, yet we had a good meeting. We held the meeting in the Baptist Church—the Methodist and Baptist ministers being present. A branch of the Society was formed and the financial results of the meeting were over \$37, with the collectors yet to hear from. Mr. Henry Hammond became a life member by paying \$20.00.

*Souris*.—We met in the Methodist Church and had a good audience. Hugh McDonald, Esq., the president, was in the chair. Very little had been done during the year, owing to carelessness somewhere. The stock had not been renewed and early in the year was exhausted, so that there has not been a book for many months on sale. The depository was removed to a little more central point.

*Wawanesa*.—Left *Souris* at 9:45 a. m., and was met at *Methven* by the Rev. Mr. Wilson, who drove over to *Wawanesa* with me on Thursday. We had a good meeting in the Methodist Church. The president, R. W. Hector, Esq., was in the chair. We found the depository well kept. Owing to the probable removal of the depository, it was thought well to remove the stock to the drug store, which is very conveniently situated. The Presbyterian minister was absent, but the Rev. Mr. Wilson was with us and did us good service.

REV. ROBT. HAY—*Kirkton*.—The meeting was held in St. Paul's Church, and notwithstanding a wet evening we had a fairly good meeting. The work of the branch was attended to, and arrangements made to have the collecting done at an early date. The pastors of the Episcopal and Methodist Churches gave me all the help in their power.

*Elimville*.—We had a good meeting here. The evening was favourable, and the congregation large. Rev. Mr. Russell (Methodist), in whose church the meeting was held, gave me a kindly reception and very generous help.

*Hibbert*.—A wet evening, yet a good meeting. This branch is in good shape and does its work well. Rev. Mr. Scott and Rev. Mr. Burwash gave me efficient help at the meeting.

*Mitchell*.—Spent Sunday here. Preached in the morning in the Presbyterian Church and in the Methodist in the evening. Had a very good meeting on Monday evening. But little was done here last year. An efficient secretary did what he

could, but was not very successful. Better things are promised, and the prospects are good for this year.

*Millbank*.—Had a very good meeting with this branch. Mr. Magwood, M.P.P., president, in the chair. Addresses were made by clergymen of the Church of England, Methodist and Presbyterian. This branch did well last year, and will not go back on a good record.

*Shakespeare*.—The night was not very favourable, yet we had a good meeting. The Rev. Mr. Pike, of the Presbyterian Church, gave me a kindly welcome, and the excellent choir of his church did much to add to the interest of the meeting. Collectors were appointed who will do their work at an early date.

REV. J. G. MANLY.—Began at *Thornton* with good attendance, attention and interest. To *West Essa* from *Alliston* and back afoot, for a meeting of the young friends of the Society, the president coming ten miles. Secretary invalidated by a severe accident. Requisite appointments made. Good attendance, including all the ministers at *Rosemont*, and a large staff of collectors appointed. Not much sale of Scripture in a well-supplied region.

Spent three days very satisfactorily in *Orillia*, in visiting, preaching, stock-taking, etc., in preparation for the annual meeting at a later date. After a genial meeting at *Ivy*, inspected and inventoried the stock, drove four miles to *Thornton*, against a driving rain, to catch the train for *Cookstown*, where the meeting, though small in such weather, was very pleasant, and was well addressed by the Episcopal incumbent, lately from Ireland, and by the master of the high school. Large attendance at *Becton*, reporting increase. Inspected and inventoried stock and made order for increase. Meeting prevented at *Bond Head* by rain. Medium attendance at *Bradford*, after the devastating fire. At *Flinton*, on the way to *Kingston*, a violent thunderstorm precluded a meeting.

During 18 days for the *Kingston* sections, I had not one day idle. At *Odessa* on Sunday evening (after *Cataraqui* in the morning) a violent thunderstorm, as at *Flinton*, broke up the congregation, hastening away all the country attendants. The resident minister kindly undertook the office of secretary-treasurer. Catalogued the books before leaving next day for *Wilton*, where I was glad to find the young Society doing well—making good sales of the precious Scriptures, and the people evincing their sympathy by their presence at the meeting. Good meeting at *Sunbury*, and thence afoot to *Battersea* meeting. Good attendance at *Inverary*, which like *Battersea* needed more of the "Scripture of Truth" to meet demand. By some misunderstanding, not yet accounted for, I was directed to the wrong place for the *Pittsburgh* meeting, while in the right place the meeting was disappointed, and while also the agent was subjected to loss of rest and much extra and inconvenient travelling in order to reach *Sydenham* next day for Sunday services, in which the Bible Society was resuscitated, with good hope of life and work. Large congregation in the evening, and hearty ministerial coöperation. Usual meeting and receipt of free contributions at *Harrowsmith*.

Large attendance on *Amherst Island*. Stock well kept. Good meeting at *Bath*. Depository, though recently closed, with removal of incumbent, to be renewed as soon as practicable. Meeting on *Garden Island* as usual. By three Sunday services on *Wolfe Island* (one five miles from the village) I had access to many not otherwise reachable. Contributions for last year of \$28 show that this new branch is doing well. The Scriptures here (well kept) are in process of sale.

Good meeting at *Beaverton*, followed by the cataloguing of the stock for the new depository. *Eldon* meeting prevented by rain and postponed for the season. *Woodville*, a good meeting in the Methodist Church. Very encouraging meeting at *Sandford*, where all the ministers are co-operating (as they should everywhere) for the Bible Society. Increase confidently expected. Large attendance at *Gamebridge* for the *Mara* branch, and a thoroughly good meeting.

The annual meeting at *Harwood* resolved to divide the *Fenella* branch into two branches, *Harwood* and *Roseneath*, ten miles apart and not workable together.

Large attendance and excellent meeting at *Coldsprings*. Suitable reference and expression were made respecting the decease of the late excellent and faithful secretary. Good meeting at *Colborne*; and immediate action taken by the new president towards recovering the efficiency of this branch. Sunday and Monday services at *Warkworth* for the *Percy* branch gave good collections, with careful appointment of the year's collectors. The *Castleton* branch did well last year, better than I had ever known it; and the scanty depository was to be replenished. Stock well kept and accounted for at *Vernonville*.

The Society at *Grafton* reorganized, on account of official vacancies by death or removal; together with good account of stock, sales and free contributions. Meeting at *Frankford* fairly attended. Good congregations and increased collections at both *Cherry Valley* and *Milford*. *Picton* anniversary postponed on account of special evangelistic services. *Bloomfield* to remit for sales and to report. *Welling-ton* meeting as usual. Best meeting for a long time at *Trenton*, and new stock ordered. Meeting at *Zephyr* not large at a late hour, after late train and a ride of three miles over a bad road. Fair attendance at *Goodwood*; president sometime deceased, and loss of preparation for meeting. Very excellent meeting at *Unionville*; good staff of collectors appointed; ministers heartily helping.

For the *Highland Creek* branch, Sunday services at *Washington* and the *Creek*; large attendance in the evening with good collection, to be duly followed up by the collectors. Stormy and dark evening at *Dunbarton*, but the collecting will not now be neglected. Good meeting at *Pickering*. Fair attendance at *Columbus*. *Brook-lin* postponed. *Ashburn* meeting to be followed up by the collectors. Three Sunday services for the two branches, *Kinsale* and *Brougham*, in good congregations.

Very successful meeting at *Campbellford*, with three ministers. Spent a whole day in stock-taking and in the disentanglement of the accounts, for a new depository and augmented stock. Good meeting, clerically and laically, at *Stirling* and good at *Moir*, with pastoral help. The meeting for *Roslin* and *Thomasburg* was held at the latter place, but without time to visit the well-kept depository at the former place, owing to the necessity of making early morning connection by stage for Sunday at *Deseronto*, where I had a good audience in each church; and arranged next day with the depository. Good meeting and contribution at *Shannonville*; and at *Melrose* good attendance (and attention) on a rainy evening.

The *Orillia* meeting, preceded by sermons and supported by the ministers with great heartiness, made due arrangements for financial action. Good attendance and excellent meeting at *Greenbank*. Distressing collision with a double wagon on the way to the *Prince Albert* meeting, involving damage and personal injury to my associates, on a perilously narrow road through a long swamp. Hearty and earnest meeting and good report at *Port Perry* in a busy season. Encouraging attendance at both *Sonya* and *Manilla*. In the latter place, a good friend of the Society, Mr. Coone, has passed away through much affliction.

The *Sunderland* meeting, in a time of excessive cold, was fairly attended and well helped by the resident ministers. The *Cannington* meeting, in still greater cold, was small in number but in spirit excellent. *Eldon* good despite the cold. *Woodville* meeting was a new departure, with ministerial co-operation and congregational sympathy, apparently presaging return to first love. Best attendance for several years at *Glenarm*. The usual Sabbath services at *Cambray*. A good anniversary at *Fenelon Falls*. A good meeting at both *Laskay* and *Temperanceville*. Sabbath services at *Keswick*.

At *Newburgh*, good attendance (both of people and ministers), good report with subscriptions and collection. Blizzard at *Tamworth* instead of meeting. Good congregation at *Tweed* in the new and beautiful church, with an offering of free contributions. Rain and snow-slush prevented meeting at *Norwood*, but business transacted by the committee. Thirteen miles' drive in storm and cold to *Warsaw* for a good meeting and proceeds of sale and contribution. Good meeting at *Mt. Pleasant*, but at *Cavanville* a raging snowstorm and no meeting.

Capital meeting (best there in memory) at *Millbrook*, with increased attendance (including five ministers) and everything to encourage. So also next day for *South Monaghan*, in the new Episcopal church of *Bailieboro*, most successfully. Largest attendance for years at *Springville*, reporting last year's increased income. The president's place, in his illness, was efficiently filled by his successor. *Omeme* meeting well attended and showing increase. *Keene*, on a very cold evening that betokened a dozen persons was large in attendance and collection. Two good Sabbath union meetings in the two churches of *Hastings* (though with evening tempest). Appointments made, stock well kept, sales good. *West Darlington* good. Good audience at both *Enniskillen* and *Hampton*, making requisite appointments for the year.

Decidedly good meeting at *Newtonville*—a well-organized and conducted society; for whose northern branch, *Kendal*, there was next evening a large congregation, and then a late return of 7 miles to the hospitable *Newtonville* manse.

Good attendance of the *Hope* branch at *Canton*; and next evening at *Garden Hill*, though service in a neighbouring church unhappily kept several away from the one only meeting in the year for the Bible and the world. Thence to *Bethany* for its annual meeting; and next day to *Fanetville* for two congregations on Sunday, yielding \$28 in collections and subscriptions, with expectation of further help through the collectors. The *Pontypool* meeting was the best as yet on a week-day; at *Eglington*, the best there in memory; and good meeting at both *Downsview* and *Thornhill*. Specially good meetings at *Oakwood* and *Little Britain*, completing regular annual visitations, to whose whole review pertains the coldest, longest and most trying winter I have known in twenty-three years' work; and pertains also great occasion for thankfulness for many most encouraging gatherings and evidences, and for the fact that amid all the winter's fluctuations and severities, a single stage or train or meeting was never missed; but every allotted place reached except three, that for local reasons were found to be not visitable, besides three intended supplementary visitations at the close, that were prevented by sudden access of influenza.

REV. W. A. J. MARTIN—*Rockwood*.—Meeting held in Presbyterian Church. Rev. D. Strachan presided, while the pastors of the Disciples and Methodist churches were present. Attendance good, and interest deep. This branch is well officered, and is working with unabated energy.

*Everton*.—Meeting held in Disciples' Church—presided over by Mr. Hugh Black. Rev. Mr. Baker and your agent gave addresses. Attendance fair and interest growing.

*Eden Mills*.—Meeting in Methodist Church; attendance small, but new energy is being put into the work, which promises better things to come. Rev. D. Strachan, of *Rockwood*, and your agent gave addresses, which were attentively listened to.

*Eramosa*.—Evening wet and very unpleasant; meeting was therefore small. Most of the collections had been made, however, and show that the interest in the Bible Society work is on the increase. Those present showed much interest in the addresses on Bible Society work by the agent and Rev. Mr. Margrett (Congregational).

*Malton*.—This branch has been going back, as no meeting was held last year. Attendance was small, but a lively interest was manifested and the collectors undertook their duties with a readiness which promises well for the future. The local Methodist minister and another minister from *Bolton* were present and took part in the meeting.

*Ayr*.—Meeting in Stanley Street Presbyterian Church. The meeting had been well announced and the attendance was good. Much interest was shown both in the agent's address and in the encouraging reports of the branch. *Ayr* will no doubt do nobler work than ever.

*Brampton*.—The fifty-first annual meeting was poorly attended, owing to other local attractions. Rev. A. Gandier and the pastor of the Baptist Church,

where the meeting was held, were present, and took part in the exercises. Brampton hardly promises to do as well this year as in the past, owing to a difficulty in securing collectors.

*Acton*.—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. Fair attendance. Most of the local ministers were present, and showed much interest in the agent's account of Bible Society work. This branch has done good work in the past, and the outlook for the future is bright.

*Beverley*.—Rain and bad roads caused the meeting to be small in number, but not in interest. A juvenile branch Bible Society has been organized in the public school by Mr. R. McQueen, and is doing much to keep the young folks in sympathy and touch with Bible Society work, and almost insures earnest and enthusiastic workers for years to come. Perhaps other branches might copy the idea, which is a good one. Rev. F. Ballantyne and Mr. McQueen spoke briefly after the agent's address.

*Guelph*.—Half a dozen local meetings in the churches of the city caused the meeting of Bible Society branch, in Trinity Baptist Church, to be smaller than usual. The community is, however, interested, as the returns of the collectors show. The local ministers as far as possible were present.

REV. J. MILNER—*Caledon East and Mono Road*.—Annual meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. By the removal of the president and others connected with this branch, the interests of the Society had suffered loss. Perhaps this was partly the cause for the small gathering at the meeting. The incoming of Rev. P. Fleming, pastor of the church, who gave us kindly help, as a tried friend of the Society, and the appointment of an efficient president, indicate future progress. The depository is now well conducted.

*Etbicoke (South)*.—This is one of the oldest fields of the Society and as vigorous as ever. The annual meeting held in the Methodist Church, Islington, was as usual very good and well attended. The pastor of the Church, Rev. George Leech, the officers and committee of the Society, aided by the excellent choir of the church, must be largely credited for this successful and inspiring meeting. The income of the branch was almost twice the amount of last year.

*Mono Mills*.—Preached in three of the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches on Sabbath to large congregations. At each service the claims of the Society were fully stated. On Monday evening following held the annual meeting. The pastors of the churches, Revs. Messrs. Orr and Brown, were present at all the services on the Sabbath and at the annual meeting, and very kindly co-operated to make the visit of the agent successful. This branch has a good record.

*Charleston*.—Meeting in the Methodist Church. The pastor, Rev. W.K. Hagar, presided over the meeting, and with the Rev. A. Wilson, president, spoke of the claims of the Society. The choir of the church rendered excellent service in making the meeting, which was well attended, very interesting. The depository made a settlement of its indebtedness and took a new start in its work.

*Humber Summit*.—Visited this branch and held the annual meeting in the church on the fifth line of York. The church was nearly full, but to our regret unforeseen circumstances prevented the chief officers of the branch from being present; otherwise the meeting was a success.

*Bolton*.—This is a good branch, with excellent officers. Annual meeting in the Methodist Church and fairly well attended. The reports of the several officers were very satisfactory. Depository stock well kept and the management good. The sales during the year in advance of any former year.

*Woodbridge and Pine Grove*.—Meeting held Jan. 19th. Dr. Thom, the president in the chair. The Revs. G. Skinner (Congregational), J. Locke (Methodist) and Walter Reid (Presbyterian) gave appropriate addresses. The proceedings throughout were interesting and the meeting well attended.

*Etbicoke (North)*.—This branch includes a number of churches, and is one of the pioneer branches of the Society. The president, W. A. Wallis, Esq., is a

veteran in the work. Preached three times on Sabbath, at Smithfield, Sharon and Thistle town. Held annual meeting at Highfield on Monday evening following. It was thought that the series of services would greatly aid the branch in its work, as the congregations were good and a great number would hear of the operations of the Society who have not attended the annual meetings.

*Weston*.—Annual meeting in Methodist Church, Rev. Walter Reid, the president of the branch, in the chair. The Rev. Thomas Keough led in the devotional exercises, and the pastor of the church, Rev. John Locke, gave a brief but stirring address. After several expressions of regret for past failure to thoroughly canvass the town for subscriptions, a plan was adopted for successful work in the future.

*Toronto Junction*.—Attended the annual meeting; G. J. St. Leger, Esq., the president, in the chair. The Rev. J. H. Grant, W. G. Howson and J. K. McDonald, Esq., took part in the proceedings. Mr. Macdonald gave an excellent address on the work and claims of the Society. The audience was not so large as expected, but the meeting was a thoroughly good one.

*Lloyd town and Schomberg*.—By a change of date from holding the annual meeting, your agent was prevented from being present. The assurances given by the secretary indicate there will be no failure in the work.

*Orangeville*.—By invitation I attended the annual meeting held in the Presbyterian Church. The heavy snow fall and severe storm, was very unfavourable for attendance, but we had a remarkably good audience and an excellent meeting. The Rev. A. Brown, Mr. Steele, principal of the high school, and others strongly urged the necessity of increase in the funds of the Society. This branch has an excellent staff of officers. The depository is well kept and its business well conducted.

REV. J. H. MOOREHOUSE—*McIntosh and Belmore*—There was a fair attendance—interest warm and good. Rev. Mr. Stewart (Presbyterian) conducted the devotional exercises. The officers were duly appointed. After your agent's address, Mr. Stewart, in a few well-chosen remarks, commended the work of the Bible Society. This is a solid branch and may be relied upon to maintain its work steadily, if not brilliantly. After the meeting, Mr. Jas. Perkins, a warm friend of the Bible Society, and of every other good cause, drove me to his home where I was hospitably entertained.

*Lakelet*.—The attendance here was excellent, and judging from the interest manifested, an advance in subscriptions might be expected. Indeed, the president pronounced the meeting "The best we have ever had." In the address here, I especially emphasized the fact that the Christian bodies represented at the meeting, whoever they might be, were dependent upon the Bible Society for the necessary help in their missionary operations. The choir gave kindly aid in the singing. Rev. W. F. Brownlee (Episcopalian) was present, and gave a short address on the value of the Bible as read in our homes. Collectors for the whole field were appointed and the other usual business carefully carried through. Mr. Darroch makes a good secretary.

*Teeswater*.—As might be expected, we had a good meeting at this flourishing branch; there were over one hundred in attendance; the interest was warm and hearty. Rev. J. Malcolm (Presbyterian) and Rev. J. A. McLachlan (Methodist), resident ministers, were present and spoke friendly words on behalf of the work. Rev. E. W. Hughes (Episcopalian) of Wingham, was also present. The choir rendered efficient help. The accounts here are carefully kept, and the report of the branch in its various departments was found satisfactory. As usual the pains-taking secretary, Mr. J. K. McLean, was "to the fore." This branch has for some years contributed over \$100 annually, furnishing an example which might stimulate some larger places to greater zeal.

*Newbridge*.—We had every reason to expect a hearty attendance here, but a pouring rain almost prevented us from holding a meeting. However, though the attendance was small, the business of the Society was carefully carried through. The accounts as presented gave a balance of some \$14.00 on hand. Inquiry show-

ed that the territory of this branch is being well worked. The officers here are faithful and Newbridge though a small branch may be confidently expected to do its duty. On Sunday I preached in the Episcopal Churches in *Gorrie*, *Fordwich* and *Wroxeter*, saying a word on behalf of the Society in each place.

*Gorrie*.—A misty evening did not prevent a good audience from assembling on Monday evening in the Presbyterian Church, where the meeting was held. Although its contributions last year were somewhat below the mark, the *Gorrie* branch is in a healthful condition and manifests a good spirit on behalf of the work. The old officers were re-elected. Three of the resident ministers were present and spoke kind, hearty words in favor of the Bible Society. The attention was good and the collection liberal, \$7.47.

*Fordwich*.—Despite a cold, driving rain there was a good attendance and a hearty meeting. Three resident ministers were present and expressed their sympathy with the work of the Society. In order to secure more thorough canvass of one outlying district it was proposed that the resident ministers should visit it and hold a meeting, a proposition which I warmly commended. The meeting closed at 10 p.m., when we went home feeling that our evening together would confirm and strengthen us in the good work. Collection, \$6.30.

*Wroxeter*.—A congregation of about 100 assembled in the Presbyterian Church, where the meeting was held. Mr. Thos. Gibson, M. P. P., president, ably occupied the chair. Four ministers living in *Wroxeter*, or vicinity, were present and gave addresses. Mr. W. M. Robinson is the efficient secretary, and the report presented showed that the branch was in a prosperous condition. Its contribution last year was \$55.85. A profitable meeting of an hour and three-quarters was drawn to a close by singing a hymn followed by the benediction. Collection, \$9.05, largest received during my tour.

*Cedarville*.—The bad roads, caused by the recent rains, together with want of notice, made the attendance small. I was sorry to find the Rev. John Morrison suffering from almost complete blindness, caused by lightning. But his affliction, which he bears with Christian fortitude, did not prevent him from attending the meeting and showing his warm devotion to the Bible Society. In urging this branch to renewed zeal, I drew attention to the small contributions of last year as given in the report. I was glad to find \$20.14 free contribution which had since accumulated in the hands of the treasurer and which I now remit.

*Dromore*.—A drive of eight miles, with a breakdown, and some heavy mud brought me to *Dromore*. I would here gratefully mention the kindness of the Society's friends at *Cedarville* and *Dromore* in conveying me through the country from *Mt. Forest* until I reached the railroad again at *Durham*. The day I drove to *Dromore* turned out stormy, the night uninviting, the attendance small—31. The Presbyterian minister presided; business carried through; good interest shown by those present. Regret was expressed that there were not more at the meeting to be stirred up by the address. This is a substantial country branch and will do well. Its contribution last year was very creditable, \$45.40.

*Durham*.—On Sunday I preached morning and evening in the Episcopal Church, *Durham*, and in the afternoon in a school house, six miles out, in the township of *Egremont*. At each service I urged the claims of the Bible Society. Well, although there was a rather dull sky no rain was falling at the hour of the meeting, and at least a fair attendance might have been expected. There were 44, and of these three-fourths were ladies. In an address of 45 minutes I presented eight departments of the Bible Society's work, strongly urging the various claims. There was excellent attention and apparently deep interest. Two of the resident ministers were present and commended the work. The old officers were re-elected. The president pointed out that under the efficient secretaryship of Mr. Brown, the branch had made a decided advance last year.

*Mount Forest*.—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The night was cold and blustering. There were fifty-one present. After the usual business

had been carefully attended to, your agent spoke about three-quarters of an hour, the address receiving close attention. By way of emulation I held up the example of Teeswater. There were four ministers present—two active, two retired. Rev. Mr. McMillan (Presbyterian) gave a short but ringing speech on behalf of the Society. The Baptists were engaged in holding revival services, which prevented them attending the meeting. But before leaving, next day, I called on the Baptist minister, and was glad to hear him express himself as warmly in favour of the Society's work, and desirous to commend it heartily to the support of his people.

*Arthur.*—A warm, hearty meeting. Three resident ministers were present. The interest was lively and well sustained throughout. A peculiar evidence of the activity of the officers in seeking to add interest to the meeting consisted in a programme of the order and proceedings printed and distributed among those in attendance. The only change made in office was that of president. Rev. A. E. Smith (Methodist) taking the place of Rev. L. W. Thom (Presbyterian), president last year. It was a pleasure to visit this branch, and judging from the character of the meeting, the Society's work will be well looked after again this year.

*Grand Valley.*—A very bleak wind with storm of sleet was unfavourable for a large attendance, but despite this we had a good meeting. The cold without did not prevent the hearts within the Church from being warm with interest in the great work of the Bible Society. This branch is in a hearty condition, some evidence of which was given by a free contribution of \$61.00 last year. I carefully inquired as to how far the branch was reaching the territory surrounding the village. This was found on the whole, satisfactory, though there appears to be some territory between Grand Valley and *Arthur* not fully reached. Officers and collectors were appointed, the address given, and we closed the meeting about 10 p.m., all feeling stirred up in the good work.

*Waldemar.*—The next day was one of the stormiest of the season; however, after waiting for the train, which was behind time, I came to this place. A blinding storm was raging, and the Presbyterian Church, where the meeting was to be held, was not even opened or lighted up, so I was unable to hold any meeting. I visited the depository. On inquiry as to the cause of such small contribution from this branch last year, I was informed that some three or four districts had, unfortunately, not been canvassed owing to the terrible storm and drifts. I did not see the president, who lives outside the village. Next day, after a delay at the station of over two-and-a-half hours, I got a train up to *Harriston*, a point where I thought I could profitably spend Sunday in the interests of the Society.

*Harriston.*—Having called on the secretary and president on Saturday afternoon, the opinion was expressed that it would be best to hold the Bible Society meeting on Sunday afternoon, in the town hall, notice to be given out in all the churches at service on Sunday morning. As the branch appeared to prefer this plan, and as it would save the expense of another day, it was so arranged. I conducted service morning and evening, in the Episcopal Church, presented the claims of the Bible Society at each service. At 4:15 p.m. a congregation of 130 assembled in the town hall. The resident ministers who were at home, some three or four, were present. I spoke about three-quarters of an hour on the various departments of the Society's work. A hearty spirit prevailed, and those present seemed determined that the *Harriston* branch should do its part in the good work this year.

*Holstein.*—It afforded me peculiar pleasure to visit this branch, it having been my privilege to organize it in the year 1885. Since then it has gone prosperously on its way, usually contributing from forty to fifty dollars annually. Last year, though it appears blank in the report, through being late in forwarding, I was glad to find it had contributed \$55.00. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. Both resident ministers were present, and warmly commended the Society's work. The evening was somewhat stormy, but there was a fair attendance, and as might be expected, a warm, active interest was manifested in the affairs of the Society. This branch has sustained a loss in the removal of Mr. Gilroy to Mount Forest, but Mr. Richards, who takes his place, shows an active interest in the work.



*Clifford.*—The meeting was held in the handsome new Presbyterian Church. The Presbyterian and Methodist ministers were present. Officers and collectors were appointed, and reports read and approved. Though the attendance at the meeting was by no means as large as we might probably expect, yet the branch is a thrifty one, and may be relied on to do good work. Next day I started for home, where I arrived safely about 7 p.m. The storms and extreme cold rendered this tour of work, probably, the most arduous I have ever experienced; but on the whole, I met with, I think, fair success, for there are but few branches that are not much the better of being roused out of encroaching lethargy by the annual meeting and stimulated afresh in their labours; and I desire to record my gratitude to God for the continued assistance of that guiding and helping hand which has so kindly been vouchsafed me in former tours.

REV. CHAS. R. MORROW—*Lynden.*—The annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church; Rev. H. M. Hall, the president, occupied the chair. Mr. Hall gave a short address. The choir of the church led in the singing. A small audience owing to the stormy night. Miss L. Nisset was appointed secretary. Nothing was done by this branch last year, but I expect good returns for this one.

*Glen Morris.*—It took your agent nearly two and one-half hours to go from Harrisburg to Glen Morris, a distance of about eight miles—several times out in the deep snow, aiming at the Presbyterian Church, and were late. I found the church warm and well lighted. In the absence of the president, Mr. J. Howlett was elected chairman. Your agent was cordially received, and at the close of his address, accorded a hearty vote of thanks. The secretary presented an able and thoughtful report. Rev. Mr. Pettigrew, pastor of the church, was absent through sickness.

*Copetown.*—The meeting was held in the Zion Hill Methodist Church, the pastor of the church, Rev. C. W. Cosens, was in the chair. Before introducing your agent, Mr. Cosens gave a brief but very interesting address. The depository, Mr. G. W. Howell, went to his eternal home during the year. His business partner, Mr. C. K. Thompson, was appointed in Mr. Howell's place. This depository is well kept. Mr. F. J. Fry, the efficient secretary, presented a good report. I expect an increase in receipts from this branch.

*Kilbride.*—Another stormy night. A small audience assembled in the Methodist Church. Presbyterian and Methodist bodies have churches in Kilbride, but the pastors live in Strabane and Carlisle. Neither of them were present. Geo. Harbottle, the president, in the chair. He makes a good chairman. I found this branch in a low state. Collectors were appointed the previous year, but did not act, even the proceeds of sales the previous year were not forwarded to Toronto. The secretary hopes for better results this year.

*Strabane.*—Very cold and stormy. The east wind was so great that the upper part of the Presbyterian Church could not be made sufficiently warm, so the meeting was held in the basement—a very drafty place. The president, Rev. R. Cohoe, of Freelon, in the chair. The pastor led in prayer. The president gave some interesting statistics of Bible circulation, after which your agent addressed the meeting. The depository is at Freelon.

*Waterdown.*—Another very stormy night, notwithstanding which the venerable president, Dr. McLaren, came out and occupied the chair. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The Revs. Messrs. Ferguson, McEachren and Yorston were present. The secretary and treasurer both removed to other parts during the year. Mr. A. Baynton, principal of the public school, was appointed secretary, and Miss. Ryckman, treasurer. There is some difficulty in getting anyone to take charge of the depository.

*Jerseyville.*—Meeting announced for Baptist Church, one mile and a-half west of Jerseyville, but as there were so few present, it being so very cold and stormy, it was thought best by the members of the committee present to have another meeting. So arrangements were made to hold a meeting in Jerseyville, on the next Wednesday.

and have your agent give an address in the Baptist Church on the following Sunday. Before adjourning, your agent, the Rev. Mr. Haviland, and Rev. Mr. Cosens gave addresses. On the Wednesday night we had a fair audience, Rev. Mr. Bristol, president, taking the chair. Mr. Cosens gave a brief but very fine address. The officers and resident ministers are warm friends of the Society. On the following Sunday I preached in the Baptist Church to a good audience. The officers of the church kindly gave the collection to the Society.

*West Flamboro.*—Rev. S. W. Fisher has for several years been president of this branch. He is an admirable president, taking great interest in the Society. The meeting this year was held in the Methodist church. Mr. Albert Jones, who makes a very fine secretary, gave his report. Officers re-elected. This branch for two years in succession has sent \$76 free contributions—a noble record.

*Burlington.*—The meeting was held in the school room of the Presbyterian Church; Rev. Mr. Histon, the president, was in his place. There were quite a number of ladies present. Rev. R. H. Abraham led in prayer. The secretary presented a full report. The officers were re-elected, after which your agent was introduced and his address received good attention. I look for a good report from Burlington.

*Alberton.*—And still another stormy night. So few out it was thought better to appoint another night. Quite a number of ladies and young people came the second night. The meeting was held in the Trinity Methodist Church. The secretary hopes for increased returns this year. On the following Sunday I preached in the Alberton Presbyterian Church on behalf of the Society.

REV. S. N. MOYER—*Morrison.*—The annual meeting of this branch was held in the Evangelical Church. Attendance was fairly good. The good people gave practical proof of their growing interest in the operations of the Bible Society by their liberal contributions. Rev. Charles Finkbeiner, newly appointed president, gave a suitable address.

*Tavistock.*—Meeting was held in the Baptist Church. Rev. L. Wildfang, our old active president, in the chair. The attendance, considering the inclemency of the night, was large. The good people of this community take a lively interest in the Society's work. The depository is one of the best kept on my district. The sales are largely increased. The local pastors gave suitable addresses.

*Crediton.*—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. Owing to a heavy snow fall and the night being stormy, the attendance was not so large as was expected, but the financial results of the meeting were grand. The Rev. Geo. Baker, newly elected to the presidency of this branch, and Rev. D. H. Brandt nobly assisted your agent. The sum \$21.81, secured, when supplemented by the sums gathered by the collectors, will show a fine percentage of increase on last year's amount.

*Dashwood.*—Although this is one of the infant branches organized one year ago, yet it has displayed an exemplary degree of freshness, vitality and working ability, worthy of imitation by older branches. They sent in a nice little sum of free contributions last year, and expect to increase that amount this year by about 20 per cent. at least. Rev. S. Krupp is an old friend and active helper of the Bible Society.

*Zurich.*—The meeting was well attended. As usual, all the local pastors were present and doing what they could to make the meeting of your agent successful. This is one of the finest branch territories on my district, and if well canvassed, might easily contribute at least fifty dollars annually. The books are finely displayed and beautifully kept.

*Ayton.*—Notwithstanding the denominational drawbacks here, this branch is alive and annually sends in a creditable report of sales and free contributions. If the Lutheran pastors and their people would only fall in line and help, the free contributions would be doubled. The meeting was held in the Evangelical Association Church, whose pastor, as also the president, gave each an address.

*Elmwood.*—Meeting was held in the Methodist Church, whose pastor, Rev. Mr. Smith, newly elected to the presidency of this branch, is a warm-hearted old standby of the Society. The operations of this branch seem to be somewhat enfeebled on account of the prevailing depression of the times. But the Bible Society has not a few warm-hearted friends here, and we think they will show a fair record of themselves.

*Mildmay.*—Our annual meeting of this branch was held in the new Presbyterian Church. This was the largest audience and most enthusiastic meeting yet held. From a branch having such a devoted staff of working officers, and such an enthusiastic people, you may expect liberal contributions. Rev. Messrs. Danard, Haist and G. F. Swartz, also gave appropriate addresses.

*Milverton.*—Our annual branch meeting was held in the Cavan Presbyterian Church. Rev. John McKay, the pastor, a devoted friend and worker of the Bible Society, in the chair. By the secretary's report we notice that this branch sent in the sum of \$58.00 last year. This was nearly double the amount raised two years ago. At my first visit here I recommended the plan, for local reasons, for having a Bible Society contribution Sabbath, to be held in each church within the bounds of this branch district, as soon as practicable after the agent's visit, and that the pastors in each church take up the contributions and subscriptions; and all have been so well pleased with the plan, that they now consider it a standing rule in the branch. The result is nearly 100 per cent. increase of the free contributions.

*Breslau.*—Meeting was held in the Mennonite Church, and was an interesting and successful one. The attendance was about double that of last year's meeting, and we succeeded in re-organizing it with a good staff of officers and collectors. About five weeks later I gave an extra address to a large audience of interested old and young people in the River Bank School House, several miles south of Breslau and secured nearly \$10.00. I confidently expect that Breslau will make a good record this year.

*Sebringville.*—On account of a very rainy night here the committee, by consent of the agent, postponed their annual meeting, until Dec. 29th. At this date we had a good meeting in the Evangelical Church. The local pastors, Rev. Messrs. Kreh and Becker, assisted your agent ably. The sum of \$23.60 was secured, which, when supplemented by the active branch collectors, will no doubt show a small advance on the last year's amount of free contributions.

REV. H. MCQUARRIE—*Kinlough.*—The meeting was held in the Episcopal Church, Oct. 24th, and was moderately well attended. The president, Mr. J. Lane, occupied the chair and gave a short opening address bearing on the work of the Society. Officers were re-elected and collectors appointed, and instructions given to have returns made in due time.

*Langside.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The president Mr. Alex McKenzie, in the chair. This is a weak branch, and the meeting was not large, but those present seemed to be deeply interested in the work of the Society.

*St. Helens.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, the pastor, Rev. Mr. Anderson, in the absence of the president, occupied the chair, and gave an interesting and instructive address. The attendance was good, and all appeared deeply interested in the work of the Society. The branch is in a prosperous condition.

*Whitechurch.*—The night was wet, and the roads muddy, and the attendance small. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church; the pastor was absent, having an appointment at another station. The president, Rev. Mr. Geddis, presided and gave a clear and instructive address. The secretary gave a carefully prepared report. He and the president are earnest workers for the Society.

*Brussels.*—There was a very good meeting in the Melville Presbyterian Church, presided over by Mr. T. Strachan, who gave a good opening address. The pastor Mr. Ross, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Jones, conducted the devotional exercises. This branch is in a prosperous condition—it is the best in this section. Mr. Kerr is a very efficient secretary, and all the office-bearers seem to take a lively interest in the work.

*Walton.*—The meeting was held in the Episcopal Church, and, although the night was cold and stormy, there was a fair attendance. The president, Mr. Smillie, presided and spoke earnestly on behalf of the Society in his opening address, and was followed by the Rev. Mr. Forest (Presbyterian) and Rev. Mr. Ottawell (Methodist) who gave short and practical addresses. This branch is doing well.

*Bluevale.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. Mr. G. Leitch in the chair. Rev. Mr. King (Methodist) and Rev. Mr. Hartley (Presbyterian) took part in the devotional exercises and also spoke earnestly in favour of the work of the Society. The depository is well managed, and the sales second highest of any of the branches visited by your agent.

*Molesworth.*—We had a very good meeting. It was held in the Presbyterian Church, and the pastor, Mr. Stevenson, in the absence of the president, accepted the chair, and gave an excellent opening address. Both he and Mr. Watson, the efficient secretary, and other office-bearers take a warm interest in the work of the Society.

*Atwood.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and was well attended. The president, Rev. A. Henderson, in the chair. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Fisher, took part in the exercises. Both he and the president are warm supporters of the Society. This branch is in a good state, the business is well conducted. The depository is in a good condition, and the sales are far in advance of any of the branches visited by your agent.

*Trowbridge.*—Having preached at a union thanksgiving service in Atwood in the forenoon, and a similar one in Monkton in the afternoon, came here accompanied by Rev. Mr. Henderson, and held an interesting meeting in the evening in the Methodist Church. The president, Mr. Code, presided. Short and instructive addresses were given by the pastor, Mr. Baugh, and Rev. Mr. Henderson. This is a weak branch, but the Bible Society has some warm friends here.

*REV. JOSEPH PHILP—York.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The audience was not large, but the people present manifested a deep interest in the work of the Society.

*Binbrook.*—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church, Rev. Messrs. Walker (Presbyterian) and Laird (Methodist) assisting. A union choir showed their sympathy by lending their aid. The attendance was good and the prospect assuring.

*Oneida.*—The evening was wet, and no meeting was held. We, therefore, arranged to return from Hagersville on Sunday afternoon. The Rev. Mr. Turnbull (Presbyterian minister), a true friend of the Society, cancelled his evening service, so as to allow the people an opportunity to attend the meeting in the afternoon. There was a fine gathering, a gracious influence, and a collection of \$7.91. The officers of the branch are doing faithful work.

*Hagersville.*—By request we arranged to spend the Sunday at this place. We addressed the Sabbath School and preached in the Baptist Church in the morning. A mass meeting was held in the Methodist Church at night. The Presbyterians, Methodists and Baptists gave up their regular evening services and ministers and people attended the mass meeting. The large Church was crowded till all available space was filled. The collection amounted to \$10.74. The officers have made this one of the strongest and most prosperous of branches.

*Ancaster.*—The meeting was held in the town hall. It was a lovely night, but a great many people remained at home. We would like to see more interest shown by the people of this rich and beautiful section of country. However, with faithful officers, we trust that the work will not be forgotten. Rev. Messrs. Clark (Episcopalian) and Forman (Methodist) were with us.

*Glanford.*—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. Conflicting interests interfered with the attendance, but not with the good spirit manifested. The outlook is encouraging. As we could not give a Sunday, we managed to attend a Sunday School tea meeting at Case's Church, where we looked after the interest of the

Society, and spoke briefly in its behalf. In this way we reached the people of the two localities united in the work of this branch.

*Caledonia.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church; officers, ministers of the town, and the other members of the committee were on hand in due time, and by their excellent spirit, wise counsels and superior arrangements they showed wherein the strength of the Caledonia branch lies. We look for liberal contributions this year. Collection at public meeting, \$3.26

*Farvis.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The attendance was the largest for years. Your agent sketched the origin and work of the Society, and the audience listened with the closest attention. All of the officers and members of the committee were re-elected, and a fine company of collectors chosen. The offerings of the people will show a large increase. The Rev. C. Bennet, B. A., showed us great kindness, and rendered valuable assistance.

*REV. J. M. SMITH—McGillivray and Biddulph.*—The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church. This branch has been in a weak state for some years, owing to some misapprehensions. A large gathering met to hear my address. New life has been infused into the branch—the depository removed to a more convenient location, new stock sent for, old officers re-appointed and the outlook this year is very hopeful indeed. Mr. Schoff, the veteran secretary of the branch here, entertained your agent hospitably.

*Corunna.*—The annual meeting was held in the Methodist Church. It is a beautiful building, and is warm and well lighted. The choir of the church added materially to the pleasure and success of the meeting. The Rev. Messrs. McNair and Urquhart spoke eloquently for the Society's work. The excellent record of the past will be maintained by this branch.

*Sombra.*—Had a good meeting in the Baptist Church. No ministers present. This is the serious defect in the working of this branch. It has been at a low ebb, but we hope with a new staff of officers to be able to report more favourably another year.

*Watford.*—This is one of our banner branches. The annual meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, presided over by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Graham. The Methodist minister, Rev. Mr. Harris, took an active part also in the services. The evening was wet and stormy, but thanks to the young people of the Christian Endeavour Society, we had a good meeting. Good speeches, spiced with good music, and backed by a good collection.

*Theford.*—A worse night could not have been chosen for the annual meeting of this branch. The rain came down in torrents, and the result was a small meeting; but it was one of the most interesting of the series. All present were ardent friends of the Society, and I am sure the high record of contributions from this branch will be sustained this year.

*Ravenswood.*—The rain still came pouring down, and this branch being seven miles out in the country from Theford, the roads were dreadful, and as a result there was no meeting; but the secretary, Mr. Taylor, is a devoted friend of the Society, and he promised to have the collecting done as thoroughly as in former years.

*Camlachie.*—The annual meeting of this vigorous branch was held this year in the Anglican Church. The evening was wet, but a very fair attendance. The president, Rev. Mr. McLennan, is a staunch friend of the Society and entertained your agent, besides giving a profitable address at the meeting. The Rev. Mr. Pomeroy, the only other resident clergyman, also took part and spoke favourably of the Society's work. This branch is doing well.

*East Williams.*—Visited this prosperous branch and found the Society's work in the hands of a grand staff of officers. On account of the collections being taken up in the summer, and the branch is but a few miles from your agent, it was decided not to hold the annual meeting till February. This branch always gives a good account of itself.

*Mooretown.*—We had a fine moonlight night for the annual meeting of this branch, in the Presbyterian Church school room. The pastor, Rev. Mr. Urquhart, occupied the chair and did much to make the meeting a success. The secretary is a devoted friend of the Society, and through his efforts the branch has been kept alive.

*Forest.*—The annual meeting was held in the Anglican Church. We had a stormy night, but a fairly good meeting, the pastors of Anglican, Baptist and Presbyterian churches being present, and taking an active part in the meeting. There are excellent men at the head of the Society, and we hope that this branch will take on new vigour. Your agent spent a Sabbath preaching in the Presbyterian Church in the morning and in the Baptist Church in the evening to good congregations.

*Lobo.*—This new branch was organized on Tuesday evening, at a public meeting called by announcements from the various pulpits of the township. It will take up new ground in this wealthy township, and we hope to be able to send a handsome collection yearly to the U. C. Bible Society at Toronto. The officers elected were: President, Rev. S. W. Ball, Vanneck; vice-presidents, the clergy of the township; secretary-treasurer *pro tem.*, the Rev. J. M. Smith, Poplar Hill.

*Arkona.*—I arranged for a meeting, which was duly announced and held in the Baptist Church. After opening exercises and the address of your agent, it was unanimously decided to re-organize, with the following officers: President, Rev. J. S. Yelland; vice-president, Rev. F. Harvey; secretary, Dr. E. M. Copeland; treasurer, and depository, A. D. McDonald. Mr. McDonald deserves great praise for the way in which he has preserved the stock of the Society and cared for its funds through the depression.

*REV. W. W. SMITH—Smithville.*—Found the books well kept, in a good public place—a druggist's store. Officers of the branch attentive and courteous. Mr. Schnick, secretary-treasurer, very active in the work. Meeting in Methodist Church—moderately attended. Rev. Mr. Cruickshank (Presbyterian) gave us good assistance. Methodist pastor absent on other duty. A young lady appointed secretary, who will do her duty well. Collectors were also appointed.

*St. Anns.*—Rev. Mr. Cruickshank, who also preaches at St. Anns, took me there in his buggy, and helped us well at the meeting. Though small, the tone of the meeting good, and Bible activity all over the world listened to with much interest. This small branch did very well last year, and the same collectors will keep up their former record. The choir gave us some good pieces. Secretary and treasurer had their reports ready. Depository at post office—sales fair.

*Wellandport.*—Called at houses of three resident clergymen—one not at home. By some oversight, meeting not well announced. Secretary only officer present. Rev. Mr. McLaren in the chair and warmly advocated the cause. No collectors last year, the matter having been neglected. Collectors appointed at this meeting. Attendance small.

*Caistorville.*—Rode five miles with a mail-carrier and took a healthy walk of nine. Model officers. Such branches are always prosperous. Excellent meeting in Methodist Church. Fine choir—inspiring anthems. Agent listened to with very great interest. Vicinity alive to the cause: did well last year. Rev. J. T. Davis (Methodist) presided and gave us efficient help.

*Caistor.*—An entirely rural branch. Meeting in Kerr Church. A fair representative attendance. Rev. W. H. Garnham (Methodist) spoke well and warmly. Agent well received. Collectors had just made their returns, and were reappointed, with thanks. Considerable advance on last year.

*Beamsville.*—Depository well kept and sales large. Entertained by Dr. Comfort, president. Interesting meeting in Presbyterian Church; three ministers present and all took part, but no speeches. Agent listened to with much attention. This branch is well managed, and the committee (two members from each church) meet at once to appoint collectors, for whom districts are already mapped out.

*Camden.*—One of the best meetings of the year in German Methodist Church. The pastor, Rev. S. R. Knechtel, at whose church in South Cayuga I had an overflowing meeting, some years ago, gave us warm assistance, as did also Mr. Moyer (Methodist). Large collections last year; and the very full staff of collectors appointed at the meeting will at once go to work. Such meetings as these cheer the heart of an agent.

*Winona.*—Meeting in the Anglican Church. The clergyman, Rev. F. E. Howitt, warmly commended the cause and in the absence of the president presided. A very snowy night, and the meeting, though small, was yet representative. This branch has one of the best secretary-treasurers in the country. A committee appointed to co-operate with officers. All pleased with the meeting.

*South Saltfleet.*—Meeting in Methodist Church, Tapleystown. Stormy, snowy night and attendance small. Rev. Mr. Bowlby (Methodist) presided and warmly advocated the cause. Agent's address appreciated. Depository of books will be removed to the post-office. Collectors were just finishing their rounds. Results to be forwarded.

REV. A. I. SNYDER—*Pelee Island.*—It is fifteen miles from the mainland, in the county of Essex. Has a population of six hundred souls, mostly Protestant. By previous arrangement the meeting was held in the Episcopalian Church. The incumbent, Rev. J. Gander, presided, and gave an interesting address. The Rev. Mr. Anderson, Methodist minister, also gave an instructive address. Your agent then presented the object and work of the Society, and it was unanimously decided to organize a branch of the Society on the Island. Officers and collectors were duly appointed and arrangements made to establish a depository.

*Amherstburg.*—Unfortunately the night was very stormy. The rain fell very fast during the afternoon and evening, thus preventing a large attendance. But the officers and friends of the Society here are alive, and arrangements were made for united action in the interests of the Society. The meeting was held in the Episcopalian Church, and Rev. Mr. Wye and Rev. Mr. Gane gave short addresses. We shall have a good report from Amherstburg.

*Gesto.*—Previous arrangements were made to hold a public meeting in behalf of the Society in the Methodist Church. There was a good audience. The Rev. Mr. Snell, pastor of the church, presided, and the choir did good service. Your agent explained the origin and work of the Society, and the friends unanimously declared their willingness to organize a branch and do all in their power to make it a success. Arrangements were also made to establish a depository.

*Aldborough.*—Again we were overtaken by a heavy rain, and as a result the audience was not large. The Rev. Mr. Ballantyne, Presbyterian minister, occupied the chair and gave a profitable address. Your agent presented the claims of the Society and the people responded with a liberal collection.

*Buxton.*—Owing to a lecture of unusual interest in the neighborhood, the Bible Society meeting did not take the usual form. The officers will do their duty and the collectors their work as speedily as possible.

*Comber.*—Meeting in Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Messrs Andrews, Cotter and Elliot were present and assisted. The audience was large and attentive and the meeting was unusually interesting. The collections were good, and the officers anticipate a better year for the Society than any previous one.

*Duart and Orford.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The pastor, Rev. W. M. Kay, opened the meeting with devotional exercises. The Rev. A. Currie, who has been president of the Society for many years, presided. We had a most interesting and profitable meeting, and the officers made every effort to look after the interests of the work for which they have so much regard.

*Fingal.*—A large audience assembled in the Baptist Church. Mr. McPherson has been president for over thirty-three years, and he was on hand promptly and had a good word for the Society. Addresses were given by Rev. Messrs. Charles-

worth, Sutherland and McAllister. Your agent had an opportunity to present the worth and work of the Society. The meeting a very successful one.

*Kintyre.*—A severe storm and bad roads prevented the usual meeting of this branch. The officers, however, will look after the interests of the work and I trust a good report will be forthcoming.

*Lambeth.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The president, Mr. Joseph Poole, presided, and did good service. Rev. T. W. Blatchford, B.A., and Rev. R. J. Garbutt, LL.B., gave suitable addresses, and your agent felt much at home on the theme that never grows old. The people here feel more deeply interested in the work of the Bible Society, and we anticipate a good report from this branch this year.

*Rodney.*—Meeting in Presbyterian Church. The Rev. Mr. Fansher and Rev. Mr. Bean were present and rendered assistance. The Royal Templars of Temperance had an important meeting, and your agent, being a member of that Order, visited the lodge and a subscription of \$15 was taken for the Bible Society, and the officers feel encouraged for the work of the year.

*West Lorne.*—The meeting was held in Presbyterian Church. Owing to a heavy snowstorm the audience was not large. This branch has lost by death one of the most energetic workers I have known. I refer to Edward Mettam, Esq., who is said to be the "friend of all and enemy of none." However, while "God buries the workman, He carries on his work." A worthy son is found in the person of Fred. Mettam, Esq., who was elected president and who is a safe and good man.

*Quinn.*—A meeting was called in the Methodist Church with view of organizing a branch of the Society. There was a good attendance, and after careful deliberation it was decided to organize a branch and establish a depository. Four excellent gentlemen were chosen for officers and a good committee appointed. Collectors were appointed whose work will embrace this community and that of Tilbury Centre. Altogether this promises to be a fruitful branch for the Society.

REV. F. B. STACEY—*Wolseley.*—The meeting was held in the Methodist Church. The President, Rev. A. Campbell, was confined to his house by an accident, but the chair was ably filled by Mr. A. B. Bompas. The choir of the church furnished suitable music and the pastor, Rev. A. H. Burrow, gave a short address. After your agent had spoken, the usual business was transacted. Considerable interest was manifested in the work of the Society, and the financial returns were good.

*Moosomin.*—Here, also, I found a growing interest in the Society's operations. The Methodist, Presbyterian and Baptist ministers of the town were present, and the latter, Rev. Mr. Dowling, gave a stirring address on the value and necessity of a Divine revelation. Your agent was kindly received, and the financial results were excellent. The meeting was held in the Baptist Church, which was comfortably filled. Excellent music was furnished by the Methodist choir. This branch is well officered, all the reports were unusually complete, and the Bibles are well cared for. Total receipts, \$84.

*Whitewood.*—Here, also, I found an able and energetic secretary, to whom much of the financial success may be attributed. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, but the attendance was very small owing to a late change in the place of meeting. Mr. Attwood, the resident Methodist minister, and your agent addressed the meeting. This branch has suffered severely by fire during the year. All the Bibles, accounts, etc., were burned, but a new depository was secured and the prospects are very encouraging. Free contributions, \$52.

*Grenfell.*—A very successful meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The president, Mr. Garrett, occupied the chair. All the resident ministers, Episcopalian, Presbyterian and Methodist, gave short addresses, and at no point did your agent have better hearing. The depository changed hands, and now is in a very desirable situation. The sales last year were not very large, but the contributions were good. The president and secretary were re-elected.



*Broadview.*—This is a small place with very limited constituency. However, considerable interest was manifest. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church and short addresses were delivered by the local Presbyterian and Methodist ministers. The financial returns were very fair. The sales, however, were very small. All the officers were re-elected.

*Indian Head.*—The work of the Society does not appear to be in a very satisfactory condition. At the very last moment I was advised that no public meeting could be had. The sales during the year have been light. Very little work has been done.

*Qu'Appelle.*—A fair sized audience greeted your agent here. Rev. Mr. Matheson (Presbyterian minister), in whose church the meeting was held, very earnestly advocates the cause of the Society. The choir of the church also assisted us very materially. The sales during the year were small and the contributions not so large as our friends hoped to report.

*Regina.*—Owing to illness the president was unable to be present at the meeting here, which was held in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. King occupied the chair, and the usual business was transacted. Excellent reports were presented by the officers. The Bibles are in good hands, and the total receipts amount to nearly \$70.

*Moosejaw.*—Our meeting was held in the Methodist Church and the president, Rev. W. T. Clay, ably conducted the business meeting. This was the largest gathering, and from a financial standpoint the most successful, of the series. Sales were good and very general support given to the Society's work. New officers were elected and the collector's staff strengthened. Your agent was assisted by Rev. W. H. Mack, resident Baptist minister and president elect. Total receipts, \$85.80.

REV. PETER STRAITH—*Mount Pleasant.*—Meeting was held in Methodist Church. Though not large, there was an evident interest in the work. Rev. J. We expect a good return from this branch.

*Scotland.*—Meeting held in the Baptist Church. Mr. J. B. Merritt, president, occupied the chair, and spoke of the work of the Society. Rev. Mr. Hay (Congregational) also took part in the meeting and spoke highly of the claims of the Bible Society. Most of the audience were young people, and we hope a good foundation is laid for future work.

*New Durham.*—Meeting in the Methodist Church. Mr. Charles Walker, being absent on account of sickness, Mr. Doherty occupied the chair, and with Mr. P. Kelly and Mr. M. Corliss conducted the devotional exercises. There were a number of young people present, and there is an evident interest in the work.

*St. George.*—Meeting held in the Baptist Church. The night was unfavourable. Rev. Mr. McTavish, president of the branch, occupied the chair and conducted the devotional exercises. Rev. Mr. Colling (Methodist) and the minister supplying the Baptist pulpit, took part in the meeting, commending the work of the Society.

*Drumbo.*—Meeting held in the Methodist Church. Attendance small. We have to record the death of the president, Mr. Thos. Passmore, and also Mr. Jos. L. Burgess, at one time treasurer and depositor, who took a very active interest in the Society's work. The report for last year shows live interest in the work. Rev. Mr. Bailey (Methodist) occupied the chair, and made some remarks. Rev. Mr. Shearer (Presbyterian) also addressed the meeting.

*Princeton.*—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church, and was well attended. Mr. A. Allison, president, occupied the chair. The choir rendered some appropriate music. Rev. W. K. Shearer (Presbyterian) and Rev. Mr. Bowers (Methodist) took part in the meeting.

*Plattsville.*—Meeting held in the evangelical (German) church. The night was very unfavourable. Rev. Mr. Whittock occupied the chair, and conducted devotional exercises. Plattsville is a prosperous village, and we expect a good return.

*Innerkip.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church. The night was wet and the meeting small. Rev. Mr. Voaden, of the Methodist Church, occupied the chair, and made a few remarks commending the work of the Society. Mr. John Richardson, president of the branch, died during the past year. He was an active worker in the Society for many years, and his presence will be much missed. We hope for a good return from this branch.

*Chesterfield, Ratho, Bright.*—Meeting held in the Presbyterian Church, Chesterfield. Though the night was unfavourable the meeting was comparatively good. There is an evident interest in the work. The country about is one of the best parts of Ontario. Mr. Teasdale Hall, Ratho, president, occupied the chair and made some remarks. Rev. Mr. Johnson (Presbyterian) and Rev. Mr. Kelly (Methodist), Bright, made appropriate addresses. We expect a good return from this branch.

REV. C. W. WATCH.—*Whitby.*—This is an active branch and doing a good work. The evening was dark and damp, but the attendance was large and the spirit and interest in the meeting were helpful. The secretary, Mr. R. Johnston, an officer of the Society for twenty-nine years, presented a report, which would have done credit to any meeting of the Society. It showed that they had raised about \$120 during the past year. The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church and short addresses were delivered by the Rev. J. Abraham, the newly elected president, and the Rev. R. Cade. The choir of the church led the singing. It was a pleasure for your agent to visit this branch.

*Oshawa.*—The meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church and presided over by R. McLaughlin, Esq., in the absence, through sickness, of the president. There was a much larger attendance than had been seen at a Bible Society meeting for many years, and the interest was good. We are anticipating larger returns from Oshawa in the future. There were five of the resident ministers upon the platform.

#### MEETINGS HELD WITHOUT AN AGENT.

*Cherrywood.*—The annual meeting of this branch was held on Tuesday, March 1st, 1893. The Rev. Mr. Keam (Methodist) presided at the meeting, having travelled ten miles at his own expense in order to do so. The expense of an agent's visit was thus spared to the Society, whilst the results of the meeting, financially, was in excess of any recent year. The office-bearers of the branch deserve commendation for their action in this matter.

*Sudbury.*—A meeting to reorganize this branch was held in the Methodist Church, Sudbury, on Wednesday, 22nd February, 1893; the Rev. W. R. Shortt, Pastor, in the chair. This branch had formerly been connected with the Ottawa Bible Society, but had been transferred to the Upper Canada Society by a friendly arrangement. The model constitution, as in Report, was adopted; Committee and office-bearers elected; report from the Depository read, and collectors appointed. It was decided to hold the annual meeting on the last Wednesday of November.

## ANNIVERSARY MEETING.

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The Fifty-Third Anniversary of the Upper Canada Bible Society was held in St. James' Cathedral School House, Toronto, on Thursday evening, 25th May, 1893. The Hon. Geo. W. Allan, President, occupied the chair. Accompanying him on and around the platform were the Reverends Dr. Barbour, of Montreal; H. Grasett Baldwin, Dr. Dewart, Dr. Gregg, Canon Sanson, Charles Duff, Robert Wallace, W. S. Blackstock, John Burton, Dr. Barrass, J. M. Cameron, Bernard Bryan, J. G. Manly, Alex. Gilray, Geo. M. Milligan, with Messieurs J. K. Macdonald, J. G. Scott, Q.C.; John C. Copp, W.B. Geikie, M.D.; David Higgins, James Brown, A. T. Crombie, James Scott, Ignatius Cockshutt, of Brantford; J. W. Bickle, of Hamilton; James Fraser, G. W. Wood, James McNab, R. Gilmour, Geo. S. Spence, J. J. Woodhouse, C. J. Page, Principal MacMurchy, R. W. Doan, J. D. Nasmith, John Harvie, etc.

The meeting was opened by singing the hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." After which the Revd. H. Grasett Baldwin read a portion of Scripture and led in prayer. The Chairman then arose and addressed the meeting as follows:—

MY CHRISTIAN FRIENDS,—

It is my privilege as President of the Bible Society, to meet you once again on our Anniversary, and to bid you all a hearty welcome.

Last year I was unavoidably prevented from being present at our annual meeting, and I cannot help recalling on this occasion the honoured name of one of our Vice-Presidents, since called to his rest, who took the chair in my absence, the late Sir Daniel Wilson.

Sir Daniel's great literary abilities, and his distinguished career in connection with the University over which he so long presided, are well known to all; but apart from these, he has left behind him the memory of one who was a devout lover of the Bible and the zealous friend and promoter both of the Bible cause and of every Christian and benevolent work.

We have also to regret the loss of two other of our Vice-Presidents, the Rev. T. S. Ellerby and Mr. Herbert Mortimer. The latter, especially, was a constant attendant at our meetings, even when nearly total blindness and increasing weakness would, under similar circumstances, have deterred most men from making the exertion.

I trust that our meeting this evening will be both interesting and profitable. We shall have the pleasure of being addressed by warm friends of the Bible cause, some of whom have come from a distance to speak to us to-night, and I shall not therefore occupy your time at any length, but shall touch briefly upon one or two points which I desire to bring before you.

And first, I rejoice to be able to tell you, in the words of the Annual Report, that the work of the Society has been extended, and that the revenue is in advance of any previous year in the history of the Society.

Seventeen new branches have been organized, and the total number now in connection with the Society in Ontario, Manitoba, the North-West and British Columbia, is 567.

The number of copies of the Scriptures issued from the Depository has not been so large as in the previous year, but the Colporteurs of the Society have sold and circulated nearly 500 copies more than last year—the total circulation through their agency having been 6,725 copies.

Of these faithful workers, one has been labouring in the counties of Grey and Bruce, another in Addington and Frontenac, another in parts of Simcoe and Victoria, and one in the Muskoka and Parry Sound District. In the latter district more especially, the work of the Colporteur involves not a little hardship and exposure in reaching the distant dwellings of scattered settlers, or the shanties of the lumbermen. In Manitoba and the North-West, four Colporteurs have been at work during the past year: one through the Red River district, another in Assiniboia, another along the lines of the Souris district, and one in the Mennonite settlement in the neighbourhood of Gretna. The work has not been carried on without experiencing many difficulties and some opposition, but in the words of the Report, "The good seed is being scattered broadcast—let us pray that it may fall into good ground and bring forth much fruit, to the glory of God and the salvation of many souls." I think you will see from the extracts I have quoted that the past year has been upon the whole, one of progress, and I trust that we may look forward to still larger results in the coming year, and to a wider support from all who love the Bible. The aim of the Directors has always been to make the Board of the Society as representative as possible; to interest in its work, without distinction as to Church or denomination, all who desire to spread the knowledge of God's holy word, and by united and friendly counsel, to render the Upper Canada Bible Society a still more efficient helper with the great Parent Society in the glorious work of Bible circulation. Suffer me now to allude very briefly to the strong claims of the Bible Society for an earnest, hearty and generous support from all who value the Bible, no matter what religious body they may belong to—and when I say the Bible Society, you will understand that I am not speaking of the Upper Canada Bible Society *alone* but I am including also the great Parent Society, the British and Foreign Bible Society, of which we are the largest Auxiliary, and in whose world-wide work it is our great privilege to bear a part. Of that great Parent Society it has been truly said that it is a National Society.

I was much struck with some remarks as to the national character of the Society, made by H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, in a speech delivered by him as chairman of a meeting of a branch of the Bible Society, at Portsmouth; and here in passing may I not say that we rejoice to see the son of that gracious Sovereign, who declared that in the possession of the Bible and its teaching, lay

the true secret of England's greatness, showing as the Duke of Connaught has so repeatedly done, his deep interest in the circulation of the same Holy Book. To quote then a few sentences from H.R. Highness's speech, he said, "I look upon the Bible Society as a thoroughly national Institution. We all know and delight to know that we are not only the pioneers throughout the world in commercial undertakings, in all naval and military matters, but we are pioneers, too, in the great Christian Mission of the Bible Society. It has been the pride, and I hope it will ever continue to be so, of our people, that as soon as a new territory is discovered, as soon as the very first forms of government are erected, immediately follow the missionaries, and these bring with them *the Bible*. The result has been, that in some of the darkest parts of the darkest continent, the Bible is now to be found. Wherever it is possible for men to force their way by any means in their power, on foot or by water, through morasses or over mountains, you will find those who are the colporteurs of this great Society pushing their work to the utmost." Shall we not earnestly pray that this may ever continue to be the National Policy of Protestant England, that in all her acquisitions of territory, or the opening up of new lands to her trade and commerce, the Bible and the missionary may be the *first* to find entrance there. And now my friends, in this work of sending forth the word of God into all lands, we surely have the very strongest argument for claiming the united and generous support of all Christians on behalf of the Bible Society.

Who is not familiar with those words of the prophet, "How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of Him who bringeth good tidings, that publisheth peace, that bringeth good tidings of good, that publisheth salvation." Yet not so many years ago, and but for the work of the Bible Society, it might have been asked, how are these glad tidings of good things to reach the ears of the many heathen nations of the earth, unless the Pentecostal miracle should in some measure be repeated, and these heathen tribes should be able to hear, every man in his own tongue, the wonderful message of God's love. Praised be God's Holy name! Through his blessing upon the labours of devoted men, and the ability which he has vouchsafed to them, the gift of tongues may be said in some sense to have been renewed, and in the marvellous number of translations of God's Holy Book issued by the Bible Society, the message of Salvation has been conveyed to thousands who would never otherwise have received the glad tidings of the Gospel of Peace.

In the closing words of the Report of the Parent Society just issued the time foretold in ancient prophecy, when all *Peoples* shall become obedient to the Son of Man, seems still distant, but the Bible Society has been privileged to bring sensibly nearer the period when all *Languages* shall serve him.

May I not say then, in the words of a prelate of my own Church, that the Bible Society has been "The hand-maid of almost all the Missionary Associations throughout the world, to whatever Church or country they belong, and can therefore justly claim the support of all Christian bodies, without distinction, who avail themselves of its work." And in regard more especially to the Missions



of the Church of England, I should like to refer to some words of the Bishop of Durham, in a sermon preached by him at St. Paul's Cathedral, on one of the Anniversaries of the Society. The Bishop said, "I cannot help thinking that for the most part, members of my own Church don't realize the extent of the debt, which Missions owe to the British and Foreign Bible Society. Take the four great Societies of the Anglican Church: first, the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel; it uses Scriptures in some thirty-five foreign languages, and twenty of them are procurable from no other source than the Bible Society. Take the Church Missionary Society; it uses the Bible or some parts of it in sixty different translations, all of which, or nearly all, are practically supplied by the Bible Society. Then with regard to the Universities' Mission to Central Africa, the history of the publication of the Swahili translation of the Scriptures so widely circulated in Africa is well known. *That* is entirely due to the generosity of the Bible Society. Or if we turn to the very extremity of South America, the only translation into the dialect of the inhabitants of Terra del Fuego has been published by the Bible Society. In other words, all the Missionary Societies of the English Church are very largely, and in some cases, exclusively dependant upon the Bible Society for the Scriptures which they use." I might go on to instance the obligations which the Church of England Zenana Society is under to the Bible Society for assistance in the work of the Bible-women. But I think I may content myself with repeating Bishop Westcott's closing words, "If the members of the Anglican Church fail to support the Society most generously by their sympathy and advocacy, it can only be from not thoroughly understanding the largeness of the debt they owe to it." Great, however, as are the claims of the Bible Society for a generous and united support, when we regard what it has done, and is doing for the Missions to the Heathen, it surely has equally strong claims upon us all when we remember the labours of its Colporteurs among the various civilized nations of the world, by which the living Word has been brought to many a household inaccessible to the living teacher. Look at what is being done in this way all over the continent of Europe—in France, in Spain, in Italy. How many poor souls have had light and happiness brought to them by the perusal of that blessed Book which had hitherto never been within their reach, and shall we not *all* desire to help in so glorious a work.

My friends, we have heard a great deal said about *Christian Unity* lately, and undoubtedly, the desire for a closer union has been steadily growing among the various Christian bodies, though as yet its accomplishment, surrounded as it is with many difficulties, may not be very near; but it seems to me, that in this duty of bringing the Bible home to all men, of bringing it within the reach of all who do not possess it, whether in other countries or in our own land, we have a great and glorious bond of union which may and should unite us *all* together. And surely there never has been a period in the world's history, in which all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity are more urgently called upon to assist in spreading abroad the knowledge of that blessed Book, whose teaching when received into the heart, can alone drive out that spirit of unrest and lawlessness

which seems to have taken possession of so many of our fellow men in all parts of the world, which can alone effectually counteract that greed of wealth and making haste to be rich, regardless of the methods by which it is accomplished, alas! too characteristic of our day and generation, even in this our own land; and which can alone preserve among our people that purity of heart and life, and those principles of uprightness and honesty, which exalt and enoble a nation.

The adoption of the Annual Report (an abstract of which had been printed and distributed among the audience) and the election of Officers and Directors for the ensuing year was moved by Mr. John K. Macdonald, a Vice-President of the Society, who made a vigorous speech, which we regret was not reported. The motion was seconded by Mr. John C. Copp, and adopted.

The hymn, "How Precious is the Book Divine," was then sung by the audience, after which the Rev. Dr. Barbour, Principal of the Congregational College, at Montreal, moved the following resolution, "That we hear with pleasure of the increased demands on the Parent Society for the Bible in many tongues, and in an age of testing and trial, we congratulate the friends of the Sacred Volume on the continued evidence from Providence of the truth of God's declaration that 'The Scripture cannot be broken'." In support of the resolution Principal Barbour spoke as follows:—

Like every other book, the Bible has its own peculiarities. Unless it is to act as a miraculous charm, and not as a book of truth, in order to profit by its contents, these contents must not only be read, but searched, and pondered, and explained. Above all they must be taken in their *spirit* rather than in their *letter*, as certain of our Lord's declarations make clear.

There is an urgent call, at present, on the lovers of the Bible, that they insist unto reiteration, upon such an examination of its contents as may secure for it the same fairness granted to other books. We should not claim for the Bible what it never promised to produce. Certainly, a spiritual effect upon rational beings, without their own free and personal consent, it never promised to produce. To claim that the Bible has the power to gain the soul, by a simple utterance of its words, apart from the conveyance of its truths, *in the meaning of them*, is to treat it as a book whose power is in its body, or letter, rather than in its spirit.

But, without farther delay, let me state my intention to show, from the contents of the Scriptures, in what way their teachings are mainly to be understood. Holding firmly by the divine authorship of the Scriptures, and being without doubt on their inspiration, more accurately the inspiration of those who record them, we the more desire to see fair play given to whatever peculiarities they may exhibit in their commendation of themselves to our attention.

In so far as we can understand it, the Bible is a book, teaching what it professes to teach, namely, by *principles*, instead of by *rules*.

These principles are set before us in various ways; some of them are rivetted into the mind by statements of a contradictory character; at times by injunctions of an impossible nature, likely, that we may see, that it is the *principle* of an action which is binding, and not merely the *letter* which enjoins it.

Take the striking metaphors in the Saviour's remark on the inconsistency of those under his rebukes, "ye strain *at*, or strain *out*, the gnat, and ye swallow the camel." How can such a rebuke be understood, unless the speaker has the liberty to convey a pungent thought in a striking way, in common with all who have the liberty of *speech in figures*, as well as in *words*.

But let us look at some instances in which solid and serious instruction is given, where the meaning cannot be justly determined by the mere *words*. Read Matthew v., 39: Ye have heard that it was said, "An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth; but I say unto you, resist not him who is evil; but whosoever smiteth thee on the right cheek, turn to him the other also." To see that this is not to be literally obeyed, in other words, that it is not a *rule of action*, but a *principle of conduct*, read John xviii., 22: And when Jesus said this, one of the officers standing by struck Jesus with his hand saying, "Answerest thou the High Priest so?" Jesus answered him; "If I have done evil, bear witness of the evil; but if well, why smitest thou me?" Here Jesus breaks his own rule, if it is a *rule*, or law, that one is not only to take any kind of abuse without remonstrance, but offer to take more! But he did not break His own principle of conduct, in this firm and dignified assertion of His righteousness. Under the old exaction of eye for eye, tooth for tooth, blow for blow, or by the Pharisaic interpretation of it, He might have struck that man back. But, He shows the Christian spirit, and instead of letting forth His righteous vengeance on the wrong-doer, He presses for the truth of the case; thereby intimating that if He ought to be struck, He will give the other cheek to the smiter, provided witness be borne to the righteousness of the smiting.

The plain fact is this, that in the sermon on the Mount, our Lord is laying down the principle of the loving spirit, as opposed to the law of vindictive retaliation; and he who interprets the strong forms in which he presents the entireness of their difference, by the bare letter of the statement, shows that he is like those ancient Pharisees still tithing the "mint and cummin" of the words, to the neglect of the weightier matter of their spiritual contents. And, in commending, by implication, the wise virgins for not giving of their oil to the foolish, our Lord, in a manner favors the breaking of the maxium on borrowing, in which He says to the exacting Jews, that they should lend to everybody asking a loan. But, there is no such contradiction in His teaching; for the *spirit* of the injunction evidently, is: "Change your whole mode of doing business, and instead of hard bargain-driving, and cruel usuries, let the distressed trader have a loan as a matter of kindness and compassion." To put *that*, as a *law*, *literally* in force, would kill commerce and all kindness; but to let the *spirit* of it reign, is to give life to both the impoverished and those who assist them.

And, in this view of the matter, we are confirmed, by our Lord's use of parables, or parallels of speech—not so much to convey ideas, as to evoke those already in the mind, and thus to secure, if not intellectual judgments, moral sympathies. In the parables, He uttered things "hidden from the foundation of the world"—that is, what was already in the heart of man, but covered up by the things of this world.

But, let me present a case of another sort, in which our Lord, in laying down certain duties, *changed certain exact and literal commands into their opposite*, on account of changes in circumstances.

We read in Mathew's Gospel, tenth chapter: "Go not into any way of the Gentiles, and enter not into any city of the Samaritans; but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. . . . and as ye go preach. . . . Get, [or provide you] no gold, nor silver, nor brass in your purses; no wallet for your journey; neither two coats, nor shoes, nor staff, for the labourer is worthy of his food."

This, we are to observe, was at the outset of their mission. They are to begin with their own people; and show the meek and lowly ways of the new kingdom, among those expecting a great worldly display when the Messiah shall come. That kingdom is "near," "at hand," without parade or show, as the people are to see, in the meek and lowly life of its first subjects. Hence the wisdom and force of such a beginning, for a kingdom not of this world.

But those first things did not serve for any length of time; and, so, we soon find Christ himself preaching to a Samaritan; and going into a city of the

Samaritans, to teach of Himself, and his Messiahship. Eventually, He sent His disciples into all the world, to preach the gospel to every creature.

And, to farther see his change of instructions, let us read Luke xxii, 35 and 37 verses: And he said unto them: "When I sent you without purse and wallet, lacked ye anything?" And they said: "Nothing." And he said unto them: "But, now, he that hath a purse let him take it, and likewise a wallet; and he that hath none, let him sell his cloak, and buy a sword."

The times have changed, and His instructions change with them. Troublesome events are pending, so wise and prudent precautions are taken for personal safety. A better instance it would be hard to quote, to show that not *rules* exclusively, but *principles* are our Lord's means for the building up of His cause. Those who think they must live by the *letter* of such diverse instructions, have their life's work before them, to get such varying *words* harmonized. "Cast-iron statutes," as we sometimes call our legal inflexibilities, must, at times, give way to the spirit of law in the rulings of a judge; much more, then, must the words conveying an outward direction give way to the direction itself, in its life and spirit.

Let me pass next to another sphere of Scriptural thought. Look, for a minute, at the *composition* of the Scriptures, regarding which, so much is said at the present day.

Always, there will be great interest in this matter, by minds of the thoughtful order. And it is well, perhaps, that there is difficulty connected with it; for were there no difficulty in settling how the *word of God* has come to us, in the writings of men, it would show either a perpetual miracle, of such vastness as to paralyse the human powers in their attempt to discover the process of revelation; or it would show a fatal indifference, on our part, as to *where*, and *when*, and *how* the heavenly communications were made. Our Lord commends a *searching* of Scripture, in order to have a knowledge of its contents. And it is our duty to go as far as we can in ascertaining how those contents have their present form.

We must all acknowledge the importance of this inquiry. If God is pleased to give us a written word for our guidance, does it come to us miraculously written by God Himself, or does He send it to us by our fellowmen, through the ordinary channels of our common thought and speech. And it is because the latter *is* the way, that difficulties arise regarding the forms of expression used by the sacred writers.

What we ask for here, is what they are constantly asking for themselves, namely, that while they have inspired truths to deliver, more accurately while they are men inspired to deliver truth from God, they are to be accorded the liberty of other writers—to set down these truths as they come into their own thoughts, and to express them in their own ways of expression.

That this they do, I think can be shown. And if I begin to show it by a very little thing, it is that we may be helped to settle a very great principle. Take Matthew x. 29: 'Are not two sparrows sold for a farthing? and one of them shall not fall to the ground without your Father.'

Read along with this, Luke xii, 6, 'Are not five sparrows sold for two farthings? and not one of them is forgotten before God.'

Both writers follow up their statements with the reference to the counting of the hairs of the head. Now, observe, here is an identical thought, but detailed in different ways. Matthew says sparrows are worth two for a farthing: Luke says they cost less—five for two farthings, or two and a-half for a farthing. They tell precisely the same truth, but they differ incidentally, in their estimates of cheapness—by half a sparrow's value, they vary in their quotations of the sparrow-market's prices.

Further, Matthew says not one of these little birds falls to the ground without the divine *will*. Luke says not one of them slips out of the divine *memory*.

Am I to throw up the grand thought of God in the minuteness of His care

taught in these Scriptures, because of these incidental differences in the forms of its conveyance?

What, then, must be allowed in the literary construction of the Bible? Simply what is here claimed—that each writer shall be free to detail his thought of God as it comes to him—detail it as *he* best can detail it, to the best of his knowledge and belief, and to the best of his ability as a writer. To spend days and years in getting the differences in the price current of the sparrow-market equalized, or the *will* and the *memory* of the divine Father philosophically adjusted to the care of created beings, before the message shall be received in the grand features of its divinity and power, is to act as like as we can act, to those fanatics of the letter whom our Lord rebuked for their scruples over non-essentials, to the missing of the weightier matters of law and judgment.

And it is here we stand, while claiming the inspiration of the Holy Scriptures, rather of the *men* who wrote them, we claim that the details of their composition have the same freedom allowed to those, who, having valuable thoughts to convey, set them forth as they are commanded to *them*, in a manner peculiar to themselves. The moment this claim is admitted, hosts of so-called discrepancies vanish from the Bible, while the sum and centre of its truth remains. Isaiah's pictures of the redemption are those of a mighty Rescuer coming to take his people out of the destroyer's power. John reveals God as Light and Love, a Father of spirits. Christian discipleship implies, indeed demands, a being born over again in the new life of love, the life of Heaven. Paul, the trained jurist, is all aglow with God under forms of law and justice; the forensic conception of the divine government is Paul's—bondage, freedom, reconciliation, righteousness, holiness, redemption by atonement and forgiveness are his specialties. Matthew, a custom-house clerk, details his gospel 'according to' the manner of a manager of details. Mark, a non-professional man of the world, relates things as they strike a by-stander. Luke, the man of culture, writes with the precision and polish of the Christian gentleman; while John, the one imbibing most fully of the spirit of the Master, writes as like to what we conceive would have been the style of the Master had He recorded his own ideas of the better life.

Without a mental miracle it would seem as if Jude could not any more write like John than could Amos, the converted herdsman, prophesy like Isaiah; or, to give a modern instance, than John Bunyan could write like Dean Stanley. But, was Bunyan less a Christian because he could not round his periods like the Oxford scholar? Or, was the graceful Stanley less a Christian, because he could not show the rugged pith of Bunyan? Were not both their pens guided by the same SPIRIT; in defence of the same faith; for the glory of the same Lord; prevailed by the same baptism? Granting, then, that Mark, in his Gospel, reports Christ as *excepting* a staff, to those sent out under the general order not to *provide* staves, there is no contradiction to a general order in an incidental exception under it. Perhaps, is the happy thought of a veteran expositor, our Lord saw some lame brother who already had a staff, and added 'Perhaps a staff.' Such a notice does not make Mark's Gospel untrue, nor interfere with the trustworthiness of Matthew's Gospel in its main details.

Granting that John says the disciples once rowed on the lake *about* twenty-five or thirty furlongs, and that Bethany was about fifteen furlongs from Jerusalem, what else was he to say, if the exact distances in rods, feet and inches were not in his mind at the time. Are we to deny the divine element in his Gospel, because the exact and literal representation of those distances is not given?

Again, Mathew tells us, in the parable of the wicked husbandmen, that when our Lord said: 'What will the Lord of the vineyard do to those husbandmen?' The *people* said: 'He will miserably destroy those wicked men.' Mark tells us our Lord said so himself: 'He will miserably destroy those wicked men.'

Luke, in giving the parable, says, that when our Lord asked and answered the question, the people said: 'God Forbid!'

Now, any one who reads in different morning journals, reports of the same occurrence, or who has heard in a case in court, evidence sworn to, involving different accounts of the same event, knows that all three of the evangelists are reporting the exact and literal truth, only detailing what may have struck them as important at the time. The speaker details the parable, asks the question, answers it himself, a part of the people respond, muttering after him, 'Yes, he will miserably destroy those wicked men'; while a few are heard to add: 'God Forbid!'

When such variations in details are quoted against the Bible's accuracy and trustworthiness as written by inspired men, it will be time enough to speak of giving it up, when something utterly irreconcilable with its one grand aim, and pervading spirit, is adduced. And even then, *that* could hardly be counted fair treatment of a valuable book, to reject it because of something in it we are unable to explain. And in the Bible there are many things we cannot explain. For all that the able commentators have done in recent years, there are passages in the Bible on which the most reverent and truthful minds are divided. But, shall we hold that what is not in our knowledge never was in anybody's knowledge, or never is to be in anybody's knowledge? That be far from us.

Take such a simple matter as the Apostle's remark upon the mode of dress while at prayer by the women in Corinth. He says that a woman should not pray nor prophesy with her head unveiled, because by so doing she will dishonor her head; and in the same connection, that she ought to have a sign of authority on her head, because of the angels. I speak for many wiser than myself in saying that the meaning of this is not in our knowledge. Conjectures by the score may be had concerning it, and if suppositions could be taken for explanations all difficulty over its meaning might be at an end; but who among the many learned in the manners and customs of the Greeks, can set forth a meaning that may end all surmise on the subject? But the Corinthians knew what Paul meant when they read his letter; and we can be saved without any precise knowledge of how, and for what reason, the Corinthian women wore their veils. He must have but a slight hold of the Bible who purposes to give it up because at a certain stage in his culture he does not see how certain parts of it are to be explained.

Several explanations have been offered of that passage in Galatians: 'Now a mediator is not a mediator of one; but God is one.' And who until this day has so explained 'the spirits in prison' as to satisfy the average intellect upon Peter's reference to them.

Perhaps at this point it may be asked: 'How, then, are we to be sure that we have the true message of salvation?' If it comes through human minds, and if those minds have peculiarities that may interfere with the lucidity of their expression, how are we to be sure that we have the very Word of God on which we are to stake our salvation? An important question, and one deserving a fuller answer than can be given to-night. But, in brief, we may say: 'We know it just as we know of a surety of any other important truth which is the subject of testimony.' About the main intent of the Bible, there can be no debate. Nor is there any; even as there is none upon the main intent of our common law. By what authority do we protect and honor certain men, while by the same authority we arrest, imprison, and sometimes put other men to death? 'By the law' it is said: 'the law written in the records of the nation.' But whence this law, and how about the record of it; who enacted it; recorded it, who sustains it? And how do we know we have the law as originally enacted, and recorded in the law-books? Our fore-fathers enacted it, we say, with evidence within itself that it is authoritative law; and intervening generations have treated it as authoritative, have sustained it, and handed it down to us; and

we live by it as thus conveyed, because we continue to study its own declarations of authority; because, we continue to test it as a true and good authority for the common weal.

There seems to be no other way to live in any department of our being; and he who lives on what professes to be from men, without scruple, and yet hesitates to live on what not only professes but proves itself to be from God, is not far from the suggestion of the scripture, that there are those who respect with a scrupulous nicety some comparatively small affairs and let the most momentous concerns in life pass without their sanction.

'He that hath an ear to hear' of the tithing of the mint and cummin, and of the neglect of the weightier matters of law and judgment, let him hear!

And so, in closing, let it be borne in mind that the Bible can be aided by such an intelligent fairness as I have asked for to-night, as well as by a devout adherence to its precepts on the one hand, and by your material contributions on the other.
