MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS
OF THE
FIFTH NIAGARA CONFERENCE
OF
THE METHODIST CHURCH,

Held in the Town of Norwich, from June 6th to June 12th, 1888.

THE CONFERENCE began its FIFTH SESSION on Wednesday, June 6th, 1888, at 9 a.m., in the Methodist Church, Norwich, the Rev. D. L. BRETHOUR, Ph.B., President, in the chair. The Conference prayer-meeting was held from 9 a.m. till 10 a.m.

At 10 a.m., Rev. A. CARMAN, D.D., Senior General Superintendent, took the chair.

After reading Psalm xxv. and Matt. xiv., Rev. D. L. BRETHOUR, Ph.B., President, led in prayer.

The roll being called by the Secretary, one hundred and ten ministers and forty-eight laymen answered to their names.

The first draft of Stations was laid on the table by the Rev. J. S. Ross M.A., Secretary of the Stationing Committee, and received as read.

QUESTION IV.—Are there any objections to any of our Ministers or Probationers for the Ministry?

ANSWER:

REPORT OF THE ACTION OF THE SPECIAL MINISTERIAL SESSIONS.

Rev. A. L. Gee.

This was an appeal from the findings of a Committee of Trial which fully acquitted Bro. Gee.

Moved by Rev. J. H. Collins, seconded by Rev. J. H. Kennedy, that having heard all the evidence adduced in the Appeal Case of Teeter *vs.* Gee, this Conference sustains the findings of the Committee, and that Rev. A. L. Gee's character do now pass. Carried.

Rev. C. O. Johnson.

This was a case charging Mr. Johnson with falsehood.

Rev. C. O. Johnson then made a statement, accepting the findings of the Committee, with certain modifications, and submitting to the godly judgment of his brethren.

The Committee appointed to try this case do not report the charges of falsehood fully sustained, but the Committee find him guilty of "highly reprehensible" conduct, also of a careless use of language, which they regard as "highly censurable," and of "careless, uncandid, and misleading language;" and further, that Bro. Cleaver, from his knowledge of the facts and circumstances, was in duty bound, under discipline (sec. 215), to lay a charge, and

Resolved,—That Rev. C. O. Johnson be reprovved by the President of the ensuing Niagara Annual Conference, before a special meeting of the ministerial members of the Hamilton District, to be convened at the call of the President of Conference.

The Secretary of the Committee read the charges and findings of the Committee.

Moved by Rev. A. E. Russ, M.A., seconded by Rev. Jas. E. Dyer,—That the findings of the Committee be adopted.

Moved by Rev. C. Cookman, seconded by Rev. O. G. Collamore, in amend-

ment,—That in view of the statement just made by Rev. C. O. Johnson, this Conference do now pass his character.

Moved in amendment to the amendment by Rev. D. L. Brethour, seconded by Rev. John Wakefield,—That the President's reproof, as recommended by the Committee, be omitted and the following substituted: "And that Bro. Johnson be required to make confession, in writing, to the President of the Conference, of the wrong in matters on which he was found guilty by the Committee in his case, and such confession to be read before the Conference by the President."

The amendment to the amendment was then put, and carried by a large majority.

At a subsequent session a letter was read from Mr. Johnson, which was ruled not to be in harmony with the resolution of the previous session.

The Secretary appealed from the ruling of the chair.

The Conference sustained the ruling almost unanimously.

At the Monday morning session, the following letter was presented by Mr. Johnson:

Rev. W. J. MAXWELL, *President of Conference*:

DEAR BRO.,—I hereby acknowledge that the findings of the Committee of trial in my case are correct and true in their statement of matter of fact, circumstances and language, and confess that in the matters of which the Committee has adjudged me guilty and censurable, I did and said what was wrong and highly reprehensible, and for these things now express my sorrow. I deeply regret that I was guilty, as the Committee states, of using careless, uncandid, and misleading language, and accept, as deserved by me, the censure of the Committee and the Conference therefor.

The Conference accepted the same as satisfactory.

Moved by Rev. C. Cookman, seconded by Rev. J. S. Williamson,—That the character of Bro. Johnson do now pass. Carried.

Rev. Benjamin Longley, B.A.

The case consisted of charges preferred by a Committee of the Toronto District against Rev. B. Longley of conduct unworthy a Christian minister, and with indulging in acts expressly forbidden in the Word of God, in violation of his ordination vows, and to the great scandal of the Church, and more especially that he did attempt to deceive an unmarried woman, and lead her into improper relations with himself.

The Committee appointed to try this case returned the following verdict:

Resolved unanimously that Rev. Benjamin Longley, B.A., be and is hereby suspended till the approaching Annual Conference; moreover, we recommend that he be deposed from the ministry of the Methodist Church.

The appeal for a new trial was withdrawn on behalf of Mr. Longley by Rev. Mr. Stafford, who acted in his behalf.

All the documents relating to the case were laid upon the table by Rev. Jas. Gray, and were read to the Conference.

The Toronto District Meeting adopted the findings of the Committee, and referred the whole case to this Conference.

After much debate the motion to adopt the recommendation of the Toronto District was lost, and the following carried:

Moved by Rev. R. W. Woodsworth, seconded by Rev. W. H. Laird, and,

Resolved,—That, having heard all the evidence in the case of Rev. Benjamin Longley, we deeply deplore the glaring inconsistency, and sinful folly of his conduct, and hereby adjudge that he be suspended from the ministry of the Methodist Church for a period of one year; and we earnestly pray that the fruits of a repentance, which we are glad to recognize as sincere and genuine, may henceforth be manifest in a consistent and holy life." Carried. Yeas 56, nays 40.

ANSWER :

REPORT OF THE STATISTICAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on Statistics beg leave to present the following summary of the returns:—

1. The present membership is: on trial, 1,378; full membership, 24,084. Total, 25,462, an increase of 735. There were received on trial during the year, 3,035; removals by death, withdrawal, dropping or expulsion, numbered 1,562. Baptisms, 1,620. Marriages, 844.

2. Quarterly Official Boards are composed as follows: Ministers—Probationers, 10; effective, 111; superannuated, 30; supernumerary, 4. Total, 155. Local preachers, 198; exhorters, 65; class-leaders, 879; stewards, 768; representatives, 827; Sunday-school superintendents, 285. Net total of officary, 2,740.

5. Amount raised for ministerial support by Circuits, \$81,046.21; increase, \$734.47; Circuit deficiencies, \$4,031.68, being \$1,364.34 less than last year. Ministerial support from all sources, \$83,752.21; net deficiency, \$1,963.68, being an average of \$78 for each of the twenty-five brethren who suffer from the deficiencies. There are ten deficiencies, ranging from \$100 to \$217.

6. Grand total for all purposes, \$238,711.73.

Your Committee, while gladly recognizing a marked improvement in the preparation and accuracy of the District books, as the result of the District Committee of Audit, appointed in accordance with last year's recommendation, in most of the Districts, have still to complain that the books of some of the Districts were so incorrect and incomplete in their records that numerous and serious changes have been made therein since they were handed to this Committee, thereby seriously delaying and inconveniencing the Committee in its work.

Your Committee make the following recommendations:

1. That greater painstaking should be exercised in the preparation of the Circuit schedules, to secure correctness and harmony of figures.

2. That Chairmen of Districts should insist that schedules be filled out in all details before being presented to the District Meeting, and espe-

cially that the Missionary Fund column should be closed up in time to permit the District Committee of Audit to certify to the correctness of the whole returns.

3. District Secretaries should see that all errors in Circuit schedules are corrected.

4. That the financial Secretary and one other member of the District be appointed a committee to audit and certify to the correctness of the District books.

5. In regard to the resolution of the Hamilton District Meeting recommending that "all other purposes" in Circuit schedules be changed so as to show the particulars of this amount, we recommend that this Conference recommend the General Conference to make the change asked for.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee on Temperance have carefully considered the matters submitted to them by the Conference, and have also diligently surveyed the present aspect of the question throughout the country and the relation of the Methodist Church thereto.

We rejoice that from the beginning of the operations of the Methodist Church, Conferences have taken strong ground in opposition to the traffic in intoxicating liquors, and we desire to re-affirm all our strongest statements in opposition to the traffic as being the most potent form of evil against which our ministers and people are compelled to contend in the daily prosecution of their Christian work.

At this time the subject presents to us such a phase as demands our careful consideration.

While we regret the recent Scott Act defeats, yet we are assured that there is no great occasion for surprise, when we take into consideration the refusal of the Dominion Government to give the necessary amendments for the more effectual working of the Act; the unfriendliness manifested by many of the license commissioners and inspectors appointed by the License Department of the Provincial Government to enforce the Act, the combination of county officials, lawyers and politicians, as also of town councils in many places, to support the men engaged in the traffic in their defiance of the law; and above all the failure of temperance people to unite in one solid political vote to sustain their principles.

We recommend that our people use all their influence to introduce temperance text-books in every school section, that the young may have these principles instilled in their minds, and grow up with some knowledge of the baneful effects of alcohol.

That although we are securing laws which have for their end the legal suppression of the traffic, yet we are not to fail in using the old weapon of persuasion until such time that we shall have this traffic prohibited.

That we oppose strongly the system which licenses men to deal in that which brutalizes and degrades manhood, and whose end is drunkard-making.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee having examined the District schedules, have much pleasure in reporting an increase in the number of scholars of 768, the total attendance being 23,984, and the average 16,287.

2. Your Committee are glad to report 970 conversions during the year, an increase of 200 over last year.

3. There is an increase of 891 subscribers to *Pleasant Hours*, 713 to *Home and School*, and 865 to *Sunbeam*.

4. The sum of \$2,828.63 has been raised for Missions. No missionary report has been received from Woodstock or Welland District; without these there is an increase of \$2.71.

5. There has been raised for school purposes, \$12,434.11.

6. For Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund, \$227.06; an increase of \$15.99.

7. There is an increase of 16 schools using uniform lessons, and an increase of 18 schools opened during the whole year.

8. That Rev. Geo. Clark be appointed Secretary-Treasurer for the coming year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee on Sabbath Observance beg to report as follows:—

We are glad to note that the Christian public are awake to the necessity of earnest effort being used to bring about a better observance of the Lord's Day. This is evidenced by the fact that all the Churches are speaking out in behalf of this matter. On the other hand, we are pained to note the gross laxity that prevails so widely concerning the law govern-

ing the Sabbath day, and enter our strong remonstrance against any encroachment on the sanctity of the holy Sabbath.

We reiterate our protest of last year against railroad traffic, and running excursions by rail or boat, and urge all Christian people to positively avoid travel on the Sabbath.

In view of the fact that much Sabbath desecration arises out of the open gates at the various camp and park associations, where Sabbath services are held, we respectfully, but urgently, recommend the directors of such summer resorts to keep the gates of their parks closed on the Lord's Day. And, further, having learned that, in some instances, cigars, summer drinks, confections and edibles, are exposed for sale, contrary to law, we most strongly and positively protest against this desecration of the holy Sabbath day; and recommend that the Conference direct the Secretary to send a copy of this report to the presidents of all summer resorts.

We call upon all parents to teach, both by precept and example, a careful and strict observance of the Sabbath. We recommend that a sermon be preached in all our churches on the first Sunday in October on this important subject, and that this report be read at such service. We further recommend that the Conference comply with the request of the St. Catharines District, and the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto, and appoint a committee to confer with other Christian bodies; said committee to consist of the President of Conference, Rev. W. J. Maxwell, Rev. Geo. Young, D.D., Rev. D. L. Brethour, His Honor Judge Jones, T. C. Watkins, Esq., and J. H. Beatty, Esq.

REPORT OF THE WESLEYAN LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

The Directors of the Wesleyan Ladies' College would greet the members of the Toronto Conference.

The College cannot come now, as it did for years—alone, as the only Ladies' College in the Dominion, that had a regular curriculum followed by a degree. Indeed, it was one of the first in the world that aimed so high or claimed so much for women. Nor can it now come as the only one in our own Church, for they have so multiplied that the competition for patronage is as keen as in any commercial calling.

We come, as usual, to greet you, and to assure you of our sympathy and co-operation in your great work. Ours differs from yours, but it is both preparatory and auxiliary to it.

Our course of study, as you will see from our catalogue, is both broad and practical. The mastery of it will imply a familiarity with the leading lines of culture of the present day. We are satisfied that if the graduates of the Literary Course had a fair equivalent allowed for the extra work they had done in Music and Art, their work would be found fully equal to that required for the ordinary B.A. An equitable system of education would make such allowance.

But we believe that the study of the Scriptures should run all through a Christian education. In the preparatory year our junior pupils become familiar with the Gospel by Matthew. In the Academic year they take the Acts of the Apostles, thus finishing New Testament history. In the College Course begins a closer study of the Scriptures, their history, chronology, authorship, etc. In the first year, to the Psalms; in the second, through the Old Testament; in the third year, the history, chronology and authorship of the New Testament, and in the senior year, Biblical MSS., the Canon, versions, etc., will be discussed. We do not know any course, not strictly theological, that gives such an acquaintance with the Scriptures. The course of study embraces Natural Theology, Evidences of Christianity and Ethics. We call your attention to this line of study as cognate to your own work and auxiliary to it.

Our work in Literature, Music and Art is well known, and constantly

growing. Next year will introduce some marked improvements. We have put into our catalogue all that any student can safely carry; more than that would be foolish display. We have graduated over 220 in the full Literary Course. These ladies have played a very important part in the educational interests of our country. A good class will be added this year, and several graduates in Music and Art.

The institution is, as you know, on a strictly self-sustaining basis; it has never asked nor received any Church aid. Its founders intended to save the Church from financial responsibility for woman's education, and thus far the original plan has been followed. We seek not your hard earnings, we ask for your sympathy and good word, so long as we merit it.

Regarding the government and discipline of the College, it may suffice to say that the development of self-respect, and the allowance of a liberal latitude for innocent relaxation, accomplish all that is needed. During the twenty-seven years of its history, no accident or mishap of any kind has befallen any student in attendance.

The saddest part of our report is the announcement of the death of the President of our Board, Dennis Moore, Esq., also of two others of our Board of Directors, Dr. Nelles, and Dr. S. J. Hunter—three of the heaviest losses that Canadian Methodism has ever sustained in one year. Their names were as household words, wide as the Dominion.

According to the estimates of the Financial Committee of the General Conference it will require \$7,500 to meet the claims on the Fund. This, I think, is a moderate estimate in view of the expenses of the past year.

The actual amount received from the Conferences during the year is only \$1,552.33. I am aware that some of the Conferences had paid a large proportion of the collections for the then current year, just before the General Conference, but the collections for the following year should have been paid in before the 31st August. After making all due allowances, the amounts paid by the Conferences during the year were shamefully small.

If this state of things should continue till the close of the Quadrennium there will be no funds to pay the expenses of the delegates to the General Conference of 1890. The officers appointed by the General Conference are forbidden to "disburse more than the amount in hand." The question, therefore, is assuming a serious aspect, and it becomes my duty to lay the facts before the parties interested, at this early date, that they may govern themselves accordingly.

The Fund, at the close of the year, was indebted to the Treasurer \$7,921.70. It is scarcely necessary to say that this state of things cannot be continued. Some provision must be made, evidently at a very early date, to meet the expenses of the Fund. I know of no available method of doing this, unless the Conferences provide in some way for the prompt payment annually of the amounts allotted to them by the Financial Committee of the General Conference.

INTERIM REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE UNION CHURCH RELIEF FUND.

*To the Presidents and Members of the Several Annual Conferences of the
Methodist Church.*

The Report of about nine months' operations for this year is as follows:—307 Circuits have reported \$2,224.88 as collections for the year, averaging about 30 per cent. more per Circuit than last year. The greater portion of this sum has been absorbed in paying interest on appropriations, and the balance, with the sum received from other Circuits to report, will be used in paying the most needy claims in part. As was done last year, a full report will be sent out early in September, which, it is hoped, will be read in all the churches when the contributions are asked for. The Treasurer is giving the best and most careful attention he can command to the administration of this Fund, and earnestly hopes the ministers and members will steadily increase their givings, which, last year, averaged less than four cents per member for the whole Church. May this rate be doubled. Let all the people say, "Amen."

We recommend the following:—

1. That the collections for this Fund be taken up in the month of September.

2. That the objects of the Fund be clearly stated before taking the collection, especially the following points: (a) That necessary Conference expenses and special claims of affliction alone can be considered as legitimate; (b) That the salary of a minister regulates his claim on this Fund—no minister having any claim whose salary amounts to \$800, or over, and even then only in cases of very special affliction; (c) That cases of ordinary expenses for medicine and physician's bills cannot be entertained; (d) That when a Circuit requiring ministerial supply during the year is considered by the Committee abundantly able to pay for the same, the Committee may reduce the claim or rule it out altogether; (e) That the maximum amount allowed for funeral expenses, shall be for adults \$40, and for children \$20.

3. Your Committee would call attention to the fact that our law requires that when Conference collections are taken, all the moneys collected shall be paid to the objects for which the collection is made; and this the more, because it has come to the knowledge of this Committee that some churches have been in the habit of giving only a portion of the amount collected.

4. That the Secretary of Conference for the current year order the necessary supplies for his successor in office.

5. The Treasurer's Report was audited by Rev. Wm. Ames and Mr. Walter McGibbon, and found correct.

6. That Rev. R. W. Woodsworth be Treasurer.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Treasurer's Report for the year ending July 31st, 1887.

In presenting this Report for the consideration of the Board, the Treasurer has pleasure in stating:—

1. That there has been an increase in the Permanent Fund amounting to \$4,244.23.

2. The estimates for the year, which were made with great care, were sufficient to meet the expenditure, and the debt has been considerably reduced. It was the desire of the Treasurer to make these estimates as close as possible, in order to keep the assessments to Circuits down to the lowest possible amounts.

3. The annual income from all sources has fully met the expectations of the Treasurer. Notwithstanding the low rate of interest, there has been an increase realized from this source of \$1,679.29. A part of this increase, however, should have been paid in and accounted for in last year's Report. The Book Room has paid \$6,000 to the Fund, an increase of \$2,000. The several Annual Conferences have paid the amounts in full apportioned to them, with very trifling exceptions, which are very easily explained.

4. The claimants have been paid in full, and the debt, with which we commenced the year, has been reduced \$1,667.25, leaving only a balance of \$1,044.95.

5. On the whole, the working of the new law has been an encouraging success during this, the first year of its existence, and augurs well for the future. I do not claim for it absolute perfection, but it cannot be changed till the next General Conference. As we cannot "mend" it till then, let us, as ministers and laymen, "keep it," and with the improvements that may be made at the next General Conference, it will be a lasting blessing to the Church in all time to come.

REPORT OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND COMMITTEE.

1. 3. That the Financial Secretary of each District be the Treasurer of the District.

4. That the amount received be distributed by a Sustentation Fund Committee, which Committee shall consist of the Chairman of each District and one lay representative elected by the May District Meeting.

5. That the amount received be distributed as equitably as possible among those married ministers who have received less than \$550.

MERRITTON (St. Catharines District).—In regard to the request of the trustees of the Centreville Church, conjointly with the trustees of the Pine Street Church, on the Merritton Circuit, asking permission to sell the two churches respectively, the proceeds to be applied towards the erection of a new church, we recommend that in each case the request be granted.

SWEABORG (Woodstock District).—As it is a request of the trustees of the parsonage property on the Sweaborg Circuit, for permission to transfer one acre of land to the trustee board of the anticipated new church at Sweaborg, we recommend that their request be granted.

PRINCETON.—It being a request of the trustees of Princeton Church for permission to sell the property recently given them by David Grant, Esq., and apply the proceeds to settlement of existing debts on church and parsonage property, we recommend that their request be granted.

LYNEDOCH (Simcoe District).—In compliance with a request from the Lynedoch Circuit, we recommend that permission be given the trustees of the old church to sell the same, and apply the proceeds to the new church.

PORT ROWAN and ST. WILLIAMS.—We also recommend that permission be given the trustees of the Port Rowan parsonage property, and the trustees of the St. Williams parsonage property, to sell the said properties and apply the proceeds in each case towards the building of a new parsonage in a more suitable place.

HAGERSVILLE CIRCUIT.—Your Committee on the matter of the sale of Garnet Church, Hagersville Circuit, recommend that the trustees have the permission of Conference to sell the church and apply the proceeds on the remaining debt of said church, and the balance in fencing the graveyard alongside of said church.

OAKLAND.—In the matter of a memorial coming from the Oakland Circuit, praying that the Conference order a re-consideration of the case relating to the division of church property on the Simcoe District, so that the Oakland Circuit may have its proper share of the proceeds of the sale of the Waterford parsonage, your Committee offer the following as their recommendation :

Resolved—That inasmuch as the Adjudicating Committee exceeded its jurisdiction by awarding the proceeds of the sale of the Garnet Church to the Oakland Circuit—*Resolved*, that one hundred dollars from the sale of Waterford parsonage rightly belongs to Oakland Circuit, and we agree that the said one hundred dollars be paid to Oakland by the appointments having received the proceeds of such sale *pro rata*, and that the President and Chairmen of Districts concerned are a Committee to make the distribution (Committee, page 73).

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE WORK.

This resolution emphasizes the necessity of preaching the old doctrines of the Gospel with increased fidelity ; a personal and entire consecration to God of heart and life, time and treasures on the part of both ministry and laity—together with greater diligence and devotion in the department of pastoral work, and a continued looking for of accessions to our ranks by the conversion of souls. And to this end said resolution recommends the setting apart of a portion of the time usually devoted to the regular sessions of Conference, for conversation on topics of spiritual interest, as provided for in the Discipline, section 152, sub-section 29 ; all of which is heartily recommended to the Conference by your Committee.

In addition to the above, however, we would further recommend :

1. The holding of annual conventions in each District in connection with the Financial District Meeting, to promote the personal piety of both ministers and laity, and devise plans for a general soul-saving campaign.

2. That the ministry give greater attention to the systematic employment of the agencies of the Church, whether male or female, old or young, in Christian work.

3. The more frequent holding of meetings for the systematic and topical study of the Scriptures—popularly known as *Bible Readings*.

4. The diligent and prayerful study of the Sunday-school lessons.

5. The more general and thorough organization of our young people and children into catechumen classes.

6. The holding of cottage prayer-meetings where practicable, and where suitable leaders can be secured.

7. That the pastors on the several Circuits do exercise a special supervision over all these departments, and give special prominence to their operations in the pulpits.

8. That, in the matter of employing evangelists in revival services, we recommend that our own accredited agents be employed as far as practicable, in preference to the irresponsible, and frequently ill qualified and inexperienced persons who are offering their services for such work, and too often teaching doctrines at variance with the Word of God.

OBITUARIES.

REV. JOHN S. EVANS, D.D.

John Swanton Evans was born in the town of Bandon, Ireland, on the first of April, 1821. He was of Welsh extraction; one of his ancestors having emigrated from Wales to Ireland, to take possession of a large tract of land granted him by the Crown. His father was an earnest and devoted Christian, whose influence was blest in the conversion of all the members of his family in early life. Brother Evans was converted when about fifteen years of age. He then united with the Irish Primitive Methodist Society, commonly called Clonites, of which his father and family were members. The religious course thus early commenced, he maintained with fidelity until he exchanged mortality for life. When he was about ten years of age his father died, and the responsibility of training and educating the family devolved upon his mother. In speaking of his early religious life he remarked that he found prayer of signal benefit, when he first set out.

The advice of his class leader was, "When the world assaults you, *watch* and pray; when the flesh, *flee* and pray; when the devil, *fight* and pray." After his conversion he became conscientiously desirous of improving his mind by the acquisition of knowledge, especially Biblical knowledge. About the year 1845 he commenced to preach locally among the Primitives; but circumstances leading the family to dispose of their property in Ireland, he, with them, emigrated to Canada, and soon after was called out by the late Rev. John Carroll, D.D., as a supply on the Toronto Circuit. In this, his first field of labor, he won the confidence and affectionate regard of all who knew him. Successfully and honorably passing through his probation, he was ordained to the full work of the ministry in 1852. After his ordination he was stationed on the following Circuits, viz.: Woodstock, Hemmingford, Goderich, Mitchell, Danville, Coatimcook, Dunham, Melbourne, Spencerville, Morrisburg and Uxbridge. In 1855 he was united in marriage to Miss Mary Jane, second daughter of the late Thos. Vaux, Esq., who proved an helpmeet indeed, and who, after a happy union of thirty-two years, survives to mourn her loss. Beloved and honored, he continued in the regular work of the ministry for twenty-nine years; when, owing to a defect in hearing induced by a cold, he became a superannuate, and for a number of years was the Governor of Dr. Stephenson's Children's Home in Hamilton, in which position his services were much appreciated. He possessed a strong and vigorous mind, well cultivated by close study. As a minister, he preached the truth as it is in Jesus. He was an able expounder, and wise defender, of the doctrines of Methodism. Christ was the Alpha and Omega of his pulpit ministrations. His excellent work, "One Mediator," shows how he regarded the doctrine of the Atonement; this was the inspiration of his pulpit themes. He viewed the atonement, through the sufferings and death of Jesus Christ, as the sun of the Christian system, as the great central truth around which all other truth revolves. As a writer, very few in the ranks of the ministry during the last thirty years have made more use of the press than he. His works on various subjects, especially "One Mediator," and "Baptizing and Teaching," have enriched our denominational literature. In appreciation of his ability as an author, the Victoria University, at the commencement in 1886, conferred upon him the title of Doctor of Divinity—a title well earned by his patient researches and untiring efforts in the paths of theology and literature. Bro. Evans was a man of sterling principle, whose piety shone in an humble walk with God. He was fully consecrated to God, and this consecration appeared in the discharge of his daily duties. His last sickness was brief but painful. It was evident for some time before he died, that the hand of death

On reaching his room one evening, after taking a walk in the grounds he took so much delight in improving, he mentioned to some friends who were sitting by his bed, that the following verses were suggested by what proved to be his last walk:—

“Farewell! sweet nature, waving
With fruits and flow’rets fair,
Of thee but little craving
Of what thou well can’st spare;
Only an earthly pillow
To rest my death cold head,
And the turf and the weeping willow
To deck my lowly bed.

“Farewell! thou vase of splendor,
The world to which I soar
No beauty canst thou render,
Nor give one glory more.
The world to which I’m going
Has fairer fruits than thine—
Life, rivers ever flowing,
And skies that ever shine.”

When the time of his departure drew near, he expressed his confidence in the great truths which he preached. “Jesus loved me, and gave Himself for me,” afforded him great consolation and strength. “If I die,” said he, “it will be just falling into the Everlasting Arms.” Implying, that he felt those Arms around him now. In this spirit he continued until the Master said, “It is enough, come up higher.” He ascended to be with the Lord forever, on Saturday, August the 5th, 1887, in the 67th year of his age, forty of which he spent in the ministry of the Methodist Church. A wife, two sons and two daughters mourn their loss. A memorial service was held in the “Centenary Church,” to which he belonged, on the evening of August the 13th, conducted by his old friend, Rev. John A. Williams, D.D., one of the General Superintendents of the Methodist Church.

REV. S. J. HUNTER, D.D.

The Rev. Samuel J. Hunter, D.D., one of the ablest, most useful and most honored of our ministers, has passed away from the scenes of labor to those of joyous companionship with loved ones gone before.

Our whole Church is in mourning because of his departure, and as his co-laborers and personal friends we accept the admonition, “Be ye also ready.”

Brother Hunter was born in the village of Phillipsburg, province of Quebec, on the 12th day of April, 1843. He was of Irish parentage. His father and mother were born and married in Strabane, county Tyrone, Ireland. They were early and soundly converted to God, and although brought up Presbyterians, they were led, in their native land, to cast in their lot with the Methodists. They came to Canada, and, after residing for some time in the province of Quebec, settled in East Gwillimbury, Ontario, when that township was almost a wilderness.

His early training was conducted in the home of piety, and by teachers fully consecrated to the highest objects of such a work. He soon developed an unconquerable thirst for knowledge, and when a mere lad had reached the limit of

the common school teacher's power to instruct. When seventeen years of age he was converted, and not long afterwards, or when only eighteen years old, he was induced to enter the ministry as a probationer.

He continued the prosecution of his studies under the direction of wise and faithful teachers and superintendents, and his growth in literary and theological attainments was very marked. He was at once popular as one of the most youthful of the young ministers of that day, and was faithful in pastoral and pulpit work, and not unfrequently rejoiced in the ingathering of many souls through special revival services in which he was very successful.

He began his ministry on the Nanticoke Circuit, where he remained one year. Then followed two years in Oakville, two in Yonge Street North Circuit, one in Bowmanville, six in Montreal, twelve in Toronto, and three in the Centenary Church Hamilton, where he fell at his post, and in keeping with his oft-expressed desire, "died in the harness," on Monday, April 30th, in the forty-fifth year of his age, and the twenty-seventh of his ministry.

His health was not at all times the most robust, but by careful management and occasional rest he maintained a good degree of strength and marked efficiency in his ministerial life.

His pulpit ministrations sustained a very high average. He was one of our strong men, and was admired and loved far beyond the limits of his own denomination.

He was popular and powerful as an expounder of the truth, which he preached with great clearness of expression and distinctness of utterance.

His attachment to his personal friends was warm and faithful, and his bearing towards all men was that of the Christian gentleman. During his stay in Hamilton he endeared himself to his ministerial associates with special brotherliness of feeling, and his sudden and unexpected departure is a heavy blow to all. It was a great gratification to his many friends when, two years ago, Victoria University conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity, in recognition of his ability and distinction as an eloquent preacher and minister of Jesus Christ.

The Centenary Church mourns him as their fallen leader, and exclaimed, "Know ye not that there is a prince and a great man fallen this day in Israel."

His last ailment began probably about the month of January, the effects of a cold. His kind and liberal people sent him and his family away for rest. They went to Clifton Springs, N.Y., but only remained a short time, and, on returning, he was far from being well.

His illness culminated in a severe attack of erysipelas in the face, on Monday, April 23rd; delirium set in almost immediately. He was attended by able and careful physicians, most of whom were his personal friends, and did all that the most advanced and efficient medical skill could do, but to no purpose. From the beginning of the attack until his last breath the disease held him with relentless grasp. His ministerial brethren, the members of his family, and of his church were unceasing in their attentions and faithful in ministrations.

The closing scene reminds one of the picture of Wesley's death-bed. Physicians, ministers, his family and friends gathered round, while sobs and tears mingled with their songs and prayers. When told that Jesus was taking him home, he exclaimed in a loud voice, "Amen."

So passed away one of the best and most useful of men. Last summer he frequently sat for hours on the piazza of his cottage at Grimsby Park, in company with the late Dr. Nelles, his familiar friend, and others, and conversed upon the heavenly state and the immortal life, little thinking that before another year had passed, both himself and the honored Chancellor would enter upon a higher plane from which to pursue those glorious themes.

His funeral, which took place on Wednesday, May 2nd, was a most striking testimonial to his worth, and an eloquent expression of universal sympathy with the bereaved family and church.

On the Sunday following the funeral a special memorial service was held in the Centenary Church, conducted by the Rev. W. J. Maxwell, Chairman of the District, who preached an admirable sermon, full of brotherly sympathy and spiritual power, to one of the largest congregations ever assembled in that spacious building—a tribute of esteem and love by all denominations in the city.

He has gone, and we stand. Ministers and people from all the Protestant and from Catholic Churches of both Hamilton and Toronto, and Methodist ministers from surrounding circuits, in large numbers, were present to show their kindly feelings. Floral tributes from loving friends were piled upon the casket in great profusion.

The President of the Niagara Conference, Rev. D. L. Brethour, conducted the services in Hamilton, and Rev. Dr. Potts, President of the Toronto Conference, in Toronto. Thousands of sorrowing friends looked upon his familiar features for the last time. He leaves a widow and two children, a son and daughter, who are greatly comforted in their affliction by the grace of God and the sympathy and prayers of the whole Church.

Breathing a prayer for the blessing of God to rest upon his dear family and the church he has left, we gird ourselves afresh for the journey and for the battle, in hope of meeting again.

REV. GEORGE WASHINGTON.

Comparatively little is known to-day of the life and labors of this good man. Those with whom he worked in the days of his active ministry have mostly passed away; his relatives in this country seem to have been few, and his children, who survive him, are so remote that we have found it difficult to get anything very definite with reference to him. He was born in Ireland, and was converted to God among the Methodists of that country when very young.

At the early age of sixteen years he commenced to preach among the Primitive Methodists, and in 1819 was received on trial for the ministry of that Church, and for the space of twenty-eight years was a useful minister of that body in Ireland. In the spring of 1848 he came to Canada, and soon after reaching the country was sent by Rev. Henry Wilkinson, who was then Chairman of the Hamilton District, to labor on the Dunnville Mission.

After leaving Dunnville he was three years in Nelson, two in Georgetown, and three in Albion. Those nine years seem to have been spent under the direction of Chairmen of Districts.

At the Toronto Conference of 1857, he was received into full connexion, and stationed on the Wallace Mission; but his first year in full connexion with the Conference proved to be his last in the active work. In the early part of the following year his health failed him, and in June, 1858, he became a supernumerary, which relation he sustained for thirty years.

Bro. Washington was a devoted and useful man. The few who still remain and remember him in the days of his stalwart manhood, speak of him as a useful preacher, and as being pre-eminently possessed of a meek and quiet spirit. The greater part of his life as a supernumerary minister was spent on the Oakville Circuit, and for many years, when that Circuit was large, and the Superintendent did not live in Oakville, his services were in frequent demand, and for years he rendered very timely and efficient service to the church in that place.

During the latter years of his life he was, for the most part, confined to the house, and for some years before his death there was but very little for which to live. His circumstances were anything but affluent; the friends and associates of his early life had all passed away, and bowed down with age and extreme feebleness, he was ready and anxious to depart and be with Christ.

In the home of his daughter, in the new country of Muskoka, in the eighty-ninth year of his age, and sixty-ninth of his ministry, he closed up his long and useful life and entered into rest.

OF THE

NIAGARA CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—

Observing our time-honored custom, we once more address you in the name of our Common Master. The Conference sessions, now rapidly drawing to a close, have been marked by the presence of the Divine Spirit, and though matters of unusually grave moment have demanded our attention, we trust that we have not been left entirely to our own judgment in reaching our decisions.

It will gratify you to learn that the past year has been marked by healthy progress. The membership returns show a gratifying increase. Revivals have cheered the hearts and crowned the labors of the toilers in the vineyard. We rejoice in the assurance that the converting power still attends our ministry.

Our Connexional Funds give evidence of your continued and growing loyalty to the financial interests of the Church. Our Missionary Society retains its prominent place in your affections. The allotments on behalf of the fund for superannuated ministers and their families appear to have been secured with less difficulty this year than in the year previous. All this is fit cause for rejoicing.

In this connection we would call your attention to the need of increased liberality in support of the Educational Society of our Church. Marked advances have characterized the contributions of some Circuits, but the importance of this fund does not seem to have impressed itself upon the vast majority of our membership. Upon its hearty and generous support must depend, in no small degree, the efficiency of the future ministry of Methodism. Nor is this all. The great problem of how to secure a Christian education for our children, an education which, while second to none when judged by scholastic standards, is nevertheless fully in accord with the doctrines of the Lord Jesus, depends for its solution, so far as our Church is concerned, almost entirely upon the liberality with which our people respond to the appeals for larger givings to the fund in regard to which we now address you. An annual income from the whole Church

of \$30,000 is quite within the easy possibilities of the near future. This would equal an endowment of half a million, and would greatly facilitate the work of higher education amongst us. Upon this we are all agreed, that we must not, as a Church, permit ourselves to become indifferent to the question of the education of the youth committed to our care. We would do well to ponder the thoughtful and suggestive utterance of the learned Chancellor of Victoria University, the Rev. Dr. Burwash, who assured us at the anniversary meeting of the Educational Society, that much as the Church might need the ministry of higher education, higher education stands in greater need of the controlling and elevating influence of the Church of our Redeemer.

It is in place, at this point, to commend to your most favorable consideration, the efforts that are now making to secure an endowment for Victoria College, in view of its transfer to the city of Toronto, in harmony with the scheme of College Federation which was adopted at the late General Conference. Permit us to emphasize the fact that this is the present policy of our Church, and to invite your earnest co-operation to secure its success. We were encouraged to learn from the Rev. Dr. Burwash, that the prospects of obtaining the required endowment are bright. Several large subscriptions, which will bring the endowment to a point exceeding \$300,000 will probably be announced in the near future. Having thus received the princely contributions of the few, it but remains for the many to add their small though, perhaps, equally liberal gifts, to place the endowment of our beloved Victoria forever upon a satisfactory basis.

That our contributions as a people may be marked by more steady progress, we shall do well to adopt the habit of systematic and proportionate giving. Uneducted impulse is a poor guide in beneficence. The Holy Scriptures seem to reveal it as the Divine expectation that we should set apart, at least, one-seventh of our time and one-tenth of our income for the glory of God. And while it may be a mistake to urge the latter law as being of equal obligation with the former, it is undoubtedly true that proportionate giving is divinely sanctioned, and that, almost universally, it has been followed by increased material prosperity.

We are much more concerned, however, dear friends, that you should maintain a close walk with God. Temptations to worldliness beset you. Lay to heart the Master's words: "Take heed and beware of covetousness, for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." (Luke xii. 15.) Character is immeasurably superior to wealth. The very duration of life is more closely related to what a man is than to what he has. The Almighty has promised to satisfy him with long life who has "set his love upon" Him. The felicity of life depends upon character rather than possessions. What we are, not what we have, fixes the true value of our lives in the relation which they bear to others. That character determines destiny the Scriptures teach us again and again. Dives passes away from this life into a state of misery; when Lazarus dies he rests upon Abraham's bosom. Our boldness in the day of judgment will be the outgrowth of likeness to Jesus. "Herein is our love made perfect, that we may have boldness at the day of judgment: because as He is, so are we in this world." (1 John iv. 17.)

Hence the need of a holy life. This is the privilege of every Christian. Satisfaction with less than this will prove fatal to our religious progress. It is ours to be filled with the Spirit, to walk in the light, to abstain from every form of evil.

We are called upon to exhibit the reality of our professed faith in Christ by our lives. "He that said he abideth in Him ought himself also so to walk even as He walked." (1 John ii. 6.) Applied Christianity is the need of the hour. Let us aim to apply the precepts of the New Testament to our home life, our business life, our social life, and especially just now, to our political life. As Christian citizens we must meet the responsibilities which God has placed upon us in His fear. We must recognize the fact that the ballot is entrusted to us for His glory. We entreat you to employ it in securing the prohibition of the liquor traffic. God has placed this possibility within the reach of the Christian Churches of our land. When we want prohibition so much that we shall demand it at the polls it will be granted to us. We fear that many are only willing for it, not so determined to secure it that they are prepared to count all else loss, politically, to win the desired end.

Death has invaded our ministerial ranks during the past year. Our beloved brother, the Rev. Samuel Hunter, D.D., has fallen at his post. We had anticipated for him many years of useful and honored service. His unexpected departure from the midst of us has filled our hearts with sorrow, and warned us, once more, against counting upon long years of work for the Master. The Rev. John S. Evans, D.D., has been taken from us. He has left the Church his debtor by his valuable contributions to her theological literature. His name will not quickly be forgotten. Another brother, the Rev. George Washington, who, for some years past has been debarred from active work by reason of failing health, has passed on before. His memory is dear to those who knew him. Nor can we omit reference to the grief which is ours, as it is the grief of united Methodism, occasioned by the translation to the abode of the blessed of the Rev. S. S. Nelles, D.D. This is not the place to recall his many and remarkable gifts and graces; but the weight of sorrow which rests upon this Conference in consequence of his death, deserves recognition in our annual address to our membership. We rejoice to know that these brethren beloved "sleep in Jesus and are blessed," and that when He shall return, who is the resurrection and the life, they with us who remain and are faithful to His word, will share in His triumphs forever.

And now we "commend you to God, and to the word of His grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among all them which are sanctified." (Acts xx. 32.) May "grace and peace be multiplied unto you, through the knowledge of God and Jesus our Lord."
