

15 Villages Are in Ruins and 23 Others Are Partly Destroyed

LENINKAN, Armenia, Oct. 26-Heartened by the immediate assistance from the United States and every part of Russia, Armenia is struggling valiantly to extricate herself from the misery, famine and desolation caused by the series of earthquakes beginning Fri-

ONE DIES IN FIRE AT ROCKLAND, ME.

to air force matters is indicative of a progressive outlook one is apt occasionally to fear lacking. Probably to the end of time will the foot soldier remain the final factor in any war; it is doubtful whether even cavalry will disappear entirely, although its role is already modified and restricted; artillery will in all likelihood march from one greatness to the next, while tanks, as a new arm, have usurped a portion of the functions of all three of world of entirely new conditions before the navy, perhaps changed in form, will cease to exercise its function of patrolling the ocean lanes or massing into fleets to smash the enemy's sea-power and so prevent his performance of like offices for commerce. But there can be little doubt that the future of military strength lies in the air.

The aeroplane, and possibly the airship, will be the attacker and defender and the transport of the future. Time was when Britain appeared to lag in this respect. Even now her air strength is far from commensurate with her needs, when compared with the armaments of others. Assuredly the Royal Air Force must be enlarged, and perhaps in this lies in part the solution of Dominion contribution to Empire defence. Purely military planes are far from useless in peace time; they can be employed on all kinds of patrol work-forest fire, coast guard, preventive. The growing popularity of commercial and pleasure flying taps a source of reserve planes, to expand skeleton cadres, maintained in peace time, to war strength.

The aeroplane and airship may be regarded as closely analogous to the ships that sail the seas. In olden days the man-of-war was merely an armed merchantman, and though evolution has now carried it far from that, the last war showed how great use may still be made of the auxiliary cruiser, the Q boat and the trawler-minesweeper. So with the aeroplane. Only the commercial or pleasure plane of today differs from the fighting plane, the bomber or the scout, scarcely, if at all, more than did the merchantman from the man-of-war of the Restoration period and later.

The question of cadre expansion is merely one of registration and subsidy. The pre-war British army had this system for its mechanical transport in extremely efficient form. Civil owners of approved standard types of lorry accepted an annual subsidy in return for which they guaranteed to keep the lorry in first-class condition and, in the event of war, to surrender it at a pre-arranged valuation along with a driver, a man on the reserve. Thus complete M. T. units mobilized at ports of embarkation within forty-eight hours of telegrephic demand on the owners. A similar system might be applied to aeroplanes.

The matter of Imperial air development along parallel military and civil lines will be interesting to watch, and may go far towards elucidating the problem of Imperial defence.

Care For Aged Poor

"Among the major problems which perplex society and demand constant and careful attention, the problem of poverty is not by any means the least important. This problem and indeed all social problems can be successfully attacked only if the efforts that are put forth are directed by intelligence as well as by sympathy.

"This paper is limited to the discussion of methods of caring for the aged poor. By the aged poor I shall mean those who, with advancing years,

mind or both, and are unable to maintain themselves and their natural dependents, if they have any, in a state of physical efficiency.

"In the past, the relief of the poor has been characterized, to a very large extent, by careless thinking or by no thinking at all, and in this connection what is true of the past is unfortunately true in lorse. "Those who advocate old age pensions believe that with their introduction the need for almshouses will be greatly decreased. Let us consider this method of providing for the aged.

Green, the situation in East London was as follows: 'The greater number of the East End clergy have converted them-selves into relieving officers. A hundred different agencies for the relief of distress are at work over the operation or the slightest information as to each other's exertions, and the result is an unparalleled growth of imposition, mendicancy and sheer, shameless pauperism.'

Position of Planet Tonight Most Favorable for Reception

LONDON, Oct. 26-Thousands of British radio enthusiasts will listen in Wednesday night (tonight) for possible messages from Mars, which will be in a more favorable position for radio reception than it has been for 100 years.

Astronomers and other scientists for years have toyed with the idea that beings of equal or even far superior intelligence to inhabitants of this world might populate Mars.

Mars will be 42,000,000 miles away during the period from Oct. 27 to Nov. 4. Two years ago, when Mars was last near the earth, many listeners picked up signals that could not be assigned to any known station, and this year the Wireless League of Great Britain has asked its members to listen in for messages from the neighbor

Reports of any strange signals will be sent by receivers to the wireless league for investigation and co-ordina-

Neither the British Broadcasting Company, a semi-official agency, which holds a monopoly on internal radio communication, nor the Marconi Company will make any effort to receive and their officials are skeptical about possibility of inter-planetary communi-

'Gippy" LeBlanc Also Hit Over Head, Doctors Say

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 26— Positive evidence that "Gippy" LeBlanc, fishery officer, was murdered on Wednesday night last while in the performance of his duty, searching for illegal fishermen in Buctouche Bay was forthcoming today, when Doctors Oulton and Cyr continuing their postmortem examination, found fine shot embedded in LeBlanc's head.

In the opinion of the medical men Leblanc's assailants first fired at him with a shot gun, hitting him in the top of the head and then continuing their attack on the officer, struck him over the eyes with some blunt instrument, knocking him insensible. The fine shot found in the dead man's scalp were not sufficient to cause death, but their presence furnished convincing proof that there was a fight between the officer and unknown parties, and that Leblanc's death was due to foul play. The officer carried no gun, therefore it is quite clear the shot must have been fired by those responsible for his death.
