May Be Counter Suggestions.

Paris, July 4—The Trench Government is not in accord with Prime Minister MacDonald on the agenda for the forthcoming allied conference in London as set forth in the British Premier's invitation to the other allies, it was said at the foreign office this morning. The French, it was added, will be unable to accept the British idea of taking from the reparation commission the prerogative of deciding when Germany shall have defaulted in the execution of the Dawes plan.

Mr. MacDonald's instructions to the British ambassador here in this connection are taken in Paris as mere suggestions concerning the agenda and the French delegation to the conference will have counter suggestions to present in London.

GUARDS ARE KILLED Double Event For

Number of Ballots Taken So Far Already Four Above Record. PROGRESSIVES MEET

DELEGATES TAKE

RESPITE AFTER

SIXTY-FIRST VOTE

Lafollette's Candidacy Likely Will be Announced Tomorrow.

Madison Square Garden, New York, July 4.- The continued deadlock in the Democratic National Convention, which seeks to name a candidate for the Presidency of the United States, and which passed all national convention records when the 58th ballot was started, remained unbroken today after 61 votes had been taken. Tired out with their protracted efforts to reach a solution, the delegates were granted a respite after the 61st ballot, planning to

resume their task at 1 p. m. The deadlock was attributed by Rockwell to the failure of favorite sons to withdraw and leave the race to the leaders. Senator Glass was the only member of this group to release his delegates yesterday, but the Virginians could not make up their minds to take his advice to go to McAdoo and decided to stick to him a while longer.

Delegates Take Respite.

This morning the convention was given a respite from balloting until 1 p.m. while party pilots sought a way out of the wilderness in which 61 futile attempts to select a president nominee had left them.

Various plans to end the record ballot deadlock between William G. McAdoo and Alfred E. Smith were under consideration but most of them

At the end of the 61st ballot early today McAdoo had 469.5 votes as compared with 503.4 on the last ballot Wednesday night, Alfred E. Smith had 335.5 as compared with 318.6; John W. Davis had dropped from 67 to 60, and Senator Ralston, after advancing from 30 to 97 on the 55th, 56th and 57th ballots, was back to 37%. James M. ballots, was back to 37½. James M. 

Recalls Tale of Heroism in War

Washington, July 4.—Results obtined by the customs marine patrol lined by the customs marine patrol lined its organization last April 1, to supplement operation of the Coast Guard in curbing rum running in the vicinity of New York harbor, have justified its continuance for another four months, it is announced by Assistant Secretary Moss of the Treasury. It was originally intended to discontinue the patrol June 30.

After brief suspension of activities necessary to overhaul and rent boats and equipment, Mr. Moss said, the patrol will resume operations "with augmented equipment, including machine guns and rifles, manned by picked crews determined to surpass their previous record." The patrol to date has captured seventy vessels, with thirty-one now under seizure, and seized 12,500 cases of liquor valued at \$900,000.

Dovre, England, July 4—A dramatic incident of the war is recalled by the necessity of removing a British monitor which was sunk north of the fairway at the entrance of Dover Harbor.


Jury Awards Damages to Madeline Dever in Suit Against






