New Move in Ordering Members to Keep Hands on Pool Table.

New York, Aug. 30.—Eighteen mem-bers of the S. G. Independent Political Club at 200 East 114th Street were held up on Friday night by four weil-dressed men armed with revolvers and blackjacks and robbed of \$8,000 in dressed men armed with revolvers and blackjacks and robbed of \$8,000 in cush and jewelry. News of the rob-bery was withheld for some days. New hold-up methods were introduced by the raiders. Instead of ordering their victims to hold up their hands, they were lined up around a pool table and directed to keep their hands on the table while being searched. This process completed, the eighteen men were ordered to sit on the floor and remain there for ten minutes. The four robbers, all wearing straw hats, range the bell and were admitted to the club. Then, drawing revolvers and blackjacks, they mobilized the vic-tims about the pool table. Three of the robbers stood guard with their pis-tols while the fourth, who was short and stocky and had a deep scar on his face, canvassed the pockets. He went about his work leisurely, spending fifteen minutes on the job. One of the members pleaded with him not to take his \$200 (stickpin, which was a present from his dead mother, but the robber replied by ripping off the tie with the pin. Another mem-ber tried to save a diamond ring by dropping it under the pool table. The hold-up men apparently had anticipat-ed such a ruse as they looked under the table before leaving and found the nom. After collecting the members' cash
