YESTERDAY'S RESULT.

The Conservative government has gone down to deserved and overwhelming defeat. There is not now a Conservative government, federal or provincial, in Canada.

The prediction that the Conservative party would be third instead of first in the running, has been fulfilled.

The overwhelming nature of its defeat convinces all that Hon. Mackenzie King would about popular resentment over its usurpation of power and its general policy.

The first great blunder committed by the government was in making the tariff the only issue, and in misrepresenting the tariff policy of the Liberals and Progressives.

It is a most gratifying fact that the Liberal leader will have a majority over both Progressives and Liberals.

A cheering feature of the financial situation in Canada is the continued improvement in demand for high-grade investment securities.

It would be most ungracious not to accept at their face the fervent assurances of Hon. Dr. Baxter and Dr. MacLaren that St. John is first in their thoughts and that they desire above all the welfare of this city.

ST. JOHN-ALBERT.

Hon. Mackenzie King owes nothing to the Liberal party of St. John. It had the opportunity to give him two supporters and to have a representative in the new government.

When big issues are at stake lesser ones should not prevail.

It is regrettable that the people of Canada have not meted up to the expectations of the Standard, which says: "The people of St. John-Albert have no cause to reproach themselves; it is not their fault that other constituencies in the Dominion had not sense enough to appreciate the fact that the Liberal administration was more worthy of the support of the electors than any aggregation of politicians whom Mr. Mackenzie King can collect together ever can be."

**TORONTO TO HAVE
A BOYS' COUNCIL**

Organization Modelled on the Lines of the Real Thing, and to Hold Meetings in the Council Chamber.

(Toronto Globe)
Toronto is to have a Boys' Municipal Council next year, promoted by the Toronto Boy Life Council. Election day will be on January 16, from 4:30 p. m. to 9 p. m. The Council is to have a Mayor, four Controllers and twenty-four Aldermen and hold meetings monthly in the Council chamber at the City Hall. The business of the Council will be to train boys in citizenship and public speaking, to deal with questions pertaining to boys, such as laws affecting boy life and the development of boys as junior police, control of certain athletic leagues, study playground questions, appoint committees and commissioners, such as parks, works, etc., and perhaps to criticize the work of the regular Council; in general, to carry on much the same as the ordinary City Council under the supervision of older men.

To Be Permanent Organization.
There are many matters this Boy Council can deal with the above suggestions are only a few. It is the intention that this Council shall carry on from year to year, and it may be expected that the boys will greatly benefit and become better citizens as a result.
One of the regulations with respect to a boy holding office is that, excepting the first year, the Mayor must have been a Controller or an Alderman, and that having been Mayor for one year he then passes out entirely; that, excepting the first year, he must first have been an Alderman before he can run as Controller, and having been a Controller for two years he then passes out unless elected Mayor, and having been an Alderman for two years he passes out, unless elected Controller or Mayor.
Qualifications for Citizenship.
Any boy between 15 and 18 may be a citizen with the right to vote if he is a member of one of the following organizations or a Sunday school class: Neighborhood Workers, Boy Scouts, Y. M. C. A., Boys' Naval Brigade, Settlement Federation, Jewish Big Brothers, Jewish Boy Life Council, Cadets, Catholic Boy Life Council, Protestant Big Brother Movement, Band Eights, Methodist Disciples, Anglicans, Presbyterians, Congregationalists.
Boys are to have one vote only, even though they may be members of two or more of the above organizations.

be held in eight wards on December 16, as follows: Ward 8, 8 p. m., St. John's Parish Hall, Woodbine avenue and Kingston road; Ward 1, 8 p. m., Broadview "Y"; Ward 2, 8 p. m., Moss Park Rink; Ward 3, 8 p. m., Central "Y"; Ward 4, 8 p. m., St. Christopher House, Bellevue place; Ward 5, 8 p. m., West End "Y"; Ward 6, 8 p. m., St. Helen's Hall, Dundas and Marguerita; Ward 7, 8 p. m., Livingston & Scott's factory, 411 Clevedon. Nine are to be nominated in each ward, three to be elected.
Selecting the "Hight-ups."
Any boy who wishes to run for Mayor or Controller must first be nominated for Alderman on December 16, so that he may attend the subsequent nomination meeting for those offices on December 19. The 72 nominated on December 16 are to gather in convention on December 19 at 8 p. m., at the office of the Toronto Boy Life Council, 87 King street east, and from themselves select four to run for Mayor and eight to run for Controllers, four to be elected.
One or more of the Toronto public schools will be used as polling booths in each ward on election day, and definite instructions as to where each boy will vote will be on his voting card. The city ballot boxes will be used.
MAY BREED BEAVERS.
Right Granted to Northern Rice Lake Fur Company.
Toronto, Dec. 7.—Harry Mills, minister of mines for Ontario, who also has charge of the Game and Fisheries Department, has conceded the right to breed beavers in captivity. In a letter to the North Rice Lake Fur Company, Mr. Mills says the department has no objection to the propagating of beavers and muskrats when fences are erected as enclosures. Heretofore the department has refused the company the right to propagate beavers under any conditions.

BERBER TRIBESMEN OF MOROCCO HAVE STRANGE CUSTOMS

Numbers Greatly Reduced Within Fifteen Years by Inter-Tribal War.

Mellilla, Morocco, Nov. 10.—(By Mail) —The customs of the two Berber tribes whose territory had just been occupied by Spanish troops as a result of their recent victories, are very interesting. These tribes are known as the Beni-Buyahi and Beni-Mulruur, including the settlements of Segangan and Zenlan, extending to Monte Arruit, Tustina, Bastel and Garef.
According to the best information they number about 16,000, of whom about 8,000 are males of fighting age. In the last fifteen years their number has been reduced from about 40,000 of both sexes by inter-tribal fighting and migration because of bad harvests.
The tribes are divided into nine factions, all of which quarrel frequently between themselves, a practice common in the Berber stock from which they descend. They became mixed with the Arab invaders in the seventh century.
They are nomads who have temporarily arranged in places where the pasturage is plentiful, for they possess large numbers of camels, sheep and cattle. They live under large tents, which they pitch in circles, thus forming an aduar, or settlement. The tents are made of sheep's wool mixed with camel or goat's hair for the more wealthy among the tribesmen, while the poorer members of the tribes must content themselves with grass-fibre.
The men are of changeable mood, at times seeking adventure in rapine and at others indulging in prolonged periods of laziness.
Polygamy prevails among them in proportion to their means of providing sustenance for the women. These poor creatures in every part of Morocco lead the most miserable lives. They look after the cattle, grind the grain, make the bread, churn the butter, sew the wool, draw the water which often has to be carried long distances, shear the sheep and goats, card and weave the wool as well as the grass-fibre, do all the ploughing and sowing, and generally are treated by their lordly husbands even worse than the animals to whom they are yoked for field work.
Eat Four Meals Daily.
Their only consolation is in eating. They consume four meals daily, at which they drink great quantities of weak tea, and before they retire for the night devour large quantities of alkum-balls, composed of flour, water and honey.
They are very careful with the cattle and never forget to put them to pasture facing away from the sun, so that they will not lose their sight through the brightness.
Among the chief festivities are those connected with births and the giving of names, which occurs eight days after birth, when the father sacrifices a sheep and, sprinkling the blood, pronounces the names to be given to the child in the name of Allah.
At twenty years of age, it is customary to marry. A young man then announces to his father his desire to wed a certain young woman. The father communicates with the father of the chosen bride and sends his brothers to sacrifice a sheep in front of his tent, at the same time appealing to the father to give his daughter.
If the father consents, the price of the young woman and the dowry she is to bring with her is agreed upon. The day of the ceremony is settled, the bride knowing nothing about it.
When the wedding day arrives, the parents of the bridegroom go in procession to the tent of the bride's father, to whom they bring the half of the price to be paid for the bride, receiving in return therefor the half of the bride's dowry. The men fire three rifle shots and the women shout with joy.

SHOULD OBSERVE RULES OF HYGIENE

Present Season Fosters Danger to Breathing Organs, Says Health Authority.

Precautionary measures have been issued by the Montreal Health Department regarding the prevention of such diseases as bronchitis, pneumonia and pleurisy. This advice published in the Health Bulletin is in part as follows: The time of the year is at hand when the temperature and the state of the atmosphere expose us more particularly to the diseases of the breathing organs: bronchitis, broncho-pneumonia pneumonia, pleurisy, etc. the number of people affected by these diseases increases always considerably during the fall of the year, and the ravages made continue to exist until the spring. It is quite important that the people should be warned and advised to take the best precautions, in order to avoid these diseases as much as possible.

"We must not forget that they are due to germs which are transmitted from one person to another, and that therefore they are often preventable."

Besides, contagion, bronchitis, pneumonia etc. will develop in persons who are living in certain conditions which render them less resistant; such as being exposed to damp cold, malnutrition, living in certain buildings with insufficient hygienic appliances, the lack of personal hygiene. Hygiene of the body must receive particular attention, a regular life will help the organs to function normally and will therefore carry to its maximum the individual resistance.

"Badly heated homes, lack of ventilation, insufficient clothing, the bad state of the atmosphere threaten us with colds; during the cold season our efforts

should tend to observe the rules of hygiene as strictly as possible, in order to avoid the contagion of one of these so dangerous diseases which the bad season fosters.

"Patients suffering from bronchitis, a cough (cold in the head), sore throat, even in a mild form, must at once receive treatment at home, otherwise they lay themselves open to complications, as well as exposing to contagion the other persons with whom they come into contact."

"Some people have careless manners, and without consideration for their neighbors' feelings, they cough without covering their mouths with a handkerchief, they sneeze in the same manner or spit on the floor."

"Such facts are observed daily, either in public buildings, in the tram cars or in any other form of public conveyance, not taking into account what happens on the street."

CHICAGO WOMAN KILLS NEIGHBOR'S BABY GIRL

When Police Find Body in Basement Store She Takes Her Own Life With a Bread Knife.

Chicago, Dec. 7.—The dismembered and partly cremated body of three-year old Margaret Coughlin was found today by the police in a stove in the basement of the home of Ralph Penzes. In a bedroom upstairs the police found the body of Mrs. Penzes, 48 years old. She had committed suicide with a bread knife while the police were battering down the door.

The little girl was the daughter of a South Park policeman who lived across the street. As neighbors go the Coughlin and the Penzes families were friendly, and the child crossed the street most every day. On Wednesday afternoon she disappeared after she had gone to the Penzes' home to play.

Mrs. Penzes pretended to help in the all-night search which followed. She sat in the Coughlin home, caring for Margaret's younger brother until 8 a. m. This morning she hurried her husband and her daughters, Josephine and Dolly, off to work and school, kissing them goodbye.

As soon as they had left she locked the doors and windows and went to the basement. With saws and a hatchet she cut up the baby's body. The legs and one arm were wrapped in newspaper and stuffed into the stove, where a brick fire had been started. The torso and one arm were bundled up in papers, and Mrs. Penzes took them upstairs with her.

Meanwhile the police had put a watch over the cottage. A policeman saw smoke coming from the basement windows. When his knuckles were un-screwed he broke down the door and found the burning body.

"Pathological insanity—she killed the child in a fit of mania and then killed herself," was the verdict of Coroner's Physician Reithardt.

"Pure mania, not uncommon," asserted a psychiatrist who visited the scene and looked at the principals.

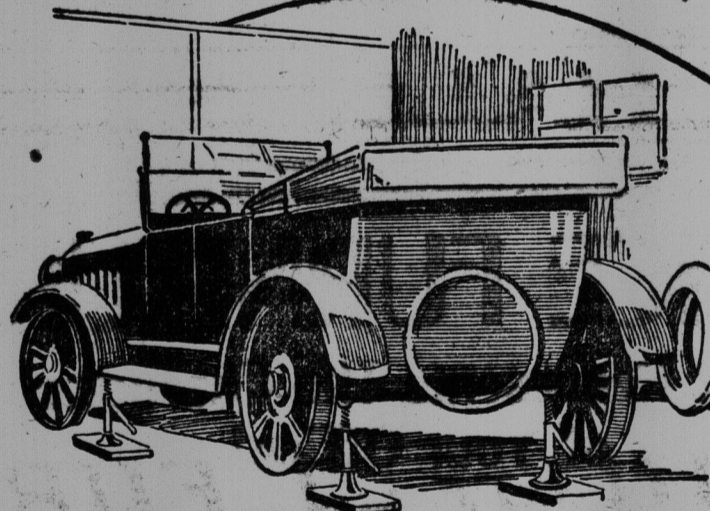

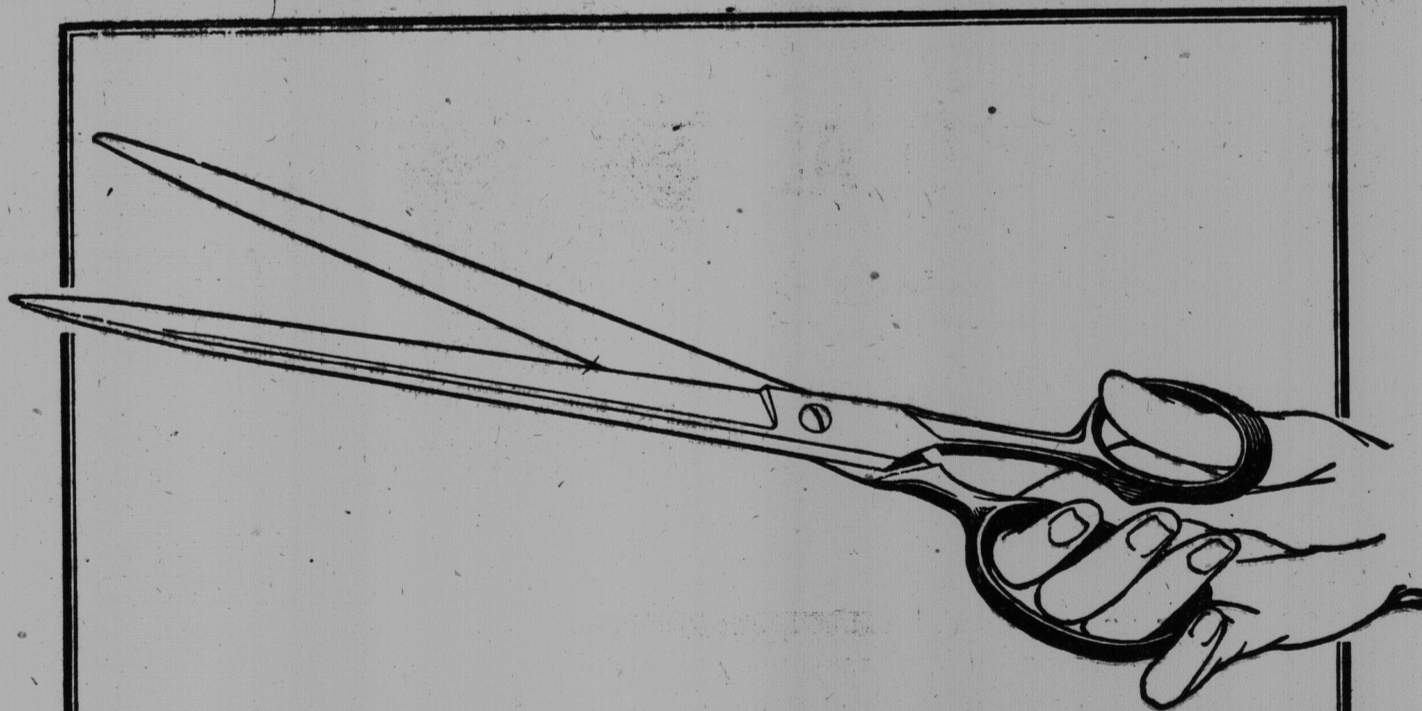

POLICE COURT
Case of Alleged Illicit Still is Gone Into.

One man, charged with being drunk, pleaded guilty and was remanded.

George Hatt, charged with the non-support of his wife, said he was out of work. His wife testified that they had been married for eight years and had three children. Her husband had been working all summer, driving a jitney, and had been a chauffeur for four or five years, but had given her no money since the early part of November.

John Porter was before the court on a charge of having an illicit still on his premises at 27 Sheriff street. Walter P. Dawes gave evidence that he had gone with Policemen McFarland and Garnett to the defendant's home and found there, in a trunk, a complete still of a kind commonly used in the manufacture of illicit liquor. He said there was also a can which smelled of liquor, and a tongs which were used in making "moonshine." The only person in the house was a young fellow, and he was told to notify his father that he would be expected in the police court the next morning. When the man did not appear, the officer said, he swore out an information and asked for a warrant. He identified the apparatus in court as the still and produced a sample of the wash from the legs, which, he said, contained oats, raisins, prunes and molasses or soft sugar.

The magistrate asked the accused if he could pay a fine of \$50, and remanded him to jail when he said he did not have 500 cents.

Lenis Daley, who was before the magistrate yesterday on a charge of striking a young woman, was examined by the jail doctor. Another examination will be made in three days.

MACKENZIE KING SPEAKS OF VICTORY

W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, on receipt of approximately complete returns from the election at an early hour this morning.

"The people of Canada," Mr. King declared, "have shown by their overwhelming majority vote both the truth of the charges of autocracy and usurpation which I have been making against the Meighen government since Right Hon. Mr. Meighen took control of the affairs of the country."

"When the total Liberals and Progressives elected are considered, it must be admitted that the Meighen administration has been ignominiously defeated. The people have also shown that they are heartily sick of coalitions, and it is a matter of great satisfaction to me to find that the Liberal party is returned to coalition or log rolling with either group in the House of Commons. Disaster Reported to Have Overtaken Newfoundland Sealing Fleet.

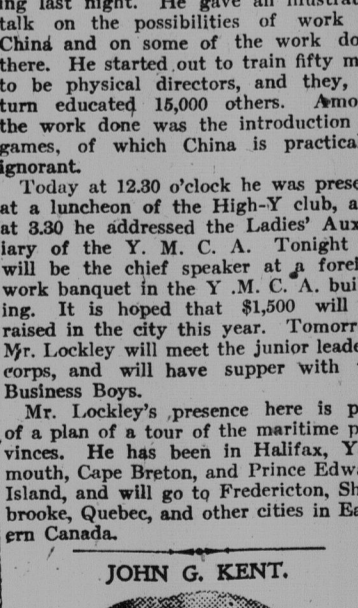

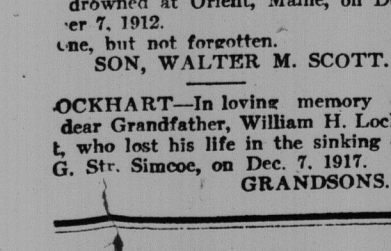

SMOKE DAGGA LEAVES

It is not only among war-weary people in big cities that drug-taking is prevalent. The natives of South Africa cultivate—surprisingly, because there is a huge fine if the authorities find them out—a herb called dagga. Dagsa, in Africa what opium is to China, it is smoked—but smoked in a strange way and the native smokes it only in the very early dawn or very late at night, when he can do so discreetly. He scoops a hole out of the hard ground three or four inches deep by three inches wide. A foot or so away from this he scoops another hole, and he then bores a small channel underground from one to the other. There is thus a secret air passage connecting the two little excavations. WHERE 'POTHEEN' IS BREWED

Efforts on the part of the British government to suppress illicit distilling in Ireland have always met with determined resistance. What we call "moonshine" whiskey is "mountain dew" in the Emerald Isle, or as it is otherwise called "potheen," a latter word meaning a little pot. A century ago it was estimated that there were in Ireland at least 150,000 illicit stills regularly at work. Most of the best hidden in mountain glens and other secluded places, and the government was powerless to suppress the industry. The neighborhood of Innishowen was famous for its "potheen," which was of so superior a quality that the British authorities sought, though vainly, to induce the licensed distillers to make whiskey equal to it. The Innishowen liquor had a peculiar smoky flavor (from the peat used for fuel) which was much liked by consumers.

To Stop Practice Would be Contemptible, Said Rev. A. E. Runnells.

(Montreal Gazette) The stoppage of the use of tobacco by inmates of penitentiaries on the score of economy would be a mean and contemptible thing, was the declaration made yesterday at a board meeting of the Canadian Prisoners' Welfare Association, this comment being in reply to the statement attributed to D. A. LaFortune, K. C., Liberal candidate in Jacques Cartier county, who, according to newspaper reports, had argued for the elimination of the tobacco. The Rev. A. E. Runnells, a member of the board, stated that he had never seen a smoker himself, but when over at the front as a chaplain, he had been unable to ignore what it meant to the boys to get a smoke, and he recognized that prisoners were not so worthy as the soldiers, he was of opinion that it would be a mean proceeding to remove one of their few joys and consolations. At the outset Mr. Runnells said if it were a matter of minimizing the tobacco habit among women, or with juveniles, he would view the question differently, or if Mr. LaFortune had raised the question on moral grounds it would be different, but on economic grounds it was a pliable excuse for removing such a privilege.

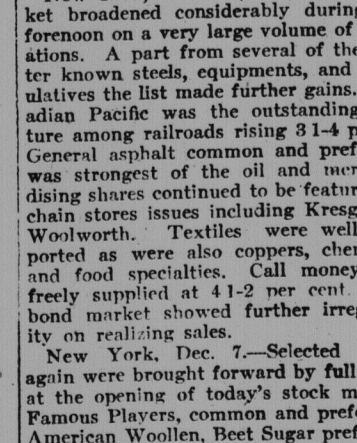

IRELAND ON SAME FOOTING AS CANADA

Lord Chancellor Speaks at Birmingham—Outlines the Status of New Irish Free State.

Birmingham, Dec. 6.—"With one single important reservation," declared Lord Birkenhead, in an address here today, "we place Ireland, and I shall define Ireland in a moment, precisely in the position of Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa. And there is no reservation, subject to the reservation which I shall indicate that is given to any one of these great self-governing dominions."

Lord Birkenhead said the parliament that agreed to the settlement, in its own domain in matters of finance, but that arbitrators would determine the amount to be advanced by Ireland as her proportion of the national debt and war expenditure.

We do not propose to interfere with the arrangements of counties. It is proposed that a commission should examine into all questions necessary."

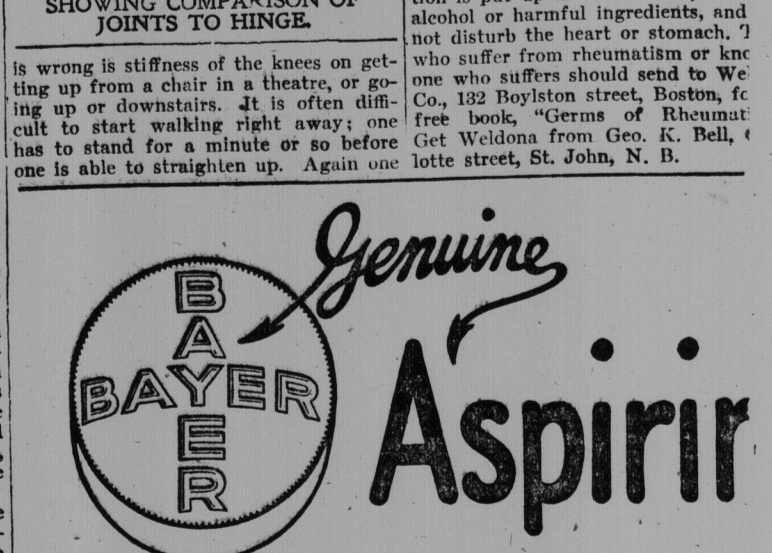

U. OF T. ASSISTS PERU EXPEDITION

Blood Samples Tested for the Effects of High Altitudes—Secure Valuable Facts.

Professors in the department of physiology of the University of Toronto are actively co-operating with the expedition of scientific men who started recently for Peru to study the effect of air pressure at high altitudes on human life.

Some of the samples of blood taken from the veins of the members of the expedition will be sent to the University of Toronto for analysis. The results of these analyses will form the data upon which the valuable findings of the expedition will be based.

The party is composed of Prof. Joseph Barcroft, of the University of Cambridge, Prof. Mackinnon, a graduate of McGill University, and at the present time professor of Therapeutics in the University of Edinburgh, along with several others from England, where the expedition had its origin at Cambridge, and a group from the United States composed of Prof. Redfield, formerly on the staff of the University of Toronto; Dr. Harper of Johns Hopkins University; Dr. Binger of the Rockefeller Institute; and others from American medical schools.

This expedition is to arrive in Peru early in December, and, having studied the behavior of the blood gases, respiration and other functions at sea level, will travel by the Central Railroad of Peru to its highest point, Tielio, which is 16,000 feet above sea level. At this height all the members of the expedition will probably suffer from symptoms of mountain sickness. While in this condition they will again examine the behavior of the blood gases, respiration, etc., comparing the results with those obtained a few days before at sea level. In a few days they will recover from the symptoms of mountain sickness.

The main object of their investigations is to find out whether this recovery has depended on blood, blood gases, respiration, or other functions. At the same time they will make observations on the workmen in the various mines in the neighborhood of Tielio, and it is at present an inexplicable fact that the workmen in this region seem to be free from mountain sickness, even at this high altitude. It is hoped that it may be possible to discover the nature of the composition which effects this difference.

The practical application of the results obtained is partly in order that the problem of living at high altitudes may be understood, thus making possible the prevention of accidents from aeroplane, balloon ascents, and mountaineering, and partly so that knowledge may be gained which will help in the treatment of clinical conditions like pneumonia, gas poisoning, etc. where oxygen deficiency is the real cause of the condition.

Are Thoroughly Equipped. The expedition is probably more thoroughly equipped for these investigations than any previous one, and is made up of men specially qualified in the various lines they will take up.

The party will remain in Peru for two months, during which time a freight car fitted up as a laboratory will be placed at their disposal by the railway authorities.

LIBERTY BOND INTEREST TAXED IF A DIVIDEND

Internal Revenue Bureau Announcement Intended as Warning to Corporations.

Washington, Dec. 7.—The Internal Revenue Bureau announced that there was nothing in the new revenue act which would permit corporations to distribute interest from Liberty bonds as dividends with the expectation that stockholders receiving dividends from such a source would not have to pay the income surtaxes.

The statement was made in order to avert the purchase of large blocks of Liberty bonds by corporations which might contravene the law in such a manner as to make this procedure possible. If the attempt was made, the Revenue Bureau announced, there was ample legal means to handle the situation. The formal announcement read: "Under the Revenue act of 1918, in-

terest on Liberty bonds held by corporations was exempt from the corporation income tax, and such interest is also exempt from the corporation income tax under the Revenue act of 1921. Liberty bond interest, however when distributed in the form of dividends, remains subject to surtaxes in the hands of the stockholders in the same manner as other dividends. There appears to be no reason to expect that the new law will give any encouragement to corporations to own Liberty bonds for the

purpose of avoiding surtaxes, but if any such attempt should be made the law provides ample means for dealing with it."
HID FROM KIN 27 YEARS.
Death Shows "Miss Hatfield," Sixty, Was Mother of Five.
Camden, N. J., Dec. 7.—The death of a woman here, known here as Miss May Hatfield, sixty years old, owner of a

cigar and candy store at Point and Erie streets, revealed a strange story of a recluse, long supposed by her family to be dead. Nearly \$1,000 in cash was found in her house.
Just before she died the woman sent for a neighbor, saying she was married and had one daughter and four sons, whom she left more than twenty-five years ago. She gave the name and address of her son in Philadelphia. He arrived this afternoon and recognized his mother, whom he had not seen in

twenty-seven years.
The son searched the house and found in a couch \$500 in bills and \$200 under carpets. One and two-dollar bills behind window frames and pictures amounted to nearly \$400. Neighbors said the woman had not been seen to leave the house in twenty-two years, doing her shopping through children.

SWEEPING VICTORY BY THE LIBERAL PARTY

Will Have Majority Over All Other Groups In New House

Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Quebec Solid Liberal—Premier Defeated in Portage La Prairie—Mr. King Has 1000 Majority in North York

(From The Daily Telegraph.)

The Liberal party in Canada gained a great victory at the polls yesterday. After ten years in opposition it was returned to power, and indications at an early hour this morning were that Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King will have a clear majority over all other groups in the new House of Commons.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, Dec. 7.—By decisive majorities, the Meighen administration was yesterday defeated at the polls and a Liberal ministry will reign in its stead. It was a day of surprises. Liberals succeeded even beyond their sanguine expectations.

The chief strength of the Progressive movement lay in the prairie provinces which gave it birth. In the next house, however, to judge from returns so far available Progressives will form the official opposition.

The government has retained little more than a third of the seats it held at dissolution. The prime minister was defeated in his own constituency and with him were defeated eight members of his administration.

Of their number, five, Messrs. Norman, Monty, Belle, Fautoux and Wilson, have been members of the cabinet only since Mr. Meighen re-organized his cabinet in September.

Seventeen candidates on the island of Montreal lost their deposits. They are: Michel Buhay, Independent; H. A. Chouette, Conservative; L. F. Malic, Labor; in St. George Etienne Cartier division: Leon Gauthier, Conservative, and Ubaldo Pugin, Independent; in St. James: Alfred Mathieu, Labor, and J. A. Nadeau, Conservative; in Laurier-Outremont: Rose Henderson, Labor; in St. Lawrence: St. George: H. Jullif, Conservative; in St. Mary's: J. E. Bernier, Conservative; J. O. E. Leclair, Independent; in St. Jean: Labor; in Maisonneuve: A. Lanouette, Labor; in St. Ann's: J. R. Avoite, Conservative; in Hochelaga: J. C. Gauthier, Independent-Labor; P. W. Dupre, Independent-Labor; in St. Denis: and Wilfrid Lamare, Conservative; in Westmount: St. Henry.

probable. Thirty-two polls out of thirty-eight give Leader, Progressives, 5,474 and the prime minister, 2,908. Bannerman, Liberal, has only 620 votes.

At the Liberal Leader's Office. Ottawa, Dec. 6.—Gaiety reigned in the offices of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King in the parliament buildings when special telegraph wires carried the news to the Liberal leader of the continuous sweep of eastern seats to the Liberal column.

There were several surprises, even in the early results, as seats such as Colchester, which the Liberals had hardly expected to carry were swung over to the Liberal column in the maritime sweep, while in Ontario one or two seats which were expected to be very difficult fighting ground appeared to have carried fairly easily.

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 6.—Making a clean sweep of Nova Scotia, 16 seats, and carrying at least five, possibly six, of the eleven New Brunswick seats, the Liberal party, under the leadership of W. L. Mackenzie King, emerged from the Maritimes with twenty-five of a possible thirty-one seats as a result of today's general election.

Mr. King was elected in the constituency of Portage La Prairie, which first sent him to parliament. "I accept the verdict of the people," was Mr. Meighen's comment when he learned the results. Of the other ministers, Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, minister of customs; Hon. Henry Drayton, minister of finance; Hon. Dr. Toimie, minister of agriculture; Hon. R. B. Bennett, minister of justice and Hon. Edmund Bristol, minister without portfolio, are, so far, only those who apparently will survive the fight.
