



UNITED STATES WET AND DRY SITUATION

Survey by Methodist Board of Temperance Indicates Ratification of Federal Constitutional Amendment Before Feb. 1

Washington, Jan. 4—A survey of the wet and dry situation throughout the United States, just completed by the Methodist Board of Temperance, shows that there are 2,546 dry counties and 351 wet counties. This is a dry gain for the year 1918 of 460 counties. Durate wide for the year 1918 of 460 counties. During the year the drys won state-wide victories in Ohio, Florida, Wyoming and Nevada, with a recount pending in Minnesota. They were defeated in Missouri and California, but elected ratification legislatures in both states. There are at present thirty-one dry states, not including Texas, where a state-wide prohibition law was held by the state supreme court to be contrary to the constitutional provision for local option. At present, opening of saloons in that state is being prevented by injunctions and refusal of the comptroller to grant licenses.

The probability is that the federal constitutional prohibition amendment will be ratified before Feb. 1, 1919. The constitutional prohibition amendment will be ratified before Feb. 1, 1919. The following fifteen states have already approved the amendment: Mississippi, Virginia, Kentucky, South Carolina, North Dakota, Maryland, Montana, Texas, Delaware, South Dakota, Massachusetts, Arizona, Georgia, Louisiana and Florida. The following states which have not ratified are considered certain to do so: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Utah, Vermont, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming. The legislatures of all these states meet in January. The list includes every state which has not already ratified except New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania, and of these three, Pennsylvania is hopeful, New York an even proposition and New Jersey probably opposed to the amendment.



It has glass doors through which the progress of the cooking operations on the gas stove can be watched. A slit in the lower part of the glass doors admits air, and the heat, steam, smoke and cooking odors escape through a flue placed in the upper part of the cabinet.



HAPSBURG'S FALL IS BRIGHT SPOT IN **AUSTRIAN TRAGEDY**

Can Never be Restored, Declares Karl Seitz, Leader of Socialists -Entente Loan is Needed

The only bright spot in the "tragedy of Austria," was the release of the country from the Hapsburg autocracy, which could never be restored, declared Karl Seltz, leader of the German Socialists in Austria and president of the National Assembly of German Austria, Austria, owing to her needs for coal and National Assembly of German Austria, in an interview given in Vienna.

The fate of German Austria was especially tragic, he said, because she had been accused wrongfully of kindling the war. History would prove he dectared, that the German-Austrians had no expansive aspirations against the Slavs, and always had opposed the action which started the war. No country in the world, Herr Seitz asserted, had suffered such brutality and persecution at the hands of the military class as and German Austria.




