Mrs. Edith Rigby, a Preston Suffragette, Admits Crime

SURRENDERS TO POLICE

Glories in Her Achievements—Also Placed Explosives in The Liverpool Cotton Exchange to Show How Easily it Could Be Done—Miss Given Released

Liverpool, July 10.—A dramatic confession of incendiarism was made by a well known militant suffragette, Mrs. Edith Rigby, wife of a physician at Preston, to the magistrate sitting in the police court here today.

"I lighted that beacon. I also placed the explosives in the Liverpool Stock Exchange to show how easy it is to procure them and to place them in public buildings. I might just as easily have blown up the Nelson monument."

Fredericton, July 10.—Dr. T. C. Allen, registrar of the supreme court, is seriously ill at his home here from cerebral palsy. He was about yesterday afternoon and was taken suddenly ill late in the afternoon while attending to some business.

HON. JOHN V. ELLIS and the daughters, Mrs. H. Lawrence and Mrs. E. R. Taylor, both of this city.

Hon. John Valentine Ellis was of Irish origin, a son of Michael Ellis and his wife Margaret Walsh Ellis, being born at Halifax, Feb. 14, 1838. He was educated at Halifax and learned the printing business early in life, coming to St. John in 1857 and beginning his newspaper career here as a reporter, serving five years in this capacity.

He first entered politics as a Liberal member for St. John in the provincial assembly in 1887 and beginning his political career in the House of Commons and represented St. John at Ottawa in 1896 and 1901.

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He leaves to mourn his wife, who was Mary Caroline, eldest daughter of the late Samuel Babbitt, Fredericton; two daughters, five sons, and also fourteen grandchildren and a great-grandchild.

Kiev, Russia, July 10.—Counsel for a Jew named Belas, accused of the murder of a little boy for ritualistic purposes, asked yesterday that subpoenas be issued calling for eighty-nine new witnesses, mostly Christians and including many distinguished theologians and professors as the court surgeon Doctor Pavlov, owing to the divergence of opinion among medical experts as to the nature of the wounds inflicted on the boy.

Bulgaria's Future Is at Stake in the War

Enemies Assail Her on Every Hand—Her Troops Reported Routed by Serbians—Victory for Greeks

(Canadian Press)

London, July 10.—The present is the most fateful crisis for the Bulgarian race since King Milan of Serbia in 1886 declared war against Bulgaria, in the absence of the Bulgarian army on the Turkish frontier," says the Sofia correspondent of the Times.

Bulgaria is now threatened by hostile forces on every side, but the manifold dangers of the situation, he says, are being confronted with extraordinary calmness and resolution. All reserves occupied by the Greek military service have been called out and they respond readily, it being realized that the whole future of the Bulgarian nation is at stake.

"A more cheerful view, however, prevails today, instead of a serious defeat which General Kovatchoff's laconic message was supposed to indicate as the motive for the evacuation of Kotel. It appears that no fighting has occurred in that region in the last two days. Three days have been occupied with the evacuation of the town and wounded, and the evacuation was due to strategic reasons. The troops have now taken up strong positions from which it will be difficult to dislodge them.

Second Stage of the Campaign

London, July 10.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Times yesterday said that the Bulgarian forward movement which precipitated the fighting at Iatip and Kotelchana was carried out in obedience to orders issued by General Ivanoff for his stout resistance against overwhelming forces.

HAD 29 PUT OUTS AND TWO ASSISTS

Connie Mack's Son Makes World Baseball Record

JACK JOHNSON IN FRANCE

Says He Will Never Return To United States—Match Between Palzer and Carpenter—Late Sporting News

Baltimore, July 10.—Earl Mack, son of Connie Mack, manager of the Philadelphia Athletics, is believed to have made a new world record yesterday for chances accepted in a ball game. The match was between the Raleigh and Durham clubs of the Carolina League. Mack accepted thirty-one chances, twenty-nine put outs and two assists, without an error.

The game went eighteen innings. Havre, France, July 10.—Jack Johnson, colored pugilist, arrived here today on board the S. S. Corinthian. Immediately on landing he announced his determination never to return to the United States. He said he would take up his residence in Paris.

Washington, July 10.—Jack Johnson's announcement that he would never return to the United States caused the department of justice officials to consider the steps to bring about the forfeiture of his \$500,000 personal bond pending in Chicago for his appearance in connection with white slave indictments. The federal attorneys say that France may deport Johnson.

New York, July 10.—Tom O'Rourke, manager of Al Palzer, has accepted the terms of T. H. Dienne, director of Woodland in Paris, France, for a match between Palzer and Georges Carpentier next October for a purse of \$15,000. An effort will be made to match the winner with Jack Johnson in November.

Nottingham, Eng., July 10.—A number of lawn tennis enthusiasts reached this city last night and early today to attend the playing of a sensational round robin here today, tomorrow and Saturday between teams representing Germany and the United States in the preliminary contests for the selection of the challenge England for the Dwygitt F. TURKEY SEIZES OPPORTUNITY TO GRASP TERRITORY

Greeks and Bulgars Both Claim Victories - Reports of Bulgarian Atrocities Confirmed

Constantinople, July 9.-The reply of Bulgaria to the request of the sublime porte agreeing to evacuate the Marmora coast, intimates that the Bulgarian delegate M. Natchovitch, ex-foreign minister, who arrived at Tchalatala today, is empowered to negotiate a settlement of the Marmora question.

London, July 9.-A correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, who arrived at Nigrita Saturday morning, describes the scene as a reeking heap of smouldering ruins and confirms the reports of wholesale murders and burning committed by the Bulgarians in all the villages around, as well as Nigrita. He estimates that 1,200 persons have been killed in this manner.

President Thomas Shaughnessy of the C. P. R. who was asked yesterday in Montreal concerning a contemplated issue of new stock by that company said there was no truth in the report.

There will be a ten thousand dollar exhibit of Canadian food fish this year at Toronto exhibition, by the dominion government. The display will be the first of its kind ever attempted in Canada.

The whaler "Diana" arrived at Sydney yesterday with the Crocker land expedition after a run of 7 1/2 hours from Boston.

Tenders will be called at Ottawa soon for the increasing of the capacity of the Ottawa branch of the Royal mint to take care of the larger amount of Canadian gold being submitted to the refining process each year.

The verdict of the coroner's jury in the case of Harley Dunlap, who was killed yesterday in a Woodstock mill, was that the death was accidental, but they recommended that the attention of the factory inspector be called to the open and dangerous condition of the mill.

About five hundred former residents of New Brunswick attended the picnic given by the N. B. Association of B. C., at Second Beach, B. C., on July 1. Colonel Sam Hughes and General Sir Ian Hamilton were in Sydney yesterday, and after spending part of the day there went to Halifax, arriving there at 11 o'clock last night. In Sydney they examined the various military properties, and inspected the Sydney battery, C. P. A. The minister intimated that new armory might be provided.

HOW FRIEDMANN'S SERUM IS PREPARED

New York, July 9.-Dr. George Rambood, of New York city, medical director of the institute operating on the Friedmann process for the treatment of tuberculosis, announced today that the "vaccine consists of a homogeneous emulsion of live avirulent tuberculous bacilli, in sterile distilled water.

The germ was isolated several years ago from a turtle and maintained ever since by transplantation on culture media, according to the usual procedure. The vaccine is administered to patients in doses of from cubic centimetres 0.10 to cubic centimetres 0.80 at intervals of from four to six weeks. Injections are made intravenously in the case of joint tuberculosis and intramuscularly in the case of lung tuberculosis.

He said: "Any physician in good standing is welcome to familiarize himself at the various laboratories where the vaccine is prepared, with the details concerning the administration of the treatment that he may be able to use it personally on his own patients."



**GREAT SALMON CATCH IN THE BAY LAST NIGHT**

Lorneville Fishermen Bring in 400 Fine Fish—A Profitable Season

If anyone who enjoys the delicious, nearly cut of Bay of Fundy salmon—who does not—had been walking along the South wharf this morning he would have seen a sight to make his heart glad. Two fishing boats laden deep in the water were coming sailing up the harbor with the record catch of the season—four hundred large, firm salmon. Last night while the people of St. John were reposing peacefully, a fleet of twenty-seven fishing boats set out from Lorneville with nets trailing to catch the coveted salmon lurking in the waters of the bay. Great was their joy in the morning when they gathered in the spoils and found that they had run into a school abounding in the finest fish, instead of the usual catch of 150-200 had found their way into the nets.

After the fish were brought into the end of South wharf they were hoisted up in a great bucket ten at a time and they will be stored for today. Tomorrow some of them will be sent to dealers in the city and the remainder, employed in St. John but by the greater number will be sent out on the west bound trains, some to upper Canada, others to Maine and Boston.

The salmon season this year is reported above the average and since in spite of the greatly increased catch the price remains as high as in other years next winter should prove an untroubled one for the residents of Lorneville.

**MR. ANGUS TO CONFER WITH COMMISSIONER**

Matter of Sidewalk Platform Which Was Declared an Obstruction

W. M. He found time in the midst of busy political and editorial duties to write several brochures, at one time coming out in favor of annexation to the United States and favoring complete reciprocity to the last. He was a warm advocate of maritime confederation.

**His Work for City.**  
Besides his work for St. John in the wider field of politics, Mr. Ellis was always a good citizen and gave good service as a school trustee, as a director of the N. B. Historical Society, president of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty, president of the Natural History Society of New Brunswick, and was also president of the Keystone Fire Insurance Company, and a director of the St. John Relief and Aid Society. He was the donor of the medal given for the best standing in English to students of the High school.

Hon. Mr. Ellis was a prominent fraternalist, having been prominent in both Masonic and Oddfellow lodges. He held the office of grand master, the highest in the gift of the Masonic order in New Brunswick, and was also P. G. H. priest of the Grand Chapter of New Brunswick, past commander-in-chief of the Sovereign Great Priory of Canada, past commander-in-chief of the Supreme Council Scottish Rite for Canada, and provincial grand master of the Royal Order of Scotland.
