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

### HOW FRIEDMANN'S SERUM IS PREPARED

New York, July 9-Dr. George Rambaud, of New York city, medical direc-Friedmann process for the treatment of tuberculosis, announced today that the

tuberculosis, announced today that the "vaccine consists of a homogenous emulsion of live avirulent tuberculosis bacilli, in sterile distilled water.

"The germ was isolated several years ago from a turtle and maintained ever since by transplantation on culture media, according to the usual procedure. The vaccine is administered to patients in doses of from cubic centimetres 0.10 to cubic centimetres 0.30 at intervals of from four to six weeks. Injections are

to cubic centimetres 0.80 at intervals of from four to six weeks. Injections are made introvenously in the case of joint tuberculosis and intramuscularly in the case of lung tuberculosis."

He said: "Any physician in good standing is welcome to familiarize himself at the various laboratories where the vaccine is prepared, with the details concerning the administration of the treatment that he may be able to use it personally on his own patients."

No Need To Have Superfluous Hair

In delatone, a simple way has been found to remove hairy growths from the face, neck or arms, and one aplication usually is sufficient to permanently banish every trace of disfiguring hair or fuzz. This treatment consists in applying a paste made with water and a little of the powdered delatone. After remaining on two or three minutes, rub it off and wash the skin, and it will be white, firm and hairless.

Short, straight eyelashes will grow long and have a silken sheen and delightful curl if proxin be applied at lash-roots with thumb and forefinger. Thin eyebrows come in thick every day. Use care and don't get any where no hair is desired.

Add nine tablespoons orange juice and five tablespoons lemon juice, and the grated rind of one orange. Cook ten minutes longer, add one cup chopped walnut meat, pour into buttered pan and let stand over night. Cut into squares and roll in powdered sugar.

The sale of Craganour recalls the fact that breeders in the Argentine have bought several high priced racehorses, the last being Your Majesty, winner of the St. Leger, for which £30,000 was paid. Cyllene, sire of four Derby winners in Cicero, Minoru, Lembeg, and Tagalie, was also sold to the Argentine for 30,000 guineas, a similar price being paid by that country for Diamond Jubilee, the late King Edward's Derby winner in 1900.

Polar Star, 18,000 guineas, and Pietermaritzburg, 15,000 guineas, are among other prices the Argentine has paid for racehorses whose reputations have been gained in this country, while to the United States was sent the famous Rock Sand for £25,000, and the unbeaten Ormonde, which, after being sold to the States for £12,000, was resold for the large sum of £31,250.
