SICILIAN PRISOMERS IN FIERCE REVOLT

Wreck Windows and Furniture

and Defy Soldiers

All Efforts to Calm Them Prove

Futile and Authorities Are

PALERMO, June 23—A, serious revolt has broken out in the prison here. Thursday evening a prisoner named Sansone, who was in the infirmary, began to protest that the soup was not good. He banged with his fist on the table and broke a bottle; then, turning the key in the door, began huding imprecations at everybody and threatening to kill anybody who approached him.

It would appear that his outrageous conduct was the signal for a general revolt, because all the prisoners, including the women, started an agitation and created a terrible din. The director of the prison was informed of the matter and ordered all the doors to be closed and the sentries to be doubled on the fortifications which surround the prison buildings.

Accompanied by guards, the director went to the infirmary and tried to induce Sansone to calm himself and unlock the door. But Sansone replied that he would only come out dead. Then the door was forced, and after a terrible struggle Sansone was overpowered.

Meanwhile, in all the rooms and cells, a fearful noise was being made. The prisoners hurled through the windows all sorts of projectiles, bottles, mugs, bedsteads and bedding, and a number of carabineers were hit. The

mugs, bedsteads and bedding, and a number of carabineers were hit. The stock of portable objects was exhausted and nothing remained in the rooms. The public prosecutor just escaped being hit in the face by a bottle which was launched at him.

Soon reinforcements were sent for, and four companies of infantry arrived on the scene, as well as a number of guards and carabineers. This had not the least effect in checking the disturbance; indeed, the prisoners cuty increased the tumuit. They shouted that they wanted to get out to "make sausage meat" of the director.

# THE LITTLE WAYS OF THE INDIAN SERVANTS

Housekeeping in India and in Canada are two verw different things. Excellent servant as the Indian is in many respects, honesty is not one of his qualities and he has to be strictly looked after when either money or goods are entrusted to him.

A mistress cannot go into her kit-

day or else expenses would increase in a surprising manner.

A mistress cannot go into her kitchen, consult the cook as to what the meals should be, and what should be ordered from the shops and leave the rest to him. She has to give him out from her locked stores every spoonful of everything that is required for the day's cooking else the goods would be sold outside.

HIRED CLOTHING.

The dusters, the name in India for every description of kitchen and pantry and table towel, have to be doled out every day or every two days, the solled ones being counted and locked up till they are given to the dhobil (washerwoman) who must not be allowed to keep the clothes of the household longer than is absolutely necessary, or he will let them out to his friends for small sums—silk handkerchiefs for feast days, stockings and woollen under-garments in the cold weather, so that holes appear in unaccustomed places.

A khitmatigar (table servant) will be the most of the family.

In the Civil Service the same thing happens. The pay of every post in the various services is published in the official lists and the serants know to a cent what their master gets.

People who go down into the sea in ships as passengers are sometimes disposed to concern themselves over the risks of storm and wreck to be encountered therein. As a matter of fact, these are not appreciably greater ashore than aftoat. They are known, and provision is made against them in any well-found vessel—the real dangers consist in small unknown contingencies, against which no foresight can guard.

Take, for instance, the case of the fine sailing ship Hollinwood, which some years ago left Sydney for the United Kingdom with a cargo of wool, copra, some "glue pieces," and a few bales of sinews. None of these things—as was borne out at the subsequent indury—suggested inflammability, and, indeed, all went well until the Hollinwood reached the North Atlantic.

Then smoke appeared from some of sinews, whilst other three similar bales and one of glue pieces were very hot. The former was thrown overboard, and the laster were removed to a place of safety, but a week later fire again broke out in the hold, and ultimately the ship had to be abandoned. The Court which investigated the case found that the fire originated with the sinews and glue pieces—goods which had been constantly shipped for years without the slightest indication of spontaneous combustion from them.




