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
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

Acadia because of the men 'that institution has given to us, and is still giving,
we shall rejoice."

We quote with pleasure the just and
generous words of our contemporary.
It is quite undeniable we think that
our brethren across the border are in
debt to us for a large number of very
valuable men whom we have educated in
our institutions here in these provinces
and sent over to them. In an address
delivered not long since by Mr. Frank
W. Pavear before the Baptist Social
Union, Boston, and published in our
columns, it was shown that of the 369
students who in the past fire years have
come to Newton 9.4 per cent. came from

Bochester, Croser and Chicago. It is
impossible to prevent this movement of
our young preachers toward the west

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
