**RECORDS GO ON AMERICAN RACE TRACKS**

**Union Lowered Record at Charter Oak Park--The Harvester Wins Free-for-All--Canadian at Hills Grove.**

Charter Oak Park, Hartford, Conn., Sept. 9.--Sensational horse racing brought to a close today, the grand circuit meet held in connection with the Connecticut State fair at Charter Oak Park. Union won an exhibition mile to wagon in 1:14, which is near a world's record for exhibition mile. The other feature was the breaking of the track record by The Harvester in the free for all trot. The track events were the finest of the week. The Harvester won in straight heats, the time in the second and final heats being 2:03, which broke the track record of 2:04-2/4, made by Hamburg Belle. This race was a walk over for the winner. The second honors went to Bob Douglas. It was a two in three event, and apart from the performance of The Harvester, was uninteresting. The honors in the 2:16 pace and the 2:16 trot went in straight heats to Sara Ann Patch, and Daddis Archdale. The first heat of the 2:17 trot was won by Senator Hale in a close finish. Rebecca G. Took, the second, and the two winners fought it out alone in the final heat, as it was a two in three event. In the final heat the horses kept close well into the stretch when Senator Hale became fagged, and finished a poor second flight this afternoon, with a strong wind swept over the field.

**Canadian Horse Wins.**

Hills Grove, R. L., Sept. 9.--In the fastest four heat race ever paced over the track, St. Anthony, the fleet son of Bourbon Patchen, owned by Lew Martin of Kingston, Ontario, captured the last three heats and the race after thoughtful stole away to a good start and landed the opening heat, each heat was hotly contested and in the third heat Thoughtful and X-Ray pushed the gelding so hard that Burnham was forced to lift his gelding under the wire in 2:01 3/4, giving him a new mark.

Dillon Maid, the willing daughter of Baron Dillon, put up one of the gamest exhibitions witnessed in many years, when she won the 2:24 trot on three legs. An extra heat was necessary to declare a winner in the 2:16 trot, which furnished some thrilling racing with hard drives and blanket finishes the rule. Admorell, the favorite, owned by W. L. Rhodes of Wilmington, Del., took the first two heats, only to be beaten in the third, which appeared to be a dead heat. The gelding broke in the home stretch and Dan Dee, coming fast, got the decision by an eyelash. In the final heat Dan Dee went lame at the quarter but after the son of Adbell giving him a grand battle, Rhodes had the speed to stave him off and win the race.
