

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male ever 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitobe, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency that the office of any Local Agent of Dominion Lands (not sub-agent) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upos and cultivation of the land in each of three years. The conditions of the land in each of three years are conditions. A habitable house is required in every case, except when residence is performed.


