





Foreign Secretary Says GovernmentWill Endeavor to Secure Open Door to British Commerce in All Parts of China,

London, April 20.—The preservation of the common interests of all the powers in China by the insurance of the independents and the integrity of the Chinese republic, and the prin-ciple of equal opportunities for the commerce and industry of all nations in China was declared by Sir Edward Grey, Foreign Secretary, to be the policy of the British government in China.

Sir Edward spoke in the Hous bommons. He was asked a num of questions concerning the neg ions now going on between China apan, but he replied that under present conditions, while the neg sent conditions, while the negotia-ons were still proceeding he was not le to make a detailed statement peaking generally, however, he de-ared that the policy of the Britiah yvernment in China continued to be yverened by the terms of the Anglo-panese agreement as defined above.
