OTTAWA, May 12.

Saturday afternoon the Sanitary Committee submitted a plan for ventilating the House.

Mr. Holton became exceedingly angry because Hon. Mr. Tilley declined to say, until Monday, when the resolution fixing the price of land on the line of the Pacific Railway would be introduced.

Mr. Mitchell delivered an eloquent eulogy on the clerical hero, and hoped the poor fishermen who so nobly aided him in his good work would not be forgotten by the Government.

Lord Campbell on route for Ottawa. Lord George Gordon Campbell, son of the Duke of Argyll and brother of the Marquis of Lorne, was at the Victoria Hotel yesterday. He is a Lieutenant in the Royal Navy, and is at present, attached to H. M. ship Challenger, for some months past engaged in making scientific deep-sea soundings in the Atlantic Ocean. His Lordship is accompanied by three or four other officers, and goes direct to Ottawa to visit Lord Dufferin. He is about twenty-three years old, and has a very pleasing manner. In conversation with a Tribune reporter yesterday he gave many interesting details of the deep-sea soundings in which they have been engaged, describing very graphically the strange dead and living things brought up by the grapples from the depth of the great ocean. He acknowledged, however, with some reluctance, that he had grown rather weary of the work and received his leave of absence with much joy. He called on his old friend, Rev. George J. Calk, yesterday. It was the intention of the Captain of the Challenger to land the party at New York, but a gale at Sandy Hook forced him to bear up to Halifax.

Shipping Notes. H. M. S. Challenger, with the exploring expedition on board, arrived at Halifax on the 9th inst. from Bermuda, from which port she sailed on the 21st inst. She had been dredging all the way, which caused the delay in reaching her port. Since she left nothing unusual has transpired, with the exception that on the 7th inst., while dredging, and at a depth of nearly two miles, the dredge brought up a large rock, weighing upwards of 400 lbs.; it is granite, and a lot of dark mud was around it. The following gentleman composed the expedition: Prof. Myrtle Thompson, leader of the expedition; Mr. Mosley, naturalist; Mr. Wyde, draftsman; Dr. Buchanan, analyst; John Morry, the great American explorer, and Dr. Shann, surgeon. She will leave again on or about the 18th inst., for the Western Isles and Madeira, and will remain from home three years longer, during which time it is intended she will make tour of the world. She reports that H. M. S. Royal Alfred was to come out of dock on the 4th, and to sail for Halifax on the 10th inst.

The Governor Willard. This superb vessel was launched from Messrs. Crutshank & Pittfield's yard at noon to-day, and towed round to the Custom House wharf, where she is to be rigged and fitted for sea. She is a handsome vessel and well worth inspection.

The schooner Jello, Kingston, master, on her passage to New York with a cargo of spinnings, struck on the ledge rocks, Two Rivers, N. S. She listed of shortly afterwards. Is much damaged.

New York, May 10, p. m. Gold 117 1/2; slight exchange 109 1/2; money 7 per cent.

A tornado passed over Belleterre, Ohio, yesterday, blowing down a church and several dwellings, causing \$40,000 damage. Nobody killed. United States troops have been called upon to restore order in Louisiana.

London, May 10. George Bidwell, one of the forgers implicated in the recent heavy bill frauds on the Bank of England, has turned Queen's evidence against his associates in the affair. It is now believed that Edward Noyes and others charged with the forgeries, will be speedily convicted.

A despatch from Rome says the Pope was too ill yesterday to receive the party of pilgrims from France. Consols closed 109 1/2; breadstuffs quiet. The reduction of the duty on sugar causes a decline in that article. Sales at 298 6d to 30s on the spot.

London, May 11. PARLIAMENTARY ELECTION. The Observer states that a general election for members of Parliament will be held next Spring. The present Parliament will meet for the last time in February for a short session, when after voting the estimates it will be dissolved. The new Parliament will be convoked shortly after the Easter holidays.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION. At the Republican Convention in Birmingham to-day a letter from John Bright was read discontinuing the Republican agitation, and emphatically declaring that the writer had no sympathy with those who sought to uproot British monarchy.

ATTEMPTED ASSASSINATION. It is reported that the Emperor of Germany was freed upon a pretext while reviewing the troops at St. Petersburg. The ball passed through his helmet and severely wounded an Adjutant.

M. LONDON, May 11. The Federals have arranged every election district in the city. It is reported that Magistrates have received orders to hold Admiral Topete under arrest.

STAMER ATLANTIC. The official inquiry into the loss of the Atlantic liner Sunday at Liverpool. This city was visited by a terrible conflagration in which one hundred and fifty buildings were destroyed. Many accidents occurred and several fatalities, six persons being known to have perished.

New York, May 12. An accident occurred to one of the cylinders of the steamship Oceanic in New York harbor, Saturday, as she was on her way out, which will cause a detention of two or three days.

A warehouse fire gave way Saturday, in Petersburg, Va., injuring several persons severely.

ST. LOUIS, May 12. Reported this morning at New Orleans, loss \$100,000; at St. Louis, Mo., loss \$75,000.

TORNADO. A terrible tornado, accompanied with great destruction of property, is reported from Ohio.

James Patreux, a sailor, was given in charge by the Chief Mate of the Castalia for being drunk and fighting on board that steamer. He was sent to goal for two weeks or until his ship leaves, and the fine is to be deducted from his wages.
