WIRELESS TELEPHONES ARE WORKING SUCCESSFULLY

French Minister of Marine Talked with Operator Thirty Miles Away

PARIS, April 12.—Naval Lieutenant Colly and Jeanes, the inventors of a wireless telephone apparatus with which they succeeded last fall in communicating with Diego from Paris, today introduced a new and greatly improved apparatus. The Minister of Marine expressed conversation with operators at Melon, a distance of 20 miles, and he declared that the result was a vast improvement over that obtained by the ordinary telephone. The sound was clearer and purer. In December 1907, messages from Berlin declared that Waldemar Poulson had succeeded in telephoning without wires from a suburb of Berlin of 250 miles. The dispatches said that the sound of music played in Berlin was distinctly heard at the other end, that messages were twice exchanged and that the communication left nothing to be desired in the way of clearness and audibility.

SHERIFF STEWART AND ARTHUR CULLIGAN HANDLE PATRONAGE

In Answer to Enquiries of Mr. Currie the Following Answers Were Given—Warden Not Dismissed.

CROWN PROSECUTOR.

Ans.—The Government has received recommendations from Mr. Stewart and Mr. Culligan in reply to Mr. Currie's enquiry. Mr. Stewart is in charge of the prison in the county since the appointment of James E. Stewart as High Sheriff.

Q.—Who has acted for the Crown before the Court in the County of Restigouche since the present Government came into power?

Ans.—At the Circuit Court held in the County of Restigouche on the 2nd Tuesday in October, 1907, the Attorney General personally conducted the criminal prosecution on behalf of the Crown. At the Circuit Court held on Tuesday the 10th of March in the County of Restigouche, neither the Attorney General nor the Solicitor General were able to attend, the former being occupied in conducting the criminal prosecutions at the St. John Court and the latter conducting criminal prosecutions in the County of Madawaska at the Circuit Court, both of which courts opened on the same day as that on which the Restigouche Circuit was held.

Q.—What reasons were given by those who are dispensing the patronage in Restigouche County, for singling out Victor Desjarret of Bathurst, for dismissal among the Deputy Game Wardens appointed in 1907?

Ans.—Victor Desjarret was not singled out for dismissal, he served out the term for which he was appointed and was not re-appointed.

SUBSIDY AGAIN FOR NAVIGATION CO.

Amount Placed in N. B. Estimates for This Important Service in Glo. Co.

MANY BILLS INTRODUCED.

PREDEFERCTION, April 8.—House met at 2 o'clock. Hon. Mr. Maxwell protested against the action of the committee in turning down St. John bill No. 34. It was a bill of interest only to St. John city in connection with the police force. Hon. Mr. McLeod said there was yet time to reintroduce the bill.

Bills were introduced as follows: Hon. Mr. Hazen, to amend the town's incorporation as relating to Shediac; Mr. McInerney, relating to the union of St. John and Portland; Hon. Mr. Shierley, as relating to the Town of Newcastle; Mr. Hatheway, to authorize the city of St. John to build a bridge across the harbor; Mr. McInerney to amend the act relating to sewerage in the city of St. John; Mr. Byrne to authorize the town of Edmundton to issue bonds; Mr. Wilson, to amend the act relating to the construction and inspection of buildings in St. John, and to amend the act relating to the police force in St. John; Mr. Tweeddale to incorporate the Têbique Pulp and Paper Co.

The House went into supply. Mr. Storaal in the chair, on the item of \$150,000 for roads and bridges. Mr. Russell said he desired to call attention to the necessity of lighting some of the covered bridges.

Hon. Mr. Marvay said the government thought if they undertake work of this kind, the municipalities should assist.

On the item of \$12,500 for steam navigation Mr. Byrne asked if it was

the intention of the government to continue the subsidy to the Gloucester Navigation Company, which was performing a necessary and important service and giving satisfaction.

Hon. Mr. Morrice said the subsidy given last year and would be given again this year.

Concerning \$5,000 for wharves, Mr. Robinson, inquired if the government had accepted if the Dominion will take over the responsibilities of the wharves.

Hon. Mr. Morrice said the Dominion government was willing to pay half the cost when the province paid half.

Mr. Chapp asked if any surveys had been made of the wharves for which appropriation was asked, and Mr. Morrice replied that the amount was appropriated to the wharves.

Hon. Mr. Hazen said they had built several wharves, especially in Sunbury and Quocoms.

On an item of \$4,000 Hon. Mr. Fleming said it was largely for insurance. The government had thought it necessary to considerably increase the amount of insurance on various public buildings.

Hon. Mr. Fleming said the government was bound to provide reasonable protection. The last government had accepted if the Dominion will take over the responsibilities of the wharves.
