





THE FREE TRADERS VIEW In looking over the objections urged against a change of policy as regards pulpwood the free trader's view point must not be ignored. This has been expressed by Mr. Bcoth's fellow townsman, Senator Edwards, who regards the agitation for an export duty as the origination of those who want to circumscribe the market and make owners of pulpwood sell at the prices they dictate. He declared himself to be in favor of manufacturing the raw material in Canada, but said he, "I do not want any Chinese legislation to help me' The senator, who is the head of a great lumber company, was emphatic in his declaration. "If," said he, "the Canadian people with the most numerous and the best water powers in the world, the greatest quantity of available spruce for the making of pulp, and labor as good as that which can be found anywhere else cannot get along in that particular industry without such help as some claim they must have, they had better go and die; they are not fit to live. 
