LONDON SOUTH VOTING.

It is satisfactory to know that the London South amalgamation campaign will be short and sharp. A long-suffering reading public will join with us in the hope that it will be decisive.

The date fixed for the taking of the vote is April 21, two weeks from next Mon day. In accordance with the law govern ing votes of this description the amend ment to the bill provides that all municipal electors shall be entitled to vote. This will insure a full and free declaration of opinion on the part of the whole Had such a vote been arranged for in the January contest, all this extra trouble would have been avcided. As pointed out by Mr. Hutchin son and his associates, the amalgamation question was really decided on the election of Mr. Pritchett to the deputy reeveship, he having secured a majority of the vote over both of his anti antagonists. When however, the case was taken to the Legis lature, Mr. Hutchinson declined to stand by his own declaration, and this additiona vote was deemed necessary.

As it has been pretty conclusively proved

that the Municipal Act affords no adequate machinery for establishing and managing waterworks in a portion of a township, and there is no reason to believe the Westminster Council wound undertake the job in any case, the friends of amalga mation now believe that the vote in favor of amalgamation, comparatively small in January, will be much strengthened on the 21st inst. Both parties, we hear, are working like beavers at a spring dambuilding, but it seems to us that, supported by the liberality of the terms and by the necessities of the situation, the friends of amalgamation have the advantage.

Reciprocity with Canada Invited in the Matter of Aiding Wrecked Vessels —The Latest Hudson River Bridge Scheme.

Washington, D. C., April 3.—In the House of Representatives yesterday on motion of Mr. Mason, Illinois, a bill was passed amending the Act to Aid Vessels Wrecked or Disabled in Water Coterminus to the United States and the Dominion of Canada. It grants authority to Canadian wrecking vessels to aid Canadian vessels in distress when similar authority shall have been given by the Canadian Government to wrecking vessels of the United States to aid United States to aid United States wessels in distress.

It is represented to the applicant that he will be thoroughly drilled in the American methods of farming, and that he will be able to become a well-to-do country gentleman in a short time after he has mastered the intricacies of Western agriculture. The fee is paid, the young man crosses the ocean, and begins the laborious life of an American agriculturist, ignorant even of the first principles of farming. The poor dupe soon finds that he has lost his money and gained no knowledge.

A REMARKABLE resolution has been brought into the United States House of Representatives by a member from New York State. Its intention is to afford better protection for human life on the At-lantic Ocean. TUNNELING NIAGARA.

Manufactories Involving Three and Half Millions of Dollars

LOCKPORT, N. Y., April 3.—A contract has been signed at Niagara Falls between the Niagara Falls Power Company and the Cataract Construction Company, the latter composed of New York capitalists, for the construction of a tunnel 30 feet square, starting at a point near the waters' edge, a short distance below the Falls and extending under the village and above about two miles, where large manufactories are to extending under the village and above about two miles, where large manufactories are to be built, the mills discharging water from their wheels into the tunnel. The Budget Debate Resumed-Bow the évernment's Promises Have Been Broken—Tariff Burdens and N. P Fallacies Discussed.

OTTAWA, Wednesday, April 2.

In the House of Commons to-day, when Government bills were called, Mr. Chapleau and Mr. Dewdney ordered the measures of which they had given notice, one to amend the Franchise Act and one to amend the Indian Advancement Act, to stand. Sir John Thompson presented his bill to amend the Interpretation Act. He explained that the bill was intended to guard against courts assuming acts explaining the law to involve an amendment.

Sir Richard Cartwright asked whether the Government intend to cause the number of persons actually present in the Dominion at the time of taking the census to be recorded as well as those enumerated under the de jure system.

Mr. Carling replied that the census would be taken on the de jure system and the greatest care would be taken to secure accuracy.

In reply to Mr. Jones (Halifax), Sir John Macdonald stated that the freight on pig iron from Londonderry, Nova Scotia, to Montreal over the Intercolonial Railway was \$2 46 per ton, being at the rate for the 598 miles of 4-10 cent per mile.

Mr. Foster gave notice that to-morrow he would move for the Committee of the Whole to consider the following resolution: That it is expedient to provide by law that a bounty of \$2 per ton be paid on all pig iron manufactured in Canada from Canadian ore between July 1, 1892, and June 30, 1897, inclusive.

Who Has the Hict Still.

At the Police Court this morning Charles Woodward, a baker, whose shop and residence is at 38 Waterloo street, was charged by Inspector Henderson with a breach of the Liquor Act in having a large quantity of liquor on his premises for which he had no license. Detectives Rider and Phair swore as to finding the liquor. While the officers were searching the premises the accused left the honse, and was caught in the act of running sway with a demijolan containing over two gallons of whisky. A smaller jar of whisky and several empty jars and bottles were also found. Inland Revenue Collector Alexander testified that he was present when the liquor wasfound. The object of the visit was to search for an illicit still. The liquor found was evidently of illicit manufacture because it contained a large amount of fusil oil and also sugar. Woodward swore that he used the liquor for making cakes and syrups and also for bitters, but he never sold any of it. He claimed to have bought the liquor from Mr. McMillan, a licensed man of London South. Mr. Frank Love appeared for the defendant and Mr. McKillop looked after the interests of the Crown. The case was dismissed. The inland revenue people are quiet satisfied with the result of the trial, as their point was gained when the accused stated where he procured the liquor. He had refused this information when asked by the officers at the time of the seizure. The officers now have a clue to work on, as they are convinced that the liquor is of illicit manufacture.
