

Parnell ought to have taken a lesson from the fate of Sir Charles Dilke. Sir Charles a few years ago was one of the ablest men in the British House of Commons. He stood next to Mr. Gladstone in the ranks of the Liberal party, with the prospect of succeeding his chief in the due course of nature. But he fell, just as Mr. Parnell has fallen. The newspaper accounts were shocking to the English sense of morality, and Sir Charles was at once forced to retire into the obscurity of a private and be emirched citizen. Whether he was or was not as black as he was painted, public opinion decreed that he must go, and from that day until now Sir Charles Dilke is an ostra-

A similar fate has since befallen another nember of the House of Commons; not a great man, it is true, but prominent by eason of his military title, position in society and status as a Conserva-tive. Public sentiment compelled him to withdraw from the House, and now his name is almost unknown. It is indeed one of the distinguishing qualities of the English people that they will not tolerate licentiousness in their representative men, and although there are in the House of Lords members of malodorous reputation, it is almost certain that they could not remain in that chamber had the ople a voice in their selection.

Parnell has made the mistake of his life in attempting to brave the moral sense of the English people, after having disgraced himself. The fate of Sir Charles Dilke ought to have been warning enough to him and had he profited by it he might have half-redeemed his character in the service done to his country. But manifestly Ire-land does not hold the first place in his estimation, and he is doing his utmost to drag her down to his own level.

BEWARE OF THE SPECULATORS The decision of the Ontario Government in closing the lands adjoining the new min-

ing territory of Sudbury, and refusing to sell them under the old system which gave great advantages to the speculator, has been well received in the Province. All the district lying between the eastern limit of Awrey, in Nipissing, to the western limit of Esten and Spragge, a distance of about 115 miles, and extending from the French River and Georgian Bay north, has been closed. TO-MORROW'S CEREMONY.

The opening of the new wing of the City Hospital to-morrow night will be an eve nt of no small importance. There was a time when public hospitals were managed in a very perfunctory manner, the chief object being to bestow as little care as possible on the unfortunates compelled to seek shelter and treatment within their walls. That day has gone past. While not forgetting that public institutions should be managed with due regard to the public purse, out of which the greater portion of the sustaining fund must come, a philanthropic spirit now dictates the management of these hos-pitals. Patients are surrounded with all easonable comforts and an endeavor is ade to render their lot as cheerful as possible. Nothing has conduced more to this than the improvement which has taken place in the nursing of patients. Indeed, oper nursing is one of the most effective ds that the healing art can have.

It has been worked with suc cess in Great Britain under the super vision of the St. John's Ambulance Associa tion of England, and there is no reason why the same good results should not flow from its introduction here. The uneducated policeman has been known to frequently mistake genuine sickne drunkenness, to the serious, if not fatal injury of the victim.

::: -The Canadian consus will not be taken efore April next, when the enumeration of the population of the whole British Empire will be undertaken. Germany anticipates us by three months, the imperial census having been taken on the night of Nov. 30-Dec. 1. In Germany census cards are left by Government officials at every house beore census night, and on these cards the householder records on the succeeding morning all the required information conerning all persons, transient or permanent, during the night. Thus all duplication and omission are avoided. The questions on the census cards concern the relationship of each person to the householder, occupation religion, military service and rank, and mother tongue, besides the usual inquiries as to age, etc. In Prussia, a typical German State, it is expected that, despite the heavy emigration, this year's census will show an increase in round numbers from 27,000,000 in 1880 to 30,000,000 in 1890, or approximately 11 per cent. "Little Prussia" of the days of Napoleon I. will then have more than sextupled her population in the last 80 years.






