Lord Salisbury repudiated the report from Gladstonian sources to the effect that if home rule should be defeated now the Conservatives and their Liberal-Unionist allies would suggest a similar scheme. This report had no foundation in truth. Whenever the Conservatives should be again in charge of the Government they would go back to the policy which they had already put to the test with satisfactory results.

A Bad Vear A Bad Year.

LONDON, May 25.—The Iron and Steel Institute of Great Britain is holding its Institute of Great Britain is holding its annual meeting. President Richards, in addressing the institute, said that the year 1892 had been one of the worst years ever known in the iron and steel industries. Those industries were still greatly deprossed, and the outlook was gloomy. The production of pigiron had fallen off 600,000 tons, and steel rails were in a worse condition. The total failing off in the exports of metals and machinery in 1892, as compared with 1891, amounted to £7,000,000. The markets were now swamped, and there was not enough work for half the country's steel products. In regard there was not enough work for halt the country's steel products. In regard to seeking new markets President Richards drew a comparison between the Richards drew a comparison between the United States, with 60,000,000 of people and 175,000 miles of railway, and India, with 250,000,000 of people and 17,000 miles of railway. Was it any wonder, he asked, that under Euglish rule India has developed wretchedly? Mr. Abel, who followed President Richards as a speaker, spoke in an encouraging and hopeful tone, and expressed an opinion that there were signs of betterment. MILK AND WATER.

Lacteal Vendors Fined by the Police Magistrate

For Mixing the Two Fluids or Skimming the Milk-The Results of the Analysis.

The sitting of the Police Court this morning was of two hours and a-half duration. The proceedings, however, to those who appreciate a pure and unadulterated quality of the white qliuid—milk—were of a rather interesting nature. Seven dealers in this commodity were arraigned charged with an infraction of the Adulteration Act. The cases against four were dismissed, while those against the other three were sustained.

T. A. Jackson was the first one of the prosecuted called. Dr. Hutchinson, medica health officer, stated that he had procured a sample of the defendant's milk; that he a sample of the defendant's milk; that he had made two separate analyses which corroborated each other; and that, in order to avoid any mistake, he had given a portion of the sample to Prof. Harrison, public analyst, for further examination.

Prof. Harrison affirmed the statement of the former witness. He had made a thorough examination of the sample submitted; had found it to contain only 1.63 of butter fat, showing, consequently, a sub-

mitted; had found it to contain only 1.63 of butter fat, showing, consequently, a substraction of considerably over 50 per cent. of this ingredient; and had as a result, returned the sample with the judgment that it was badly skimmed. On being cross-examined he averred that the authorized standard of prosecutions was whenever the milk stood 3:05 of butter fat.

The case of David Carroll, a milk dealer, charged with a similar offense, was taken up. Dr. Hutchinson said that he had examined a sample of this dealer's milk, and had found it not only badly skimmed, but probably watered.

but probably watered.
"What do you mean by 'probably?"
asked the magistrate.
"It was most likely skimmed," responded the witness.
"What is the meaning of 'most likely?"

continued the justice.
"Well, I can't say positively," said Dr.
Hutchinson, "whether the milk was watered

or not."
"You cannot, then," pursued the magistrate, "offer your conjectures as evidence."
In response to a question Dr. Hutchinson stated that the sample in question, half of which had also been submitted to Dr. Harrison, contained 2.02 of butter fat.

a minute and careful examination of the milk-sample submitted. Adulteration had taken place. The sample contained 2.02 of butter fat, and 8.03 of solids, not fat.

The various samples, it appears in these cases, were tested about the middle of March. Magistrate Parke wanted to know why so long a time had been allowed to intervene between the analysis and the prosecution. Dr. Hutchinson represented that he had been ordered by the Board of Health to wait until all the samples of the that he had been ordered by the Board of Health to wait until all the samples of the various milkmen had been investigated before any prosecutions were instituted. The magistrate, however, thought the mode of procedure was manifestly unfair. He maintained that it was unjust when one man had been found infringing the bylaw, to permit several months to elapse in order that a baker's dozen of deliquents could be experient.



"Some of the mbers of the Legislature who oppose the plebiscite," says our contemporary, "take the ground that it is contrary to the principle of responsible government. It is desibtful if that is a valid objection. A responsible government is responsible to the people, and should not act contrary to the wishes of the majority. That is to say, if a citizen of Russia can be proved to have "thought" that what are now decreed to be the "rights" of the Emperor should be curtailed, he shall lose all civil rights and forfeit his life! Penal servitude in Siberia being a lesser punishment than death, it will doubtless be meted out to all citizens who may be suspected of even beginning to think that the sacred decrees of the Czar and his minions are not absolutely perfect and unassailable. Is it any wonder that the Czar fears the outcome of such a policy

IS THERE A DEARTH OF ME-CHANICS IN CANADA?

A Solomon has arisen in the midst of us, and he has solved-at least to his own satisfaction-the exodus. Discussing the great loss in population which Canada has sustained in the last ten years, the London Free Press reaches the conclusion that the exodus is caused chiefly by the determination of our youth not to take up the occupations of farmers and mechanics. If they would only go farming or learn trades, then they could all stay at home and enjoy life in comparative luxury. That we may do our contemporary justice, let us quote the gist of its argument. The Free Press gist of its argument. The Free Press writer says:

"There is hardly a youth of superior "There is hardly a youth of superior education, intelligence and industry, graduating from the high schools, but can find ready openings for his best talents in Canada. But there are very many of the lesser qualified who cannot find room, and because they are not at once given good places, being unwilling to work the soil or serve their time at a trade, become discontented and leave the country, often to do well, in a few cases better than they could have done at home by much trying, yet in very many cases to do worse or fail utterly."

And scale.

And again :

And again:

"A good tradesman has a little gold mine at his command so long as he is able to use hand and brain. But the graduates of our high schools seem averse to agricultural and mechanical occupations, and look to callings which they vainly imagine to be higher and to afford an easier living. They forget that the intelligent, educated farmer who works upon business principles is really the best paid and most independent member of the community, or that the possessor of a good trade, who learns and applies all that there is to be learnt, and works at it industriously, is never at a loss for well-paid employment. The Germans understand this, and hence every boy is obliged to learn a trade of some gort, so that he can have no excuse for inability to earn a living, and that whatever reverse of fortune may happen he can apply his hand to a settled calling."

This is a different story from that preached by our contemporary when it was aiding in having foisted upon this country the policy of high taxation. At that time, the story recited on a hundred platforms and repeated in the journals advocating so-called "protection" was: "Permit us to increase the taxes, and we will stop the exodus. Allow us to prevent you from buying cheap goods, and we will s your sons and daughters from looking for work abroad."

The delusiveness of this cry has been exploded. The quack, economists have beer found out. The exodus has been far greater under the system of high taxation than under the revenue tariff. And even in so highly favored and advantageously situated a city as London the census proves that the population increased at a far slower ratio in the last ten years than it did in the days of low taxation.

What groundwork is there for our contemporary's argument? It tells the young men-presumably of this western districtthat if they will but learn a trade, they can all get remunerative employment in Can-ada, and it even goes the length of indorsing the view insolently propounded by the junior Tupper that only second-rate me-



Within the last week or so an old brick building situated behind O'Callaghan's Terace on Ridout street, and just on the brow of the hill overlooking the river, has been razed to the ground. The venture was not a financial success, but it effected a compromise on the position of the market which was changed to its venture was not a financial success, but it effected a compromise on the position of the market which was changed to its present position as being satisfactory to both pertions of the town. Then the west end market fell into disuse; the main building was ultimately changed into the present terrace of dwelling houses. The old building recently demolished, however, remained almost unchanged during the long course of years. Some cleanly-inclined citizen ran a bath house there for a time, but there was no sower pollution in

inclined citizen ran a bath house there for a time, but there was no sewer pollution in the Thames then, and the competition was so brisk that the place closed for lack of support. During the Trent 'trouble the building was used as a drill hall, and when the barracks was in operation it was turned into a store house. Of late years the place has fallen into desuetude and surrounded by a high board fence and a marble yard in front, its associations have gradually been forgotten.


