

third. Seven horses ran. THE IRISH LAND BILL. London, Aug. 11.-There was an atmosphere of compromise in the House of Lords yesterday when the Irish Land Bill came up on its third reading. The Marquis of Lansdowne submitted three amendments, which were somewhat in favor of the landlords, and these were accepted by the House. About a dozen amendments were offered by the landlords, but after brief

debates they were withdrawn. Numerous photographs were taken, but they are of little value.

THE SUN'S ECLIPSE.

An Impressive Scene, but No New Scientific Data Gathered.

London, Aug. 11.-The Times has a dispatch from Vadsoe, on Varanger Fjord, near which point observations were taken by Mr. Downing, supermtendent of the British Nautical Almanac, and a number of other English astronomers, including Sir Robert Ball, of Cambridge. This correspondent describes the impressive scene of the moon's shadow sweeping over the earth at the moment of the totality of

the eclipse. "The view from Mr. Commons' observatory," he says, "extends for 30 miles up Varanger Fjord to the mountains opposite. The deep purple shad-ow plunged the mountains in temporary obscurity. As it advanced across the fjord, the shadow enveloped the training squadron, the details of the rigging disappearing from view, and the ships' lights gleamed forth brilliantly. Still shadow pressed on with majestic speed, a mile in every two It moved as swiftly as a seconds. cannon ball, until it reached the observers at Vadsoe, announcing the totality of the eclipse.

"Complete darkness lasted for 100 seconds. The unwonted spectacle hushed everyone to silence. A few startled birds hurried past the camp. "Although all the vistors felt that the magnificnent phenomena were worthy of remembrance, scientifically all the labors were hardly anything. The light around was not greater than that of a full moon, but in the distance the mountain tops were shining brilliantly. The manner in which the darkness lifted was almost startling in its sudden-

ness, but the sun was still hidden in clouds." Yokohama, Aug. 11.-Word has been received that the British, American and Japanese expeditions for the puroose of observing the eclipse at Akkshi, on the Island of Yeso, the most northerly island of the Japanese group, proved a failure owing to the dense fog prevailing at that place, and that no observations were taken.

Terribly Fatal Effects of the Torrid Temperature.

The Death List Growing Larger Every Hour.

Cardinal Vaughan's Brother Prostrate in Chicage-The Mercury Reaches 100 Degrees in Many Places.

Chicago, Aug. 11.—As the blazing sun pushed its way up over Lake Michigan yesterday morning the intensity of the heat was increased hour by hour. To make life still more unbearable a steamy hot wind, as baneful as a sirocco from the sands of Sahara, blew over the city from the marshes and swamps beyond the southern limit. It was a blighting wind and men sought to escape from it. It was terrible even on the lake front and in those quarters of Chicago where wealth and plenty abound, but in the poverty-stricken tenement districts the agony was awful. All night long the miserable wretches sweltered and panted in vain for breath of refreshing air. They slept, or tried to sleep, by thousands on the sidewalks and on the paying stones, while the steamy vapors rose from the garbage heaps spreading death and disease. The city ambulance and patrol wagons from the police stations, were kept on the run all night long bearing victims of the heat to the hospitals.

The Very Rev. Prior Vaughan, of London, is lying at the point of death at the Auditorium annex. He was overcome by the heat, and is now in a critical condition. He is a brother of Cardinal Vaughan, of England, and is making the trip around the world for his health.



emarkable Session of the Christian Alliance Convention.

At Old Orchard, Me. - A Crowd of 10,000 Swept by Religious Emotions.

Old Orchard, Me., Aug. 11.-The emotional convention is spreading. There was one here Sunday, but it was not political. It was the mission day of Dr. Simpson and Christian Alliance convention, and the day appointed for the receipt of offerings.

"The record has been broken for giving for missions," said the Rev. D. W. Lelacheur, a missionary in China. The total offering is \$101,500, the largest amount subscribed in a single service for the work. The money has literally poured down like rain."

"Either we have been in the real presence of the Spirit of else this great audience has been under the hypnotic influence of the speakers," emarked a cool business man after the day was over. He is a man not a member of the alliance.

The stately pines and towering beeches of the Old Orchard camp ground, a veritable tabernacle of nature, have looked upon many remarkable gatherings. They have heard the patriotic utterances of Hannibal Hamlin in the times of political peril; they have listened to the eloquence of Jas. A. Garfield; they have seen John B. Gough hold a great audience spell-bound; they have scattered with the breezes of heaven the echoes of songs rung by thousands, thrilled by the preaching of a Beecher or a Phillips Brooks; but never in their long years have they been silent witnesses of a more remarkable scene than that which was enacted Sunday. When Dr. Simpson arose to make his appeal he faced a crowd of at least 10,000 people. It was an audience made up from every walk and condition of life, and an audience that sat for hours hanging on the words of the exhorters, laughing or weeping at the will speakers, shouting hallelujahs, and showing by the workings of the countenances the earnestness of their interest in the services. It was an audience that was finally to lose all control of itself in favor of its faith, and in the end was to contribute, under its influence of what a layman would call a religious-evangelistic hysteria, and in sums ranging from a nickel to \$25,000, the sum of \$101,500. Dr. Simpson's sermon was brief. His theme was that all are debtors to Christ, and can never liquidate till they have given everything and done every-

thing possible. He said:
"We must sacrificate; do what hurts.
God loves what hurts, because it smells of the sweet odor of Calvary. I must solemnly lay the command of Christ upon ye, 'Go ye.' What will ye do about it?"

Louise Shepard sung a song, and then Rev. Mr. Lelacheur spoke from the text, "What have ye in the house?" He charged them to give it all, if they would hope for joy eternal. Then the subscriptions were called for. The first was \$1, and it was given by Mrs. F. E. Morrow, who said she had gone without her supper and breakfast, and Messrs. Harry and Herbert Stein, now was going without her dinner to give this.

Then came a man who said he started from Springfield with only \$1. He had got there somehow. He gave his last 50 cents Saturday night. He had earned \$2 since, and he gave that. "GOSPEL CYCLERS."

A Boston dispatch says: The "Gospel Cyclers" are preparing to set out on an invasion of Canada as a beginning of their novel crusade, Rev. T. G. Hazel, of Chelsea says: "I propose to consecrate the bicycle to God and my plans for accomplishing my purpose are to organize federated groups of Christian workers, who shall travel from place to place, preaching, and going without ostentation or sensation. This proposed body is to be called 'The Gospel Cyclers,' and this country and Canada will at first be its field. My group will soon start for Portland, Maine, but stop at all places where we find enough people to listen to us. We will go to Canada with this first group. When cold weather comes we shall continue our work riding south, thus keeping in climatic conditions that will permit us to be constantly Gospel cyclers." The Rev. Mr. (Hazel said: "The army will be divided into groups of three or more riders, to be governed by a board of directors, who will remain at home. Their business will be to direct financial business." Describing the Gospel wheelers today Mr. Hazel said: "When a group reaches a town or city it will at once repair to the principal square, and the riders will seek to attract attention by riding round and round, singing hymns before the service. We shall be careful to oppose no one in authority, and if we meet with opposition we shall quickly ride on to the next place. We expect to remain in each place two or three days. Every man and woman who joins the Gospel Cyclers must come prepared to endure physical hardship, if need be. No money will come prepared to endure physical hardship, if need be. No money will be paid them, and it is probable they will have to sleep in hammocks we will have to sleep in hammocks we shall carry to sling in the woods. We shall take light cooking utensils along. Our organization is entirely non-sec tarian. Denominationalism will not appear. We shall tolerate no bloomers or short skirts, but will wear ordinary

Here Is a Bankrupt Pasha Endeavoring to Recoup Himself.

Philadelphia Record. A genuine Oriental harem is now being exhibited throughout Europe. The manager of the Berlin Panopticum has persuaded a pasha living in the holy city of Kayroman to exhibit his harem to the unfaithful. This is the first time sha, the proprietor of the harem, became bankrupt and worried much about his inability to keep up in due manager, who happened to be in Egypt to engage attractions for the sideshows of the coming exposition in Berlin, heard of the pasha's difficulties, and prevailed upon him to accept a magnificent sum for a six months' contract to exhibit himself and family in Europe. The pasha, who had to choose between a certain fortune among the unbelievers or absolue ruin staring him in the face at home, was persuaded to accept the manager's offer, and thus his household is now to be seen for fifty pfennigs-12 cents -a head at Berlin.

Sure enough, the pasha, showed excellent taste in the selection of his wives, all of whom are good-looking, and are considered great beauties from an Oriental standpoint. There are a number of very handsome children from 6 to 16 years of age, and some 20 female slaves attend to all the duties of the household in full view of the onlookers. The most interesting part of the show is not the persons themselves, but the life they lead in the harem, about which much has been written, but very little is known. Several of the pasha's wives have extraordinary accomplishments in the way of singing, playing musical instru-ments and dancing. They are very clever handworkers, and while away much of their time with embroidery and other similar occupations. There are, all told, 47 persons in this house
