A joint stock company has been formed in Hamilton to edit, manage and print The Templar newspaper. Mr. Wm. Southam, publisher of the Hamilton Spectator, that well-known Conservative journal, is one of the directors. Now look out for some red-hot prohibition editorials from the pen of Bro. Southam.

The Strathroy Age chronicles an interview with two veteran West Middlesex residents. It is not generally known that telephone wires have an important influence in preventing lightning from striking. The German Government telegraph department put 340 towns with telephone systems and 560 towns without them under observation. In the former the lightning struck three times for every hour of storm; in the latter five times. Moreover, the violence of the lightning was much less in the former cases.

We in Canada may not have a formal visit from Li Hong Chang, Viceroy of China, who is now the guest of the British Government. It would be a pretty expensive call, for the big Chinaman requires everything to be done in great style, and he has a retinue of over 100 in his company. But the Viceroy will be in Canada before he leaves. He desires to see our magnificent Rocky Mountain scenery, and he will take a special train over the C. P. R. to Vancouver, B. C., from which port he will set sail.

All-Embracing Oil Pool.
The Hamburger Boersenhalle makes the announcement that all of the dealings of the members of the European continental oil pool have been transacted with the Standard Oil Company since May 24, and that the unification of the petroleum trade of the world is now an accomplished fact.

This confirms the information recently published in these columns. It is, however, scarcely correct. The Canadian petroleum business is as yet outside the "pool," though how long it will remain few can tell. It is known that recent attempts have been made to sell out the Canadian industry to old world syndicates, and those interested in the proposed deal do not despair of having it completed. It may be that the reason why the German paper, whose declarations have been cabled, takes no cognizance of the fact that the Canadian oil men are not yet in the big pool comes from the knowledge that for a good many years our oil men have not exported any of their product.

Value of Publicity.
Hon. Wm. Jennings Bryan, Democratic candidate for the United States Presidency, has within the last few days made a triumphal journey from his home in Lincoln, Nebraska, to New York city. In the commercial metropolis, tomorrow night, he will be formally tendered the nomination voted him at the Chicago convention. Big crowds have everywhere assembled to see the "Boy Orator," who, so unexpectedly, has been chosen by a great party to be its standard-bearer. But the audiences to which Mr. Bryan has spoken are small indeed compared to those he has been enabled to reach by the agency of the newspapers, which have everywhere reported his car-ent speeches. Naturally enough, people are anxious to see a popular candidate, but after all, it is what a man has to say, not how he says it, that the people of a nation care about in a political crisis such as the United States is passing through. The fact that the newspapers have given Mr. Bryan millions instead of thousands of an audience, is another testimony to the value of the press as an agency of publicity, whether in informing and instructing the people on public affairs or in bringing under their notice what men and women of enterprise have to buy or sell.

An Insolvent Law Needed.
The Kingston Freeman makes a strong argument in favor of the passage of an insolvency law by the Dominion Parliament. It says:
"We do not plead for an insolvency act on the grounds of mercy, but on the grounds of justice. The ball and chain that binds the negro to his task was no more cruel than the law that claims for the benefit of one man the earnings of his fellow, therefore our new Parliament should extend to our debt-laden multitude such a measure of relief that will give them new heart to labor in their own land rather than remain useless incumbrances on the commonwealth or seek energies in other lands where their efforts are not paralyzed by the knowledge that they can never hope to be free or legally own again but the raiment covering their bodies. Yet there are people who claim that Canada is a land where the highest laws of humanity prevail and where Christianity and all its blessed influences moulds the legislation of Parliament. We have no right to claim to be either a humane or just people so long as we not alone strip the debtor of all his possessions, but put him in bondage to his creditors and deprive him of that hope which alone sustains man in the battle of life."
There is solid food for thought in this presentation of the question. Some means ought certainly to be devised to have insolvent estates wound up with economy and expedition, and the honest debtor, who has failed in his struggle with adverse circumstances, should be given the earliest possible opportunity to begin anew.

Chattel Mortgage Record.
The total chattel mortgages registered in Ontario for the year ending 31st of December last numbered 22,391, representing \$11,012,320. In 1889, the number of chattel mortgages was 16,214, representing \$7,491,908. The increase has been steady. In Middlesex, the chattel mortgages on record at Dec. 31 last numbered 993, representing \$376,436. This was an increase in the county of 76 chattel mortgages and over \$20,000 indebtedness in the twelve months.

Apples are excellent food products, and at the same time are valuable for their medicinal qualities. This is what a famous German authority says on the subject: "The apple is such a common fruit that few persons are familiar with its remarkable medical properties. Everybody ought to know that the very best thing that they can do is to eat apples just before going to bed. The apple is excellent brain food, because it has more phosphoric acid, in an easily digestible shape, than any other fruit known. It excites the action of the liver, promotes sound and healthy sleep, and thoroughly disinfects the mouth. It also agglutinates the surplus acids of the stomach, helps the kidney secretions, and prevents calculous growth, while it obviates indigestion, and is one of the best preventives of diseases of the throat. Next to lemon and orange, it is also the best antidote for thirst and craving of persons addicted to the alcohol and opium habit." These being the merits of the apple, there would be little difficulty in finding a profitable market for even the enormous crop of this year, if they were fully known.

AGE-DISPARITY IN MARRIAGE.
New York World.
Is it wise for a man to marry a woman older than himself? A conspicuous New York youth has just given an emphatic affirmative answer to this question. But that, of course, does not settle it. There is much to be said on both sides.

A woman at 30 may not look any older than a man at 22. But a woman of 40 years usually looks at least ten years older than a man of 32. Physical appearance, however, does not often count for much after a few years of married life, in which character soon becomes the chief test of happiness or the reverse.
There have been many happy marriages between young men and women not so young. The intimate companionship with a woman who has the wifely instinct judiciously combined with a sort of maternal feeling has often had a steady and uplifting effect upon a youth. Such a marriage has many special risks, but is not of necessity predestined to failure. And with the higher education and greater

freedom of women these marriages will, in all probability, become more frequent. Nor will the physical disparity be as evident as it would have been formerly. The woman of our day clings to her youth with great tenacity and with real success. Exercise, proper diet, massage and fresh air put off the age of wrinkles and crow's feet indefinitely.

WEST ZORRA.
Death of Mrs. H. Munroe, an Oxford County Pioneer.
On Aug. 6, at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. H. Munroe, West Zorra, passed peacefully away Abigail Sutherland, relict of the late David Ross, at the advanced age of 92 years. She was born in the parish of Clyde, Sutherlandshire, Scotland, in 1794, and was married to David Ross, of the same place, in 1821, when she was but 17 years of age. The couple emigrated to Canada and settled in East Zorra, which was then a comparative wilderness, in 1830, and by courage and perseverance succeeded in making a comfortable home, on which deceased lived to within three years of her death, when she went to reside with her daughter, Mrs. H. Sutherland, relict of the late David Ross, at the advanced age of 92 years. She died of a stroke of the face, from which she suffered terribly during the last year of her life, but she bore her suffering with great patience. She had a family of only four of whom survived her—Adam and John, of San Francisco; William, on the homestead, and Mrs. Munroe. The deceased was an earnest and consistent Christian from early youth, being a member of the Presbyterian Church. It was common thing for her to walk to London to the sacrament before the time of railroads. Moody was her ideal man. She would never tire of reading and talking about Mr. Moody. She was an uncompromising foe of the liquor traffic and always strove to reform what was wrong in her circle, and in the lives of all those with whom she came in contact.

Fanny Things Come to Pass.
