partment of the interior reports, "passengers of the immigrant class who declared their intention of settling in Canada," at Quebec and Halifax. As many more who landed at these points declared their intention of going to the States after availing themselves of Canadian transportation facilities. American immigration was insignificant. The number who came west of Lake Superior is reported as follows: 1892, 12,614; 1893, 11,366; 1894, 7,007; 1895, 4,901. The census of 1901 found in the Northwest only 34,755 people who had come during the 15 years, 1880-95, while 58,628 had come during the first five years of Liberal rule. The census of 1906 found 185,068 who had come within the preceding five years. The Liberal policy not only brings people to Canada, but keeps them here.




