CITY RATIFIES SPECIAL LOAN ON SIX PER CENT PLAN

> A Portion of the \$764,500 Debentures Will Be Used as Security.

Council Confirms Appointment of Mr. Dodd as Head of Garbage Collectors.

London is now in a position to meet he most pressing of its financial burdens. The city council, at a special session this morning, ratified the loan of \$200,000 from the Canada Trust Company that had been negotiated by the finance committee. Part of the \$764,500 lebenture issue will be placed with the rust company as security. The amount realized by the loan will be used for retiring \$200,000 debntures of the 1908 onsolidation that fall duem on July 1 This retiring fund was provided for by part of the \$764,500 issue, but as only part of these debentures received any thing like a reasonable consideration the bond houses, the entire mount will be kept by the city till the money market is in a more favorable





### LAW OF THE LOAF WILL BE ENFORCED BY THE INSPECTOR

Committee Insists That Bakers Must Deliver Pound and Half Loaf.

Other Municipalities Inform City Clerk That They Are Enforcing the Law.

Bread is the staff of life-according to life for fire, light and market committee of the city council in the way of argu-Whether London bakers would compelled to make the pound and a alf loaf that the statutes call for, or whether they would be allowed to make smaller one, by the non-enforcement of the law, was the main issue. Out of 64 places that esponded to London's request for inormation, 38 declared that the law was eing enforced. According to the figures compiled by City Clerk Baker, 30 of the 64 municipalities charge 6 cents per loaf for their product. There are for 5 cents, and four others where a 20wns only 41/2 cents is charged for the other 7 cents. In two others 3-pound oaves are sold for 10 cents, the equivaent of the 5-cent rate for the pound and a half. One sells a 2-pound loaf for 10 cents, in another a 4-pound loaf brings

Is Statute Fair? It was the general concensus of opinion mong the aldermen that the statute alling for the pound and a half loaf was hardly a fair one. They were in favor of legislation that would allow the bakers to make any sized load they desired, adiness for the various regiments stamp it and sell it on basis of weight. 
