# HUNDREDS KILLED IN WHEN SOLDIERS FIRE AT CROWD

Terrible Loss of Life in Fight at Zacatecas.

# CITY IS UNDER MILITARY RULE

Bands of Mexicans Reported To Be Gathering at Many Points.

[Associated Press.] El Paso, Texas, Nov. 21.—One hun-

dred persons were killed in rioting which took place at Zacatecas in the interior of Mexico, opposite Tampico, Saturday night, according to reports received here. Soldiers fired into the struggling body of rioters with disastrous effect. One hundred is the lowest estimate of the loss of life, which may reach five hundred.

The American consul telegraphed the first news of the riots to Mexican sonsul at San Antonio, stating that the town was in a state of terror, and that the loss of life was not less than one hundred. No details were given out here, except that a company of soldiers were ordered to fire upon a vast crowd of rioters which thronged

the streets. Zacatecas is the capital of the state of Zacatecas in Central Mexico, about 500 miles from the United States line. News of the riots did not reach the outside world until late Sunday, although the battle took place Saturday night. It is stated that quiet has now been restored by placing the city under rigid military rule. The latest reports are that the slain are still lying in the streets where they fell.

# DIES AT ASTAPOVA

# 69 ON SUNDAY HEART WAS WEAKENED

Constant Stream of Peasants Gathered Around Hut to See Him

[Associated Press.]

Astapova, Russia, Nov. 20.-Early this morning Count Leo Tolstoi died in the little hut in which he was carried when he was first taken ill. His wife was with him at the time of his death. Throughout a heartbreaking night a motley crowd, made up of the most varied elements imaginable, pressed around the low hut. These were distant relatives of the aged author, Tolstoians, villagers, and churchmen, among them the many Varsofonius, who did not lose hope until the end of seeing Tolstoi and extending to him the olive branch on

behalf of the church. All alike stood spellbound, knowing that a matchless personality was departing as the Sunday dawn dispelled the foggy, raw November night.
Virtually the whole population of Astapova was there. Then a voice from the hut came quietly: "Leq Nicholaevitch is dead."





As passed, the bills give to the religious minority of Alberta and Saskatchewan not much more than is accorded to it in Manitoba. and which, judging from the com plaints of those who speak for the Roman Catholics of that province, leave to be desired much that could reasonably be asked. The change was not wrought by the Conserva-tives in or out of Parliament. 

# MAY REDUCE RATES

Test of New Apparatus To Be Made on Pacific Cable.

Vancouver, Nov. 19 .- A series of experiments with a new cable receiving and transmitting apparatus will be made during the next four weeks, over that portion of the Pacific cable between Bamfield Station on the west coast of Vancouver Island and Fanning Island, in mid-Pacific, the longest stretch of the entire submarine cable, 3,450 miles. If the merits claimed on behalf of the new apparatus can be demonstrated it will mean an increase of at least fifty per cent in the speed of the cable, and will probably result in a reduction of rates.







# A FACULTY OF MUSIC ADDED TO WESTERN

Will Share With Toronto Board of Governors—Agrees to Important New Department For Local University.

A faculty of music was added to the Western University at a meeting of the board of governors, held in Mayor Beattie's office on Saturday afternoon. There has long been a demand for such a department. Hundreds of graduates in music throughout Ontario have been given their degrees from the University of Toronto, but from this time on the Western share with the provincial university the right to give diplomas.

Mr. Justice Meredith, chairman of the board, presented the report of the special committee appointed to inquire into the matter. The recommen-

dation that the faculty be installed was unanimous, and an agrement was In addition Mr. Meredith pointed out that a number of English universities were endeavoring to have musical examinations conducted in this country. Since Toronto University had the only faculty of music. that institution held all the examinations throughout West-

ern Ontario. Mr. R. Anderson, president of the Brantford Conservatory of Music, and Mr. F. L. Willgoose, president of the London Conservatory of Music, were present, and explained their courses to the governors. Both were of the opinion that the new curricula would provide a much more thorough musical education than the course supplied by Toronto University.

The agreements were ordered executed, and the members of the faculty will be selectd shortly.
