At the meeting of the British and Foreign Bible Society similar brotherly affection and generous unsectarian feeling was exhibited. One of the speakers was the Archbishop of York, one of our first scholars and theologians, and a truly working prelate, another was the Rev. W. Muirhead, a missionary of the Independent Body recently returned from China.

The late B shop of Victoria was in the chair, and speke in warm-hearted terms of the labours of the Nonconformists. Urguestionably there is less of exclusiveness than there was a few years ago; at the same time in many quarter the spirit of intolerance is still very bitter, and where it has the opportunity very persecuting. A short time ago the Government, with a view to conciliate the Irish, recommended Her Majesty to exert her royal clemency in behalf of several Fenians undergoing various terms of imprisonment for sedition and treason; and they were accordingly set at liberty. What do you think was their acknowledgment of the Queen's good-will and grace! Why immediately on their release they attended a banquet, at which the old hatred of England and the English was as freely indulged in as ever. One of the speakers said he should like to drive every Englishman out of Ireland.

The Mayor of Cork uttered such inflammatory language that Prince Arthur, who was at the time on a visit to Ireland, declined to go to Cork, and the Government found it necessary to take steps to remove his worship of Cork from the Mayoralty. The business however was cut short by his resigning his civic dignity.

A movement has recently been inaugurated which promises to render good service in the arrangement. cause of Christian philasthropy. It consists in the opening of a Training Hospital at Tottenham a suburb of London for the purpose of giving the necessary instruction to nurses for the poor. It is modelled after a well known establishment at Kalserworth in Germany where there are at present almost 500 young women who are called deaconesses, and whose employment it is to act as nurses at the bed sides of the sick. It will also include some other departments of Christian work such as the training of the young, attention to regard schools, and active benevolence generally. Those who are admitted to the Institution to be trained as deaconesses must receive credentials from the pastors of the Church to which they belong. Some handsome subscriptions have been received to aid in carrying out the proposed scheme which in point of fact will be an association of Protestant Sisters of Mercy, without the vow of celibacy characteristic of Roman Catholic Sisterhoods. We have just received the mournful intelli-

gence of the massacre of some European settlers in New Zealand at the White Chiffs, about 35 miles to the north of New Plymouth, the chief town in the province of Taranake. Among those who have been cruelly murdered is the Rev. John Whiteley one of our oldest and most esteemed Missionaries in the Colony. This calamitous event is supposed 'o have occurred on the evening of Saturday February the 13th. On the following Monday the body was accidently discovered lying on the grass pierced by five ballets. Mr. Whiteley left this country for missionary work in New Zealand in the year 1832, and ever since that time he has been pursuing a course of much usefulness. His selfdenying and upright character had given him much influence over the natives ; and on frequent occasions when war broke out between various tribes he interposed at the risk of his own life, to stay the effusion of blood and restore peace. His painful death will be very severely felt both by colonists and natives. We continue to receive deeply interesting accounts of the proceedings in the Spanish Cortes with respect to the question of religious liberty. They were making some new streets in the city, and in the progress of the work it was necessary to cut through the spot where tradition recorded that the victims of the Inquisition were burned .--These excavations soon laid bare the memorials of these horrid cruelties. I cannot do better than give you a short extract from one of the Spanish newspapers in which the account of the discovery is given in words of intense indignation. "There are to be seen in dark bands and layers the remains of the coal which after being blesssd by the Dominican Fathere. burnt all who did not think or believe as the king and the monks thought and believed. There in the manner of geological strata, we see pulverifed remains of muscles consumed by the livecoal, calcined bones, remains of garments singed by the flames, halters stiff with coagulated blood, locks of hair imperfectly burnt, irresistable witnesses to the fact that brothers of ours expired amidst the flames, their hearts beating with energetic protests against men worse than byenas, judges who condemned them to die amidst agonies without number, and in the name of Christ delivered them to those fires."-The Bill for liberty of worship passed the Cortes by a large majority.
