The C. P. R. and Reciprocity.

WHAT SIR WILLIAM VAN HORN HAS TO SAY ABOUT IT.

This province, and the Annapolis Valley in particular, is expecting great things from the advent of the C. P. R. Our readers will, because of this expectation, be interested in reading the opinion of the most influential representative of the great railway upon the reciprocity question. It will be noted that he makes special reference to the Maritime Provinces in his letter, which was addressed to Charles Chaput, the chairman of the Anti-Reciprocity League.

Sir,—I regret having to leave for England on Thursday. I shall not be able to attend the meeting of the Anti-Reciprocity League next week, and to give my views in person on the question of Reciprocity.

What I have to say on the subject has an relation to party politics (for I have nothing to do with politics), not only as an individual who, for the past thirty years, has been working hard and out for the upbuilding of this country and one to whom the great development of the past two decades has been a source of immense pride and satisfaction.

To my amazement and distress and shame I now see the magnificent work of a generation trampled away for a vague idea or a childish sentiment—the splendid commercial and industrial position we have reached and our proud independence battered for a few empty puffs, and I regret it my duty to join in the protest which I heard from every section of the country.

Today we are in an enviable position, with a commerce three times as great per capita as that of the United States, and without a cloud in our sky save the one which has just now been raised. Does not common sense tell us to stay where we are and to let well enough alone?

The termination of the old reciprocity arrangement by the United States in 1866 was a heavy blow to Canada, and the fourteen years that followed were full of trials and despondency, for Canada then had no west; she was thrown back on herself by the great lakes, and she had not in herself a market for the support of any manufacturing concern of any consequence. She cut her trees and lived as best she could.

During these years annexationists were bred of hopelessness and many good and honest people urged annexation as the only future open to the country.

Then came, in 1879, our national policy, and factory chimneys began to appear above our tree tops and their number rapidly increased, and then came the Canadian Pacific Railway, opening up the great west, and from that time Canada advanced by leaps and bounds.

The other day Mr. Fielding in a cable message to the Canadian high commissioner in London, said that for fifty years the people of Canada and both of its political parties had wished for reciprocity.

That was true of the sixties and seventies, but it has not been true since.

For the past twenty years we have heard only an occasional whine from some survivor of Canada's dark age.

We have heard nothing for many years back of commercial union, reciprocity and all those fads which grew from empty pockets.

The liberal party came into power sixteen years ago. The tariff was accepted by them as a national need. It was regarded in many ways and with great intelligence, and preference was given to Great Britain, and our whole country applauded and was content. Everybody felt secure and the country advanced prodigiously.

Our commerce and manufactures reached a height never before dreamed of. The government, and particularly Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Fielding, had the respect and confidence and good will of everybody, even of their political opponents. Now, out of a clear sky comes Mr. Fielding plunging like Icarus into darkness and threatening to take us all with him.

We have never seen such an exhibition of crawling and cringing as Canada's representatives have just now given us at Washington. We have heard much of the dignified attitude of our government which was assumed after repeated snubs.

We have been told that if there was anything more to be said about reciprocity it must be said at Ottawa; but at the very first signal from Washington we have seen Canada's representatives crawling and cringing, and without consultation with one of our business interests and apparently without consultation with their colleagues, hasty assenting to terms vitally affecting

It isn't much, and our neighbors expect reciprocity to bring the price down. On the other hand, there are easily reached and ample markets for these things where the farmers of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick were with a little effort, secure twice as much as they are now getting for their potatoes and apples and at the same time quadruple the demand by reducing prices one half to the consumer.

Take Cuba, for instance, where a barrel of potatoes yielding the Canadian farmer about seventy-five cents, reaches the consumer at seven dollars and so with apples.

The Canadian trade commission at Havana will verify this statement. Our farmers count on exporting potatoes and apples to the United States while these same things are exported from the United States to Cuba and elsewhere. Ontario suffered in her better, eggs, cheese and such things until the Dingley tariff compelled a turn to other markets which proved to be more profitable.

Aside from the fisheries, of which I do not know enough, I do not believe that there is any industry anywhere in Canada that cannot find a way to be better off without reciprocity than with it, and with many industries the question is a vital one. And even with our codfish, judging from the prices to consumers in the West Indies and Central America, it may be that we are, as with potatoes and apples, overlooking what might easily be made our very best market.

Let us not run away with the idea that if we make a mistake in this matter of reciprocity we shall be able to correct it at pleasure. We may not be permitted to do it. It should be remembered that there are such things as vested interests with nations and that the vested interests of nations, real or alleged, are terribly binding upon the weaker party. Editorial Notes.

Florida, Texas, New Mexico, California, Hawaii, Cuba, Porto Rico and the Philippines have all been at the cross roads with Uncle Sam within sixty years. Great Britain has \$700,000,000 invested in Mexico, and Samuel wants it. And what the old gentleman wants he usually gets. He is just now after Canada, so the President says. Will he get Canada?

President Taft has been telling the people of the south as well as the north that 'Canada is at the parting of the ways.' Mexico would seem to be there also, with a United States army on the borders and the recollection that sixty years ago a similar situation occurred, and Mexico lost \$70,000 square miles of territory. Uncle Sam has an awful nose for other people's goods.

We have recently received a copy of a new aspirant for public favor in newspaperdom, 'The Weekly,' published at Amherst by Mr. N. B. Stanton. Well, it is published, and we understand, in the interest of labor, and ought to succeed. Mr. Stanton is a clever writer and a good newspaper man, and he has our best wishes for success.

At a recent meeting of the Council the rate of taxation for the present civic year was placed at \$2.00 on the hundred, made up as follows: schools, 70 cents; sewers, 20 cents; general taxes, \$1.10. The increase of 10 cents on the hundred dollars is to provide for the interest on the amount to be used this year in providing street-making machinery and performing permanent work on the streets. All the other services are well provided for.

Westmorland county, N. B., has an aggressive electoral reform league which is taking active measures to secure the enactment of better election laws for the province. Rev. B. C. Borden, of Sackville, a well known native of this county, is a leading spirit in the movement, and with him are associated influential men of the county. Two years ago a bill was prepared by the league executive providing that on the petition of 25 electors for an investigation by a judge, empowered to place on oath every one suspected of either giving or receiving bribes. It is claimed this is the law that was worked so successfully in Adams county, Ohio, a few months ago, when one-third of its 6,000 electors were disfranchised on their own admission. The Westmorland county reformers claim that they might as well disband except for educational work unless such a law can be secured there.

We cannot but think that it would be a most serious mistake on the part of our citizens to allow the Board of Trade to become totally derelict. The Board has not had a meeting for a long time, and unless some steps are taken immediately to infuse new life into it, it will have to be regarded as defunct. In other towns this organization is doing good work, and in the earlier days of its existence in Wolfville a considerable was accomplished through its instrumentality. At the present time there are many lines of work in which a live Board of Trade might operate with real profit to the community. Such an organization ought to be especially valuable at the present time, when opportunity seems to be knocking at our door. The coming of the C. P. R. ought to mean a great deal to Wolfville. We trust that our business men, and all interested in the prosperity of our town, will see the advisability of taking hold of this matter in earnest and do their utmost to put the Board on its feet again. Some of the turbulent spirits who in the past did much to discredit the Board are no longer with us, and so far as we can see, there is now no reason why Wolfville should not possess a united and useful instrument for progress in the Board of Trade.

Against Reciprocity.

There was a large and lively meeting of the Executive Board of Trade on Tuesday evening, called for the purpose of discussing the Piddington reciprocity agreement. At 10 Wednesday a vote was taken and a resolution against the treaty was passed unanimously.

The Reviewer.

SCIENTIFIC VIEW OF CHRISTIANITY—SIR OLIVER LODGE SAYS IN CONNECTION OF DEITY HUMANLY SIMPLE.

No scientific man compels greater interest and attention in this country when dealing with religious matters than Sir Oliver Lodge. His great lay sermon on the subject of 'Christian Revelation' from the scientific point of view was the outstanding event at the National Free Church Council meeting last week at Portsmouth. Sir Oliver declared that he had learned to regard the universe as a concrete, full-blooded reality with its parts accessible and intelligible to all. Among other things he said: 'God can be regarded as displayed to us in each fashion as we can make use of it in the person of an incarnate being, revealing to man such attributes of the Deity as would otherwise have been missed.'

At another point Sir Oliver advised his hearers to 'always mistrust negations. The impossibility of squaring a circle is not really a negative proposition except in form. Negations commonly signify blindness and prejudice always, except when they are thoroughly established and carefully formulated in the light of actual experience or mathematical proof. Even then, I would be ready to admit the possibility of higher generalizations which may uproot them. They are only safe when thrown in the form of a positive assertion. Always try for a positive form of any comprehensive denial. If it cannot be thrown in positive form, mistrust it. Its pronouncer is probably stepping out of bounds into the easy region of negative speculation. He is like the rationalistic microbe, denying the existence of a human being.'

In summing up his convictions, Sir Oliver said: 'Progress lies in careful investigation as well as speculation and thought up to the limits of human power. When things are really understood, they are perceived to be fairly simple after all. The Christian conception of God is humanly simple. It appeals to the man in the street, the unlettered, the ignorant and babes. That is the way with the greatest things. The sun is the centre of the solar system, a glorious object full of mystery and unforeseen force. But the sunshine is a friendly, homely thing that touches common objects and conduces to comfort, joy, and conduces to the comfort of the cat. Sunshine is not the sun, but is the human, terrestrial aspect of the sun.'

'Thus would I represent the Christian conception of God. Christ is the human, practical, workaday aspect of Christ is the sunshine, that fraction of the transcendent Deity which suffices the earth.'

In dealing with miracles, Sir Oliver said they were no more impossible, nor more lawless than the interference of a human being would seem to a colony of ants and bees. 'The religion of the miraculous,' concluded Sir Oliver, 'has been hastily and illegitimately denied, so long as we do not imagine it to be a religion devoid of a law and order of its own, akin to the law and order of a psychological realm, our denial has no foundation.'

The 'Truro Citizen' in its issue of March 17th, records that on the Wednesday before, a Mr. Carr, of Carribo, Aronstook county, Maine, U. S. A., arrived in Truro with 700 bushels of Aronstook county potatoes. After paying the duty of 20 cents per bushel he disposed of the goods in job lots at 25 cents per bushel, and seemed pleased with his sale. Of course he might have taken them to Boston, or New York and avoided the duty, but there was more money in Truro. If he will bring a good lot to Wolfville we will guarantee him a sale for part of them.

After reciprocity comes it is hard to say what the farmer will get or what the consumer will have to pay. A duty of 50 cents a bushel would help the farmer in our opinion.

for sixty-one consecutive hours last week, adjourning at midnight on Saturday. The government intend to run the coming elections on old laws and the opposition insists that new laws shall be prepared. Hence the adjournment.

CANADA'S GIFT TO THE TWELVE NATIONS

No doubt now that Canadian farmers are to be exposed to the Competition of all the Great Food Exporting Countries in the World.

When it was first made known that the Reciprocity Compact not only gave American farmers free entrance to Canadian markets and extended the same privileges to the United Kingdom and the British colonies, but also opened the door wide to the Argentine Republic, Austria Hungary, Russia, Spain, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Switzerland, Japan, Bolivia, Columbia and Venezuela, Canadian farmers in general thought there must be some mistake. They could not believe that without getting any compensation whatever from any country except the United States our government would admit farm products from all those countries into Canada to compete freely with Canadian farm products. The wording of the Reciprocity Agreement was very plain; there seemed to be no doubt about its meaning; and yet it was such an extraordinary arrangement, so unfair to Canadian farmers, and so likely to lead to disputes with the American customs officials that many people believed that the government would give some explanation showing that the agreement had been wrongly interpreted. However, there is no longer any such hope. Mr. Robert L. Borden questioned Hon. Mr. Fielding on this point and Mr. Fielding admitted that the Reciprocity Agreement meant exactly what it appeared to mean and that Canada would get nothing whatever in return from any

Lemon Marmalade.
Slice six lemons very thin, taking out the seeds. To each pound of sliced fruit add three pints of cold water, and let all stand for twenty-four hours; then boil the marmalade till the chips are tender. Pour into earthenware bowl, and allow it to remain till next day; then weigh it, and to every pound of boiled pulp add one and a half pounds of loaf sugar. Boil the whole until the syrup jellies and the chips are quite transparent. In taking out the pips be careful to leave all the white pith in, as that goes towards making the syrup.

Advance of the Water Wagon.
Under the above title, Dr. Henry Smith Williams writes interestingly in the November Century of the growth of the temperance reform. Of the drink habit he says it is now generally recognized by the observant man about town that men drink less than they did five or ten years ago. In any restaurant in a great city like New York, where business men congregate at the lunch hour it is noticeable that at many tables, often the majority, no beverage but water is used. Even at the dinner, the principal meal, the same thing is observable. The marked change within the last decade in the drinking at meals custom among business men indicates clearly, he says, that the temperance spirit is abroad in metropolitan, no less than in rural districts. The extent to which the growing hostility to the liquor traffic is being embodied in legislative enactments is striking evidence of the growing strength of temperance sentiment. The fact that state-wide prohibition is now the law of nine states having an aggregate population of over twelve millions, that local option applied to communities in other States brings the total number of people living in the so-called "dry" territories to about forty millions, it must be admitted that the growth of the temperance sentiment in recent years has been phenomenal. Particularly noteworthy is the fact that this growth is not merely sectional in scope, but is general across the continent, from Alabama to North Dakota.

What Smoking Does For Boys!
A certain doctor, struck with the large number of boys under fourteen years of age who had observed smoking, was led to inquire into the effect the habit had on the general health. He took for his purpose thirty-eight boys, aged from nine to fifteen, and carefully examined them. It was twenty-seven he found in various stages of the habit. In twenty-two there were various disorders of the circulation, and digestion, palpitation of the heart, and a more or less marked taste for strong drink. In twelve there was no marked bleeding of the nose, ten had disturbed sleep, and twelve had slight ulceration of the mucous membrane of the mouth, which disappeared on ceasing from the use of tobacco for some days. The doctor treated them all for weakness, but with little effect until the smoking was discontinued, when health and strength were soon restored.

What the Churches Could Do.
Ladies Weekly says: "In their total membership in their aggregate property holdings, in their combined intellectual, social and moral influence, the churches represent ever so much power, and where united for one and they are capable of almost any achievement in the interests of the public. In all respects named, the churches together far outweigh the combined interests of the liquor dealers, and if they acted as harmoniously and solidly together as the latter do would have no difficulty in accomplishing their purpose. Acting as one strong arm, they could strike a blow at the liquor curse from which it would never recover."

Drinkers and Unemployment.
A Trade Union secretary has the following pointed paragraph set forth in notes commenting on labor conditions in general: "A class of workmen who figure somewhat frequently on the unemployed list, are the tipplers. There is no room for dram drinkers in the workshop of the present day. The drunken workman is rightly kept on the outside of the workshop gates, because his presence inside is a danger both to himself and others, and the tippler will soon be sent to keep him company for the same reason."
"Much is being said in certain quarters concerning the effects of intoxicating drink on the question of unemployment. No one who is acquainted with the conditions of workshop life would contend for a moment that drink has any appreciable effect on the volume of unemployment, but it is an important factor in determining who are to be the unemployed. Other things being equal, the non-drinking, non-sporting workman has by far a better chance of finding employment, and of keeping it, than his tipping or sporting fellow."

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
