THE LATE PETER GREEN. -- One of the familiar figures of the township, a pioneer and a patriarch, recently passed away to join the great majority. We refer to the late Peter Green, who on Saturday, the 9th inst, was laid to rest among his kindred. He died at the residence of his son in law Sanual Morris dence of his son-in-law Samuel Morris, at the age of 86. He emigrated from Perthshire, Scotland, in 1833, and travelled with his family partly by boat and partly on foot from Quebec to Garbraid, and was the first man to turn a furrow in Colborne, at a point on Attrill's flats where the two oak trees facing Charles Morris's house (then the Dunlop homestead) stand. The trees are now 51 years old, and what a change in the district since then! At the first meeting of the township council, the commissioners, as the township fathers were then called, ointed him the first constable in

dorne. The council meeting was in the "Crown and Anchor" hotel, kept by John Morris, and situated where the barns of Jos. Morris now stand. Out of 43 ratepayers present on the 5th of Jan., 1836, only John Morris, J. Paterson and our respected reeve, Mr. Young, with Harry Brace, who resides in Oregon, are alive. Mr. Green was a strong, robust man, hardly knowing a dose of medicine during a long lifetime 86 yeears, only taking one dose which was presented to him, by Dr. Dunlop when he first came to settle in Huron. One of his feats of strength was carrying a berrel of whiskey from where J. Morris gate stands to the Crown and Anchor hotel. He also was one of those who went to the front in the troubles of 1837, with the company of the late sheriff Hyndeman, and was wounded by a bayonet thrust through the hand. His aged partner in life, who was three years his senior, still survives, after 65 years of wedded life. Out of nine of a family three sons survive—W. Green, of Casselton, Dak; A. Green, Dalhousie; J. Green, Sheppardton. His daughters—Johnston, St. Thomas; Mrs. Anderson, Brantford; and Mrs. S. Morris, Colborne. There are also 50 grand. Colborne. There are also 50 grand children and 64 great grand children living in Ontario and Dakota.

rape Vine Pruning.

Not only in early spring, but later in the season, strong, vigorous shoots will appear on the main stem of the vine.

These start at no particular place, and grow with great rapidity. Novices in grape culture are puzzled as to the proper treatment of these shoots. A shoot from a regular bud, if not needed is broken away and the same should be is broken away, and the same should be done with these chance shoets. Unless cane is needed just where such a shoot appears, break it off. The laterals puzzle many, but their treatment is very simple As a shoot grows there will be found two buds at the buds at the sxil of each leaf—the part where the leaf joins the stem. Later, one of these buds will start into growth—this shoot is called a lateral. We wish to keep one bud perfectly dormant, for next year's fruiting. If the shoot from the bud that has started were pulled out, the other one would start into growth, and there would be no fruit from it next year. The proper treatment of interals is to pinch them there to be leaf, as often as they push.




