HOURS WASTED IN OBSTRUCTION

Conservatives Kill Time By Reading Columns from Newspapers.

Ottawa, July 20—The parliamentary battle due to the determination of the government to move the reciprocity resolutions and the equal determination of the opposition to prevent any headway being made was continued today. The motion to go into committee to discuss the resolutions was moved twenty minutes after meeting.

The stumbling block to governmental progress was provided by J. D. Taylor of New Westminster, who introduced a resolution on the Chinese immigration frauds of British Columbia, which were inquired into by Mr. Justice Murphy, whose report was sent to Ottawa last week.

Mr. Taylor concluded shortly after the house resumed its session. Mr. Taylor complained because the report had not been made public and then, with running comments, proceeded to read the evidence as reported in the Vancouver papers, until six o'clock.

At eleven thirty Mr. Currie of Vancouver made a couple of suggestions that the hour being late, the house should adjourn but the minutes took no notice. He concluded speaking at 12:15 when Mr. Fielding's motion to go into committee on the reciprocity resolution was passed. Then came a ten-minute interval.

Wants to Rise. Wm. Thoburne of North Lanark, who moved the adjournment of the house at midnight on Wednesday, asked that the house be permitted to rise. Sir Wilfrid Laurier shook his head and the Liberal members cried "go on."

Mr. Thoburne repeated his request and sat down. Hon. Mr. Fielding promptly moved that the resolutions be adopted. The opposition members greeted the proposal with cries of "No!" and in order to prevent a question being put Mr. Thoburne was compelled to rise and proceed with his arguments against the act. When he concluded his speech at 1:25 this morning, W. J. Best of Edmonton moved the adjournment of the house.

The government had failed to lay on the table the evidence in the case and there was nothing to do but to produce it from the press. While it was quite true that the commission had not made public there was no reason why the evidence which revealed so much bootlegging should not have been presented to the house the first day of the session and J. A. C. Curry having again argued that there had been obstruction, Mr. Best resumed the reciprocity debate at one fifteen.

After speaking for half an hour he was allowed to adjourn the debate. The reciprocity resolutions will be the government's programme again on Friday. Morning sittings will commence on Wednesday.

TORONTO STREET RAILWAY.

Capital stock of company to be increased by \$4,000,000.

Toronto, July 19—Interviewed today regarding the proposed issue of four million dollars additional capital stock issue for the Toronto street railway.

Roars of Cynical Laughter Greet Declaration That Marathon Speech Was Not to Obstruct.

Ottawa, July 20—The opposition committed itself to purposeless obstruction of both reciprocity and redistribution. At midnight the House had been in session since resuming for twenty-one hours while the government and their supporters have occupied only sixty minutes of that time.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that it was withheld on the recommendation of the judge, who urged the prosecution of parties not at present in the country, and premature publication would defeat the ends of justice. The premier added that he feared Mr. Taylor's long speech was not for the purpose of obtaining information, but to kill time by obstructing. He would have secured the information in ten minutes had he desired instead of speaking for five hours.

Mr. Borden also defended his follower against the charge of obstruction, declaring that he had rendered a service to both the House and country. This declaration caused the recediment by Col. Tabbot that the West, which was anxious to reach redistribution, would not think so. Meanwhile the Opposition continued to devote time to the same discussion and the reciprocity debate was not reached.

Every Indication Points To Record Crop This Year

Survey of Conditions Gives Renewed Assurance That Crop Will be Bumper One—Cold Wave Has Been Beneficial—Little Damage From Frost.

Winnipeg, July 19—A survey of the crop conditions throughout Western Canada removes all apprehension that was felt because of the recent cool wave which struck the country, and gives renewed assurance of a record wheat crop. Conditions could hardly be more favorable. From 50 to 100 per cent of wheat is in blossom and indications at present point to an early harvest. With the exception of two points where frost damaged the lighter grains considerably and the wheat very slightly, there is no report of a detrimental effect from the cool wave. Of the reports received 81 per cent announce conditions which bode for the perfect, while 18 per cent have been visited by more or less frost or other climatic conditions which do not conduce to successful ripening.

No Lack of Moisture. While there has generally been more rain this year than for several seasons a few districts are complaining of lack of moisture, while others have had too much rain. The vast majority of sections have, however, enjoyed ideal conditions throughout the year. Western farmers appear to consider the cold wave as beneficial.

Will Country Through Which Line... Timber Survey Made by Forestry Department.

Where is the timber for the construction of the Hudson Bay railway to be obtained? and will the country through which the lines be able to furnish it?
